## RESOLUTIONS OF CONFERENCE.

1. That the Rev. T. Goldsmith preside over the deliberations of this Conference.
2. That Michael Aikman, Esq., be the Secretary of Conference.
3. That the Rev. David Savage be the Recording Secretary.
4. That the Rev. J. C. Watts be the Conference Reporter.
5. That in the election of President of Conference, the rule shall be, that no person shall be eligible to the Chair who has not a majority of all the votes present, in favor of his appointment; when the ballots come in, if no one has a majority of all the votes present, the two highest on the list shall be taken and balloted for again.
6. That in case any of our probationers fall sick and desire to locate on that account, and should it appear expedient to the Conference to grant their request, their names shall not appear on our Minutes, in that relation, for more than two years; but, should a brother under these circumstances afterwards be accepted as a probationer, the time he travelled previously shall be reckoned as a part of his probation.
7. That a number of colored people in Colchester having proposed to be recognized by our Connexion, and the Conference having heard the report of the Rev. H. Wilkinson, who has visited them, resolved that this Conference feels a deep sympathy with the colored race, and are anxious to do all in their power to spread the Gospel among them, and the Conference remits the consideration of this question to the Stationing Committee, to make the best arrangement in their power, and that if they judge it expedient to employ an agency among them for the following year, £25 of our Mission Funds be placed at their disposal.

13. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the Toronto Circuit, for its commendable conduct in returning the grant made to it, and the Conference would be glad to see this example imitated by other Circuits.

14. That supplies called out under the cognizance of the Annual Committee, and who may afterwards be received into our ministry, shall be considered as having travelled one year, provided they have served as supplies for nine months.

15. That the Conference deeply sympathises with brother Maguire in his sickness, and referring his case to the Annual Committee for the coming year, grants him the sum of £10 to assist him in his sickness.

16. That the Conference highly estimating as it does the character of our former General Superintendent, the Rev. Dr. Crofts, most deeply sympathises with him in the painful bereavement he has been called, in the order of Divine Providence, to sustain, in the removal of his beloved partner by death, and trusts that the consolations of the Gospel, in connection with the consciousness of her happy death, will support him in the trying circumstances in which he is placed.

17. That the Conference deeply sympathising with brother Childs, in his protracted affliction, cordially gives material

expression to this sentiment, by granting to him £25 for the ensuing year.

18. That in consequence of the ill health of brother Oates, at his own request he be allowed to retire from the ministerial life for one year.

19. That brother Bursall's name be placed on the list of supernumeraries at his own request.

20. That it be considered the duty of the Chairmen of Districts to inform all their ministerial brethren of the time and place of holding each district meeting.

21. That in future any minister in charge of a Circuit, who shall neglect to hold missionary meetings on his Circuit or to attend his own missionary appointments during the year, shall not be entitled to any grant from the Mission Fund, for himself, on the Circuit which he may be sent.

22. That in future it shall be the duty of each preacher in charge of a circuit or station, to give at least ten days' notice (post paid) to the superintendent preacher of the circuit or station where the Conference is to be held, of the number and names of the parties who intend going to the Conference from their respective circuits.

23. That brother William Robinson's request to locate for the next year, be granted, and that the Manvers Circuit be recommended to avail itself of his labors, in any way that may be mutually convenient.

24. That the Conference, after hearing the statements and propositions of Mr. Barnum, desires to express its fraternal feelings towards other branches of the Methodist Church, and should they manifest a disposition to unite, as recommended, determines to co-operate with them to secure an object so desirable.

25. That the surplus funds (if any there should be) be divided into three parts, one-third to be given to the Beneficent Fund, one-third to the Chapel Fund, and the remaining third to make up deficiencies.

27. That the Conference particularly requests those Parents connected with our societies, to use all proper means to cause their children to attend, not only our public means of grace, but also our social means, such as prayer meetings, Sabbath schools, &c.

28. That our Mission in the Eastern District be sustained, and that a Minister from the Western part of our work be sent to labor there this year.

29. That the thanks of this Conference be presented to the Rev. J. H. Robinson, for the publication and able Editorship of the 'Evangelical Witness,' and that it be recognized as the organ of our Connexion; feeling convinced that its continuance will be greatly promotive of the best interests of our Church in this Province, and that brother Robinson be respectfully requested to continue his services as Editor, with a grant of £25 to him, for an assistant, commencing from the present Conference.

30. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to Richard Barford, Esq., of London, England, for a generous donation of ninety-five pounds, sterling, to our Chapel fund.

31. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to Job Meigh, Esq., of Ash Hall, Staffordshire, for his generous donation of fifty pounds, sterling, to be used by the General Superintendent as he may think proper, in aid of our operations in this country.

32. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to M. C. Schofield, Esq., of Durham, for his generous donation of a town lot in Fergus, to aid in the erection of Chapels in the Owen Sound District.

33. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to Mr. Cooke, of Bolton, Lancashire, for a donation of four pounds, sterling, to be appropriated to the erection of a chapel in Allinville.

34. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the Executors of the late Isaac Sours, Esq., of Galt, for the remittance of the sum of one hundred and fifty-seven pounds one shilling and eleven pence, being part of the legacy left to our Connexion by Mr. Sours, and the Conference would take this opportunity of expressing its sense of the prompt and honorable manner in which this business has been attended to.

But if the executive preacher be a party implicated, then the chairman of the district shall choose the fifth member; and if the chairman of the district is himself implicated, then, the next oldest preacher in the district shall make the choice."

39. That the Missionary Committee for the following year be the Rev. J. H. Robinson, W. McClure, T. Goldsmith and J. B. Kershaw; with Messrs. Aikman, Sharpe, Darvil, Chapman and Latimer; and that the Rev. J. H. Robinson be Chairman, and Michael Aikman, Esq., Secretary.

40. That the question of the Clergy Reserves being still unsettled and the occasion of protracted controversy in the Province, and there being much misapprehension throughout the entire community as to the position of several of the Christian churches on the matter, this Conference avails itself of the opportunity of expressing its decided disapprobation of any division of these funds among the religious bodies; on the contrary, it desires an absolute and entire secularization.

adopted. It reads as follows:—"The Committee, in conformity with the request of the District Meeting, visited the St. Thomas Circuit on the morning of May the 19th, and at the commencement of their investigations ascertained that the parties upon whose appeal the District Meeting had taken action, had been expelled by a Leaders' Meeting without any appeal having been made by them subsequently to the Circuit-Quarterly Meeting. The Committee felt thus that they were not in a position to treat with the Quarterly Meeting, as that body had taken no part in the expulsion of the protesting parties. The Committee moreover feel it incumbent upon them to record it as their unhesitating conviction, that the above-mentioned Leaders' Meeting was not constituted according to the provisions of the Discipline." The Conference therefore regards the membership of the protesting parties as unaffected by the decision of that meeting.

42. That the Conference deeply regretting the fearful spread of intemperance, again repeats its decided conviction that no measure short of a Prohibitory Liquor Law will meet the exigencies of the case.

43. That the thanks of the Conference be given to Philip St. John, jr., Esq., for his donation of an acre and a half of land for a parsonage site in the Township of Brock.

44. That the Rev. Thos. Goldsmith preach the Ordination Sermon next year.

45. That the Conference expresses its grief that in a country where liberal principles and free institutions prevail so generally as in the neighbouring republic, that Slavery, as a system, continues to be supported, and especially regrets that many portions of the professed church of Christ lend their countenance and aid to the perpetuation and extension of this fearful evil.

46. That the Annual Committee for this year be the Revs. the President, W. McClure and J. H. Robinson, with Messrs. Brett and Aikman.

47. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to T. Lottridge, Esq., for his services as Treasurer during the past year, and that he be requested to accept the office for the ensuing year.

48. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to R. H. Brett for his services as Financial Secretary during the past year, and that he be requested to accept the office for the ensuing year.

# ADDRESS

TO THE

## CONNEXION.

---

DEAR BRETHREN:

Having in the Providence of God been permitted to assemble in Conference, we present you our Annual Address.

Our Conference has been one of unusual interest and importance, Questions perplexing and important—calculated to elicit expression of opinions diversified and even conflicting, and calling into exercise Christian patience and forbearance—have occupied our attention; yet we are happy to state, that brotherly affection for each other, and intense solicitude for the Cause of God, have characterized our discussions. The decisions of our Conference have been, without exception, harmonious and in the main unanimous; and we pray that the blessing of the Great Head of the Church may render them successful in promoting his glory.

The religious services of our Conference were seasons of refreshing to many souls. The word preached, and the ordinances administered were in power, and accompanied with gracious influences, and we hope and pray that the fruits of these services may be seen in a harvest of souls gathered into the Church during the year. Our brethren, both lay and ministerial, have been visited with a holy unction, and baptised into the spirit of love, and will, we hope, return to their several stations to devote themselves more fully to the work of God.

You will perceive from the statistics of the Connexion that we have an increase in the number of our membership of 100; we regret that it is so small, and yet we thank God and take courage. We feel, Brethren, that we should enter into deep heart searching before God, and pray for an unction of the Holy Ghost to rest upon all our Ministers and Churches; then shall "the barren soil be rendered fruitful," "the former and the latter rains" shall come upon us: "the wilderness and the solitary place shall be made glad, and the desert shall blossom as the rose," "the little one shall become a thousand and the small one a great nation."

We are happy in being able to report a large increase in our Mission Fund this year. This is as it should be. This has been the most favorable year, to most classes, in pecuniary matters that our country has ever known, and we do well to let our Christian liberality bear some proportion to the Divine benefaction we receive. Though much has been done during the past to extend our missionary subscription list, still, Brethren we are of opinion, that our resources are not even yet sufficiently developed. Let one and all put their hands to the work and we shall, with God's blessing, largely increase our Mission Fund during the ensuing year. And while on this subject, let us remind you of the claims which our Paternal and Beneficent Funds have upon your sympathies and liberalities. These cannot but commend themselves to your judgments, let them receive your hearty and liberal support.

You will also be glad to learn that something is being done in the way of erecting comfortable Parsonages for our Ministers. Let every Circuit see to it, that their Ministers are comfortably provided for in this respect, and that those Parsonages are secured to the Connexion by good Title Deeds.

we commend it to your sympathy and support. Let every family in our Connexion be supplied with the "Evangelical Witness," and while it will do you and your families good, it will also be a source of future income to the funds of the Connexion.

We would, dear Brethren, affectionately urge upon you punctuality and faithfulness in attending upon all our religious means. Make it a matter of *principle*, regularly to attend all our means of grace, especially our Class and Prayer Meetings. We have never known this to be neglected without bringing on spiritual declension,—your absence discourages your brethren, your Leader and your Minister, and cripples the Church in her efforts to save souls. Brethren, "forsake not the assembling of yourselves together."

And, brethren, permit us to "stir up your pure minds" on the subject of eminent holiness. The true secret of our power to do good, is holiness. We fear there are too many of us resting "in the principles of the doctrines of Christ and not going on to perfection." Brethren, God commands—"be ye holy for I am holy." Let us come up to the standard of Gospel requirements and seek the "sanctification of body, soul and spirit" unto God, "to be filled with all the fullness of God"—then shall our "peace flow as a river and our righteousness abound as the waves of the sea," and then others "seeing our good works, will glorify our Father which is in Heaven."

Our Stationing Committee have been seriously embarrassed from want of a sufficient number of Ministers to supply all the demands that are upon them. While we have received some additional probationers for our Ministry, some have been compelled, by affliction, to retire for the present from our ranks; and, at the same time, fresh applications from new and important places are reaching us for our Ministers and the establishment of our Church amongst them; and it is a matter of no ordinary

grief to us, that for want of a sufficient number of Ministers, we have been compelled to decline openings that would have been important to us as a Connexion. "Pray ye the Lord of the harvest that he would send forth more laborers into his harvest."

And now, brethren, we commend to your cordial welcome and co-operation, the servants of God whom we have appointed to labour amongst you. Give them not only a generous pecuniary support, but also a hearty co-operation in carrying out the Discipline and promoting the spirituality of the church. As a connexion, we admit the laity into all our church courts, and we expect your sympathy and support in all our official duties. Hold up the hands of your Ministers, and sustain them by your prayers, your labours, and your liberalities, and God will bless your united labours to promote his glory.

Finally, brethren, we commend you to God and to the word of his grace, which is able to build you up and to give you an inheritance amongst all them that are sanctified.

# ADDRESS

OF THE

## CANADIAN CONFERENCE

TO THE

### ENGLISH CONFERENCE.

BELOVED BRETHREN IN THE LORD:

The pleasing custom of annually addressing you, which Christian courtesy dictates and Christian love prompts, we gladly perpetuate. It is to be hoped that this fraternal recognition may never become a mere matter of conferential form or venerated usage, but that it will ever be, as in the past, a link of warmest attachment, a pledge of Christian fellowship, and an incentive to faithfulness, co-operation, and full consideration in the best of all causes—the salvation of the human family through the blood of the Lamb.

The Great Redeemer hath said, "By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another." This trait of discipleship we have. We enjoy and delight in "endeavouring to keep the unity of the Spirit," not only amongst ourselves, but with you, the parent community, beyond the vast Atlantic. Oceans may roll between the children of God, but cannot prevent "the communion of spirits." That indissoluble tie,

constrains us sweetly to sympathise with you. We weep, when you have cause to weep: we rejoice, when the smile of our Heavenly Father inspires your hearts with joy. The gradual extension of our cause in England, through Home and Missionary efforts, liquidation of chapel debts, special services for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit, is a pleasing feature in the news we hear of you. To God be all the glory. One in principles, in faith, in object, in heart, and best of all, *one in Christ*; we hail your progress, material or spiritual, with gratitude and delight, and earnestly pray "that ye may become a thousand times as many more as ye are."

In this land of increasing interest and importance—the land of our toils and triumphs—the liberal principles of our church, congenial alike to the spirit of the people and to the spirit of Christianity, are rapidly spreading. Kindred communities—the Primitive Methodists and Bible Christians—aid us in this great work: whilst we rejoice in the indisputable fact that there is not a single Christian church around us, however despotic its polity theoretically, but is thoroughly leavened with these Scriptural principles, and practically liberalised. The Church of England in this land has its conventions, in which the clergy and laity are associated. in full connexion, and an addition of 100 to our members on probation,—being a total increase of 259.

Much has also been done towards the consolidation of our community in this Province. Our ministry is increasingly respectable, talented and earnest; our membership loyal and multiplying. Chapels and parsonages are in course of erection on many of our circuits, and the Christian benevolence of our people is rapidly developing.

We have been much encouraged in our efforts by the munificent liberality of our friends, Richd. Barford, Esq., of London; Job Meigh, Esq., of Staffordshire; and Thos. Firth and Sons, of Sheffield,—who have given £95, £50, and £100, sterling, respectively for chapels and parsonages in Canada. We present our most grateful acknowledgments to those kind brethren, praying that God may abundantly reward them with the richer blessings of his grace. The labours of our beloved General Superintendent, the Rev. J. H. Robinson, in the general work, and in the establishment of a Connexional periodical by him, and since conducted by his able editorship, have been of incalculable service to us. Our Assistant Superintendent enjoys our affectionate confidence, and his services are highly beneficial. But the best of all is, God is with us. Through his blessing we are prospering numerically, financially, and spiritually. And we are still labouring and praying, believing and hoping for brighter days, and tenfold success. Our great want is the Holy Ghost. O may God in answer to ten thousand prayers bless you and us with a Pentecostal baptism, that the coming year may be one remarkably distinguished by a glorious ingathering of precious souls to the fold of the Great Shepherd.

Our Conference has been characterised on the whole by great unanimity. There has been a happy combination of warmth and meekness, faithfulness and patience in all its discussions. Love to the brethren has been delightfully exemplified the

whole of the session. It augurs well for our future prosperity, that the number of ministers enjoying or earnestly seeking the attainment of perfect love is steadily increasing. O may the time speedily arrive when all shall be "men full of the Holy Ghost and of faith."

We believe this to be the great essential in the churches at the present day. The tone of piety must be deepened in the memberships. The standard of holiness must be exalted in the ministry. Then would the church be mighty as of old, "fair as the moon, clear as the sun, and terrible as an army with banners."

All the world is in commotion in the present age. Mighty revolutions are taking place. Awakening myriads are crying "Come and help us." Devoted Missionaries, overwhelmed with toils, are appealing with thrilling earnestness to the church.— Oh! let us arise; and equipped with the whole armour of God, and fired with a quenchless zeal to rescue souls from eternal ruin, let us "come up to the help of the Lord, to the help of the Lord against the mighty." The word of God does not say, "Where Liberty is, there is the Spirit," but, "Where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is Liberty": yes, and prosperity too. We may have liberty and glory in it;—we may have, in addition, wealth, talent and skill, but unless we have "the Holy Ghost," our efforts will be powerless and futile. This is so trite a religious truth, that it is universally acknowledged, but we fail to realize its vast importance. Whilst we prize a liberal polity, let us pray for the Spirit, remembering that "our sufficiency is of God," and of God alone.

We also feel more deeply conscious than ever, that one of the greatest wants of the age is Christian union. We deplore the numerous and lamentable divisions in the church at the present day. As the result, the energies of half-a-dozen ministers of different churches are wasted in a neighborhood, where one man, doing the work of an evangelist, would be sufficient. In the midst of a spare population, we feel this evil more than you will. Probably there will be a diversity in the formulas of religious belief and church order till we meet around the throne of the God of truth; but are there not many churches closely approximating in doctrine and polity, and therefore criminally separate? Does not this occasion much unhallowed competition and strife? Does it not weaken our strength, and cause the Papist and the Infidel to triumph? Would not several of the Methodist communities be stronger, more prosperous, and better every way, if united? Do not our divisions grieve the Holy Spirit of our God? May God teach us the good and right way, and hasten the time when there shall be one fold and one shepherd.

Brethren, the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit.
