Independent Order of Odd Fellows.

Belleville, August 1st, 1877.

At a special session of Belleville and Mizpah Lodges, held for that purpose, the Grand Lodge of Ontario being in waiting, and having been duly announced by the Grand Marshal, was introduced and appropriately received.

Bro. Wm. Davis, N. G. of Belleville Lodge No. 81, on behalf of the order in Belleville, greeted the Grand Lodge with a cordial welcome, and expressed the gratification they experienced at the honor conferred upon them in holding this session in their town, and concluded by tendering to the Grand Lodge, for the purposes of the present session, the free use of the hall and ante-rooms.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE M,W. GRAND MASTER.

To the Right Worthy Grand Lodge, I. O. O. F., Province of On'ario:

REPRESENTATIVES AND BROTHERS:

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Under the directions of our constitution, the pleasing duty now devolves upon me of laying before the Right Worthy Grand Lodge, my official report for the year just closed. Peace, harmony, brotherly-love, and satisfactory progress have been constant visitors in our Lodge rooms during the past twelve months. Our Lodges have increased in number; our membership enlarged its circle; our widows', orphaus', and general fund strengthened in amount; our property enhanced in value, and Oddfellowship everywhere throughout this fair Province, rapidly taking, if not already secured, the front rank of the charitable, philanthropic, fraternal societies of the age. Born in America, as it were but yesterday; not yet passed its childhood,-reckoned, as the years of nations and other kindred societies are counted-still, our Order, for all that is good, noble, generous and worthy, has become a mighty power in the land. In age but an infant, in good works, acts and deeds, a giant. Well may Oddfellens with pardonable pride affirm their allegiance to the wonderful magnetic influence and power of the Three Golden Links,—acknowledging, first, their daily duty and consecration to their Maker; secondly, their patriotic devotion and pride for their country, and thirdly their unwavering attachment and unswerving love for the great Brotherhood.

I will now proceed, briefly, to refer to all important matters arising during my term of office, and invite earnest consideration and wise legislation in the disposal thereof.

#### II.—OFFICIAL ACTS.

DURHAN LODGE No. 78.—In compliance with instructions of Grand Lodge (Journal 1876, page 1659.) on 15th August last, I restored to Durham Lodge. No. 78, (being the fifth anniversary of institution) its charter, seal and properties. In connection with the restoration of this charter two questions have arisen, and which I only decided after consulting with those of the G. L. U. S., whose opinion I considered valuable and conclusive.

First. That the suspension of a Lodge does not relieve the members of the said Lodge from paying the dues accruing during time of suspension, after restoration of the charter.

Second. That like suspension does not relieve the subordinate Lodge from paying to Grand Lodge per capita tax, with semi-annual returns due and returnable, during time of suspension.

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Gorrie Longe, No. 192.—As instructed by resolution of Grand Lodge, (Session 1876, page 1701) I investigated the petition for warrant for Lodge, at Gorrie. Obtaining all the information I could upon the question, seeking the advice of those qualified to judge, and carefully considering the point at issue in all its bearings, I arrived at the conclusion that a dispensation by Granted, and a Bodge organized. District Deputy J. Campbell carried out my decision by instituting the Lodge, 19th September, 1876.

Belleville Lodge, No. 81.—On the petition of several members of this Lodge, and at the request of the Lodge itself, as evidenced by resolution, I Lodge, and at the request of the Lodge itself, as evidenced by resolution, I visited the Lodge on 1st March last. The matters in contest between members, so far as they came before me, were examined, considered and decided, I have reason to believe to the satisfaction of all concerned. The misconceptions which might have caused at least trouble and irritation, if not more serious consequences, have through the good judgment and thoughtful consideration of the members been avoided. In my visit I was ably and efficiently assisted by the counsel and advice of Dr. Fife Fowler, Grand Warden, and District Deputy Grand Master T. G. Carson.

Dues and Benefits.—As directed by Report of Committee on Legislation, (Journal 1876, page 1854,) I appointed the following Select Committee on dues and benefits, who I understand will make a majority and minority report the present session of this Grand Lodge, viz: Dr. George Wright, and Master; Dr. Cl. T. Campbell, Deputy Grand Master, and Representatives Hu. Blain, D. L. McFarlane, W. D. Gordon.

COMMITTEE ON BY-LAWS.—The following Representatives have kindly performed the laborhous duties of Committee on By-laws for the past year, whose Repert will be presented in regular order: W. S. Campbell, Brantford; W. A. Rawlings, St. Catharines; and Robt. Kirkpatrick, London.

AUDIT COMMITTEES.—Representatives Charles Pacckart, of Stratford, and W. George Mutton, of Toronto, have performed the duties of Auditors. Their Report at the proper time will be laid before the Grand Lodge.

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## III.—NEW LODGES.

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re nnNotwithstanding the very great and increasing depression in trade, manufactures, and commerce in all the various branches, applications for registern dispensations for new Lodges have been received, and each separate petition, on the approval of the District Deputy, has been granted. From the reports of the installing officers for the past half year, I note the most favourable accounts from each new Lodge, and have every reason to believe that in due course of time they will become strong and valuable, and add largely to the future success of our Order.

I respectfully request the approval of the Grand Lodge to the dispensations thus granted, by directing the regular and proper charters to be issued in due course.

The kindly receptions, the flattering attentions, and the high honor accorded to me as the Head of the Order, will ever continue to be a pleasing and gratifying reflection. To those Lodges extending an invitation for an official visit, and to those warm-hearted, hospitable brothers who cared for me, provided, protected, and helped me on my journeys,—one and all,—I sincerely thank from the depths of a

### V .- HALL DEDICATIONS.

It has been my privilege and pleasure to take part in the pleasing and instructive ceremony of the public dedication of four halls, for the uses and jurposes of Oddfellowship. In each instance the arrangements made were perfect and complete in every detail, and carried out by the respective committees in a most satisfactory manner. The new halls are comfortable, of good size, tastefully and appropriately fitted up and arranged, showing good judgment on the part of the Lodges in securing suitable, neatly furnished rooms, and at the same time without unnecessary or extravagant expenditure of Lodge funds. In this connection, I have thus publicly to express my regret to the members of Livingstone Lodge, No. 180, Thorold, and to my brother Oddfellows on the Welland Canal for my inability to join in the dedication of Thorold Lodge Room, on 21st February. To D. D. G. M. McConachte of Welland, I am greatly indebted for so ably and satisfactorily supplying my place on that occasion, on exceedingly short notice. The halls dedicated by me were:

VI.—NEW CHARTERS FOR LODGES DESTROYED BY FIRE.

Since last session of the Grand Lodge, thrue Subordinate Lodges have lost their Charters by fire, viz.:

Cambridge Lodge, No. 188, Preston, burnt 12th January, 1877.

Oak Leaf. "No. 159, Hamilton, burnt 10th April, 1877.

Niagara Falls "No. 58, Clifton, burnt 19th April, 1877.

Following the action of the Grand Lodge, in the case of Rond Eau Lodge No. 40, (session 1876, page of the Journal, 1606,) I directed the Grand Secretary to supply, in each of the three cases above named, new charters free of charge, and now respectfully ask the approval of the Grand Lodge of my action in this matter.

#### VII.-DISPENSATIONS GRANTED.

Jarvis Lodge, No. 191, instituted 11th September, 1876, was burned out on the 26th December following, losing their furniture, regalia and charter, with but a partial insurance on the property. On the application of the Lodge and the approval of D. D. G. M. Hodgson, I granted a dispensation to Jarvis Lodge to receive donations from the Lodges in District No. 16, to assist in repairing the loss and re-furnithing the new Lodge room. The response, I am pleased to report, was prompt and generous, and reflects great credit on the members in that district for their timely and acceptable action in aid of a sister Lodge in the day of its distress and misfortune.

During the year, I have also granted many dispensations for pic-nics, socials and concerts in the name of the Order, and the wearing regalia at funerals and public occasions apportaining to Oddfellowship. In several cases dispensations were asked for and given by telegraph, thereby preventing me from giving words of caution and advice, as I would otherwise have done. In my opinion the Grand Lodge should settle and determine by general law the conditions, and the only condition, on which the name of the Order could be used, and the regalia displayed outside the Lodge room on public occasions. All dispensations hereafter granted only to be in ac-

cordance with general regulations. Such legislation and practice would secure uniformity throughout the whole jurisdiction, and provide a safeguard against hasty action, and possibly unpleasant complications.

# VIII.-DISPENSATIONS REFUSED.

I declined granting dispensations for the following purposes:-

- (a). To initiate a candidate a few days under 21 years of age.
- (b). To waive the requirements of our law as to six months residence of candidate.
- (c). To initiate a candidate residing in an adjoining local jurisdiction without the consent of the Lodge in said adjoining jurisdiction.
- (d). To waive re-ballot when candidate did not present himself for initiation within thirteen weeks from acceptance by Lodge.
- (e). To wear regalla in a public procession of a semi-political religious character. Replying to this application I said, "Our Order is ron-political, non-sectarian."

# IX.—DISTRICT DEPUTY GRAND MASTERS.

As a simple act of justice, I tender, with unfeigned pleasure, my heart-felt thanks to the District Deputies for their unwearded exertions, unflagging interest and invaluable assistance throughout the year just closed. In their selection and approval by Giand Ledge, the Order has been fortunate in securing the assistance of well tried, trosty and experienced brothers, who in the discharge of their responsible and frequently very delicate duties, have shown patience, prudence and good judgment. Necessarily, in a great measure, the yearly progress and permanent success of our Order largely rests with those officers, in whose hands, for the time being, are intrusted the guidance and government of the brotherhood. The office is certainly of the first importance in dignity, honor and position, and when good and faithful servants are found, their continued services should be secured. The past year my intercourse with the Deputies has been of the most pleasing and setisfactory character, and their aid and support highly valued. For interesting extracts and valuable suggestions from district reports, refer to Paper A.

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RESIGNATIONS, D. D. G. MASTERS.—District Deputy Grand Master, James Brown, having removed from District No. 6, resigned his commission, which I accepted, and filled the vacaley by appointing J. W. Wonch, of Brougham Lodge, No. 155. Also, District Deputy E. E. Chipmen, of Park Hill, being about to remove from Ontario to Manitoba, placed his resignation in my

hands. At my urgent request, Past Grand Master Wm. N. Fore, of St. Marys, consented to perform the duties of the office for the remainder of the year. In Brother Chipman's removal from this jurisdiction the Order has lost a most earnest and consistent member, one who was ever ready to perform his whole duty in every particular. For the two appointments of all the before mentioned vacancies, I crave the sanction of the Grand Lodge.

#### X .- OBITUARY.

On the 28th November I was summoned to London for the purpose of performing the last sad rites of our fraternity over the mortal remains of my immediate predecessor in this chair, Past Grand Master H. E. Buttrey, who died on the 28th of that month.

The name of our departed brother is too fresh in the memory of all to render it necessary for me to refer at length to his work or his character. Faithful and carnest, whether as a private member or an official of the Order, he performed every duty assigned to him in a manner that received the approval of his brethren, and secured his elevation to the chief places amongst us. On the occasion of his death, the members of the Order showed themselves mindful of the command of our laws to "bury the dead," and at the same time testified to the esteem in which he was held, by assembling in large numbers from different parts of the jurisdiction. We laid his remains in the dust in charitable forgetfulness of all faults and failings—the common iot of mankind,—with warm recognition of his many virtues, and with deep sympathy for the widow and orphans left in our care.

## XI.—QUESTIONS SUBMITTED AND ANSWERED.

A great number of questions have been submitted by Lodges at dimensers for my opinion. Many of the questions related merely to the interpretation of Subordinate Lodge By-Laws, and others to points well established by law and custom. Nevertheless, while to the Grand Officers the major portion of the questions submitted may appear very trifling, we should not forget that the new Lodges instituted, the new members initiated, and the new officers installed, creates each year a large new element of officers and members. What, therefore, may appear a very simple question of law or practice, may be regarded as a very important one to the Lodge asking for instructions, and the members seeking for advice. To all presented to may I have given careful consideration, and I trust correct decisions. A few of those of more general character are herewith submitted for examination and disposal by Grand Lodge. [See paper B.]

#### XII.—SUEORDINATE LODGE RETURNS.

· The report of the Standing Committee on Returns at the last session of

the Grand Lodge, enumerates 103 returns from 73 Lodges as being imperfect in some particular, such as "error in membership," "error in financial statement," "error in capita tax," "error in visiting cards," "no seal" "no signature of secretary," "no financial statement," "names of representatives omitted," &c. It is a matter of grave importance that all returns and statistics of our Subordinate Lodges, membership in its various branches, iu-Stiations, deposit of cards, withdrawals, suspensions, deaths, financial statements, receipts, dues, fines, donations, benefits, (sick, funeral, widows and orphans,) should be scrupulcusiy correct and reliable. To secure so desirable an object, in December last I drew the attention of the D. D. G. M's. to the existing errors, and I have good reason to believe that the larger portion have been corrected, and trust that the semi-annual returns for the year just closed will show a marked improvement on the past. Most heartly do I concur with the committee of last year in their suggestions as to the office of Secretary, and the duty of Representatives to carefully examine all semi-annual returns, and thereby secure correctness. # XIII.—SUSPENSIONS, N. P. D.

The rapidly increasing number of "suspended" and "dropped" members for n. p. d. must cause deep anxiety and pain to every thoughtful, earnest Odd Fellow. From the universal depression and general stagnation of business, I feared still isrger loss from this cause, the year just closed. To check this great source of depletion, a special appeal was issued to each Subordinate Lodge in November, pleading for extra delay and brotherly care and consideration. I have good reason to know that my communication was universally acted upon, in that spirit of fraternal love and charity so prominent within our Lodge rooms. I also observe with pleasure that this question is now engaging the close attention of some of the oldest and clearest minds among the Representatives and Officers of the G. L. U. S., and earnestly hope for speedy and successful legislation by the Supreme Grand Lodge to stay great annual loss of membership. [For letter to Subordinate Lodges see paper D.]

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### XIV.—CORRESPONDENCE.

With the rapid and gratifying yearly growth of our Order, the necessary correspondence of the Grand Master naturally increases in volume and importance. For the past year it has been very large, yet not by any means too extensive to keep up a lively and I believe advantageous intercourse between the chief executive head and the Lodges under his supervision. I have endeavored to be reasonably prompt in the discharge of this duty and trust I have been tairly successful in my efforts in this direction. Throughout, this correspondence, with Grand Officers, District Deputies, Lodges, and individual members, has been of a very pleasing cnaracter, and I am confi-

fident that on all sides, the one object in view was, the honor, integrity, stability and progress of the brotherhood. All communications of special consequence, and my replies thereto, are now placed before the Grand Lodge for examination and approval.

With the correspondence will be found several letters from the widow of our respected late Grand Master, Brother Buttrey and copies of my replies thereto. The case of the widow is peculiarly touching and cannot fail to receive from the Grand, Lodge the fullest consideration and the warmest practical sympathy.

#### XV.-ST. JOHN FIRE.

The startling report of the terrible and destructive fire in the City of St. John, N. B., sweeping away the entire business part of the city, and causing loss of property, and suffering of person, words can faintly express-fell upon our Province with fearful suddenness and sadness. The whole population of our  $\mathbf{D}_i$  minion was electrified at the awful calamity, and moved as one body, directed by one controlling master-hand and mind, to promptly and efficiently relieve our suffering fellow citizens. Provisions, clothing and money were dispatched from all points, and placed at the disposal of the authorities of the distressed city, as fast as steam could convey, and the lightning spark of the telegraph flash. Naturally our first thoughts were for our brother Odd Fellows in that distant land, to learn their loss—to know their wants. -and then to apply the remedy, of succour and relief. Through the well directed exertions de our Grand Secretary, by telegraph, the members of the "Advisory Board" acting in unison, and unanimous approval, obtained the appropriation of \$400 for that purpose. Speed, promptness and dispatch were all important, and as there was no time for doubt, discussion or hesitation, the wishes of the Board were confirmed, and the money paid by the Grand Treasurer. In addition to this grant of Grand Lodge funds, several Subordinate Lodges made special appropriations, which were sent direct to the Grand Officers in St. John. The correspondence is in the possession of the Grand Secretary, and by that officer will be laid on the table of the Grand Lodge. It is expected that before the close of the present session complete detailed information will be received, and it will then be the privilege of this Grand body to devise and arrange such further measures of relief and assistance as may be required.

## XVI.—CIRCULAR GRAND SIRE ORDER.

In the month of April, 1877, I issued the following circular (enclosing copy of the proclamation of the M. W. Grand Sire) to each of my deputies and also had a copy posted to each Lodge. Only a few instances have been reported to me of illegal odes being in use, and which in every case were pron-ptly suppressed. [For circular see Paper E.]

#### XVII.—CHANGE OF NAME G. L. U. S.

The instructions of the Grand Lodge, as per resolution (page 1645 Journals 1876) relative to change of name of G. L. U. S., I carried out at an early day. On the first of September last I addressed a letter to the Grand Master and Grand Patriarch of each Grand Jurisdiction in America and siso caused a copy of the same to be laid on the desk of the Representatives at the meeting of the G. L. U. S. in Philadelphia. Following up the action of this Grand Lodge, our Representatives gave notice of motion, signed by one hundred members, to amend the Constitution in this respect and which proposed amendment will be considered at the ensuing meeting to be held in Baltimore, in September. [For copy of my letter, see Paper F, and for which I ask the approval of the Grand Lodge.]

#### XVIII.-HISTORY.

I would call your attention to the urgent necessity of this Grand Lodge taking immediate steps to place on record in a permanent shape the early history of Oddfellowsh'p in Canada. The duty devolves on us from the fact that this Grand Lodge is the direct successor of the first regularly constituted authority of the Order in British America having under its jurisdiction all the Lodges now existing in the Dominon, that were instituted by or under the control of the old Grand Lodge of Canada.

The history of Oddiellowship in this country, previous to the organization of our own Grand Lodge, is in a confused and imperfect condition. Most of the records are lost and nearly all the polers have passed away. By prompt action now possibly we may secure from the survivors the necessary information from which to write our history. Whereas, in a few years, to do so it will be surrounded with difficulties. Something has already been done. This Grand Lodge appointed a Committee on History three years ago, but without power to incur the necessary expense. Dep. G. M. Dr. Campbell has given some interesting and valuable sketches in the Oddfellows' Cr mpanion which can be utilized, but unless the Crund Lodge authorizes the expenditure necessary to obtain all the required information it will be impossible for any one to collect the materials and present the history in a perfect form.

#### MIX.-LIBRARIES AND READING ROOMS.

At the last session of the G. L. W. P. the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved,—"That Lodge Libraries are a necessity of the Order and should by all means be encouraged, and that the funds of Lodges may be appropriated for that purpose; but that the monner and measure of such appropriations are proper subjects of local legislation." It will thus be observed that the doubtful question of the right of Subordinate Lodges to grant funds for libraries is set at rest. It now becomes the duty of this Grand Lodge to legislate in the premises and determine "the manner and measure" of such appropriations by some general regulations and thereby give full force and effect to the acts of the Supreme Grand Lodge.

With these new powers in operation, it is to be hoped that every Sutordinate Lodge will at least supply itself with the current weekly and mosthly Oddfellows' publications, and so place within the reach of every member an opportunity of keeping pace with the rapid onward march of our Order on this continent. The old adage that "Knowledge is power," with us has a fuller and more comprehensive meaning than in its general application in Oddfellowskip not only is knowledge power, but it is life, vigor, growth, vitality and strength to each Subordinate Lodge, and fullness, freshness and force to every individual member.

Let a beginning, however small, be speedly made, and thus secure not alone the nucleus of valuable and richly stored libraries bereafter, but information and present interest united and consolidated exort for members now, and well secured order and solidity of our Order in the far distant future.

# XX.-MUTUAL RELIEF AND PROVIDENT ASSOCIATIONS.

I would indeed fail in my duty were I to omit to direct special attention to the Mutual Aid Association organized in this Grand Jurisdiction for the exclusive beneft of Odd Fellows, the one at Hamilton, instituted 8th June, 1869, and incorporated in 1871; and the other at Kingston, incorporated 16th April, 1875. This system of Life Insurance in our Order has been largely test of in other and older Grand Jurisdictions and has proved of great benefit to the families of deceased members, who prudently and thoughtfully availed themselves of this mode of protection for the widow and orphan.

I regret, however, to learn from the annual report before me, that comparatively few of our members have taken advantage of so favorable an opportunity, to secure such a worthy and commendable provision for those who have the highest claims on our care, forethought and protection. Out of a membership on our Grand Secretary's books, in round numbers, of twelve thousand Oddfellows we have only about twelve hundred members holding policies in these two associations. Instead of one out of ten, or ten per cent. of our members being protected and covered by a mutual life policy, there is no reason why at least one-half of our membership, or five

times the number now insured should not be policy-holders in these associations. The Hamilton Company, since its institution has paid \$3,885, on 17 policies, and the Kingston Company, \$5,375, on 7 claims. The management and directing control of each company is in the hands of prudent and experienced Oddfellows, and all interested may feel assured that every under, taking will be honestly and faithfully carried out. The value of the policy is well secured, the annual cost very low, the calls small and easy of payment, and the satisfaction enjoyed of knowing that every dollar paid does double duty, secures the double object; first, of helping and assisting the family of a deceased brother Oddfellow, and secondly, of providing sure and certain provision for our own family hereafter. On the attention of every representative to this Grand Lodge I strongly urge the duty of bringing this important question before each subordinate lodge and arranging for reliable agencies, whereby every facility may be given to all our members to secure this cheap and satisfactory mode of protection for "the loved ones at home."

## XXI-FIRE INSURANCE LODGE PROPERTY.

It is estimated that our one hundred and seventy-seven lodges have invested in furniture, fittings and regalia in round figures one hundred thousand dollars. In far too many cases the lodges have no fire policies on this description of property, and in many other instances, even where insured, the risk covered, is greatly below the true insurance value. Each lodge owes it to itself, yea, owes it to every other lodge, to provide a reasonable amount of insurance on their a weable property. The sudden and unexpected loss by fire (from careless neglect of insurance) of one lodge room unquestionably to a greater or lesser extent affects the financial reputation of the whole. Therefore in the interest of all, for the mutual protection of all, it is clearly the duty of every lodge, to be reasonably and as far as possible, safely insured in some good solvent company. How best to secure this worthy object, is a question in my judgment well deserving the careful and patient consideration of the Grand Lodge.

#### XXII.-LEGISLATION.

In administering the affairs of the office of Grand Master, my attention was early directed to the fact that on several points deeply affecting every subordinate lodge, we had no general law governing the whole jurisdiction, but were left to local Lodge legislation. More especially do I refer to the questions of punishment by reprimand, the mode and manner of suspensions for n. p. d., the same as to "dropped" members, members when entitled to benefits, after initiation or deposit of card; and when entitled to benefits, after payment of arrears. Being stroagly impressed with the conviction that a general law should govern these several important and general questions, and thereby secure uniformity in Oniario, I addressed a letter to the Grand Masters of each state in America, asking for their custom, their

practice, and their law. Replies have been received from thirty-six Grand Officers, giving full and valuable information on the particular points desired. The full correspondence I now lay before the Grand Lodge, inviting caref. I and thorough consideration of the same.

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### XXIII.—PROCEEDINGS GRAND JURISDICTIONS.

On application by letter to the proper officers, I have received the printed journals of proceedings of the last session from nearly all the State Grand bodies under the control of the Supreme Grand Lodge. These records are always interesting and instructive, and I feel it important that the work, yearly progress, and constitutional laws prevailing in our sister jurisdictions should be more widely known in Ontario. Several Grand Lodges have a regularly yearly appointed Standing Committee, whose duty it is to minutely examine the proceedings of kindred Grand Lodges, and report all matters of importance, law and custom. This report is considered one of the most interesting and valuable of the session, spreading broadcast within such local jurisdiction the essence of the yearly results, changes and improvements of the Order on this Continent, and in foreign countries. Most earnestly I invite the attention of our Grand Lodge to this point, and recommend provision should be made for a regularly constituted committee to carry out this practice, with instructions to report the first day of each annual session. As an example of the duties and results of such a committee, I confidently refer to the journals of Wisconsin for December, 1876.

#### XXIV .- CONCLUSION.

In no words of mere form or compliment, do I desire to acknowledge my obligations, to the Grand Officers, and Past Grand Masters for valuable ald and timely assistance during the year. I do so gratefully and with sincere and hearty thanks. More especially am I indebted to our esteemed and Right Worthy Grand Secretary, for prompt correspondence, active co-operation and advice cheerfully rendered upon all occasions.

And now, Representatives and Members, let us, with a will, address ourselves to the duties of the day. Let us review the history of our Order in
Ontario with thoughtfciness and care, and closely examine each step in
the past, particularly the work of the closing year, and then diligently apply ourselves to wisely legislate for the future; let us sink the foundations
deep; build them broad and strong, and by our success secure to future generations the stability, power and permanency of the wide-spreading, everer larging principles of the great Brotherhood of Oddfellowship.

# EXTRACTS REPORTS DISTRICT DEPUTY GRAND MASTER.

DISTRICT NO. 1.—Deputy J. T. WHITE, Brockville.

Pembroke Lodge, No. 203, Pembroke, instituted April 11, 1877.

Reports for both half years received in good time. Term ending December, heputy White says: "It affords me no little pleasure to say, that all the Lodges (with two exceptions) in this district are doing well, and all the reports went in in good time to the R. W. Grand Sceretary. I am also pleased to say, some of the Lodges are in sple-tidd condition and bid fair to rank with 'ainy Lodge in the Province. Old Brock, No. 9; Amity No. 80; and St. Lawrence, No. 137, are flourising with renewed energy." He says, in July report, dated 12 h: "All officers have been installed and returns sent to the Grand Secre ary. I am pleased to be in a position to say, that so far as Oddfellowship is concerned, in this district it, is on the increase, and becoming more popular with the public, which is a very gratifying resulf. The new Lodge at Pembroke, instituted in April last, is doing well, and few Lodges start under more favorable circums ances." The attention of the Grand Lodge is called to Capital Lodge, No. 141, and considerate legisla ion asked for.

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DISTRICT NO. 2.—Deputy A. L. MORDEN, Napanee.

Both half-yearly reports received, which are very full and complete. He installed the officers of all Lodges for first term, and says: "Cataraqui, No. 10. This Lodge is worked in an admirable manner. The lows are neatly kept, and finances in most gratifying condition, and only a trilling amount in arrears for dues. Kingston Lodge, No. 59, I was delighted to meet a

large number of Brethren, and too much praise can hardly be accorded to this Lodge for the manner in which the work is done. The future projects of the Lodge are of a most cheering character.

Napanee Lodge, No. 86.—The work is fairly well doue. In its membership are zealous, hard-working Odd Fellows, who steadily keep the good to the Lodge and Order in view."

In the report for July, Brother Morden's ays: "The semi-annual returns exhibit a gratifying increase in the aggregate membership during the year, and the later returns show a diminution in the suspensions for N. P. D. That is an encouraging feature, and one that may be largely attributed to your earnest appeal to the Order, in your jurisdiction, to address themselves with fraternal zeal and sympathy, to the wirk of staying the serious drain upon our members, caused by this single agency. Cataraqui Lodge, No. 10, has completed and dedicated as new spacious and very handsomaloge Room, with reading room and ante-rooms adjoining fitted with all the modern improvements. Napance and Gananoque Lodge have each provided themselves with improved Lodge Rooms and are now in very comfortable circumstances. In that respect I am pleased to be able to state that the anticipations formed by me of the success of Gananoque Lodge in my last report, nave been fairly realized."

# DISTRICT NO. 3 .- T. G. CARSON, Deputy, Picton.

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Reports for both terms received in good time. In January last the Deputy visited all the Lodges and installed officers, except Madoe, No. 179; Trenton, No. 113; Doscronto, No. 103, Mill Polat. Bith for good-tidy rooms and for quality of membership these Lodges are to be congratulated. Belleville, No. 81, and Mizpah, No. 127, "Lodges of Brothers," with their room and fixtures that is a credit to the two Lodges in Belleville as well as to the Order at large. Bay of Quinteh, No. 143, stands second to none in Ontario as to the quality of its membership, its working and its weath." In last report Brother Carson says: "Visited Madoe Lodge, No. 179 and must say was agreeably disappointed to see how well a candidate was initiated with scarcely the use of a book."

DISTRICTS NOS. 4 AND 5. -W. H. SCOTT, Deputy, Peterboro'.

Cicerone Lodge, No. 195, Woodville, instituted 28th December, 1878.

In the last report received from Brother Scott he says: "The Order in the Districts under my charge has been making very satisfactory progress, during the year the increase in members being equal in percentage to that of preceding years. I have also to report the institution of a new Lodge at Woodville in December last, pursuant to your warrant, a Lodge that from its local situation and from the standing of its charter members is likely to prove very successful and have a large sphere of usefulness."

DISTRICT NO. 6.—JAMES BROWN, Deputy, Oshawa,
" J. W. WONCH, " Whitevale,

Leaving the District on 28th February, Bro. James Brown resigned his commission and Brother J. W. Wonch was appointed for the remainder of the term. Under date of 10th July, he says: "I have to report that the officers in my District were installed the first week of this month and returns forwarded. For the past year we have an increase of members, fluance, and in the good opinion of the public. Our members understand their obligations and carry them out, thereby raising our Order in the estimation of all worthy and right thinking citizens."

# DISTRICT NO. 7.-W. B. RUSSELL, Deputy, Uxbridge.

The two half-yearly reports reached me in good time. In January the Deputy says: "I am happy to state that the Lodges in this District are working harmoniously, and there is every prospect of building up Lodges that will be a credit to our beloved Order." In July he says: "I have visited and installed the officers in my District and find the Lodges in a very healthy condition, kill having increased in membership, and consequently in funds."

DISTRICT NO. 8 .- H. WILSON, Deputy, Markham.

Weston Lodge, No 200, Weston, instituted 27th February, 1877.

Barrie Lodge, No. 63, is rapidly increasing in membership, and will soon have the best in the District. Cookstown No. 182, the accounts and books are well kept and the brethren attentive to the work. Alliston, No. 171, the books and papers of this Lodge were in excellent order and there were no suspensions for N. P. D. North Star, No. 68, Stayner. This Lodge donated \$30 for St. John, N. B. Bro. G. P. Bishop was deputed to install officers. Collingwood Lodge, No. 54, the books are better kept and the work better performed than in any other Lodge in my-District. This is the parent Lodge. I regret I ceuld not pay Parry Sound Lodge, No. 189, a vibit, as I am aware of the value of such attention from a Grand Officer. On the whole I can congratulate you on the state of the Order in this Industrict. The Bethren are hard working and enthusiastic and the Order, is fourishing."

#### DISTRICT NO 10 .- A. S. GILLET, Deputy, Milton.

Acton Lodge, No. 204, Instituted April 13th, 1877.

The two semi-annual reports received in good time. In the July report Brother Gillet says: "I can say, that Oddfellowship in this District is prosperous, and I can observe with pleasure the kind and brotherly feeling existing between the different Lodges and members. Acton Lodge, No. 204, which was instituted on 13th April, I am pleased to say bids fair to be a splendid working Lodge."

#### DISTRICT NO. 11 .- C. B. STEVENS, Deputy, Walkerton.

Deputy stepens, under date 23rd July, writes: "It was my intension to visit each Lodge of my District and install the officers the first of this month. I left my office here (Kincardine) on the 39th ult., went to Walkerton; Intended to leave there on the 1st inst. for Slephen Lodge, No. 189, Dufferin, No. 186, and Owen Sound, No. 180, on Thursday. Man proposes, but God disposes. Monday afternoon I was taken ill with lumbago, confined to my bed without a moment's warning and remained there for eight days, and only now able to commence work again. Hence I have been unable to visit either Lodge of my District. I have often heard from the Lodges during the year. None of them are progressing very rapidly, but each holding their own, out of sebt and working harmoniously together."

DISTRICT NO. 12 -A. B. St. John, Deputy, Walkerton.

Ahiram Lodge, No. 205, Palsley, instituted 24th April, 1877.

Silver City Lodge, No. 206, Tiverton, instituted 28th June, 1877.

Two interesting term reports received in good time. He says: "As far as this District is concerned, you will find that your request (suspension N. P. D.) sent to the Lodges has been attended to, and a good ircrease of membership reported. In each Lodge in the county—7 in number—the good work of the Order is progressing rapidly, and all working with but one end in view—to increase in numbers and brotherly kindness. I find the finances very creditable and books all kept in a business-like manner, each Lodge having large balances on hand."

DISTRICT NO. 13.-J. CAMPBELL, Deputy, Scaforth.

Howick Lodge, No. 192, Gorrie, instituted 19th September, 1876.

Received the two regular term reports. The Deputy says: "I visited all my Lodges (with the exception of Goderich) installed the officers, and found them all working well and gaining in membership." In July he reports: "I have visited all my eight Lodges twice, and some of them three and four times. Deputy District business for pleasure, enjoyment and sociability, a success; financially, a failure—out of pocket every time. I have had very few questions to answer, which shows well for the working of the Order. I had Past Deputy Grand Master Warriner at three of my visits and installations."

DISTRICT NO. 14.—RICH'D NOAKES, Deputy, Harriston.

Britannia Lodge, No. 198, Hollin, instituted 28th January, 1877.

The two term reports duly received. The Deputy says, February 21st:
"The Order in this District is to every appearance progressing very favorably and harmoniously. During the half term not one question referred to me for decision. It is also a pleasure te speak of the kindly reception I received while officially visiting Lodges. I have visited Britannia, No. 19s, since its institution, installed officers, and find it working prosperously. I have also visited Maple Leaf, Palmerston, Minto and Garnet Lodges, and find the work performed in compliance with the requirements of the Grand Lodge,"

#### DISTRICT NO. 15 .- R. WILKINSON, Deputy, Galt.

The two half-yearly reports regularly received. Brother Wilkinson says:

better. I have not been able to visit all the Lodges, but I can with all confidence say that every one is in a prosperous condition and good working
order."

DISTRICT NO. 16 .- W. J. Hodgson, Deputy, Hamilton.

Jarvis Lodge, No. 191, Jarvis, instituted 11th September, 1876.

Minerya Lodge, No. 197, Hamilton, instituted 26th January, 1877.

The two semi-annual reports are very complete and interesting. The statistical tables exceedingly well arranged, and showing the position in all financial matter and membership of each Lodge at a glance. Bro. Hodgson says, "I can report that the Officers have all been installed into their respective positions by myself or some responsible Brother. I regret to say that owing to the large number of suspensions N. P. D., which I may say have been unavoidable, there has been little or no increase in membership."

DISTRICT NO. 17 .- D. McConachie, Deputy, Welland.

Scotla Lodge No. 199, Pt. Robinson, instituted 7th Feby., 1877.

Beacon Lodge No. 201, Pt. Colborne, instituted 28rd March, 1877.

The two term reports received from Deputy McConachte are comprehensive and satisfactory. Heavys "I find the various Lodges of the District, notwithstanding the continual depression of the times, prosperous financially, and brotherly love and harmony prevailing. A pervading feeling of retrenchment of expenditure for the future exists, and unanimously expressed unity of action on the part of every Lodge has been declared, to carry out the instructions is your circulars of November and December respectively." Under date of July 13 he says "On the 13th September I laid the corner stone of Odd Fellows Hall, Thorold, and on 21st February hast dedicated the Hall. Visited officially, and installed the officers of the following Lodges (all 3, in sumber). On the whole during the year there has been considerable work done in the District. My labour has been fruitful of pleasure and profit to myself and I trust of some benefit to the Order. ## DISTRICT NO. 20.-W. F. Howell, Deputy, London.

Egremont Ledge, No. 207, Adelaide, instituted 26th July 1877.

Two full and complete reports received from Ero. Howell, who says (19th Feby.) "I have formed a lodge of instruction for the officers of the Lodges of this city, in order that they may make themselves more cerfect in the work especially in Initiation. At the request of some of the Lodges, I have made two public addresses on Oddfellowship, which I am led to believe has done some good." Also under date 12th July he says "Since January I have visited all the Lodges in this District twice, those in the city very often. I have on many occasions exemplified the work body of the initiatory and also Degrees, and believe that some permanent good has been done. On the 6th inst., I visited the Daughters of Rebekah. This brunch of the Order is doing very well in this District. During the past year we have had a visit from F. G. M. Bro. J. W. Stebblas, of New York. Also Bro. J. B. Tracy, G. M., of Michigan. Summing all up for the past year, notwith-

standing the great depression of business and the general duliness of the times, I think we can say it has been a year of prosperity in the Order here."

DISTRICT No. 21.—E. E. CHIPMAN, Deputy, Parkhill,
"W. N. Ford, P. G. M., ,, St. Marys,
Victor Lodge, No. 193, St. Marys, instituted 1st Dec., 1876,

In this District there are ten Lodges and under date 15th Feby., Bro. Chipman says: "While the country in this District, has been suffering from financial depression it is a matter for congratulation, that the Order has been steadily progressing. Although the increase in numbers has not been so large the last term, as in some former ones, it is of a healthier character, and initiates have been in general, men of ability and stability, who will reflect a credit upon the Order for good." Past Grand Master Ford says "In this District the general depression in business has had its off sct, yet the Lodges here maintain their standing in all cases. In St. Marys the new Lodge "Victor" No. 193 has gone on by yond precedent, they now number \$2 members. O.d St. Marys No. 36 still having a membership of 149 good on the books. All are in good working order and Oddfellowship never stood so well as now in this District."

#### DISTRICT NO. 22.-H. McAfee, P. G. M., Deputy, Walkerville.

Reports for the two terms received and under date 12th July, Bro. McAfee says, "I have visited and installed the Officers in all the Ledges in my District except Rose Lodge, No. 28. Beaver 82, Ru dyen, is fin undelty sound and altho' small in number the material is very good. Leannington No. 140 is holding her own and working harmoniously. Concord, No. 142, Kingsville, is a good and live Lodge. Frontier, No. 45, Windsor, as usual is progressing fairly, but our increase is reta-ded by hard times. The stringency of the times and scarcity of money has a tendency to keep all the Lodges back."

#### DISTRICT, NO. 23 .- JAS, CLEEVE, Deputy, Chatham.

Under date of 13th July, Deputy Cleeve says, "I beg to report to you that I have visited all the Lodges in my District last January, installed the Officers, and find everything connected with the Lodges very athisfactory. I found one Lodge violating the law by using Illegal odis."

## DISTRICT, NO. 24.—HENRY NEAL, Deputy, Sarnia.

Reports for each term were received in good time. The Deputy installed the Officers for all the Lodges—four—for both terms. The reports for each Lodge, their returns, &c. are interesting, and Bro. Neal in closing the Party report writes, "The Working of the Order in number 24 District is progressing satisfactorily and as good as could be expected, considering the pressure the dull times has on the Order."

DISTRICT, NO. 25.-WM. JAFFRAY, Deputy, Berlin.

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Silver Star Lodge, No. 202, Milverton, instituted 29th March, 1877.

Interesting reports have been received for both terms. Under date of 19th February, the Deputy says, "I duly Installed all my Officers in the first two weeks of January, and owing to the strike (on the G. T. R.) and bad roads, I had a rough time of it. I found the Stratford, Mitchell, Listowel, Hamburg, Waterloo and Berlin Lodges all in as prosperous condition as could be reasonably expected. They were working well and happily, and in the Hamburg and Listowel cases I found a genuine improvement in numbers and interest taken by members." Under date of 14th July he says, "I have freat reason to be delighted with the substantial position of both these Lodges and the evident interest taken by their members in the good work of Oddfellowship. Also on 5th, installed the Officers of Germania Lodge, Waterloo; the 6th, Grand Union Lodge, Berlin; the 12th, Nith Lodge, New Hamburg; and 13th, Silver Star Will shine brighter and brighter to a more perfect existence."

DISTRICT, NO. 26.-J. R. PROCTOR, Deputy, Bothwell.

Fic rence Lodge, No. 196, Florence, instituted 10th January.

The regular term reports were received in good time. Bro. Proctor writes, that in January he installed the Officers for the four Lodges, and for Bothwell Lodge No. 74, found good and efficient Officers; Glencoe Lodge, 183, a first-class Lodge, Mt. Zion Lodge, 46, (the oldest Lodge in the District) the members good workers, and understand their business, and Wardaville Lodge No. 60, working very well. Under date of 18th July he says, "I have visited Florence Lodge No. 196, several times since it was instituted. It is doing well (membership 23), and have a well furnished Lodge room, everything that is required in an Oddfellows Lodge, and out of debt."

DISTRICT NO. 27.—Deputy JOHN DONOGH, Toronto.

Albert Lodge, No. 194, Torento, instituted 21st December, 1876.

This District comprises six Lodges, and I have received from the Deputy a most valuable and interesting report for the year. The officers of all the Lodges were installed both terms by Bro. Donogh. Speaking of the Degree Lodge, he says, "The secret work I know has been correctly exemplified and the various charges and lectures have uniformly been given without the ald of the books. Everything that can be done, has been done to make the meetings interesting and attractive, and yet we can only report a lack of interest and a slim attendance at all the meetings." Of the Lodges as a whole the Deputy writes, "I am pleased to be able to report that in this District both the secret and the written work of the Order is on the whole very correctly rendered. Nevertheless I would suggest that the appointment of a Grand Lecturer or Instructor, whose duty it would be to visit in detail the Lodges throughout the Jurisdiction, examine their working and correct errors and abuses, would be an improvement of the very highest value in securing the efficiency of the Orlar in its internal working" He also makes suggestions as to "Degree work," "Business work in Lodges," "Suspensions N. P. D." "Lodge attendance," "Improved Lodge meetings." Writing of Lodge Rooms, he says, "Toronto Lodge, of this city, deserves capecial mention in this connection, they having on the 8th of January removed to new quarters on King Street West. I had the pleasure of attending and assisting in the dedication of the new Hall, on that day. This Lodge has provided a recreation room, open to all Odd Fellows. It is handsomely furnished, and on its tables are to be found a good selection of the periodicals of the day, the daily papers, &c. Various amusements are also provided, and the enterprise may I believe be safely pronounced a decided success, and one that deserves to be copied in every Lodge in the

- No. 5.—A District Deputy Grand Master (except on night of institution of New Lodge) cannot grant a dispensation to receive application of candidate, refer to Committee, Ballot and Initiate the same evening.

- No. 7.—During the term of Suspension on Charges, a member cannot be suspended for N. P. D., for dues accruing during the term of said suspension.
- No. 8.—During the term of Suspension on Charges the member has the right at any time to pay his dues.
- No. 9.—After term of Suspension on Charges expire, and dues paid, the member can demand admission to Lodge Room without new ballot.
- No. 10.—The shortest travelled public road, or other means of public communication, from the residence of the candidate, to the Lodge Room, should govern the question of distance, and consequently jurisdic-
- No. 11.—The Junior Past Grand, during his term, cannot be elected, or appointed to office, See Sec. 1500, White's Digest.

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- No. 12.—At Election of Officers the N. G. can east his ballot, but only at the same time as members of the Lodge.
- No. 13.—At Election of Officers, in the event of a tie-vote between two candidates, the N. G. has NOT a casting vote.
- No. 14.—By-Laws of Subordinates, approved by Grand Lodge, subsequent amendments by Sub-Lodge, only have force and effect after they have received like approval.

SUSPENSIONS N. P. D.

OFFICE OF THE M. W. GRAND MASTER, R. W. Grand Lodge of Ontario.

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MY DEAR SIR AND BROTHER,-

On examination of the Journals of our Grand Lodge, I regret to find that the number of suspended members for N. P. D. is assuming alarming proportions in comparison with the yearly initiations and the membership good on the books. The following brief statement will at a glance show the number of initiations, the suspensions for N. P. D., and the total membership for the years ending July 1874—5 and 46:—

From this you will observe that the suspensions for 1876 were nearly nine per cent. of the total membership, and while for the same year we had 2,283 initiations, still our increase was but 1,180. I may add another painful fact. vis: that the suspensions for that year were over one-half greater than they were for the previous year. No doubt but that this increase is largely due to the monetary stringency of the times, and the universal depression of trade and manufactures throughout the whole country. This self-evident fact induces me to confer with the Subordinate Lodges, in order if possible to devise some remedy for this steadily growing evil in our Order.

The end of the current term is rapidly approaching, when the returns of each Lodge will be made up, and forwarded to the Grand Secretary; and I may frankly state that from the continued, if not increased duliness in all departments of trade, I greatly fear the long list of suspensions will be largely increased, ourses prompt and judicious action is taken by each Subordinate Lodge to grevent such a deplorable result. To provide against this is the object of the present communication; and while knowing full well shat this is a question wholly under the power and control of each Subordi-

nate, nevertheless I am so impressed with its importance, I cannot refrain from seeking your assistance and co-operation.

With but one object in view—the good of our Order—I respectfully, but urgently, ask each Lodge at an early day to appoint a Select Committee, with instructions to consider the case of each suspended member, and endeavour by every friendly, brotherly means, to replace the brother in good standing. By timely action, prompt aid and assistance, and considerate proceedings on the part of the Committee, the officers and members of each Lodge, cannot but result in good work, in retaining our present membership and restoring large numbers to the ranks of our Order. Let us ever bear in mind, that this special occasion demands our warmest sympathy, our kindest words, and most generous assistance. It is now that individual effort and individual confidence, one brother with and in another, are most ingently desired, and by many will be fraternally accepted. Let us ever remember, in its broadcest and most comprehensive meaning, the command of our Order—"Assist thy Brother."

You will please cause this letter to be read in open Lodge, and I will wait with much anxiety, but firm hope, of pleasing and gratifying results of the combined and united action of our ore hundred and sixty Subordinate Lodges.

Whereas, it has been represented to me that Subordinate Lodges and Bacampments have procured and are now using Odes other than those published by the Grand Lodge of the United States, in violation of the laws and to the detriment of the revenue thereof; and as the exclusive right to furnish Odes for Subordinates is vested in that Grand Body, and the laws to be found on pages 588, 588, 514, 1237, 1266, 1314, 5716, 6278, 6657 and 6751 of the Journal from 1843 to the present time, prohibit the printing, publishing, and issuing of Odes by Grand Bodies, Subordinate Bodies, and individuals; and in 1875 the R. W. Grand Lodge declared "That Grand and Subordinate

Bodles and individuals, who shall print and circulate any forms or ceremonies of this Grand Lodge that constitute a source of revenue to its treasury, will be deemed quilty of an affence against the Laws of the Grand Lodge of the United States," you are hereby required to cause your District Deputy Grand Masters, District Deputy Grand Patriarchs or other proper officers, to visit the Lodges, Degree of Rebekah Lodges, and Encampments under their charge, and forbid the use of all Odes other than those issued by and bearing the imprint of the R. W. Grand Lodge of the United States, and to see that they are immediately supplied with the legal Odes through the several

CHANGE OF NAME G. L. U. S.

OFFICE OF THE M. W. GRAND MASIER, R. W. Grand Lodge of Ontario.

Whitby, Sept. 14, 1876.

At the twenty-second annual communication of the R. W. Grand Lodge of Ontario, held on the 2nd ult., the following resolution was adopted

- " Moved by Rep. W. Gee. Mutton,
- "Seconded by Rep. J. Ritchie, jr., and

<sup>&</sup>quot; Resolved,—That as soon as possible after this R.W. Grand Lodge adjourns, the Grand Master be requested to draft a circular, to be sent to all the Grand Lodges of the United States setting forth certain reasons why the name of the Grand Lodge of the United States should be changed to the 'Supreme Lodge of the Independent Order of Odi Fellows,' and that the

several State Grand Lodges be requested to take the matter into consideration and instruct their Representatives to the Grand Lodge of the U. S. to bring aboût the change, if possible."

In accordance with the tenor of the foregoing resolution, it becomes my duty to bring before the notice of the R. W. Grand Lodge, the question of the advisability of change of name of the R. W. G. L. U. S., and ask from yourself, the officers and representatives, a fair and deliberate consideration of the question, and a fraternal and intelligent decision thereon. The subject of change of name appears to have engaged the attention of the G. L. U. S. many times within the past ten years, and in order to place the matter before you as briefly, and in as concise a manner as possible, the following is presented, compiled from the official journals:—

YEAR 1867, (page 4199). Notice given by three Representatives to change name to "The Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows."

f SAME YEAR, (page 4204). Another notice by ten Representatives to substitute "Supreme Lodge" in place of G. L. U. S.

NEAR 1868, (page 4370). Notice by four Representatives to change to "Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows."

SAME YEAR, (page 4411). To change to "Supreme Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows."

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SAME YEAR, (page 4422). By five Representatives to change name to "Most Worthy Grand Lodge," &c.

Same Year, (page 4484). By five Representatives to change to "Supreme Grand Lodge," &c.

SAME YEAR, (page 4433). By five Representatives to change so as to read "Supreme Lodge," &c.

YEAR 1869, (page 4666). By four Representatives to change to "Most Worthy Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows."

YEAR 1870, (page 4831). Nine Representatives gave notice to change name to "Grand Lodge of America."

SAME YEAR, (page 4831). Notice by four Representatives to change name to "Most Worthy Supreme Lodge," &c.

YEAR 1871, (page 5207). Notice signed by ten Representatives to insert "America" in place of U. S.

YKAR 1872, (page 5581). Notice signed by seven R presentatives to change name to "The M. W, Grand Lodge of American odd Fellow Sirip,"

YEAR 1873, (page 5791). Notice by eight Representatives to change name to "Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows."

YEAR 1874, (page 2258). Seventeen Representatives gave notice to change name to "Supreme Lodge of American Odd Fellowship."

SAME YEAR, (page 6354). Notice signed by seven Representatives to change name to "Supreme Grand Lodge of American Odd Fellowship."

SAME YEAR, (page 6321). By four Representatives to change name to "The Grand Lodge of Universal Sovereignty of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows."

It will therefore be observed that during the years 1867 to 1874, sixteen b notices were given signed by ninety-three Representatives. It may be said that during the same period really but one test vote has been taken on this question, viz., in 1870, (page 4829), when to change the name to "Supreme Grand Lodge," there were 50 year and 64 nays—the fifty year were Ropresentatives from twenty-six out of the thirty-nine Grand Jurisdictions. Your attention may also be drawn to the mot that between the years 1867 to 1874, either by signing notice of motion or votes, Representatives of all the Grand Jurisdictions (with but three exceptions) have affirmed the advisability of change of name. This statement does not include British Columbia, Monsana, and Wyoming, all first represented in the Grand Lodge United States in 1874 or at a later date. From the foregoing it 'nay reasonably be assumed that there is and has been, for the past ten years, a strong feeling in favor of changing the name of G. L. U.S., and upon reflection this is not surprising. The present name of the Grand Ledge of the United States gradually grew out of the title given to the first regularly constituted Lodge on this continent, viz.; "W ashington Lodge, No. 1." and which according to the dispensation granted by Duke of York Lodge, England, 1st February, 1820, the title of the said Lodge was to be, "No. 1 Washington Lodge, the Grand Lodge of Maryland, and of the United States of America." At this period there was but one Lodge, and yet, by the terms of dispensation, it was a "Subordinate Lodge, the Grand Lodge of Maryland and the Grand Lodge of the United States, On the 22d November, 1821, the amended Constitution of the Grand Lodge of Maryland and of the United States was adopted, the whole constituency of the Grand Lodge of the United States consisted of two Subordinate Lodges, In 1824 the present Grand Lodge of the United States was proposed, giving at same time, State Charter for Maryland, a.d on 22d February, 1825, the new Constitution of the Grand Lodge of the United States was adopted. At this time the State Grand

Total 9 Subordinates.

In 1829 the constitution was amended, but the original name retained. At this time there were five Grand Lodges, thirty-one Subordinate Lodges and a total membership of barely over one thousand, the exact number being 1009. From this brief statement it will be seen how the name of G. L. U. S. originated, and has been retained to the present day. But surely the name that was appropriate in 1820 for own Subordinate Lodge, or in 1825 for nine Subordinate Lodges, or in 1829 for a total membership of 1009, is not at this day appropriate for a membership of nearly half a million; and with their Subordinate Lodges scattered over the four quarters of the globe, and with to-day Grand Lodges in British Columbia, Lower Provinces of B. N. A, Switzerland, Ontario, and Subordinate Lodges in Chili and Peru, South America, Manitoba, Quebec, New Mexice, Sandwich Islands, Australia and London, England. The name "Grand Lodge of the United States" does not do our Order full justice; it is not broad enough nor sufficiently comprehensive. Our great want now is a name that will embrace all nations, all climes, and all peoples; let it be so large that it will cover the weole earth, equally suitable for the north, the south, the east and the west; a name local to no one section, but so comprehensive as 'o be applicable to all countries, so that the head of our highly valued and universally esteemed Order, the fountain of justice, equity, honor and legislation, shall be hereafter known as "The Supreme Lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows." It will then rest upon us, the members of the Order in the western hemisphere, to give Odd Fellowship such a high tone and such an unsullied character as to preserve its purity and enlarge its usefulness in all that is true, noble, generous, and charitable. That the moment "The Supreme Lodge" of Odd Fellowship is mentioned, the eye, heart, and feelings are at once turned to America as the birth-place, source and fountain head of the true, genuine Odd Fellowship of the present day.

Believing that the session of the G. L. U. S. for 1876 being America's Centennial, in celebrating which, nations, empires and principalities have most heartily and enthusiastically joined, to be a suitable time to give notice of motion for proposed change of name, whereby all Odd Fellows may deeply, feel and fully realize the sympathetic and magic influence of the wonderful power and irresistible control of the three golden links of our Order, and the following session of 1877 to discuss, consider and decide the same. Your thoughtful consideration and fraternal decision in Friendship, Love and Truth are most respectfully and urgently solicited.

## ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

# GRAND SECRETARY

FOR THE

YEAR ENDING 31st July, 1877.

Belleville, August 1st, 1877.

To the M. W. Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of Ontario, I.O U.F.

As required by law, and with much pleasure, I beg to submit this my Eleventh Annual Report, with statistics compiled from the returns of the past year, together with the receipts from all sources, and a balance sheet from the Ledger to July 25th, 1877, date of closing the books. A supplementary Report of receipts after that date will be given.

1. As early as practicable after the close of last session, I called for tenders for printing the Journal of 1876. I accepted that of the Brantford Expositor, and as soon as the Journal was completed I sent three co, les to each Lodge, one to each Representative, one to each Past Grand Master, and one to each State Grand Lodge and Grand Excampment in the United State.

2. As directed by Report of Committee on Laws of Subordinates, I sent to each Lodge a copy of the report so far as it related to each. A number of Lodges have not yet made the alterations ordered several sessions since; many have no copies of the Constitution governing them, they holding eff from getting a supply printed with the view of procuring the latest Constitution, in the event of a new Constitution being adopted at the present session. I would suggest that while the matter is in type for the Journal, one copy of the same be printed on one side of the page only and sent-to each Lodge to revise their Constitution by, or to serve as copy-for the printer; this should avoid mistakes on the part of Lo Iges.

- 3. By direction of the M. W. Grand Master, I notified Bros. W. S. Campbell, W. A. Rawlings, and Robt. Kirkpatrick of their appointment as the Committee on Laws of Subordinates: to Bro. W. S. Campbell, as chairman of such committee, I have sent all by-laws received from Lodges for examination. As soon as they were returned by the committee, I at once forwarded them to their respective Lodges, (certified to, as the report thereon directed.)
- 4. As required by the Constitution, I had printed all amendments sent in by Lodges to the proposed Constitution as printed in the Journal of 1876, and sent copies to each Lodge three months prior to this meeting, one copy of which, together with a copy of the Journal of Proceedings of last session is now laid upon the desk of each Representative, as provided by resolution last year.
- 5. As early as possible after the close of our last session, I sent a commission to each District Deputy Grand Master, with a circular, urging upon them to be faithful to the trust reposed in them; but from many Lodges comes up word, "We have not seen a Grand officer during the year, and scatcely know who our Deputy is." It certainly is to be regretted that brothers will accept such honorable positions, unless they are willing to sacrifice some comfort or convenience to attend to the duties enjoined. It has been questioned in one instance, whether a District Deputy Grand Master has the power to delegate his duties to another, and that other to some one else; legislation to settle this matter is desired.
- 6. The recommendation in my Report last year which was adopted, relative to the Ontario Digest (page 1500 Jour. 1876), was made in the belief that a new Constitution, &c., would have been adopted that year. Such not being the case, I did not deem it advisable to have the whole work done, though I had a sufficient number altered to supply the demands of the year. In the event of a new Constitution, &c., being adopted at the present session, and which for many reasons is greatly to be desired. I would recommend that the new Constitution be added to the Digest, and the legislation completed to embrice the present year, and the further instructions of the Grand Lodge U. S. fully carried out.
- 7. As directed by resolution at the last session, I called for an estimate or tenders for reprinting the entire Journal of this Grand Lodge. The tenders are herewith submitted for your consideration. I believe it to be necessary for the preservation of our history as an Order, that the work should be done as speedily as possible, inasmuch as there are only some three or four complete copies of our Journal in existence; should they by any means be destroyed, our history as an Order in Oatario would be lost. With the view to have the question acted upon at this session, I mentioned in my annual circumstances.

cular to the Lodges that the probable cost of the work would not exceed \$3.50 per copy, and that if each Lodge would take four copies, the work could be accomplished and the history and legislation of our Order preserved.

- Your instructions in regard to the correspondence of J. D. Simpson and others, of the Manchester Unity of Old Fellows at Sanit Ste, Marie, has been attended to.

- 10. The Charters of Niagara Falls Lodge No. 53, Oak Leaf Lodge No. 159, and Cambridge Lodge No. 188 have been destroyed by fire. By direction of the W M. Grand Master, I issued to each a duplicate charter in accordance with the Laws of the G. L. U. S., Sec. 337.
- 11. District Deputy Grand Masters James Brown, of District No. 6, and E. E. Chipman, of District No. 21, having resigned their positions as such, by direction of the M. W. Grand Master, I issued commissions to Bro. J. W. Wonch, of Whitevale, for District No. 6, and to W. N. Ford, P. G. M., for
- 12. As per resolution on page 1686 Jour. 1876, I issued Cards to Bros. H. Lanxon, A. D. Steel, Jno. Knight, R. F. Degan, D. N. Roblin, Jno. Blondin, and N. A. Mattis, of late Shannonville Lodge; that of Bro. Mattis was not applied for until some time after the others had been sent.
- 18. I have succeeded this year in procuring reduced railway rates to delegates and laddes, from each of the lines on which our Lodges are situated. The Toronto, Grey & Bruce only requiring a guarantee, that of at least 15

persons. Not feeling safe in making the guarantee, I have prepared certificates which will be issued to delegates who may have travelled by that route, provided there are the required number of fitteen. Thinking that some delegates might prefer the trip by water, I tried to get rates from the beats running on the Bay of Quinte, from Kingston, but could get no reply to my letters. To each of the Railway Companies and the Canadian Navigation Company, I have written, expressing the thanks of this Grand Lodge for their continued courtesy and liberality.

14. Several appeals have been received, and are herewith submitted, viz.: lst. Chas. Knight vs. Beaver Lodge No. 82. No papers accompanied this appeal. I wrote to Bro. Knight and informed him what he was required to produce, in order that his appeal might be considered; have not received any reply.

2nd. Chas. Packert, P. G., vs. Avon Lodge No. 41, accompanied by certified papers.

3rd. F. Heiliwell vs. Canada Lodge No. 49, accompanied by certain papers and By-laws of the Lodge,

4th, An appeal from W. J. Diamond, against the action of Belleville Lodge No. 31 is received. The certified minutes in the case have also been received from Thus. G. Carson, D. D. G. M.

5th. An appeal or grievance from John McMath of Port Burwell, with some papers from Eric Lodge No. 33, relative to its action in the matter. This case has been holding over for a long time, to the apparent injury of the Order in Port Burwell, and it is to be hoped that the case will be finally settled at the present session.

15. In order to sive some idea of the rapid growth of the Order in Ontario, I have compiled the following table:—

The first session of the Grand Lodge of Canada West was held in Brock ville, on August 23rd, 1855. Representatives from seven Lodges were present. Number of members not given. The Grand Master, Thos. Reynolds, in his report states that in 1854 there were 280 members.

16. I have seen a number of circulars and letters, written by means of Zucatto's Papyrograph, and I believe a saving in the printing account of this Grand Lodge could be effected by the purchase of one; the cost varies, in accordance with the nature of the work to be performed. I would recommend that the Grand Secretary be empowered to purchase an entire outfit suitable for his office, together with a letter press, the old one purchased some years since having lately been broken by accident.

17. I find that almost all Grand Lodges are having their Journals printed on the standard sized page, viz., 5|x9. I would the efore recommend that the Journals of this Grand Lodge be hereafter printed on that sixed page.

18. I would suggest that in future the Grand Secretary be instructed to send to each Representative to the R. W. Grand Lodge of the U. S., a copy of the proceedings of this Grand Lodge, in return for the compliment exténded by the Representatives of other Jurisdictions to the Representatives of this Grand Lodge.

19. The supply of blank returns having become exhausted, I had to get new forms p-inted for the present returns, and in doing so I altered the form materially, with the view of getting reliable statistics from each Lodge as to its financial transactions. The returns now in show a marked improvement on former terms, and bear on their face an evidence of correctness, which in very many cases the old form did not. A few alterations have been made in the form, suggested by the returns in, which will I think make it complete. If Secretaries will only take a little trouble, and read the heading of each column or line, before filling it in, mistakes need not occur, then our annual reports would be of value. The form is herewith submitted for your approval. I would recommend that the Grand Secretary be ins ructed to get printed 300 blank return books (with a sufficient supply of blank return sheets), and that each Lodge be given a book free of charge to replace the one now in their hands, and that the new Lodges be charged the usual advance on cost.

20. I would also recommend that the Grand Secretary be empowered to prepare a sheet to be filled up by Lodges, and sent in with their December returns, giving the mame of each unsuspended member, carefully revised.

21. The following abstract from the Semi-Annual Returns shows our numerical strength and financial standing, and is I think a grand eulogium on our Order, that during the past two years of almost unexampled depression in commercial circles we have steadily increased, for without doubt the duliness of the times has caused large drains on our exchequer which would not have occurred in better times.

The figures in the summary may vary a trifle, when more carefully gone over, than the time between the receipt of returns and compiling this repor will permit of, though in the main they are tolerably correct. Our success as an Order depends very largely upon a correct showing of our status, which is only obtained from the returns of Lodges, upon the filling up of which greater caré should be bestowed by Secretaries. The irregularities and errors in many of the returns indicate to me that for the most part they are more the result of carelessness than of wilful neglect. Secretaries should bear in mind the great responsibility that rests upon them in keeping correct records from which to prepare their semi-annual reports, upon the correctness of which the welfare of their Lodges so largely depends. These returns are not asked for merely to give work to the officers without object, but with view to get reliable information as to our status, eliminate defects, and pursue the good. Further, it frequently occurs that the returns are the only source from which a Lodge can gather data to start afresh. For instance when it has had its books, &c., destroyed by fire, which has been the case with several Lodges in Ontario, and is liable to happen to many of our Lodges, how necessary, therefore, that these returns should be correct, and how easy to make them so.

The returns for the past year have been promptly received, with a very few exceptions, though the Secretaries in many cases show a total disregard of former returns or instructions sent to them to govern them in filling up the returns. They seem to think that the checking over in this office—re-checking by the Committee on Returns, and their report thereon, are made only for pastime, as they pay no attention to said reports whatever.

A number of Secretaries report the names of those who cease membership for non-payment of dues, as "expelled for non-payment of dues," although in almost every circular and on the back of every return is printed the manner to deal with such. When a member is suspended by his Lodge he is counted out, and the Secretary should take no further notice of him on the returns until he is reinstated, though the name is kept on the Per, Secretary's books, and he is charged with dues until he is declared "ceased."

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22. It is well known that money sent by mail, registered or not, is at the risk of the sender; the Post Office department is not responsible for money thus sent. I would therefore surgest that all remittances from Subordinate Todges be hereafter made by Post Office order; by this means all possibility of discrepancy between the stated amount sent and received is avoided, and no risk of loss to any one.

23. In March, immediately after the receipt of all the semi annual returns I laused a circular, showing the statistics of the past term. I believe this circular does good, as I flad it kindly copied into many of the newspapers to which I have sent it. I would suggest that with future circulars of a simi-

lar character a note be sent to each newspaper editor, that upon receipt of a marked copy of the paper containing the report, a copy of the Journal of Proceedings will be sent. This will necessitate the printing of say one hundred extra copies, but I believe the expense incurred will be amply remoursed by the general dissemination of information relating to the progress of our Order,

25. The relation of "Dues to Benefits" is coming to be looked upon by our Order here and elsewhere, with more of the importance that it merits than formerly, and not before it is required, as a reference to many of our returns will readily show and convince any one, that such Lodges are not in a position to fulfil the promises held out by their by-laws to candidates previous to initiation. Many Lodges, out of an annual receipt per member of six dollars, pay three dollars for current expenses, leaving only three dollars to form a fund, out of which to pay three dollars per week to sick members, forty dollars to the widow of a deceased brother, seven dollars per quarter to the widow, and sometimes twenty-five dollars to a brother on the death of his wife. A number of Lodges show that their current expenses actually exceed the contribution of their members for duca. If Lodges cannot lay up funds out of its receipts for dues out of which to pay its benefits, its chances for success are slim indeed. In the first place, many Lodges are promising larger benefits than their dues will warrant, and in the second they are not careful enough of their funds in the item of current expenses. I know of nothing more likely to ruin a Lodge and injure the whole Order, than for it to be unable to meet its obligations for sick and funeral benefits. While I

am not aware of any of our Lodges being in this position a present, many are liable to it at any time, should epidemic or other calamity befat them their funds would very soon be exhausted, assessments rendered necessary, then members drop out—disaster, rain. Very few Lodges have a contingent fund out of which to draw in special cases, and when a calamity occurs similar to that at St. John lately, the Lodges are unable to contribute to their relief without drawing from their already slim general fund, contributed by the members for their own use in time of distress.

All the facts presented by the vital statistics of Benefit Societies in Great Britain, as well as by the experience of our own Order, go to show clearly that with increased age come, surely, increased expenses for benefits; therefore an increased quarterly dues in accordance with age is necessary, rather than a high rate of initiation. The latter only occurs once, while by the former a brother is always paying in proportion to the risk the Lodge assumes in his case.

With the view to get reliable information on this important question, I issued in December last a blank return, similar to that proposed by Bro. I. D. Williamson to the G. L. U. S. some years since, asking for the ages of all D. Williamson to the G. L. U. S. some years since, asking for the ages of all members, the number of each age sick and receiving benefits and number of weeks sickness, the number of each age deceased, &c. One hundred and forty four Lødges reported, from which the subjoined tables are prepared. Had the other 20 Lodges reported, a more exact average would have been arrived at, though for the most part the delinquents are new Lodges, with little or no sickness or death. I sent all these special returns to Bro. Cl. T. Campbell, D. G. M., for the use of the special committee on "dues and benefits," and as that committee will doubtless go fully into the question, I will only give the tables as under, which give the average of sickness at 21 to 3. to be 244, or less than a quarter of one week permember, while in the ages of 51 to 80, they are over one and a quarter weeks per member.

These returns do not, of course, embrace a sufficient number of lives to be accepted as a basis for a perfect estimate of the average rate of sickness; Instead of 10,000 lives, at least 100,000 are necessary for that purpose; but, as far as they go, they substantiate the estimates formed by English actuaries from Benefit Societies in that country. By obtaining these statistics from our Lodges for a few successive years, we will not only be able to frame an absolutely correct system of dues and benefits for our own use, but will also make a valuable contribution to sanitary science.

While on this subject, I feel justified in making a quotation from the able Report of Grand Secretary, Bro. J. B. Nicholson, to the Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania, at its late Session. In reporting the surrender of the Charter of Rising Sun Lodge No. 8, after an existence of half a century, despite the efforts of the Grand Officers and others to keep it alive he says:—

Experience, argument and entreaty were alike thrown away upon the ' members of No. 8, they adhered blindly to their own ideas, and rejected all · advice, they thought, as perhaps others now think, that the Lodge would 'last their time; yet, sad to relate, a few days after the charter was surren-4 dered, one of the old members died in the eighty-second year of his age. , His Lodge was bankrupt, and he died poor, with not money enough left to give him decent burial. Sister Lodges had to be appealed to in order to procure means for his interment. It is difficult to imagine a more painful ending than this, of a long connection with a Lodge, and the failure of · cherished hopes. . And again, the members of No. 8 persisted in a low rate of dues and a high rate of benefits, with no reserve fund to fall back upon. The effect was, therefore, a Lodge of aged men, an empty treasury, and final bankruptcy. No. 8, being dead, ' yet speaketh. Would that its voice of warning could be heard in every · Lodgeroom in Pennsylvania, saying, invite young men to unite with you. ' take them by the hand, encourage them in the active, practical duties of the Order, and fix your dues and benefits at such rates that you will lay ' up a reserve fund sufficient to meet all the claims that old age and infirmity will bring; then go on in the inculcation of the cardinal teachings of Odd · Fellowship, and carry out its mission of peace and good will to man.

26. My experience leads me to believe that dues paid in advance is the only proper and safe method, and should become general with our Lodges, though under existing laws the Grand Lodge of the United States has decided that it is not competent for a Lodge by make a by-law, exacting dues in advance. Many Lodges in this Jurisdiction have by-laws, requiring all dues to be paid in advance—som equarterly and some semi-annually. Said laws were enacted without any intention to contravene the laws of the G. L. U. S., and have been acted upon for years. Said Lodges will deem it a great drawback if they are compelled to eliminate such laws, which they must do, under the

late decision, without further legislation on the part of our Supreme Grand Lodge. I would therefore respectfully suggest that this Grand Lodge take steps, with the view to instructing its Representatives to the Grand Lodge of the United States, to introduce such legislation as will permit Lodges to enact by-laws requiring payment of dues quarterly in advance.

27. In compliance with my duties, I sent to the Grand Lodge United States a report of the Year Ending Sist December, 1876, from which the following is an extract:

I cannot close this Report without acknowledging the uniform courtesy that I have met with from the Grand Officers, and others with whom I have had correspondence.

A condensed report of the operations of the past year has now been laid before you; and surely there is abundant cause for thankfulness to God that as an Order we have been permitted to continue on in our labors, and have been the instruments of doing so much good. And let us pray that the same Divine influence may direct our present deliberations, and guide our Order on during the coming year to increased usefulness.

#### AUDITORS' REPORT.

To the R. W. Grand Lodge of Ontario, I. O. O. F. :-

Your Auditors appointed to examine the books and vouchers of the R. W. Grand Secretary and the R. W. Grand Treasurer, beg to report as follows:—

We have carefully audited the books of the R. W. Grand Secretary, and find that they are kept in a most satisfactory way. We highly commend the manner in which the sweral accounts are kept—every entry is clear and legible. We consider that the plan adopted leaves very little more to be desired. We would suggest that, as the present set of books are very nearly filled up, a new set be ordered, which should be more strongly bound, of better paper, and more conveniently ruled than the present ones.

We have examined the books and vouchers of the R. W. Grand Treasurer, and find that they are correct in every particular, and correspond with the accounts of the R. W. Grand Secretary. Marked cheques on the standard and consolidated banks were produced for the amount at present in the R. W. Grand Treasurer's hands.

We desire to draw attention to the large and increasing expense attending the annual meetings of your R. W. Grand Body, and think that it is fully time that the Grand Lodge should legislate so as to in some manner reduce the expenditure.

We would also direct attention to the very large outlay for the expenses of the District Deputy Grand Masters, and think that this matter should also be carefully considered.

In conclusion, we would call attention to the fact that as there are no less than one hundred and seventy-five Subordinate Lodges in active operation in the jurisdiction, the duties and labors of the R. W. Grand Secretary have been considerably increased. We would therefore respectfully suggest that some addition should be made to that Grand Officer's salary.

All of which is fraternally submitted.

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Grand Representative Geo. Wright, from the Special Committee on "Dues and Benefits," presented the following majority report, which was laid on the table:—

# REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON BRO. McGREGOR'S CIRCULAR.

Your Committee, to whom was referred, by resolution passed by this R. W. Grand Lodge at its last session, the consideration of the important circular as to readjustment of the fees, submitted by Bro. A. McGregor, of Covenant Lodge, having carefully considered the same, beg leave to report as follows:

Your Committee are unanimously of the opinion that the present basis upon which dues and benefits are regulated, in most if not all the Lodges of this jurisdiction is unsatisfactory and misleading. They find, upon careful inquiry, that, upon such basis as that which now obtains, the time is almost certain to come when the Lodges will not be able to meet all their financial obligations. They have no hesitation, therefore, in recommending that a scheme shall be adopted as speedily as may be, which will be at once more equitable with regard to the membership, and will greater certainty secure, to the utmost limit, all the objects contemplated in the establishment of the beneficial element of our institution.

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There are two leading methods by which your Committee think that this readjustment of dues and benefits might be accomplished: Either the amounts for initiation might be graduated uniformly from the age of 21 upwards, as per circular of Bro. McGregor, or a similar principle might be applied to the quarterly dues. Your Committee are favorable to the scheme as elaborated in this circular. They think, for instance, that the same fee for initiation between the ages of 21 and 30 years is not an equitable arrangement; nor will it effectually secure all the objects of the benefit system. They regard this feature of the adjustment of fees as the most objectionable; but they also think that the entire scheme might undergo such a modification as would more perfectly equalize the burden among the membership. Your Committee, after much thought upon the subject, are strongly impressed with the justice of the system by which an increase is made in the initiation fee proportionate to the increase of the risk incurred by each additional year of life. For example, if \$6 be the correct fee at the age of 21, it is estimated that the risk at 22 is increased in the sum of 84 cents, at 28, in the sum of \$1.31; and so on until the end of life.

It is recommended upon the adoption of this scheme of Bro. McGregor.
that the Widows' and Orphaus' Fund, now very inadequately sustained,
should receive, in addition to one-fifth of the quarterly dues, some portion of

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the initiation fee. Your Committee are fully satisfied that the amount now set apart for the Widows' and Orphans' Fund will, at no distant day, prove altogether inadequate to meet the claims upon it. Suppose, for example, that \$1,20, or one-fifth of the quarterly dues is appropriated to the Widows' and Orphan's Fund, it will be necessary, in order successfully to meet the lability, also to reserve from the initiation fee an amount proportionate to the increased risk incurred by each additional year in the age of the member. It is found upon the most careful actuarial calculation, that at the age of 22 years, the sum of 51 cents, in addition to the \$1.20, will be requisite to meet the present liability upon the fund for the support of the widows and orphans of deceased members.

After a careful comparison of the merits of the scheme as set forth in Bro. McGregor's circular, with that by which the necessary addition is proposed to be made to the quarterly dues, your Committee feel bound to ndicate their decided preference for that of Bro. McGregor, and from the following considerations: Granting that both schemes would be alike effec tual in realizing the purposes contemplated—a very doubtful proposition, in the estimation of your Committee—that by which the addition of fractional parts of a dollar would be made to the initiation fee, and not to the quarterly dues, strikes your Committee as most desirable. In either case the calculation of these fractional amounts is somewhat perplexing. But it must be apparent that the scheme which renders these calculations necessary less frequently, ought, other things being equal, to command our preference. Then, to the proposed initiate, the scheme by which a uniformly graded initiation fee is required, will appear less formidable, for the reason that, when once paid, it is paid for all time to come; and so far as his dues are concerned he will stand on precisely the same footing as his younger brother, no matter what the disparity of age. Moreover, the Lodge, by this scheme, gains more through the lapses of older than by those of younger brethren, while it will have received all that will be necessary to meet any subsequent contingencies when each brother is initiated. Whereas, if the grading according to age is put upon the quarterly dues, members will soon feel it a hardship to be placed upon an apparent inequality with their brethren, and may soon become hisheartened and drop out, and thus valu able membership may, in some cases, be sacrificed, and the necessary addi tion to the fund lost.

The following is a complete exemplification, from actuarial calculations of the scheme as proposed in Brother McGregor's circular, a careful study of which will show the reserves that should be provided from the initiation, fee, and the entire amount of the fee at the different ages between 21 and 50 years:

The annual cost of \$100, which represents the Widows and Orphans' Fund at age 21 is \$1.20, and that of the Burial Fund 36 cents. The same rule will apply to the Burial Fund in the third column. The Burial Fund is a portion of the General Fund, and is allowed to take care of itself. It \$6 at .initiation and \$10 for degrees and \$4.34 each year in dues will meet all general benefits and expenses at any or all ages, there will be left from the dues \$1.20 for the Widow's and Orphans' Fund and 36 cents for the Burial Fund, and 10 cents to be added to the two latter, because the dues are receivable quarterly instead of at the beginning of the year. It will be

seen from what is already shown, that persons joining at greater ages than 21, require a reserve equal to that shown in the second and third columns, and which is included in the initiation (as:

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It will be observed that, in the above table, the calculations are based upon a feserve of \$30 instead of \$25, as found in the circular. More careful calculation since the circular was prepared, has convinced your Committee that \$30 nore accurately represents the probable requirements of that part of the general benefit fund.

Your Committee are extremely desirous that some system which would be an improvement upon that at present in operation, should be adopted by this R. W. Grand Lodge; a 'd they have no hesitation in recommending the scheme submitted to their consideration as altogether preferable to any other with which they are acquainted.

# REPORT OF A MINORITY OF THE COMMITTEE ON DUES AND BENEFITS.

BELLEVILLE, August 1st, 1877.

To the R. W. Grand Lodge of Ontario, I. O. O. F.

A minority of your Committee on Dues and Benedits, unable to agree with all the conclusions of the majority, would respectfully submit the following report:—

The reference to your Committee of a scheme proposing alterations in the system of dues and benefits hitherto adopted by many of our Lodges, necessarily involves the consideration of two important questions, vis: Is our old system of dues and benefits satisfactory? If not, what plan shall we substitute for it?

To the first question your Committee can give a unanimous answer in the negative. The old hap-hazard system was not and is not a safe one. Crude in its original inception—framed without any data upon which it could be properly constructed—regardless of the laws of sickness and mortality—it is no matter of surprise that, with all the improvements succeeding years have made, Lodges have so frequently failed to meet their engagements, and have become bankrupt.

In England it was found necessary to make the financial basis of benefit societies the subject of legislation. The Manchester Unity—the parent of our own Order—had drawn near to the gates of insolvency. But through the interference of Parliament a new state of affairs was introduced; statistics were collected; the aid of experienced actuaries obtained; proper tables of dues and benefits compiled; and, as a result, that society stands to-day the most solvent institution of the kind in existence. The old system of the Manchester Unity was the same as that now in force among the great mass of the Lodges of our Order; and the experience of the Manchester Unity will be our experience unless we take advantage of the knowledge it has gained, and adopt remedies similar to those it has adopted.

The great mistakerwe have been making has been in placing all our members on an exact equality as to dues and benefits regardless of age. Were we simply a charitable society that might be permissable; but with our mutual benefit system—which is nothing more than a form of insurance—it would certainly appear to be the height of folly for us to disregard those laws of sickness and mortality upon which depends so largely the claims made on our treasuries.

The disbursements of a Lodge are of three kinds: 1st. Working Expenses, which can always be kept within due bounds by the exercise of a wise economy; 2d. Charty, which depends alike on the extent of our funds and the fervency of our sympathies; for we cannot spend more than we have, and we are not obliged to give more than we choose; 3d, Benglis, which are fixed by our by-laws, and the payment of which cannot be avoided without going into insolvency and bringing disgrace upon the Order.

Thus, while two of these forms of expenditure are under our control at all times, and can be regulated by the extent of our finances, the third is of a more fixed nature, and has to be provided for before the claims are actually presented. Hitherto that provision has not been properly made, for the reason that the pian upon which most of our Lodges have worked has been imperfect and unjust. In the words of the report of the Special Committee of the G. L. U. S. on this subject in 1873 (Journal p. 5903) the mistake we have made in the past has been "in not graduating dues according to age at entrance, and in not recognizing the laws of sickness and mortality prevailing in the locality."

These two elements must of necessity be taken into consideration. The claim for benefits increases with age. As far as the funeral benefits and the

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widow's annuity are concerned no one denies this fact. Though the lite of an individual is uncertain, there is nothing more certain than the average in 100,000 lives. Statistics upon this point are abundant. From them those tables of mortality are compiled which form the basis of our modern life insurance, and without attention to which no insurance association would be recognized or could exist.

But the largest claim upon our funds is made for sick benefits, and the question may arise in the minds of some whether this claim also increases with age. The most valuable statistics on this subject come to us from Engiand. They are to be found in the Vital Statistics of Neison, published in 1840, covering the experience of 1,147,000 years of about 200,000 lives; in the tables of the M. U., prepared by their Secretary, Ratoliffe, comprising about 200,000 lives for the three years ending in 1848; and in those of Finlaison, which were deduced from the quinquennial returns received by the Registrar of Friendly Societies in Britain for the term ending Dec. 31, 1850.

In 1858 a report was made to the G. L. U. S, by a Special Committee which tabulated the experience of the English societies and also of our own Order, in so far as the latter were obtainable. This session our Grand Secretary presents you with the record of about 10,000 lives for the year 1876 in the Province of Ontario—the first attempt ever made by any one to discover the rate of sickness in this country. These statistics are here presented in comparison with each other, showing in decades of years the average of sickness in weeks and decimals for one person.

The variations in these different tables may be accounted for from these facts: Neison's conclusions were drawn from lives of all classes, which would bring the rate higher than in selected lives, such as are to be found in Odd F-llows' Societies; besides which, in 1849, the date of his investigations, the rate of sickness was much greater than at present. Finlaison shows a lower rate than either Neison or Rateliffe, from the fact that he excluded miners, colliers and saliors from his calculations on account of their more dangerous occupations. It will be seen that from the age of 55

upwards the statistics in Ontario show a remarkable similarity to those of Finialson, while they embrace the same class of lives. The lower rate which we show in the younger ages is doubliess owing to the fact that ninstents of the membership of Ontario have been added to us during the last ten years after careful selection—in most cases dependent on a medical examination; and, as a consequence, the sickness is probably much less than could be depended on for a general average. But with all their variations these estimates and conclusions agree on the general principle that sickness increases with age as surely as does the liability to death.

Further evidence can be found by referring to the statistics of Ohio and Pennsylvania, the two largest jurisdictions. From the returns of the Ohio Lodges for 1875 we learn that the average of time for which benefits were paid was, for the entire membership, .441 of a week per member; for lodges over thirty years old it was .685, and for those over forty years it was 1.221

The Grand Secretary of Pennsylvania gives a table of Lodges in series of fitties and hundreds, showing the same steady increase of sickness with age. For 1876, with a membership of \$1,738, while the general average was .644 of a week, the rate for the fifty oldest Lodges was 1.215—nearly double. Taking these see fifty Lodges we find that their average in 1873 was .982, in 1874, .982; in 1875, 1.074; În 1876, 1.215.

The plan upon which most of the Lodges of our Order have hitherto worked failing to take these important elements into consideration, has been of necessify defective; and it is no wonder that in this jurisdiction, as well as in others, we find some of the older Lodges burdened with a weight of beneficiary claims startling in their extent, and awakening the most serious forebodings. In the younger Lodges the evil is not yet noticeable. Their members are young and healthy; they have little sickness and few deaths; the current of popular favor adds to their strength and their wealth; and it is easy for them to accumulate money for a time, even though their financial system is unsound. But it will only require the life of a generation to clapse for them to feel the burden as heavily as do the older Lodges, and possibly heavier. Let us note the fact, that while the average relief expenditure of the Lodges in Ontario is only about 20 per cent, of their income from all sources, in the older Lodges it reaches 50, 80, and sometimes 80 per cent. We cannot see clearly the actual liabilities of a Lodge until it has attained the age of one generation—say thirty years. Unfortunately for purposes of comparison there are only two Lodges in Ontario of that age. Let us turn, however, to last year's proceedings, and take the returns of all the Lodges over twenty years—nine in number. Their transactions per member compared with the remaining 147 Lodges will be seen as follows:—

Thus, while the older Lodges receive yearly per member \$1.11\(\frac{1}{2}\) less than the younger, they spend for regular benefits alone about \$2.10 more. Were it not that nearly all of them own property, and thus have a revenue apart from their fees, some would have been bankrupt ere this; and what they may be in twenty years from now is not pleasant to anticipate.

Another practical hint may be drawn from the above comparison. The small sum of \$\frac{1}{2}\$ cents per member paid by the older Lodges for charity shows conclusively that, as the Lodges have advanced it years, the demands on their treasuries for benefits have been so great that they have not felt able to exercise to any extent that practical benevolence, without which Odd-Fellowship is little more than an insurance society.

It would be well if we could obtain some idea as to the probable expenditive of a Lodge when it has reached the age of maturity, say 40. This cannot be done with absolute certainty; but yet some idea may be gained by analysing the transactions of the Order. We find from the experience of the Order are the order Lodges are paying it week's benefits to each member yearly. By collating the returns of the various jurisdictions for 1874 and 1875 (equivalent to about 1,000,000 lives for one year) we find that the expenditure for widows' annulties amounts to one-sixth of the expenditure for sick benefits; for funeral benefits one-fourth; for educating orphans one-fifty-sixth. Working expenses in Outario in the older Lodges amount to \$1.84 per member, a high rate, but no higher than in the United States. There is also the chartable work of the Order—apart from its regular benefits; and 25 cents per member annually is the least amount commensurate with the character and duties of Odd-Feilowship. Now let us tabulate those items;—

This amount, though we do not present to call it an absolutely correct estimate, is yet sufficiently near for all necessary purposes. That it is not an over-estimate is evident, from the fact that some of our older Lodges in Ontario are already paying out for relief and expenses over \$6 per member. But, supposing it a correct estimate, it does not represent the full amount a Lodge will require. No Lodge can be in a prosperous condition unless its income exceeds its expenditure; and considering the small membership of many of our Lodges, \$2 per member is little enough to place to the credit of a surplus fund.

We may anticipate, then, that in future years, for a Lodge to meet all its beneficiary claims to pay its working expenses, to exercise charity as liberally as it should, and to accumulate a small surplus, it will require at least \$9 per member. To meet this it can depend with certainty only on its yearly dues. It may or may not draw something from initiations, etc., but it can be only certain of dues. With \$6 or \$6.50, the amount charged for dues by most Lodges, it does not require any argument to show that insolvency is only a question of time. With all their receipts, dues, initiations, degrees, and interest from investments, our older Lodges at present only receive on the average \$8.20 per member.

To remedy the evils of this system your Committee have had referred to them a scheme drawn up with the sanction of the Toronto Lodges, which this Grand Lodge is asked to recommend to its Subordinates. An examination of this plan, however, shows it to be only the old plan in a slightly improved dress. A prominent feature of it provides tor an alteration in the appropriation for the Widows' and Orphans' Fund. Admitting this to be an improvement, it is only a matter of book-keeping. Whether a man's money be in his right or leit-hand pocket may affect his personal convenience, but does not affect his financial position. In what fund a Lodge places its money is of secondary importance so long as it has the money.

This modification in book-keeping is the main feature of the proposed plan. The general principle is the same that nearly ruited the M. U.; that has daused so many Lodges in America to fail, viz., the same yearly dues, no matter what the ages of the members may be, but grading to some extent the admission fee. In detail only it differs, in so far as the admission fee is graded for a yearly increase, while under the old plan the increase occurs usually in decades or semi-decades. Placing it in comparison with the fees charged by the Toronto Lodges it may be an improvement; but it so happens that Toronto is not the entire jurisdiction, and there are many Lodges in Onlario, even in the rural districts, whose fees for admission are much higher than have ever been charged by the Lodges in the Metro; olfs. Were they to adopt the plan under consideration they would be making a decidedly retrograde movement, for they would charge less than they do not a seminary of the consideration of the plan they do not not the plan they have the consideration they would be making a seminary decidedly retrograde movement, for they would charge less than they do

The majority of our Lodges place their members on an equality, so far as benefits are conserned—the difference on account of degrees practically amounting to this, that the brother who has not taken the Scarlet does not get full benefits, for anything less than the amount paid Scarlet members is in many cases scarce worth calling benefits. The Lodge should, then, in justice to itself, draw from all its members an equal amount in fees and dues. Under the new plan proposed, as well as under the old, this is not done; because as is evident, the man who lives the longest will pay the most money.

Let us take an illustration. A and B—aged respectively 21 and 40 years—join a Lodge working under the new plan; the former will pay an admission fee of \$6, the latter \$23.87; each would pay \$6 per year for dues. But A would, on the average expectation of life, live 41; years; B would only live 23. Consequently their paymants would stant thus:—

A would pay  $$6 \times $11 = $249 + $6 = $255.00$ B would pay  $$6 \times $28 = $168 + $23.67 = $191.67$ .

From these unequal payments they are promised the same pecuniary benefits. In reality, however, there would be inequality in the benefits as well as the dues; but the inequality is now in the other direction. Funeral benefits and widows' annuities may be considered equal; but not the sick benefits. At 41; years (expectation of life) will take him to the sige of 62; B's 28 years will take him to 68. Taking Williamson's tables of sickness (Journal G. L. U. S., 1853), which are a fair average, we find that A will likely have 51 weeks of sickness; B 82j. Thus, with a weekly benefit of \$3. A will receive \$153, and B \$218. Now, contrast the two cases—supposing them both to remain in good standing, and leaving out funeral and widows' benefits and charity, which we may consider equal—and we find:—

A pays \$255; receives back \$153; leaving to his credit \$102. B pays \$191.63; receives \$248; overdrawing his account \$46.

Showing an inequality of nearly \$150 between these two members. After previding for funeral and widows' benefits, the Lodge will not make much out of A; and certainly will lose heavily on B.

It does not appear, then, that the scheme proposed by the Toronto Lodges would be a very profitable one; and it certainly would not be just,

A serious mistake in this scheme, and one which is visible on the surface, is, that it only provides for the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, leaving the General Benefit Fund unaffected. But the disbursements for the relief of widows is only about onc-tenth of the entire relief expenditure of the Order (see Journal G. L. U. S., pp. 6838-6851). More than that, the claim on the W. and O. Fund is not a liability which increases with age to any appreci-

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able extent, so far as we can judge from the experience of the Order hitherto; while the claims on the General Beneft Fund for funeral and sick benefits do increase most emphatically. Referring again to the experience of
Pennsylvania and Ohio, with a combined membership of 140,285, we find
that the amount paid during the last year for widows and orphans was,
for the entire membership, in round numbers, 64; cents per member, while
for the fifty oldest Lodges in each State, instead of increasing, it was actually far less, being only 33; cents. On the other hand, the average sick
vate of the entire membership. 54 of a week, becomes one week in the fifty
oldest Lodges; and the general average of 23; cents for funeral benefits becomes in the fifty oldest Lodges 95 cents.

'The fact is, that the widow's annuity is the very claim for which, taken by itself, with our present knowlege, we are ulterly unable to make any calculations. It is not like providing for an annuity at a certain age, as the author of the scheme submitted to your Committee appears to think. We cannot tell at what age the anticipated widow is to become an annuitant. Further, when she does become annuitant, nothing short of Infinite Prescience can tell how long she will remain one. If it was till the day of her death, we could calculate the time with ease, but the element of matrimony comes in to confuse us; and no statistics have yet been compiled from which we can judge how long the widowhood of the average woman will last.

Herein is the great mistake of this plan, as well as the one of which it is a modification. It admits the principle that the older applicant should pay more than the younger, but it does not make him pay enough. With yearly dues at \$6, to return to our illustration, though B. pays \$17 more on his admission than A, there yet remains a difference of nearly \$150 between the two men. To ask B to pay the extra sum necessary to equalize them at his admission would be absurd. The only available plan would be to spread B'aextra payment over a number of years, and make his dues proportionately larger than A's. In other words, while the admission fee might be left equal at all ages, the quarterly dues should be graded according to the age of the member when admitted. This method has been adopted by the M. U,, and has made that body the most solvent berefit society in existence; it has received the approval of the Parliament of Great Britain, which requires all benefit societies in the old country to regulate their finances on this principle; it has been recommended year after year since 1878 by a Special Committee of the G. L. U. S., composed of some of the ablest men of that body; it has been adopted by quite a number of our Ontario Lodges, whose entarging treasuries already show its good effects; and, finally, it has been recommended by this Grard Lodge to its Subordinates in the Model Code of By-Laws adopted in 1875.

The table already approved by this Grand Lodge, which we reproduce as an appendix to this report, is drawn up on the simple basis of a comparative

equality of payments into the Lodge furds by the members. Were all the members of the age of 21, calculating according to the estimate on page 1921, \$68 would be an ample sum for each to pay; and with this as a starting point, it is required that every man joining at a more advanced age shall pay an equivalent according to his expectation of life. For the convenience of quarterly payments the yearly amount is made divisible by four without fractions. As a consequence it varies in some years a few cents, more or less, from the strictly accurate figure; but this slight variation is more than counterbalanced by the greater simplicity thereby attained.

This is an efficient plan, hos all will admit that it will increase the Lodge fund rapidly; it is a practible plan, for not less than 8000 lodges of various kinds are working upon it to-day; and, if there be any truth in figures, it is certainly a just plan.

At present the supreme law gives Subordinate Lodges full control of their finances. Any action that this Grand Lodge might take on the question of dues and benefits would therefore be only commendatory—not mandatory. It has only made one recommendation two years ago; to make another, after so short a time, and while our statistics are still imperfect and incomplete, would scarcely be wise. But to take a backward step, and advise a return to our old system, or to a modification thereof, would, in the opinion of the undersigned, be foily.

The minority of your Committee cannot therefore recommend this Grand Lodge to approve any other system of dues and benefits than the one adopted in the Model Code at the session of 1875.

# BY LAW RELATING TO QUARTERLY DUES IN MODEL CODE

Every person hereafter admitted into this Lodge shall pay into its funds—at or before the close of each quarterly term—according to his age at the time of admission, at the rate following, that is to say:—At the age of 21, \$6 per year; from 22 to 35 inclusive, an additional 12c, for each year; from 38 to 40 inclusive, an additional 20c, for each year; from 41 to 45 inclusive, an additional 28c, for each year; and from 46 to 50 inclusive, an additional 36c, for each year; and from 46 to 50 inclusive, an additional 36c.

The following was referred to the Judiciary Committee :-

DURHAM LODGE, No. 78, I. O. O. F. PORT HOPS, ONT., July 24, 1377.

To the R. W. Grand Lodge of Onta-to:

REPRESENTATIVES,—The Officers and Members of Durham Lodge, No. 78, respectfully submit the following petition to the R. W. G. L. of Ont.:—

At the session of the Grand Lodge in 1875, on the appeal of an expelled member, the Grand Lodge adopted a report of the Appeal Committee ordering his reinstatement. Durham Lodge, on being notified to comply with the mandate of the Grand Lodge, refused to obey, on the ground that such command was illegal and unconstitutional. Finally the Grand Master command was the Committee of the Grand Lodge. At the meeting of the Grand Lodge in 1876, the Grand Master presented his report, and that part releging to his action toward Durham Lodge, was referred to a special Committee. The decision of the Committee of 1875 was reversed, and the recommendation of the special Committee last year was not concurred in.

Grand Lodge 13 resolution, disapproving of the action of the year previous, by ordering an expelled member to be reinstated without a new trial, and also not concurring in the act on taken by the Grand Master in depriving the Lodge of its Charter for refusing to obey the lilegal commands of the Grand Lodge without the Grand Master having first obtained the consent or the command of the Grand Lodge.

Durham Lodge was suspended from 25th Jan., 1876, to Aug. 15, 1876, slx months and three weeks. At the previous report of this Lodge, we were reported as having 72 members. If it is right for the members not to pay dues to the Lodge during suspension, then the Lodge has sustained a loss of dues from 72 members for six months and three weeks at \$6 per year, which amounts to \$240.92, and if on the other hard it is right for the members to pay their dues during swip ension, they, by being suspended, have been deprived of all rights, privileges and benefits from the Order during such suspension.

As the M. Worthy Grand Master took the Charter of Durham Lodge, No. 78, away for refusing to obey a mandate of the Grand Lodge without the expressed wish or sanction of Grand Lodge to its Presiding Officer in acc. rdsnee with section 1633. White's Digest; the Grand Master being the executive authority of Grand Lodge during recess, and being responsible to the Grand Lodge for his actions, and the Grand Lodge being responsible to the Order for the actions of its Presiding Officers; we therefore respectfully submit that Durham Lodge has a just claim upon Grand Lodge for compensation, at least, for the direct loss sustained during suspension, amounting to \$240.92, as above set forth. All of which was caused by the illegal action of the Grand Master in taking away the Charter. Independent of our direct loss, we have sustained indirect losses which amount to more than the direct loss.

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Before we surrendered our Charter &c., to the D. D. G. M., a protest was read and handed to him to be forwarded to the Grand Master and Grand Lodge, in which the ground was taken, that in the event of its being shown that the action of the Grand Master was illegal, Durham Lodge would exject to be reimbursed the amount of any loss it might sustain during such improper suspension. The Grand Lodge in 1876, ordered that the expelled nember, referred to above, be reinstated and a new trial given him on the same charges. That commanded of Grand Lodge Durham Lodge at once fully and regularly complied with, the Brother was reinstated, a new trial held, and the question between himself and I urham Lodge settled amicably, peacefully and satisfactorily to all parties concerned. There is no doubt if the Grand Lodge in 1875 had taken this action, the matter would have been settled satisfactorily a year previous. Believing we have a ju t cause with which to approach your Grand Pody, we respectfully ask you to take our case into consideration and grant such fair and reasonable compensation as may seem to you our case is entitled.

In conclusion we beg to remind you that Durham Lodge was called upon to pay Grand Lodge dues for the year 1876 while its representatives were refused admission to Grand Lodge.

In the event of the Brother's demise during such disqualification, would his relatives be entitled to funeral benefits and his widow to her annual stipend, provided, at the date of his demise, he were clear on the books, no provision having been made in By-Laws of Eastern Star Lodge, No. 72, for same?

By Rep. Ledingham, of Warriner Lodge, No. 75:

Can a Lodge, after incorporation, do away with their Trustees?

By Rep. H. Bustin, of Nipissing Lodge, No. 79:

Can the D. D. G. M. of Subordinate Lodge give the P. W. to private members in the Lodge room ?

## By Rep. J. H. Post, of Belleville Lodge, No. 81:

Is a Brother entitled to the term password, his dues not having been paid for that term ?

A Brother pays his dues for the first week in the term, has he a right to receive the password ?

What course can or should be taken to oblige members to pay their dues, fines or other charges against them?

Has the N. G. the right to refuse the admittance of a Brother who is an arrears for dues?

A Brother withdraws from his Lodge by card and amiliates with another Lodge, is he entitled to benefits during the first six months of his amiliation, if so, which Lodge is holden for such benefits, the one he withdrew from or the one he amiliated with?

By Rep. W. Reid, of Ivy Lodge, No. 90:

Is the child of a Brother Odd Fellow in good standing at time of death to be considered an orphan, the mother being allve, the Lodge By-Laws specifying annual benefit to orphan children up to 14 years of age, and the mother re-married?

By Rep. S. J. Somerville, of Western City Lodge, No. 93:

Can the Lodge refuse benefits to a Brother after having undergone an examination by the medical examiner of the Lodge and reported in sound health although it could be proved that he was taking medicine for consumption at the time he joined the Lodge, or should they bring a charge against him for making misstatements?

By Rap. T. D. Brown, of Pt. Stanley Lodge, No. 95:

By Law No. 34 says that the quarterly contribution of each Brother shall be considered due at the commencement of each quarterly term, or within 30 days, is the Lodge supposed to use the old term P. W. for the first 30 days, is only suppose like guardian fails to pay his dues, how is he to be prevented from receiving the new P. W. from members or visitors while he is not lawfully entitled to it?

By-Law No. 15, after defining the duties of the P. S., says that "for such services he shall receive the sum of ten cents for each member in good standing on the books of the Lodge at the close of his term of office," who

are members in good standing in this sense, all whose names appear on the semi annual returns or only those whose dues are fully paid up at the close of the term?

A Brother dies in good standing, the widow who afterward becomes immoral and deprayed, what should be done with her annual benefits, can the Lodge withold it and place it in a bank for the benefit of orphans, and, if so, would that be the best method of disposing of it?

By Waterloo Lodge, No. 107:

Can the evidence taken before a trial Committee be discussed in open Lodge when deliberating upon the report of said Committee?

By Rep. McMillan, of Palmerston Lodge, No. 123:

In case of the death of a Brother, who is also a member of some other Order from which he is entitled to funeral expenses, and is buried by such Order, and the funeral expenses incurred paid by such other Order, entimed to the full amount of funeral expenses from us as provided by our By-Laws?

By Rep. Dresden Lodge, No. 124:

The Permanent Secretary reported a Brother to be eighteen months in arrears?—a. Brother made a motion that an extension of time be granted to the Brother; the motion on being put to the Lodge was lost; the N. G. then declared the Brother to have ceased membership N. P. D. Was it right to declare the brother to have ceased membership, not having been previousl Suspended or notified of his arrears in the Lodge?

Our By-Laws say it is the duty of the Permanent Secretary to notify every Brother when twelve months in arrears and report to the Lodge any Brother twelve menths in arrears. Also to report to the Lodge when a Brother is eighteen months in arrears.

Next Lodge night two Brothers who voted against the motion of extension of time, moved for a re-consideration. The motion was put to the Lodge and carried. Was it right to re-consider the action of the N. G. or the Lodge in the case?

Can the Brother become a member of our Lodge again without being again balloted for ?

A Brother of our Lodge was declared to have ceased to be a member N. ?

D. about two years ago. He now wishes to be reinstated so as to join a

Lodge in British Columbia, where he now resides. Can he be reinstated
without being here to re-sign the Constitution?

Must we have the consent of the Grand Lodge before we reinstate a Brother who has ceased membership N. P. D.

By Rep. T. A. Beckett, of Capital Lodge, No 141:

When the chair of N. G. becomes vacant, is it legal for V. G. to occupy the N. G.'s chair for the remainder of the term?

When the P. G 's of a Subordinate Lodge refuse to take the office of N. G., can a Lodge elect a Scarlet Degree member who has not filled a Subordinate office.

By Rep. Broadwell, of Concord Lodge, No. 142:

Where dues are payable in advance can the N. G. withhold the P. W. of current term when a member is not three months in arrears.

By Rep. P. S. Furness, of Simcoe Lodge, No. 161.

A member of a Lodge where the quarterly dues are payable in advance is taken sick on the evening of the first meeting in the quarter, his sickness continuing for several weeks. He is unable to send his quarterly dues on that evening, his sickness having commenced but a short time previous to the time of opening the Lodge. On the evening of the second meeting in the quarter he sends for a Brother for the purpose of sending his dues, but finds that the Brother has left for the Lodge. At that meeting his reported sick, and is attended by the Visiting Committee from that time. He neglects to send his dues at the third meeting of the quarter, although having the opportunity to do so. Query: Is such member entitled to any sick benefits, and if so, for what length of time?

By Rep. J. Stewart, of Minerva Lodge, No. 197:

The Constitution of the R. W. Grand Lodge of Ontario, I. O. O. F., provides that the Election of Officers shall be held semi-annually in Lodges meeting weekly, and annually in Lodges meeting fortnightly.

In case a Lodge is instituted and before the term of thirteen nights of meeting has elapsed (the meetings being fortnightly) the first regular meeting in July has come, is the Lodge acting unconstitutionally in holding an Election of Officers for the ensuing term of twelve months? In case this action is constitutional are not the retiring officers entitled to the honors of their several offices, they having completed the term of office.

When should the Election and Installation of Officers of said Lidge take

By Rep. Geo. Cochenour, of Live Oak Lodge, No. 185 :

A Brother having a Clearance Card from his own Lodge to another Lodge but before the Lodge accepted his Card the candidate joined the Canadian Order would Live Oak Lodge be justfied in accepting his Clearance Card?

Rep. Brc. Ormiston of Gananoque Lodge, No. 114, submitted the following which was referred to the Finance Committee.

To the Right Worthy Grand Lodge of Ontario, I. O. O. F.:

Gananoque Lodge, No. 114, claims that the fine of four dollars imposed by the Grand Secretary for non-receipt of returns for term ending Sist Dec., 1876, should not have been charged, and ought now to be remitted for the following reasons, viz.:

On the night of Installation the returns and tax were tendered to the D. D. G. M. as installing Officer but declined by him with instructions to forward them direct to the R. W. Grand Secretary. A delay occurred in obeying his instructions, owing to the fact that orders were paid by the Treasurer supposing that the tax to Grand Lodge had been paid, so that when the orders for the Capita Tax was presented by the Secretary, there were funds in the treasury.

Rep. W. Jaffray from the Special Committee on that subject presented the following report which was adopted.

### REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE.

Your Special Committee to whom was referred clause 19, Grand Secretary's annual report, beg leave to report that they have carefully examined the proposed alterations in the semi-annual return sheets as presented to them, and have decided to recommend their adoption with one or two alterations that have suggested themselves to your Committee. We would also recommend that the Grand Secretary be authorized to get the required blank return books printed and forward to the respective Lodges or the terms suggested by him in said clause 19, as follows: "I would recommend that the Grand Secretary be instructed to get printed 300 blank return hooks (with a sufficient supply of blank return sheets), and that each Lodge be given a book free of charge to replace the one now in their hands, and that the new Lodges be charged the usual advance op cost."

We therefore submit for adoption the following: Resolved, That the foregoing report be adopted.

WHEREAS,—The Lodges in the City of St. Louis, through their General Relief Committee, are almost daily called upon to assist such cases and provide for their sustenance and transportation to their places of destination, which they are under no obligation to do; therefore be it

Resolved,—That the Grand Lodges in the Order be requested to call the attention of their Lodges to this practice, and prohibit them by law from sending their own members, or the widows of their deceased members, to other towns or cities to ask aid of the Order to enable them to pursue their journey.

Resolved,—That our Grand Representatives be instructed to present this subject to the G. L. U. S., and that it be requested to adopt a uniform law upon the subject.

Resolved,—That a copy of the above be transmitted to each Grand Lodge by the Grand Secretary.

Your Committee find that Sro. Helliwell was in arrears at the time of his sickness, and therefore not entitled to benefits.

The claim set up by Bro, H-lilwell that he was not notified by the Per. Sec. according to the By-Law quoted, is no excuse for non-payment of dues.

ERIE LODGE, No. 38.

In 1874 this matter was before the Grand Lodge on the Report of a Special Committee appointed to examine fully lute the matter. This Committee recommended that Bro. McMath be reinstated on payment of ten dollars in dispute, and such other amount as demanded by the Liws of the Order. The Grand Lodge adopted this report but no time was fixed within which Bro. McMath should make payment, nor was the amount definitely stated.

Eric Lodge now compiled with the order of the Grand Lodge although afforded by the Lodge every opportunity of doing so and they ask that the order of 1874 be rescuised.

. Bro. McMath in his answer disputes the amount claimed from him by the Lodge and also claims sick benefits.

Upon an investigation of the matter your Committee are of opinion that there is a sum of \$23,15 justly due by Bro. McMath to Eric Lodge lifeluding dues up to the 14th of September, 1877, and further that Bro. McMath is not entitled to benefits.

We therefore recommend that Bro. McMath be reinstated upon payment of that amount on or before the 14th of September next; that notice to that effect be sent to Bro. McMath forthwith by the Secretary of Eric Lodge, and that in default of such payment by said time, the sentence of expansion already passed upon Bro. McMath be confirmed unconditionally.

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON APPEALS.

BELLEVIDÉE, August 2d, 1877.

To the R. W. Grand Lodge of Ontario:

W. J. DIAMOND,

BELLEVILLE LODGE, No. 81.

Your Committee report the facts appear to be as follows: A charge was preferred in Belleville Lodge, No. 81, against Bro. W. J. Diamond by Bro

R. Traceg, for conduct unbecoming an Odd Fellow, the specification being that Bio. Diamond did, on the night of December 28, 1876, in the Lodge-100m of Felleville Lodge, and also in the anter-noom, threaten Bro. Tracey that if he brought a charge against Bro Hudson, also a member of said Lodge, that he, Diamond, would bring Tracey up before a Court of Low for bringing such charge against Hudson, thereby setting at defience the laws and regulations of the Order and preventing Bro. Tracey from doing his duty as an Odd Fellow.

The Trial Committee, to whom the matter was referred, reported recommending the expulsion of Bro. Diamond, which was adopted by the Lodge by a vote of 21 to 3.

From this decision Bro. Diamond appeals, on the grounds, amongst others:

1—That the offence in the charge mentioned is not within the legal jurisdiction of the Lodge.

2—That he has not been guilty of violating any of the principles of the Order or infringing the Constitution or any part thereof, or the By-Laws of Belleville Lodge, or any part thereof.

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3—That the finding of the Committee was unjustifiable and too extreme, and contrary to law and evidence and the weight of evideenc.

4-And for informality and want of fairness,

We find:

1—That the Trial Committee was duly appointed, who heard the evidence in regular manner in presence of accused, who was also heard in defence.

2—That under the Lodge Ry-Laws any Brother guilty of language or conduct in Ledge meriting in the opinion of the Lodge expulsion from membership, the Brother may be expelled by vote of the Lodge.

8—Under clause 15 of the Constitution an appeal may be taken on the Frounds "of informality or want of fairness, and if such informality or want of fairness be proved, but not otherwise, the Ladge may be ordered by the Grand Lodge to hold a new trial."

We find no informality or want of fairness in the proceedings, and that the Subordinate Lodge is the proper judge in such a matter. Under Section 1839, Digest G. L. U. S., a Grand Lodge cannot reverse a sentence of expulsion upon the ground that who penalty was too severe for the offence," where its own fundamental law provides that an appeal to it shall be confined exclusively to matters of law or of irregularity or want of fairnesss in the proceedings.

We recommend that the appeal be dismissed.

Grand Lodge they will move that the present system be changed, and that the mode to be then adopted be as follows: "That a D. D. G. M. be appointed in every Lodge, except in cities, towns and villages where more than one Lodge is situated; then one deputy to be appointed for such city, town or village, except in cases in which Lodges are sufficiently hear to prevent any expense to this R. W. Grand Lodge."

On motion of Rep. Hu. Blain, the notice of motion given by him last session, page 1697, was considered and adopted as follows:

Amend clause 9, Constitution of the Grand Lodge to read as follows: Strike out "first," in the first line, and insert "last" in lieu thereof; strike out "July" in second line, and insert "June" in lieu thereof.

On motion of Rep. Hu Blain, seconded by Rep. J. Ritchie, jr., the notice of motion to amend the Constitution of Subordinates as given by Covenant Lodge at the last session, Journal 1876, page 1711, was considered and adopted as follows:

"No Brother shall be nominated who has not signified his willingness to accept the office for which he may be named, and no nominee shall be allowed to retire after the nominations have been declared closed."

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CLAUSE 13 GRAND SECRE-TARY'S REPORT.

BELLEVILLE, August 2d, 1877.

To the R. W. Grand Lodge of Ontario:

We, your Committee to whom were referred the several clauses of the Most Worthy Grand Master's Report, beg to report as follows:

SECTION II.

1—Clauses 1 and 2 were referred to the Judiciary Committee.

In clause 3, we approve of the action of the Grand Master in granting a dispensation for organizing a Lodge in Gorrie.

In reference to clause 4, we have to congratulate Belleville Lodge, No. 81, that all difficulties which had arisen and which might tend to destroy the general harmony of the Lodge are now amicably arranged.

In clause 5, we approve of the appointment of the Committee on Dues and Benefits, and the said Committee having presented a minority and majority report, we would respectfully refer the attention of the Grand Lodge to such reports.

#### SECTION III.

2—Your Committee wish to speak in the highest terms of the labors of the Most Worthy Grand Master during the past year. While it may be a matter of regret that he could not visit every Lodge in his jurisdiction, we believe he has done all that could be reasonably expected of him, and your Committee are glad to know that the Grand Master has received from the D. D. G. M.'s and other members of the Order that attention and assistance to which he is entitled.

#### SECTION V.

3—This part of the Most Worthy Grand Master's Report, which has reference to hall dedications, is very satisfactory to your Committee, there being no stronger evidence of the permanent improvement of our Order and the strong hold it has on the affections of its members than the fact that they are willing to erect such large and comfortable buildings for the meetings of their Subordinate Lodges, and more especially during a time of such general financial depression.

SECTION VI.

4—We endorse the action of the Most Worthy Grand Master in granting new charters free of charge to Lodges whose charters were destroyed by fire as mentioned in his report.

#### SECTION VII.

5—We approve of the action of the Most Worthy Grand Master with reference to Jarvis Lodge, No. 91.

Clause 3 of this section should be referred to the Committee on Legislation.

#### SECTION VIII.

6—Your Committee approve of the ruling of the Most Worthy Grand Master in clauses A, B, C, D and E, with this explanation as to clause D, viz., that the thirteen weeks has reference to the particular Lodge applying for the dispensation, each Lodge having a right to fix its own limit.

#### SECTION IX.

8 — We heartly endorse section 9, and recommend that paper "A" referred to, be printed and embodied in the Journal of the Proceedings of this Grand Lodge.

9—We regret the loss of the services of the D. D. G. M.'s who resigned, but congratulate the Grand Master on having been able to have the said offices so ably filled.

#### SECTION XVI.

10—We approve of the circular of the Grand Master relating to proclamation of Grand Sire in regard to the use of filegal odes.

#### SECTION XVII.

11—We would endorse, with all earnestness, the action of the Most Worthy Grand Master in regard to section I? of the report, with the hope that the Grand Representatives will use their utmost endeavors in carrying out the recommendations of the Most Worthy Grand Master.

#### SECTION XVIII.

12—Your Committee fully agree with the Most Worthy Grand Master as to the necessity of recording the past history of Odd Fellowship in Canada, and would recommend the Grand Lodge to grant the sum of \$300 as bonuses for the best history on the above subject, \$200 for the first and \$100 for the second, provided that the Grand Lodge United States has not already provided a historiographer for this jurisdiction.

#### SECTION XXI.

13—Your Committee cannot speak too strongly on the subject of this section, viz., the insurance of Lodge property, inasmuch as the Grand Lodge is called upon to assist Subordinates who have lost their property in this manner. Your Committee therefore deem it important that the Grand Lodge should enact such laws by amending the Constitution of Subordinates so as to reader it imperative for them to insure Lodge property.

BELLEVILLE, August 3d, 1877.

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To the R. W. Grand Lodge of Ontario:

The Judiciary Committee, to whom was referred the questions propounded by the several Lodges mentioned, beg leave to submit the following answers thereto, viz.:

Ivy Lodge, No. 90.

Is the child of a Brother Odd Fellow in good standing at time of death to be considered an orphan, the mother being alive, the Lodge By-Laws specifying annual benefits to orphan children up to 14 years of age and the mother re-married?

Answer. Yes.

Eureka Lodge, No. 30.

Suppose a member owes any Lodge for fines levied in accordance with By-Laws of the Lodge, more than the amount of thirteen weeks dues, what off ct would it have on his claim for beneats providing he had said his dues up to date of such claim ?

Answer. It will have the effect of debarring the brother from benefits.

Ar. ears for fines legally imposed are the same as for dues.

And also what steps the Lodge must take to recover any fires that may be made against any brother according to the By-Laws of the Lodge of which he is a member?

Answer. Same steps must be taken to collect fines that are required to collect dues or assessments.

Warriner Lodge, No. 75.

Can a Lodge after incorporation do away with its Trustees? Answer, Consult your legal adviser, under the Act of Incorporation.

Belleville Lodge, No. 81.

Is a Brother entitled to the term password, his dues not having been paid

Answer. If the brother is not in arrears for over thirteen weeks, he is entitled to the password.

A Brother pays his dues for the first week in the term, has he a right to receive the password?

Answer, Yes.

What course can or should be taken to oblige members to pay their dues, fines or other charges against them?

Answer. Refer to your Constitution, By-Laws and Digest of the Order.

Has the N. G. the right to refuse the admittance of a Brother who is in

Answer. See clause 2, page 89, also page 90, Ontario Digest.

A Brother withdraws from his Lodge by card and affiliates with another Lodge, is he entitled to benefits during the first six months?

Answer. It depends upon the By-Laws of the Lodge with which he affili-

If so, which Lodge is holden for such benefits, the one he withdrew from or the one he affiliated with?

Answer. Your Committee are surprised at the simplicity of the question.

Niplssing Lodge, No. 79.

Can the D. D. G. M. of Subordinate Lodges give the password to private members in the Lodge room ?

Answer. Refer to the Ritual.

Unity Lodge, No. 47.

A motion is put from the chair to expend money; objection is taken that it is in conflict with the By-Laws; the N. G. rules against the objection; a majority of the Lodge sustain the N G.; notice is then given that an appeal will be taken to the D. D. G. M. Would such appeal stop proceedings pending the decision of the D. D. G. M. ?

If the money was paid by the order of the N. G. before the decision of the D. D. G. M. and the D. D. G. M. ruled the action of the Lodge wrong, what redress would the Brothers forming the minority have, they having carried out the appeal in good faith and without any unnecessary delay?

Answer. The questions are not sufficiently explicit for your Committee to render an opinion.

Pt. Stanley Lodge No. 95.

By-Law No. 34 of Pt. Stanley Lodge No. 95, says that the quarterly contributions of each Brother shall be considered due at the commencement of each quarterly term or within 30 days, is the Lodge suppored to use the old term password for the first 30 days of the new term, if not suppose the Guardian falls to ray his dues how is he to be prevented from receiving the new password from members or visitors while he is not lawfully entitled to it?

Answer. The Lodge is not supposed to use the old password after installation.

A Brother dies in good standing the widow afterwards becomes immoral and deprayed—What should be done with her annual benefits? Can the Lodge withhold it and place it in a bank for the benefit of the orphans, and if so would that be the best method of disposing of it?

Answer. Discontinue benefits to the widow and give the same to the children.

By-Law No. 15 of Pt. Stanley Lodge No. 85 after defining the duties of the P. S., says that for such services he shall receive the sum of ten cents for each memorin good standing on the books of the Lodge at the close of his term of office. Who are members in good standing in this sense? All whose name appear on the Semi-an nual Returns or only those whose dues are fully paid up at the close of the term?

Answer. The Ontario Digest defines good standing, see page 61.

Simcoe Lodge No. 161.

A member of a Lodge where the quarterly dues are payable in advance is taken sick on the first metting in the quarter, his sickness continuing for several weeks, he is unable to send his quarterly dues on that evening, his sickness having commenced but a short time previous to the time of opening the Lodge. On the evening of the second meeting in the quarter he sends for a Brother for the purpose of sending his dues but finds that the brother has left for the Lodge. At that meeting he is reported sick and is attended by the Visiting Committee from that time. He neglects to send his dues at the third meeting of the quarter although having the opportunity to de so. Query? Is such member entitled to any such benefits and if so for what length of time?

Answer. Under the circumstances stated the brother not being thirteen weeks in arrears is entitled to benefits.

Western City Lodge No. 93.

Can the Lodge refuse benefits to a brother after having undergone an examination by the medical examiner of the Lodge and reported in sou adhealth although it could be proved that he was taking medicine for consumption at the time he joined the Lodge or should they bring a charge against him for making misstatements.

Answer. The Lodge accepted the certificate of their medical adviser and accepted the responsibility.

Concord Lodge, No. 142.

Where dues are payable in advance can the N. G. withhold the password of the current term when members are not three months in arrears.

Answer. No.

Resolved,-That the foregoing answers be adopted.

Can the evidence taken before a trial committee be discussed in open Lodge when deliberating upon the report of said Committee? Answer, Yes. At the election of Representatives to the Grand Lodge, has the N. Grand the right to vote the same as other members? Answer, Yes.

Eastern Star Lodge, No. 72.

Has any Lodge the power to set on an amended By-Law before the said amended By-Law has been submitted to the Grand Lodge for approval?

Answer, No.

2nd.—A Brother disqualified from obtaining sick benefits by reason of N.
P.D. In the event of the Brother's demise during such disqualification, would
his relatives be entitled to funeral benefits and his widow to her annual
stipend, provided, at the date of his demise, he were clear on the books, no
provision having been made by the By-Lawa for the same?

Answer. No.

By Live Oak Lodge, No. 185.

A Brother having a Clearance Card from his own Lodge to another Lodge, but before the Lodge accepted his Card the candidate joined the Canadian Order, would Live Oak be justified in accepting his Clearance Card. Answer, Yes.

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North Star Lodge, No. 68.

Is it constitutional to re-instate a Brother who has been suspended for N. P. D. and remit the full amount of his dues after a lapse of two years, the Lodge having unanimously voted in favor of the same?

Answer. See White's Digest, 17 8, 1769, 1770, 1771, 1772, 1778, 1774.

By Minerva Lodge, No. 197.

The Constitution of the R. W. Grand Lodge of Ontario, I. O. O. F. provides that the election of officers shall be held semi-annually in Lodges meeting weekly, and annually in Lodges meeting fortnightly.

In case a Lodge is instituted, and before the term of thirteen nights of meeting has elapsed (the meetings being held fortnightly) the first regular meeting in July has come, is the Lodge acting unconstitutionally in holding an election of officers for the ensuing term of twelve months?

Answer, Yes,

In case the action is constitutional, are not the retiring officers entitled to the honors of their several offices, they having completed their term of office.

Answer. The election would be on the last meeting an June and the initiation on the first meeting in July.

Dresden Lodge, No. 124.

The Per. Secretary reported a Brother eighteen months in arrents. A Brother made a motion that an extension of time be grante i to the Brother. The motion on being put to the Lodge was lost. The N. G. declared the Brother to have ceased membership for N. P. D. Next Lodge night two Brothers who voted against the motion sion of time moved for a reconsideration. The motion was put to the Lodge and carried. Was it right to re-consider the action of the Lodge or the N. G. in this case? and can the Brother become a member of our Lodge again without again being balloted for?

Answer. Ought to have been notified.

A Brother of our Lodge was declared to have ceased to be a member for N. P. D. about two years ago. He now wishes to be reinstated, so as to join a Lodge in British Columbia, where he now resides. Can he be reinstated without being here to re-sign the Constitution? and must we have the consent of the Grand Lodge before we reinstate a Brother who has ceased membership for N. P. Dues.

Answer. See White's Digest 1767 to 1774, inclusive.

In case of the death of a Brother, who is also a member of some other Order from which he is entitled to funeral expenses, and is buried by such Order and the funeral expenses paid by such Order, is the Brother entitled to the full amount of funeral expenses from us as provided by our By-Laws?

Answer. Cartainly; must pay funeral benefits.

Capita' Lodge, No. 141.

When the Chair of the N.G. becomes vacunt, is it legal for the V.G. to occupy the Chair for the remainder of the term.

Answer, No.

When the Past Grand of the Lodge refuses to take the office of N. G., can a Lodge elect a Scarlet member who has not filled a Subordinate office. Answer. See White's Digost, clause 1335.

Your Committee on Printing to whom were referred clauses 1, 7,16,17 and 23 of the report of the Grand Secretary beg leave to report,

That they have carefully examined the tenders produced, and would recommend that the action of the Grand Secretary in awarding the contract for printing the Journal of 1876 be approved, the tender of the Branford Expositor being the lowest received, also that his action in sending out Journals be approved.

In regard to the matter of re-printing the Journal of this Grand Lodge, it is the opinion of your Committee that the probable sale of the Journal would not warrant this Grand Lodge in Incurring the expense at the present time. The M. W. Grand Master requested the same brothers to introduce Bro. J. B King, P. G., of Brantford, R. W. Grand Secretary elect; whereupon that brother was duly installed.

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The M. W. Grand Master requested Brothers W. N. Ford and H. McAfee, Past Grand Masters, to introduce Wm. Badenach, P. G., of Toronto, R. W. Grand Treasurer elect, whereupon that brother was duly installed.

The M. W. Grand Master then made the following appointments:

# REPORT

# REPRESENTATIVES

TO THE

R. W. Grand Lodge of the United States.

SESSION OF 1877, HELD AT BALTIMORE, MD.

#### To the R. W. Grand Ludge of Ontario, I. O. O. F.

In accordance with law and custom your Representatives to the R. W. Grand Lodge of the United States, submit a synopsis of the proceedings of that Grand Body at their recent session held at Baltimore, Md., commencing on Monday the 17th of September, 1877.

The number of Representatives present was one hundred and thirtyseven; all the jurisdictions being represented except South Carolina, British Columbia, Switzerland and Montana.

The M. W. Grand Stre. the R. W. Grand Secretary and the R. W. Grand Treasurer submitted their reports from which it will be seen that the order is still prospering and doing much in the work of alleviating human suffering and providing protection and aid to the widow and orphan,

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We give an extract from the report of the Grand Sire shewing the increase or decrease for the past year as follows:

Whilst it is to be regretted that in some localities the membership has fallen off, the aggregate returns will exhibit an increased constituency in both branches, over last year in the United States. We have more than held our own, The ranks that are annually thinned by death, inability and indifference of a large class to pay their dues, has been more than made up with new recruits, presenting to the assembled representatives a progressive and appreciative constituency, which, and the side of the country, is cause of congratulation. And we should not fall in making proper acknowledgements to the Supreme Ruler of the Universe for the many favors, which enables us to feel that His love appears to govern in our councils, and that we meet again under the most favorable auspices, with peace, harmony, good will and good order pervading the entire brotherhood.

The general returns give the following condition of the Order.

The following decisions made by the Grand Sire were all confirmed :

## DECISIONS OF THE GRAND SIRE

Question. Is it right for the Grand Representatives to give the A. T. P. W. to the Grand Lodge or Encampment, the same as he would the Permanent P. W. during the exemplification of the unwritten work?

No. 1. Answer. No; the A. T. P. W. should be communicated by the Grand Representative to the M. W. Grand Master or Grand Patriarch of the jurisdiction, who will communicate it to the Grand Secretary or Grand Scribe, and cause it to be communicated to the D. D. Grand Masters and such other installing officers as he may find it necessary to appoint to assist him in the discharge of his official duties.

Question. Is it compulsory on the N. G. of a Degree of Rebekah Lodge to communicate the A. P. W. to one of its members who is divorced from her husband, whether he is still in good standing or has been expelled from the Order?

No. 2. Answer. If a member (Daughter of Rebekah), upon her own libel (or complaint) against the husband, has obtained a divorce, she would be entitled, under section 500d White's Digest to the A. P. W., and the N. G. of Degree of Rebekah Lodge would be the proper officer to communicate the same. But if the decree of divorce, was made upon the husband's libel, or complaint, against the wife, the A. P. W. should be withheld until the Lodge should be satisfied that she had not been guitty of any immoral conduct. The husband's standing in his Lodge does not affect her standing in the Rebekah Degree Lodge either one way or the other. See section 500d White's Digest.

Question. Are Lodges in this (New Jersey) jurisdiction required to submit their By-Laws, or amendments thereto, to our R. W. Grand Lodge and have them approved before they can have force and effect? fo

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No. 3. Answer. The above question is entirely within the control of State Grand Lodges, and with which the Grand Lodge of the United States should not interfere unless upon appeal in the usual manner. Vol. 8, page 6018, Journal G. L. U. S.

Question. Can an Indian with a withdrawal card be a petitioner for and become a charter member of a new Lodge?

No 4. Answer, No, he cannot be either; the action of the Grand Lodge of the United States, session 1878, page 6977, decided "The no Lodge c an lawfully permit an Indian to visit it under any circumstances whatever," which renders him also incompetent as a petitioner for a new Lodge.

No. 5. A brother of an extinct Subordinate Lodge, holding a certificate or card such as are described and provided for in section 225 and 226, White's Digest, is entitled to visit upon such certificate or card for one year from the date of its issue, and the N. G.'s of Subordinate Lodges, when officially requested by the Grand Secretary of the jurisdiction issuing such certificate or card, upon being satisfied of the identify of the individual, should communicate the A.T. P. W. to the brother holding such certificate or card. Sec. 1518 and 1519, White's Digest.

#### REPORT OF THE GRAND SECRETARY.

No. 6. The status of a brother holding dismissal certificate, is specifically defined in the third resolution as reported under 316, White's Digest, and if he wants to renew his membership, he must pursue the same course as that prescribed for Aucient Odd Fellows in section 64, or as an applicant or petitioner for a charter for a new Lodge, as provided for in section 316b White's Digest.

The report of the R. W. Grand Secretary, like all the productions of that venerable and flighty honored officer, is clear, concise and full, a pamphlet of over one hundred pages, giving e complete account of the Order in every respect. We can give only his summing up, in which he says:

"In concluding this review of the work of Odd Fellowship under the Grand Lodge of the United States and the jurisdictions thereunto belonging, our hearts are gladdened and made happy in the contemplation of the scene which rises before us. We behold the Order, which our fathers founded less than sixty years ago, in that spirit of beneficence which ennobles the ago, and for the elevation of human character, now recognized as one of the potential forces of society. In no ago of the world have greater efforts combined to pefriend man. Offices of philanthropy and of general charity in earlier periods were administered by the church or its auxiliaries in some form, This vast service no longer confines itself to this narrow sphere. Mankind, irrespective of country, aread or religious sentiment, now recken such duties to be instinctive, and amongst the highest obligations of life, not less binding upon the secular arm than upon church and state. To provide for the poor, for the sick, for the ignorant of every class, for the widow, for the orphan, for the really helpless and destitute, is no longer exclusively the command of religion, but is in all enlightened communities recognized as a high obligation of the state, which challenges the general approval, On this broad field of benefaction, policy harm mixes with humanity and religion, the abundant fruit of which is seen in all well ordered society. In Lact, the common sentiment prevails wherever civilization extends. Nobly has our age and people met this humanity and illustrated the generous spirit which it has generally a akoned. Thousands and tops of thousands emulate each other in works at trotherly love, in every form of charity and by every form of individual of combined matrumentality for the relief of human suffering. The elevech, the state and the scoular arm, however otherwise divided, move in harmony in this dause. Their counsels may differ, but the course pursued leads to the same great end. Each acting from a common heart strongthens the arm of the other and adds greatly to the general purpose, by the accord of spirit which prevails and unites the whole. Odd Fellowship is an outgrowth of the spirit and the prevailing sentiment of the times. It has been pursuing its mission in its own quiet way for half a century and more, and has enlisted the co-operation of millions of men and of treasure in the great cause, the details of which form its records, which it is our pride to present to you from year to year. No greater moral wealth envicious society than the high standard of character which Odd Fellowship is culcates, inspires and exacts. The truth of which is patent wherever an Odd Fellows' Lodge exists. Out of individual character chiefly is the standard of citizenship evoked, which is at once the ornament of the body politic and of all reformed and refined civil organizations. Character has more to do with healthy human progress than any other of the many elements of civilization. It may be assumed as the broad basis upon which society rests, to constitute the nucleus of public virtue and its real support in every trial. Christianity itself and all religious advance more under its auspices than under all other aids, because it forms its solid foundation and sure defence. Character, in fact, is the gem of life; it ennobles man and lifts the human to the Divine image. Judging it and any system of religion by the extent of nobility of soul which they inspire, or the moral elevation which they awaken, invokes the highest admiration of all candid men. In this respect, Odd Fellowship stands forth as the champion, advocate and auxiliary of the best interests of the Church, the State and the People, because it demands and inspires character as the highest adornment of life and the strongest support of the social fabric.

"In its ordinary aspect as a vast benefaction, its rtatistics and volume of detail here presented need no comment. We present its principles, aspirations and labors confidently as a great moral force, and appeal to their fruits, as verified by our record. Among the many beneficent influences at work in every sphere of life, the moral power which educates, trains and moulds man, and by which society is elevated and refined, is probably the most potential. This is our mystic force, the secret power of Odd Fellowsuip. This is the lever which lifts the masses from degradation and low estate, which conquers "vice in all its forms," and moves like an army with banners responsive to the Divine intendment of human brothernood. I an age essentially utilitarian, such has been its record. The homogeneity which it engenders, the sympathy of natures which it awakens among men, the community of public and private interests which it recognizes, the reciprocal duties and obligations which it imposes, all recall erratic man from the tumultuous conflicts of life, and inspire in him the spirit of brotherhood.

"If it has seemed of late years not to progress with its former impetuous vigor, scattering its seed broadcast upon the moral furrow, and has appeared to have been checked by the eventful times in which we live, and by which the industries and business pursuits of the world have been oppressed it has not been because its principles or labors have been relaxed, or because its normal capacity for beneficence is less effective, or has been administered with less zeal, but because the condition of the masses among which it chiefly acts, and by whom it is mainly upheld in the battle of life, has been for several years and is yet overwhelmed with pecuniary trials and diminished rewards for labor. Men have not had the means, the employment or the ability to prosper and advance its progress as actively as in former years. Besides, our great country has experienced extraordinary trials. It has but recently emerged from a fearful civil strife, which left one-half of it desolate, wasted and impoverished beyond our appreciation, with all the ordinary rewards of labor, commerce and industry stagnant, with a general paralysis of business throughout the world. Superadded to all of which, vast armies confront each other in Europe in sanguinary conflict, involving the peace of the world. Amidst all this combined evil, the wonder is, that in such inauspicious times, not that our numbers and finances do not keep pace with our former unexampled prosperity, but that Old Fellowship holds its own and

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really survives such a fearful ordeal—that it still shows signs of vigorous life, and commands its accustomed annual aggregates in its various spheres of action. These facts this report abundantly sustains. We have not only met all the demands of the sick and the needy in our seven thousand Lodges and our two thousand Encampments, but have contributed to such other objects of general benevolence as our means would allow. The condition of the Order is a just subject of congratulation to its friends. There is nothing to excite its fears or to create anxiety for its future. On the contrary, its career is auspicious in the highest degree. Ranking among the strongest organizations of the kind in the world, it maintains its prestige triumphantly, and, beyond a satisfactory examination of its system of 'Dues and Benefits' and their proper reconstruction, needs no organic legislation. This, although a pressing and vital subject, with a view to its permanent existence, is rather a question of calm and considerate reform than of controversy, addressing itself to the practical sense and wisdom of its rulers, involving as it does the life and death of Odd Fellowship, which is inseparably blended with sound finances and a stable system of 'dues and

The legislation of the Grand Lodge of most interest to Ontario will be found in the following reports and resolutions, all of which were adopted it is preper to state that all that Ontario asked was granted except the change of name of Grand Lodge of United States.

## REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

COMMITTEES ON APPEALS.

Appeal of Bro, Orendorf against the Grand Lodge of Illinois. The facts of this case are as follows:

A brother, during a regular meeting of a Lodge, and during the pendency of a trial in which he was a material witness, informally, without consent, and against the protest of "one of the presiding officers," left the Lodge room. For this act he was charged with "misconduct" (which your Committee conclude means, "conduct unbecoming an Odd Fellow,") and pleaded guilty. The Grand Master, on appeal to him, set aside the plea and directed the Lodge to find him not guilty. The Grand Lodge sustained the Grand Master, and this appeal is from that action.

Had not the accused brother pleaded guilty, the evidence must have shown that his couduct in leaving the room, coupled with the act of leaving, was such as to have amounted to conduct unbecoming an Odd Fellow. This charge is often a very indefinite one, and depends generally upon the proof of the character of the conduct complained of. As an act otherwise proper may be performed in such an improper manner as to make the performance thereof one unbecoming an Odd Fellow, and improper. If the accused himself had been conscious of rectitude in the premises, pleaded not guilty

and challenged investigation, he might have presented sufficient excuse for his act, and the following reasoning of the Grand Master might have been just, wherein he says:

"A member of a Lodge may not be prohibited from leaving the Lodge room at proper periods during any meeting of the Lodge, provided a quorum remains; and the Noble Grand may not compel a brother wishing to retire to remain. 

Bro. Duniop had a right to retire when he did. He may be punished for refusing to respond to the summons of the Lodge to testify, but he cannot be punished because he retired from the Lodge during the progress of a trial in which he was a witness, and the presiding officer had no right to refuse to consent to his retirement or protest against it."

But the accused knew what his own conduct and intentions were better than anyone else could know. The gist of every offence is the intent, and as the accused pleaded putity of unbecoming conduct, it was, in the opinion of your formittee, the duty of the Lodge to pass sentence, and as the punishment a fine of \$5.00 was not excessive, the same should not have been interfered with by the Grand Master.

Wherefore, your Committee recommend that the appeal be sustained.

Your Committee on Appeals, No. 2, to whom was referred the appeal of Bro. Edwin Rounds, from the action of the Grand Lodge of the State of Rhode Island, having considered the same, respectfully report: That the only question involved in this appeal is a construction of Art. 3, Sec. 2, of the Constitution or the Grand Lodge from which the appeal is taken in connection with Art. 3, Sec. 1, of the Bv-Laws of Crescent Lodge, No. 24, of said jurisdiction, to which appeals the belonged.

Appellant was an initiatory member of said Lodge, without degrees, and claimed sick benefits. Art. 3, Sec. 2, of the Constitution above cited, provides that "Every member." shall be entitled to receive such weekly benefits from the funds of the Lodge as may be fixed by the By-Laws," And the By-Laws provided that "every brother." rendered incapable by sickness, shall be entitled to receive from the hands of the Lodge.

• If he has taken the first degree, one dollar; second degree, two dollars, &c., making no provision whatever for members who had taken no degrees. Appellant had taken no degrees, but dalimed benefits, which his Lodge refused, and from this refusal he brings his appeal on the ground that the Constitution, as quoted, declares that "every member shall receive benefits," and that, therefore, something is due him under the law.

Your Committee respectfully submit, that the constitutional provision under which the applicant makes his claim, is by its very terms limited to such benefits as the By-Laws of Crescent, or any other Lodge working under its jurisdiction, may provide for its members, and none other, and recommerd the adoption of the following:

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Resolved,—That the action of the Grand Lodge of Rhode Island, in the matter of the appeal of Brother Edwin Rounds, be sustained, and that said appeal be dismissed.

Resolved,—That this Grand Lodge recognize the principle heretofore established by the cases named in Section 130 of White's Digest to be the law of the Order with reference to persons irregularly admitted to memberahlp, whether the same be by initiation or by card; and that the decision in the case of the appeal of John Zimmerman, in the matter of the admission of W. D. Kennedy to Toronto Lodge, Ontario, reported on pages 6284, 6285 and 6325 of the Journal of Proceedings of the G. L. U. S., be understood to be a decision appertaining only to the circumstances of that particular case.

In the matter of the appeal of St. Lawrence Lodge, No. 2, Province of Quebec, from the decision of Bro. G. Varey, D. D. Grand Sire of said Province, that a Subordinate Lodge cannot fine the Junior Past Grand, as an officer, for absence from his proper station in the Lodge at the time of opening, your Committee reports as follows:

Appellant being a Lodge under the immediate supervision of the Grand Lodge of the United States, appealed to the Grand Sire, and by him the appeal was referred to this body.

One of the By-laws of appellant is as follows:

"Any officer of this Lodge failing to discharge his duties shall be fined as follows, unless excused by a vote of the Lodge: For absence from his proper station in the Lodge, at the time of opening, without reasonable cause, whether at a regular, special or degree meeting, if an elective officer, or the Junior Past Grand, 50 cents."

The Grand Lodge of the United States approved this By-Law. After its adoption and approval, the Junior Past Gaand of appellant remained away from a meeting, and at a subsequent meeting was fined under the above By-Law for such absence. He appealed from this action to the D. D. Grand Sire of his jurisdiction, and his appeal was sustained on the ground that the Junior Past Grand is not an officer, and that therefore he could not be fined as an officer for absence from meetings of his Lodge.

Appellant asks to have this decision reversed, because:

- The fine was imposed by anthority of a By-Law approved by the Grand Lodge of the United States.
- The law makes it the duty of the Junior Past Grand to occupy the seat of Past Grand for one term, and the fine was imposed to enforce that duty.
- 3. There is no law of the Grand Lodge of the United States which forbids the imposition of fines for non-attendance of members of Subordinate Lodges.

The penalty to be inflicted on an officer of a Subordinate, gullty of neglect of official duty, depends upon the legislation of the Grand Lodge of the jurisdiction, and, in the absence of such legislation, on the Constitution or By-Laws of the Subordinate Lodge. The Grand Lodge of a jurisdiction may therefore, provide for the imposition of fines upon the officers of its Subordinates (excepting the Chapiain), for neglect of duty in remaining absent from the meetings of the Lodge, without reasonable cause for such absence; and a Subordinate may, its Grand Body not having legislated as above indicated, provide by constitutional provision or By-Law for the imposition of fines upon officers for absence from meetings without reasonable cause, and for otherwise neglecting duty. Consequently, if the Junior Past Grand is an officer, he may be fined for non-attendance.

The officers of a Subordinate Ledge are: Noble Grand, Vice Grand, Secretary, Permanent Secretary, (when necessary), Treasurer, Chaplain, (when elected or appointed), Warden, Conductor, O. G., I. G., R. and I. S. of N. G. R. S. S., L. S. S., R. and L. S. of the V. G.

All of these officers, or either of them (excepting the Chaplain), may be fined in the manner above indicated, for absence from a meeting of a Lodge. With respect to the Chaplain, it has been decided that it is not wise to require the performance of his duties by the infliction of penalties. The Junior Past Grand is not an officer, and cannot be elected or appointed to an office in his Lodge during the time he occupies the Past Grand's chair, He, therefore, cannot be fined as an officer for absence from the Lodge, or for otherwise neglecting his duty. He obtains the chair of the Past Grand neither by election nor appointment, but by service during a term in an office-that of Noble Grand. Upon him are imposed certain duties-the occupancy of the chair of the Past Grand during the term immediately succeeding his term of Noble Grand, and the delivery, during that term, of the Past Grand's charge at initiations. For neglecting to perform these duties, he may be fined, as a member of a Committee, or of the Board of Trustees, may be fined for neglect of duty; and under a law that members absent from meetings shall be fined, he would be, in common with his fellow-members, liable to the infliction of the penalty for absenteelsm; but he cannot be fined as an officer for absence from meetings of his Lodge.

In this case, appellant fined its Junior Past Grand as an officer. By its action, appellant said in effect: "The Junior Past Grand being an officer of this Lodge, is hereby fined for absence from his proper station in the Lodge at the time of opening." Appellant had no legal right to say this. It is true the By-Law in question has been approved by this Grand Body, and to it a forced construction might be given that would make it consistent with the law declaring the Junior Past Grand to be not an officer of a Subordinate Lodge; but your Committee, believing that the law should be made plain, prefers to say that the approval given to the By-Law was improper, and that so much of it as relate to the Junior Past Grand is null and void.

In view of the above considerations, your Committee is of opinion that the appeal should be dismissed, and it recommends the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved,—That the appeal of St. Lawrence Lodge, No. 2, of the Province of Quebec, from the decision of the D. D. Grand Sire of said Province, in the case of Bro. Frank G. Varey, vs. St. Lawrence Lodge, No. 2, of the Province of Quebec, be and the same is hereby dismission.

In the matter of the appeal of William Garrett, from a decision made by the Grand Lodge of Iowa, approving the answer made by the Grand Master of said State to the following question:

Question.—A member takes a visiting card for six months, paying up h is dues for that time; before the expiration of the eard the yearly dues are increased. Must the member holding the card pay the increased dues, or does the possession of the card relieve him?

To this the Grand Master answered that "The brother is not liable for the increased dues until after the expiration of the card."

The appeal should be sustained. When persons join Lodges of Odd Fellows, they agree not only to obey the laws of the Order existing at the time but all laws that may be afterwards enacted. And when a by-law is amended, increasing the amount to be paid for dues, it affects every member of the Lodge. A brother has no exemption from his obligations to the laws by reason of having received a visiting card. A pre-requisite to receiving such card is the payment in advance of such dues as the laws in force at the time of granting the card requires. By doing this he is allowed the card, but it gives him, no other special privileges. It certainly was not intended to exempt the holder from the same obligations imposed on other members of the Lodge, created by the amendment of its laws.

Your Committee therefore recommend that the appeal be sustained.

The Committee on Appeals, No. 2; to whom was referred the appeal of E. G. Budd et als, against the action of the Grand Lodge of Tennessee, would respectfully report the following facts:

The Grand Master decided that if a member of a Lodge dies who is not an Encampment member, the Encampment members should not appear in their regails.

The Committee on Judiciary while admitting the correctness of the decision, decide that it is a subject belonging to the Encampment branch of the Order. Their decision is confirmed by the Grand Lodge, and from this action an appeal is taken, not on the ground that it does not belong to the Encampment branch, but that the decision of the Grand Master was wrong, inasmuch as claimed by the appellant, it is the established custom of the Order for a brother to wear the regalla of the highest rank to which he may have attained.

Your Committee are of the opinion that the right of a member to wear the regalia of the highest rank which he may have attained, does not apply to the case under consideration. At the funeral of a Lodge member who has not attained the Patriarchal Degree, each member is entitled to wear the regalia of the highest rank he has attained in the Lodge. The regular regalia, as prescribed for the Encampment branch, other than the usual roseite, has not been authorized by this Grand Lodge to be used on such eccasions.

Your Committee therefore recommend that the appeal be dismissed, and the decision of the Grand Master be sustained.

The Committee on Appeals, No. 2, to whom was referred the appeal of G. W. L. Crook et at, from the action of the Grand Lodge of Tennessee, would report that the grounds covered in this appeal are simply these:

The Grand Lodge of the United States has emacted that in certain cases a Subordinate Lodge is required to grant a dismissal certificate on application therefor. The Grand Master decided that in other cases the certificate might be applied for and this Lodge could exercise its discretion in granting or refusing it. This decision, on recommendation of the Judiciary Committee, was reversed by the Grand Lodge, and the appeal is from their action.

Your Committee are of the opinion that the law in relation to the granting of dismissal certificates was intended to cover all allowable cases, and thereis ne authority for a Subordinate Lodge to grant dismissal certificates except as provided by said law.

Your Committee therefore recommend that the appeal be dismissed.

The Committee on Appeals, No. 2, to whom was referred the appeal of Daniel Schloss from the action of the Grand Lodge of Tennessee, respectfully report that this is a case where a resolution to pay benefits was decided by the Noble Grand to be out of order, which decision was overruled by the Lodge and an appeal taken from this action. Upon this appeal to question was raised: (an the Noble Grand draw a draft for the money notwithstanding the appeal? The Grand Master decided that he could not, and the Grand Lodge, against the recommendation of the Judiciary Committee, confirmed his decision. The case comes before this Grand Lodge on an appeal from the action of the Grand Lodge. Your Committee find that, according to the decision of this Grand Lodge. (Rev. Journal 1878, pp. 5803, 5804, 5845, 5853), where State Grand Bodies have made no provision for a stay of proceedings in case of an appeal, the action of the Lodge must be carried out.

From the paper submitted to your Committee, it does not appear that the Grand Lodge of Tennessee has made any provision for such stay on an appeal, but, on the contrary, has enacted that, "During the pendency on an appeal to the Grand Lodge, the appellant occupies the position that the decision of the Subordinate Lodge places him to until the decision of the Grand Lodge is had thereon."

In view of these facts, your Committee recommend that the appeal be sustained.

The Committee on Appeals, No. 1, have considered the appeal of Geo. A. Calahan, P. G. R., from the R. W. Grand Lodge of Maine.

This appeal is taken for the purpose of determining whether or not the proclamation of the M. W. Grand Sire is sufficient authority for Subordinate Lodges to appear in public, in regalls, upon the antiversary of the Order.

Subordinate Lodges are prohibited from appearing in public in regalia (except funerals), unless permission be obtained from their Grand Lodge or Grand Master.

Tour Committee recommend that the appeal be dismissed; they also recommended that all Grand Ledges do authorize their Subordinate Ledges to observe the anniversary of the Order—26th day of April—by public procession in regalia, or in any other appropriate manner.

In the matter of the appeal of P. G. Rep. John Medole from the action of the Grand Lodge of New York, in conferring the Grand Lodge Degree at other time and place than at the hall where its senious are held, your Committee would report that, in its opinion, the action of the Grand Lodge of New York is in conflict with the lews of the Grand Lodge of the United States. It therefore recommends the adoption of the following:

Received,—That the appeal of P. G. Rep. John Medole against the action of the Grand Lodge of New York be and the same is hereby sustained.

The Committee on Appeals, No. 2, to whom was referred the appeal of John F. C. Hollings from the action of the B. W. Grand Lodge of Michigan in the case of Haich vs. Michigan Lodge, No. 1, have considered the same and submit the following report:

The principle points in the case, briefly stated, are as follows: On the 5th day of June, 1876; Bro. Josiah H. Hatch, a member of Michigan Lodge, No. 1, was, after due trial, expelled from said Lodge. Bro. F. Kunsie, Past Grand of said Lodge, appealed from the action of the Lodge to the R. W. Grand Lodge of Michigan, charging certain informalities in the conduct of the trial.

At the session of the Grand Lodge of Michigan, February, 1877, the appeal of Bro. Kunsie was referred to a Special Committee, who reported that they had examined the papers, and evidence and arguments presented by both parties, and found the proceedings in the case were regular and in accordance with the law, and recommender that the appeal be dismissed. The report of the Committee was not adopted. A resolution was then adopted reversing the action of Michigan Lodge, and reinstating Josiah H. Hatch in said Lodge.

The General Laws of Michigan, Article II. Section III. Clause 6, provide that any brother feeling aggrieved by the decision of the Lodge against him, is entitled to an appeal to the Grand Lodge for a new trial, if informality or want of fairness be shown on the former trial, and, on the command of the Grand Lodge, the brother may be tried anew for the same offence.

In the light of this express provision of the General Laws of Michigan, your Committee cannot see in the record before them anything in this particular case, which authorized the said Grand Lodge to go beyond the letter and spirit of the law, and reinstate the brother, when only authorized to remand his case for a 'new trial."

Hence, in view of the foregoing, we are of the opinion, without going into the other questions raised in the appeal, that it is not only contrary to the established law, but impolitic for a Grand Lodge to encrosch upon the express and exclusive power delegated to, and vested in a Subordinate, by its Constitution, as to the imposition of sentence for an offence, and your Committee recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved,—That the appeal of John F. C. Hollings, E. G., from the action of the R. W. Grand Lodge of Michigan, in the case of Hatch vs. Michigan Lodge, No. 1, be sustified. That the action of said Grand Lodge in reinstating Bro. John H. Hatch be reversed.

### JUDICIARY COMMITTEE.

The Judiciary Cormittee, to whom was referred the resolution of Rep. McLean, of the District of Columbia, submitting for the decision of this Grand Lodge, "whether the establishment and maintenance of libraries for the use of the Order can be included in the "lightimate purposes of the Order," so far as to authorize State Grand Lodges to require of the members of their Subordinates the payment of affixed annual aum, in the shape of dues, for the establishment or support of Odd Fellows" libraries," have had the same under consideration, and beg leave to report that they have been unable to find any law of the Order that expressly, or by construction, gives the power to State Grand Lodges to require of the members of their Suberdinates the payment of any sum, in the shape of dues or otherwise, for the establishment or support of Odd Fellows' libraries. They therefore report that a State Grand Jurisdiction has not the tower to impose such a fax.

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WHEREAS, a custom has obtained in many Lodges to extend the time for which a visiting card was granted by a simple endorsement on the back thereof, and whereas it is desirable that this matter should be settled by positive enactment, therefore,

Resolved,—That it is illegal for any Lodge to extend the time for which a visiting card was granted by endorsement on the back thereof, but that in all cases of renewals or extension a new card must be issued.

### COMMITTEE ON LEGISLATION.

Your Committee on Legislation, to whom was referred the preamble and resolutions of the Grand Lodge of Ontario, asking for such legislation as shall enable Grand Lodges and Grand Encampments to permit Subordinates to make By-Laws requiring payment of dues in advance, respectfully report that while dues accrue weekly, the time and manner of paying them are subjects of, and should be left to local legislation.

This Grand Lodge has decided that "the subject of dues is one peculiarly for the legislation of State Grand Bodies, and any interference therewith by this Grand Body is objectionable."

Believing that the entire subject of the time and manner of the payment of dues should be left to the control of local Grand Bedies, so that a member is not deprived of his right to pay at any time, your Committee would submit the following:

Resolved,—That it is competent for a Grand Lodge or Grand Encampment to permit its Subordinates to make By Laws requiring payment of dues in advance, provided such requirement shall not work a forfeiture of any rights now guaranteed to members by the laws of this Grand Body.

The following in regard to payment of dues, fines, suspending or dropping is important:

Resolved,—That a member of a Subordinate Lodge or Encampment, who is in arrears for weekly or funeral dues more than thirteen weeks, is not entitled to the term password or to vote in the Lodge or Encampment, but is a contributing member until suspended, dropped or expelled in accordance with the requirements of the Constitution, and as such is entitled to visit his own Lodge or Encampment. He cannot, however, become entitled to benefits until he shall have paid up in full all dues and fince (weekly and funeral) that have accrued against him up to the date of payment, if the By-Laws of the Lodge or Encampment shall so provide: nor then until the expiration of such time thereafter as may also by the laws be provided as a penalty.

Resolved,—That a Lodge or Encampment cannot refuse to receive in full or in part the dues of a member prior to his suspension, and no member can be suspended or dropped from membership in the Order for non-payment of dues unless at the time of his suspension he shall be indebted to the Lodge or Encampment for one year's dues.

Resolved,—That when any member of a Lodge or Encampment shall neglect or refuse to pay the dues fixed by the laws, for the space of one year, the Secretary or Seribe shall report the same to the Noble Grand or Chief Patriarch, and, unless the Lodge or Encampment otherwise direct, such member shall thereupon be suspended, he having first been notified of member shall thereupon be suspended, he having first been notified of member action that would be taken, a record of which shall be made upon the minutes. The mere fact of a member being ever twolve months in arrears does not constitute him a suspended or dropped member. To reader him stop, the floody or Encampment must formally declare him to be assegued.

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Resolved,—That all previous legislation inconsistent with the foregoing resolutions, be, and is hereby repeated.

Resolved,—That the foregoing resolutions shall take effect from and after the first day of January, 1878.

### COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTIONS.

The Committee on Constitutions have examined the amended Constitutution and By-Laws of the R. W. Grand Lodge of Ostario, I. O. O. F., and submit the following:

Resolved,—That the amended Constitution and By-Laws of the R. W. Grand Lodge of Ontario, I. O. O. F., be approved.

The Select Committee, to whom was referred the resolution of Rep. Perry (page 28 Journal) relative to the probable cost of altering seal, stereotyped plates, legislation, dc., in the event of a "change of name" of this R. W. Grand Lodge, beg to report:

lst.—Your Committee, on consulting with one of the leading firms of engravers in the city of Baltimore, find, that to "change the name," in the official seal of this Grand Body will cost not to exceed \$20; to change the mame on the seal used on cards, diplomas, &c., will not cost over \$5, and to make a like change on the seal used for letter headings will cost about \$2—making total outside cost for the whole, \$37.

2d.—That on consulting with an experienced electrotyper, your Committee find, that to prepare a new title page to Digest and make all the necessary changes on some 55 pages of said Digest will cost, not to exceed, \$21.

3d.—Your Committee find the following books printed and sold by this Grand Lodgs, vis.: Grand Lodgs Book, Grand Encampment Book, Encampment Lodge Books, Lodge Institution Books, Lodge Public Installation Books, Lodge Charge Books, Degree Charge Books, Degree Lodge Installation Books, Rebeakah Degree Books, Rebeakah Degree Installation Books, Funeral Service and Anniversal Service.

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From a general examination of the foregoing, your Committee estimate the cost of making all the necessary changes in the electrotype plates in this section will not cost to exceed \$40.

4th.—In all the cards and certificates issued by this Grand Lodge no change will be required except in the seal, the cost of which is provided for in the first paragraph of this report.

5th.—For diplomas a new design is in preparation; therefore, no extra cost for this item.

6th.—The future editions of the present bound Jeurnals would be issued the same as heretofore, except merely changing the lettering on the binding, and which would cause no additional expense.

7th.—The Supplemental Digest, from 1871 to 1874, was not electrotyped, and therefore no expense will be incurred on account of change of name in the next edition.

8th.—Your Committee are informed that the necessary legislation required to confirm the change of name in the act of incorporation will not involve the expendiure of money on the part of this Grand Lodge.

9th.—Your Committee therefore flud the total estimated cost of "change of name," as regards seals, digests, books, cards, certificates, Journals and legislation will not exceed the following sums:

10th—Your Committee find that the paper on which Lodge and Encampment cards are printed is water lined by a process known as a "Dandy Roll." Should it be determined to change the letters G. L. U. S. in the four corners of the cards, to do so will not cost over \$12 to \$20.

11th.—Your Committee feel that this report would be imperfect were no record made of the supplies of the foregoing articles and cards now on hand, and for detail statement of which refer to page 88 of Grand Secretary's Report of the present Bession. The total cost value of said supplies on hand amounts to \$5,804.06. Of this sum \$3,919.50 is made up of Digest and Supplemental Digest, and which will be just as available and valuable as books of law and reference under the new name as the old, leaving only \$1,884.56 of general supplies. As the change of name does not in anywise affect the substance of the matter contained in the remainder of the supplies, in the opinion of some of your Committee it will not materially lessen their value.

The proposed amendment to the Constitution to change the name of the G.L.U.S. to the "Supreme Lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows" was not adopted. The vote was seventy-four in favor of the change and

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sixty one against. To amend the constitution requires a three-fourths vote; and so, after a well conducted contest the very desirable change was again rejected.

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### COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN RELATIONS.

Your Committee on Foreign Relations, in view of the fact that complications at present existing in the jurisdiction of Australia, as reported by the M. W. Grand Sire and R. W. Corresponding and Recording Secretary, seem to demand and can reasonably be expected to be satisfactorily adjusted only by the personal presence and interference of some responsible agent of this Body, and believing that no one can be by virtue of his office and distinguished ability so ca able of arranging matters for the general honor and good of the Order, and especially for the prosperity of the acknowledged Grand Lodge of Australia and the Jurisdiction thereto belonging, than our M. W. Grand Sire, we think it important and expedient that he should visit that portion of the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of the United States, with full power and authority to act in the premises, and we offer the anaexed Resolution:

Resolved, That the M. W. Grand Sire, John W. Stokes, be empowered and requested to proceed to Australia and New Zealand, and in the exercise of authority in him vested as the head of the Order, to effect an adjustment of the present complications there existing, and perform such other offices for the welfare of the Order there as in his judgment he may deem expedient.

And that one thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be appropriated to defray his expenses.

Provided, That in the event of the inability or refusal of the Grand Sire to perform said duty, the Deputy Grand Sire, John B. Harmon, be authorized and empowered to act in his stead.

## COMMITTEE ON DEGREE OF REBEKAH.

Resolved, That hereafter the only qualification for office in a Rebekah Degree Lodge shall be, lst. Such member shall be an actual contributing member in good standing in such Lodge: 2d. No member shall be eligible to the office of the Noble Grand unless previous service is shown in the office of Vice Grand in a Rebekah Degree or Subordinate Lodge.

Resolved, That the term P. W. of the Subordinate Lodge shall not be applicable to or used in a Rebekah Degree Lodge, and the pass words of the Rebekah Degree shall alone be used by both sexes therein from and after the first day of January next.

Resolved, That all former legislation, in conflict with the foregoing resolutions, is here by repealed.

#### SPECIAL COMMITTEES.

Your Committee to whom was referred the resolution of Rep. Betton, of Kansas, to wit:

Resolved,—That this Grand Body recognizes the right of the several Grand Lodges to create a widows' and orphans' endowment in the form of a tax upon their Subordinate Lodges, to be collected and paid upon the death of each member in good standing."

After thorough consideration of the subject, have the honor to report that Subordinate Grand Jurisdictions possess the right to establish widows' and orphans' endowments of any nature whatever, provided they are founded upon a basis of voluntary contributions; but it is against the organic law of the Order to make forced assessments for the above purpose, which we do not deem expedient to change, and consequently must report adverse to the resolution quoted above, but would recommend the formation of widows' and orphans' endowments by those members of the Order who may form, in the several jurisdictions, an auxiliary association for such a purpose.

The committee appointed at the last annual session to report a uniform street dress, which may be worn by Subordinate Lodges when in public procession, offer the following and move its ad pution;

- The style of hat or cap and dress shall be left to the jurisdiction of the individual Subordinate Lodges, provided that in each case strict uniformity shall be enjoined and observed.
  - 2. Plain white gloves only shall be worn.
- 8. A jewel collar two and one-half inches wide (no more nor less) at the widest part, untiting in a point in front, in accordance with pattern herewith presented, made of very light blue silk, Italian cloth or other material (excepting velvet, which shall not be used,) of the shade known as silver blue, edged with silver lace or braid, one-fourth of an inch wide, and without embroidery or other ornamentation of say kind whatever.
- 4. A medal, to be suspended from the collar, of white metal, one and three-fourths inches in diameter, having on the obverse side, in raised work, the All-seeing Eye, encircled by rays of light; and on the reverse, also in raised word, the three links of the Order, surrounded by the legend, "PRIFNDSHIP, LOVE AND TRUTH."

Officers and past officers may wear, instead thereof, or in addition thereto such jewel or jewels of the Order as they may be entitled to wear elsewhere, in conformity with the existing regulations.

The Special Committee appointed in conformity with the resolutions of Rep. Given, of the District of Columbia, page 7005 of the Journal, session 1876, of this R. W. Grand Body, would respectfully report that they have In

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carefully considered the subject referred to them, and believing it to be highly necessary, and indeed very essential to produce uniformity, and also a to correct the singular anomaly and evident inconsistency at present existing and operated by our "Book of For.ns" for processions, and relating to recognition of title and assignment of position according to rank, etc., beg leave to submit herewith an amended form for processions, etc., and would ask for the same, together with the following resolutions, the favorable consideration of this R. W. Grand Body:

Resolved,—That the Grand Corresponding and Recording Secretary be and he is hereby requested to compile and publish (ander the supervision of the Committee on Supplies) in one volume, ismo, with proper title, the Amended Ferms for Public and Funeral Processions, Dedicating Halls, and Laying Corner Stones, and the Funeral Services, as hereby approved and adopted, together with such other forms or parts of forms not inconsistent therewith, as may have been prescribed by this R. W. Grand Lodge, and in such number and style as in the judgment of the R. W. Grand Secretary may be deemed requisite and expedient, and he is her eby authorized to draw on the Grand Treasurer for the sum necessary to defray the cost of the same.

Resolved,—That the volume shall be disposed of by the Grand Corresponding and Recording Secretary at the rate of 75 cents per copy to Jurisdictions and \$1 per copy to Encampments and Lodges, in the usual form, after previous notice by the Grand Secretary of his readiness to furnish them.

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Elect entit 2d. ory o butto Provided,—That when the owner or manager of any building has invited a Grand Master or Past Grand Master to lay the corner stone of such building, said Grand Master or Past Grand Master, and the branch of the Order which he represents, shall have precedence.

If a Grand Encampment does not participate, and a Grand Lodge does, the Grand Master or a Past Grand Master shall perform the coremony.

If a Subordinate Encampment participates, with or without a Subordinate Lodge, the Chief Patriarch or a Past Chief Patriarch shall perform the eeremony.

If a Subordinate Lodge, accompanied by members of the Patriarchal branch, as in forms 1 and 2, the Noble Grand, or a Past Noble Grand shall officiate.

Should the ceremony be performed by the Grand Sire, or his Deputy, the title of that officer should be substituted for Grand Patriarch, or Grand Master, as the case may be.

An officer duly commissioned, and officiating for a Grand Patriarch, or a Grand Master, or as Chief Patriarch, or Noble Grand, shall be addressed by the title of the officer he represents.

The above regulations apply to the dedication of Odd Fellows' Halls or Lodge Rooms.

## 1 AYING THE CORNER-STONES OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS.

The present form, &c., shall be observed so far as relates to the duties of the officers of the Lodge, but when the Patriarchal, or Grand Bodies participate, the form as prescribed, shall be adhered to.

#### FORM 8.

Funerat processions shall form in the manner prescribed, (forms 1, 2, 3, 4, 5,) as the case may be, and precedence shall be observed as set forth in each case.

### REGALIA.

That the Regalia to be worn by all brothers of the Order, when attending the funeral of a deceased brother, be as follows:

- let. A black crape rosette, having a centre of the color of the highest degree to which the bearer may have attained, to be worn on the left breast; above it a sprig of evergreen, and below it (if the wearer be an Elective or Past Officer), the jewel or jewels which, as such, he may be entitled to wear.
- 2d. That the ordinary mourning badge to be worn by brothers in memory of a deceased brother, be a strip of black crape passed through one button-hole only of the left lapel of the coat, and tied with a narrow

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ribbon of the color of the highest degree to which the bearer may have attained.

(Nors.—The several State Grand Lodges and Grand Encampments may, at their discretion, permit the usual regalia of the Order to be worn at funerals either in connection with or as a substitute for the simple regalia above described.)

On such occasions, the Marshall shall wear a black scarf, and bear a baton bound with black crape.

The Outside Guardian shall bear a red wand bound with black craps.

The Scene Supporters shall bear white wands, bound with black crape.

The Inside Guardian shall bear the regalia and insignia, indicating the rank in the Order of the deceased brother,

The Supporters of the Vice Grand shall bear their wands of office, bound with black crape.

The Chaplain shall wear a white scarf.

The Warden shall bear the axe, bound with black crape.

The Conductor shall bear his wand of office, bound with black crape, and the Supporters of the Noble Grand shall each bear their wands of office, bound with black crape.

If laying a corner-stone, and the ceremony is conducted by a Grand Encampment or Subordinate Encampment, the Grand Scribe or Scribe, as the case may be, shall carry the documents, &c., for deposit in the box, and the Grand Treasurer or Treasurer, as the case may be, shall carry the box to be deposited in the corner stone.

The Grand High Priest or High Priest, as the case may be, shall carry the open Bible, on which is laid a wreath of flowers, and the Grand Senior Warden or Senior Warden, as the case may be, shall carry a silver vessel containing water, and the Grand Junior Warden or Junior Warden, as the case may be, shall carry a silver vessel containing wheat. The Grand Patilarch or Chief Patriarch, as the case may be, shall bear a crook.

If the ceremony is conducted by a Grand Lodge or a Subordinate Lodge the Grand Secretary or the Secretary, as the case may be, shall carry the documents, &c., for deposit in the box. The Grand Treasurer or Treasurer, as the case may be, shall carry the box to be deposited in the corner-stone.

The Grand Chaplain or Chaplain, as the case may be, shall carry the open Bible, on which is laid a wreath of flowers. The Grand Warden or Warden as the case may be, shall carry a silver ressel containing water, and the Grand Conductor or Conductor, as the case may be, shall carry a silver ressel containing wheat. The Grand Master or Noble Grand, as the case may be, shall bear a gavel.

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Invited brethren will take places with the members of the Lodge, according to their rank. The Lodges, when more than one attend, shall be arranged in order of juniority, preceding the Lodge conducting the ceremonies.

On arriving at the place appointed for the starting of the funeral, the brothers shall take position in the above order, immediately before the corpse, and shall precede it to the place of interment.

On arriving at such place of interment, the brothers shall open right and left, and allow the corpse, mourners, &c., to pass through, the brothers on either side standing uncovered, the hat held in the left hand of each, and Joining hands with each other. And after the passing of the corpse, mourners, &c., between the two lines, the brothers shall resform in procession after them in reversed order, and close the procession into and within the place of interment. After the performance of such religious service as the friends of the deceased may cause to be there performed, and before the Anal closing of the grave, the brothers shall form silently, and as nearly as may be according to the order above set forth, uncovered, the hat in the left hand of each, and joining hands with each other in one or more circles, as regular as the nature of the ground may admit, around the grave, when the Chaplain, or in default of a Chaplain. the Noble Grand may eddress the brothers and offer up a prayer, or may address the brethren without the offering of a prayer; and after such address or prayer, or both, or if there be no address or prayer, then, after a pause sultable to the solemnity of the occasion, the Noble Grand shall advance singly to the head of the grave, and cast into it with the right hand, the sprig of evergreen from his regalite, and shall return to his place; whereupon, the brothers, from left to right, in regular succession, and in such numbers at a time as hot to cause confusion, shall advance to the grave, shall cast into it (each with the right hand,) the sprig of evergreen from their regalia, and shall return to their

And after all have done this, the brothers shall silently re-form into procession according to the order observed in coming to the place of interment, and shall return in such order to the Lodge room, where the N. G., or other proper officer, shall declare the funeral ceremonies to be closed.

That, if at the time of his death, the deceased brother was a member of an Encampment, the Encampment may attend the funeral in a body, in order similar to that prescribed for Lodges, and shall take the position is line designated; but in all cases the funeral services shall be conducted by the Subordinate Lodge, except that if the brother was a past or present Elective Officer of a Grand Lodge or Encampment, then the coremonies may be conducted by such Grand Lodge or Grand Encampment.

### PUNERAL SERVICE.

Youth, in its harmlessness and comparative innocency, and manhood, with its wonted vigor and pride of strength, are not more exempt, than decreptd and tottering age from the fixed law of being, which dedicated all that is mortal to decay and death. This truth is inscribed in the great volume of nature upon its every page.

The beautiful and the sublime which the handlwork of the Creator displays on our every side, are fearfully associated with the unerring certainty of the end of all things, amid the vividness of the moral which they are ever suggesting to the contemplative mind. Day after day we are called upon to follow our fellow-creatures to that bourne from whence no traveller returns, but from the house of mourning we go forth again to mingle in the crowded world, heedless perhaps of the precarious tenure of life and the certainty of that end to which all flesh is rapidly tending. He who gives the vigor of body, without warning paralyzes the stout heart and strikes down the athletic frame. The living of to-day become the dead of the morrow. Hen appear upon and disappear from the stage of life as wave meets wave and parts upon the troubled waters. "In the midst of life we are in death." He whose lips now echo these tones of solemn warning, in turn will be stilled in the cold and cheerless house of the dead, and in the Previdence of God none may escape. Let us then so far improve the lesson as te be prepared for that change which leads to life eternal.

#### PRAYER.

Give, O God, we beseech Thee, Thy Holy Spirit to us, whom Thou hast spared; increase our knowledge, and confirm our faith in Thee forever.

[Bless and comfort, we pray Thee, those whom it has pleased Thee to add to the number of the disconsolate; buoy them up under this heavy stroke, sustain them against despondency. us in

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O, will Thou be their Father and their God, and pour down from on high Thy blessings upon their heads ] Bless, O Heavenly Father, the brethren here assembled; imbue them with the Wisdom af Thy laws, and draw them unto T.ee by the cords of Thy inestimable love; impress them with their duty to each other as brethren, and their obligations in the various relations of human life; and finally, bless our beloved Order throughout the globe. Preserve its principles and its purposes from innovations; sustain it from the shafts of enmity—protect it from self immonation, and shield it from all evil, and unto Thee we shall render the praise forever. Amen.

### RESOLUTIONS.

Whereas, The primary object, without which no Lodge of Odd-Fellows can exist, is, mutual aid and frateraity. That a system of dues and a treasury for the security of the former are the necessary adjuncts of our system; that all other pecuniary benefits are simply incidents which naturally flow from the duty of mutual aid; that therefore, the whole of the assets and property of Lodges are trust funds, equally to be protected, and of equal sacredness: therefore.

Resolved,—That when, from any cause, any separate fund of a Subordinate Lodge shall be found unnecessary, it shall be lawful to otherwise appropriate such fund or to mergett, in whole or ir part, in the general funds; provided that the object contemplated by such special fund, be otherwise fully protected, and secured. And provided, further, that provision be fully made to return any donor who may insist upon its being donated to the object for which it was donated; provided, further, that no such appropriation shall be made unless the same shall first be authorized by the Grand Lodge to which such Subordinate may be attached.

Resolaed,—That it is the opinion of this Grand Lodge that a donation of the bound Revised Journals, Digests, and Book of Forms to Grand Representatives who have not received them, as provided for by a standing resolution of this body, is impolitic and expensive, and should not be continued, and that the said resolution is hereby repealed.

### NOTICE OF MOTION.

The following has been submitted for action at the next session:

Amend Article I by striking out section I and insert as follows:

"Section I. This Lodge shall be known by the name, style and title of the Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Odd-Fellows."

Amend Section 4, of Article XVI by striking out all after the words "Grand Lodge" in the seventh line of said section, and insert as follows: "That the necessities of a State, District or Territorial Grand Jurisdiction require it, a resolution may be passed by a vote of three-fourths of the re-

price ntatives present at any meeting, granting to the particular State, District or Territorial Grand Jurisdiction applying therefor the right to readmit is membership within its Jurisdiction, upon such conditions as this Grand Logge may prescribe, suspended members of the Order residing in the same, vio may have been suspended for non-payment of dues, and who have not been under suspension for less than three years; and also the right to admit the members of defunct Lodges not able to get a card, it being distinctly it derstood that so soon as the necessity requiring it shall have passed away (his privilege shall be yielded up by the Jurisdiction receiving it."

Amend Article XVII by striking out all after the words "Grand Lodge."







# CONSTITUTION, ETC., AS AMENDED.

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# CONSTITUTION, RULES OF ORDER, &C.

OF THE

# A. W. Grand Lodge of Ontario k. O. A. F.

TOGETHER WITH A CONSTITUTION FOR SUBORDINATE, DEGREE, AND REPEKAH LODGES,

As adopted at the Session of 1877, at Belleville.

#### PREAMBLE.

Whereas, it has been found expedient and of the utmost importance to the well being of all organized Institutions, to govern the same by sound and uniform laws and regulations:

Therefore, the Grand Lodge of Ontario, of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, with the view of ensuring co-operation and uniformity of action, of providing for the best interests of the Order, and of securing more effectually the permanence of the blessings to be derived from the right exercise of those ennobling and Heavenborn principles of Friendship, Love and Truth, on which it is founded, doth ordain, declare, and establish the following articles as the Constitution for the Government thereof:

#### TITLE.

1.—This Grand Lodge shall be known and hailed by the name, style and title of "The Right Worthy Grand Lodge of Ontario, of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows."

#### POWERS.

- 2.— This Grand Lodge shall have jurisdiction in Odd Fellowship, within that section of the Dominion of Canada called and known as Outario, being the Superior Tribunal of all Subordinate Lodges within its jurisdiction.
- 3.- No Lodge can be formed, or continue to exist, within its jurisdiction, without the express sanction of this Grand Lodge.
- 4.—It possesses within its jurisdiction the right and power of granting, suspending or annulling Charters for proper cause; of receiving, hearing and determining appeals from the decisions of Subordinate Lodges, and of redressing all grievances arising therein; of regulating the means of its own support; and of performing all such other acts and things as shall have for their object the promotion of the true and best interests of the Order, or shall appertain to it by ancient usage or custom, and are not in violation of the laws of the land or the regulations of the Order.

#### MEMBERSHIP.

- 5.—This Grand Lodge shall be composed of all duly qualified Past Grands within its jurisdiction, who shall be entitled to all the privileges pertaining to their rank, as prescribed by the Usages and Laws of the Grand Lodge of the United States: but its legislative functions shall be vested in and exercised solely by such Representatives as shall be elected and appointed in the manner prescribed by this Constitution.
- 6.—Any Past Grand, on presenting a Certificate of his official services, and after satisfactory examination in the Degrees pertaining thereto, shall be entitled to receive the Grand Lodge Degree.

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7.—No Past Grand shall be admitted as a Representative in this Grand Lodge unless duly certified as having been elected thereto; nor until he has been instructed in the Grand Lodge Degree, and has signed a promise faithfully to support, maintain and abide by the Constitution and By-Laws of this Grand Lodge.

 Every Past Grand Master, in good standing in a Subordinate Lodge under this jurisdiction, and all officers in this Grand Lodge, shall have the right of debating and making motions.

#### ELECTION OF REPRESENTATIVES.

9.—Every Lodge within the Jurisdiction shall, at its last meeting in the month of June, annually, elect by ballot from amongst its Past Grands in good standing, a Representative or Representatives as follows, that is to say: One Representative where the number of members to be returned in the semi-annual report of the current term shall be 100 or less; over 100 and under 200, two Representatives; over 200 three Representatives.

10.—Any Lodge not having a properly qualified P. G., may choose one so qualified from any other Lodge within the jurisdiction, to represent it in this Grand Lodge for the like period.

11.—In all ballotings, only one name shall be written upon any ballot.

12.—The resignation by any member of his office as Representative, must be addressed in writing to the N. G. of his Lodge, which shall proceed at its first opportunity to consider the same, and either accept or refuse the resignation, as may seem expedient; and if such resignation be accepted, the Lodge may at once proceed to elect another qualified member to fill the vacancy.

#### TRIAL OF MEMBERS.

13.—Whenever charges affecting the character or standing of any member shall be submitted to the Grand Lodge in writing, by one or more members thereof, the same shall be immediately referred to a Committee of five members, to be elected by ballot, who shall, with as little delay as possible, examine carefully into the charges, and report the result of such examination to the Grand Lodge.

14.—The Grand Lodge, after having heard the member thus charged in his defence, shall proceed to determine the case, by the

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acquittal, reprimand, suspension from his seat in the Grand Lodge, or expulsion therefrom of the implicated member, as the Grand Lodge may deem fit and proper.

15.—Whenever any member shall be suspended or expelled, intimation of the same shall be forthwith given to the N. G. of his Lodge, and the Grand Lodge may require that he be tried by the Subordinate Lodge to which he belongs.

#### OFFICERS.

#### ELECTIVE OFFICERS.

16 .- The Elective Officers of this Grand Lodge shall be:

The Most Worthy Grand Master.

- " Right Worthy Deputy Grand Master.
- " " Grand Warden.
- diana waigen.
- " " Grand Secretary.
- " Grand Treasurer.

To be elected by ballot.

17.—These Elective Officers shall be elected by ballot, after previous nomination; such nomination and election to take place at the Annual Session of the Grand Lodge, and on the first day of the Session, at 3 o'clock r. m.

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18.—At each election the Presiding Officer shall appoint two of the members present as Tellers, who shall preside at the ballot box and allow each member as his Lodge is called by the Grand Secretary to deposit his ballot, and when the balloting is completed shall examine the same and report the result.

19.—Each Elective Officer shall be chosen separately, by a majority of all the ballots cast. Should there be no choice of such Officer at any ballot, a new ballot shall forthwith take place among the members present; and after each ballot, the name of the candidate who shall have received the least number of votes shall be withdrawn.

20.—The Grand Representative or Representatives to represent this Grand Lodge in the Grand Lodge of the United States, shall be elected in accordance with the Constitution and Laws of the said Grand Lodge of the United States, and in the form and manner herein prescribed for the nomination and election of Grand

#### APPOINTED OFFICERS.

21 .- The appointed Officers of the Grand Lodge shall be:

The Worthy Grand Marshal.

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" Conductor.
" Guardian.

" Chaplain.
" Herald.

To be appointed by the Grand Master immediately after his installation, subject to the approval of the Grand Lodge.

22.—The Grand Master shall, as soon after his installation as may be, appoint, subject to the approval of the Grand Lodge, a District Deputy Grand Master for each District under the jurisdiction of this Grand Lodge, and within which one or more Subordinate Lodges may be in operation.

#### INSTALLATION.

23.—The Grand Officers shall be installed according to the Grand Lodge order of business, unless otherwise ordained by the Grand Lodge, and shall serve until the next Annual Session, and until the installation of their successors.

24.—The sitting Grand Master, or any P. G. Master present, shall instal the Grand Master elect, who shall thereafter instal the other Officers.

25.—Should any Officer elect fail to present himself for installation at the time duly appointed for the ceremony, his office shall be declared vacant, unless sufficient cause be shown for such nonattendance, and the Grand Lodge shall forthwith proceed to fill the

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same by a new election, the successful Candidate at which shall be immediately installed. Should sufficient cause be shown, as aforesaid, the installation of the Officer elect, so absent, may take placeat such time, and in such manner as the Grand Lodge may then specially direct.

#### VACANCIES.

26.—Should a vacancy occur in the office of Grand Representative, R. W. Grand Warden, R. W. Grand Secretary, or R. W. Grand Treasurer, by death, resignation, or otherwise, during the recess of this Grand Lodge, such vacancy shall be filled by a person to be chosen by a majority of the remaining Elective Officers and Grand Representatives, provided always that the person so chosen shall serve only until the next annual session of the Grand Lodge, when in the event of the term in the vacant office being still unexpired, the members present shall elect by ballot a person to serve-for the remainder of such unexpired term.

#### DUTIES AND POWERS.

27 .- The M. W. Grand Master shall preside at all meetings of the Grand Lodge when present; he shall preserve order and decorum therein, and decide all questions of order, subject, however, to an appeal to the Grand Lodge; he shall have the casting vote upon all occasions when the Grand Lodge is equally divided, except in cases decided by ballot; he shall appoint pro tem., in the absence of the regular incumbents, all officers whose appointment is not otherwise provided for by the Grand Lodge; sign all requisite orders on the Grand Treasurer, and all regular documents requiring his signature, and transmit, or cause to be transmitted regularly, previous to the commencement of each term, to each subordinate Lodge within this jurisdiction, the Passwords necessary; he shall. be, ex-officio, a member of all Committees of the Grand Lodge, whose meetings he may choose to attend; he may grant dispensaions to open new Lodges, and petitions of a Subordinate Lodge to reinstate an expelled member; and he shall, in person or by deputy. visit and inspect the books, proceedings and work of each Subor-

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dinate Lodge within this jurisdiction, whenever he may deem it necessary in the furtherance of their interests; the necessary expense incurred in making such visits to be defrayed by the Grand Lodge.

28.—The R. W. Deputy Grand Master shall act as the Assistant of the Grand Master, and during the absence of that officer shall be invested with all his powers. In the event of the death, resignation, or removal from office of the Grand Master, he shall, ex officio, become Grand Master until the next regular session thereafter.

29.—The R. W. Grand Warden shall preside in the absence of the Deputy Grand Master and Grand Master; he shall assist the Grand Master in the ceremonies of the Order, and in the preservation of decorum in the Grand Lodge; he shall confer the Grand Lodge Degree on all Past Grands qualified to receive it; and shall, subject to the Grand Master, have charge of the Lodge room during all meetings of the Grand Lodge. And in the event of a vacancy in the office of R. W. Deputy Grand Master, he shall perform the duties of that office until the first regular session thereafter.

30.—The duty of the R. W. Grand Secretary shall be to attend in person every meeting of the Grand Lodge, and when absent to transmit the books and records thereof; he shall keep a just and true record of all proceedings, and intimate to each Subordinate Lodge such portion thereof as may affect it; he shall also keep a just and true account between each Subordinate Lodge and the Grand Lodge, and also of the affairs of the Grand Lodge; he shall preserve all books and fyle all documents belonging to his office; attest all orders drawn on the Grand Treasurer, and pay over to him monthly all moneys coming into his hands on account of the Grand Lodge; receive all documents relative to the Grand Lodge, and submit the same to the Grand Master, or the Grand Lodge, if in session; conduct all correspondence on behalf of the Grand Lodge; furnish all Committees with such official documents as may be necessary for their reference; transmit to the

Grand Lodge of the United States a regular report of the Order, made up to the 31st of December in each year; notify all Subordinate Lodges of each regular or special session of the Grand Lodge, at least two weeks previous to its commencement; prepare all Charters granted by the Grand Lodge; affix the Grand Seal to such Charters, and to all other documents requiring it; perform all the ditties of the Grand Treasurer in his absence; and attend to all other business not herein enumerated, and coming properly within the duties of his office. He shall have his books properly closed before the annual session, and shall have a sufficient number of his Annual Report printed for the use, of the Grand Lodge. Prior to installation he shall execute in favor of the Grand Lodge a satisfactory bond for the faithful performance of his duties; and shall receive such salary as may be fixed upon, at each annual session.

31.—The R. W. Grand Treasurer shall receive and take charge of the moneys of the Grand Lodge, depositing the same in some chartered Banking Institution of this Province, to be named by the Grand Lodge, within three days at furthest, after receipt thereof, unless otherwise directed by the Grand Lodge; he shall pay all orders drawn on him by the Grand Master, and countersigned by the Grand Secretary, and none other; he shall keep his accounts in a fair, clear, and legible manner, exhibiting, in as far as possible, he sources of all receipts, and the destination of all disbursements, in the smouth of both; he shall have his accounts closed immediately before every regular, Session, and submit them thereat to the Grand Lodge; and shall prior to installation execute in favor of the Grand Lodge a satisfactory Bond for the due and faithful performance of his duties.

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32.—The Grand Representatives shall attend the meetings of the Grand Lodge of the United States, and act thereat on behalf of this jurisdiction; they shall be furnished with certificates of election in the form required by the Grand Lodge of the United States. They shall also attend the meetings of this Grand Lodge, and submit a synopsis of the proceedings of the Grand Lodge of the United States at the Sessions thereof attended by them—to appear in the annual printed proceedings of this Grand Lodge.

33.—The R. W. Grand Chaplain shall open and close every meeting of the Grand Lodge with prayer.

34.—The R. W. Grand Marshal shall examine Past Grands applying for the Grand Lodge Degree, and shall otherwise assist the Grand Master in the ceremonies of the Grand Lodge, according to his office.

35.—The R. W. Grand Conductor shall assist the Grand Marshal in the ceremonies of the Grand Lodge.

36.—The R. W. Grand Herald shall securely guard the outer does of the Lodge Room; he shall permit no one to enter without examination and receiving from him the semi-annual P. W.; he shall receive the Cards of Travelling Brothers desiring to visit this Grand Lodge and deliver the same to the Grand Guardian to be laid before the Grand Lodge.

37.—The R. W. Grand Guardian shall have the charge of the innerventrance of the Grand Lodge Room, and permit none to enter or depart without the usual formalities.

38.—Each R. W. District Deputy Grand Master shall act as the agent of the Grand Master, with the Subordinate Lodge or Lodges situated within the District over which he may be appointed; it shall be his duty to see that the work of the Order is performed therein uniformly and correctly; and to instal the Officers of such Lodge or Lodges, or cause the same to be the by a competent Officer; he shall be entrusted with the charge of, and shall countersign and issue all Dispensations granted to any Lodge in this District; he shall report to the Grand Master, at least two weeks previous to each regular Session, such Dispensations as may have passed through his hands, together with all other matters coming within his sphere of duty; and he shall remit forthwith to the Grand Seoretary all Dues, Charges, and other Funds, which may have been received by him on account of this Grand Lodge.

:39.—The Grand Master, or Deputy Grand Master, shall not hold office in a Subordinate Lodge while holding either of those offices.

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#### COMMITTEES.

#### STANDING COMMITTEES

40.—The Elective Grand Officers and Grand Representatives shall constitute an Advisory Board, who shall meet on the summons of the Grand Master, and whose duty it shall be to render assistance and advice to the Grand Master, on such matters as he shall deem it necessary in the discharge of his official duties, to introduce and submit to their notice and consideration, during the recess of the Grand Lodge.

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41.—The following Standing Committees shall be appointed from among the Representatives or Past Grands by the Grand Master, at or before the opening of each Annual Session, to serve until their successors shall be appointed, unless sooner discharged by vote of the Grand Lodge, viz:

#### Committee on Credentials;

- " Returns ;
- " Finance ;
- " Appeals and Grievances;
- " Laws of Subordinates :
- Printing :
- " Legislation :
- " State of the Order;
  - Mileage and Per Diem ;
- " Petitions and Correspondence ;
  - Districts.

42.—The Committee on Credentials shall be composed of three members, of whom the Grand Secretary shall be one, who shall report to the Grand Lodge, without delay, on the qualification of Brothers claiming admission as Representatives or Past Grands, and on the validity of their credentials.

43.—The Committee on Returns shall consist of eight members, who shall examine and report to this Grand Lodge, without delay; on the regularity of the Returns of Subordinate Lodges.

44.—The Committee on Finance shall consist of five members, whose duty it shall be to examine, at each regular session, the reports of the Grand Secretary and Grand Treasurer, the accounts of the Grand Lodge, and all other claims and matters laid before them, and report thereon; and to suggest such measures of finance as they may deem to be expedient and necessary.

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45.—The Committee on Appeals shall be composed of five members, of whom three shall form a quorum, to whom shall be referred all appeals and grievances from Sub rdinate Lodges, or from members thereof, (unless in the case of charges against members of the Grand Lodge,) on which they shall report without delay, recommending such action in the case as they may consider necessary; provided always that no member of this Committee shall act as such, on any appeal to which he himself may be a party.

46.—The Committee on Laws of Subordinate Lodges shall consist of five members, to whom shall be referred all By-Laws of Subordinate Lodges, sent in for approval. It shall be the duty of the Committee, at the earliest possible opportunity to notify such Lodges through the Grand Secretary of their approval or disapproval of the By-Laws submitted, pointing out all regulations therein (if any) which may violate or conflict with the laws and usages of the Order. All By-Laws so approved will be operative upon the Lodge until next session of Grand Lodge, and no By-Laws shall be operative until so approved. The Committee shell make a full report to the Grand Lodge at its next session.

47.—The Committee on Printing shall consist of three members, of whom the Grand Secretary shall be one, to whom shall be referred all matters relative to the printing required by this Grand Lodge, and the necessary correction and condensing of material for the Journal of Proceedings of the Grand Lodge, previous to publication.

48.—The Committee on Legislation shall consist of five members, to whom shall be referred all questions pertaining to the making or amending of Laws.

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49.—The Committee on the State of the Order shall consist of five members, to whom shall be referred the decisions of the M. W. Grand Master, during the recess, all questions relating to the interpretation of the Laws and usages of the Order in this Province, and matters concerning the condition and prospects of the Order.

50.—The Committee on Mileage and Per Diem shall consist of fire members, whose duty it shall be to arrange a table of the mileage and per diem of the Officers and Representatives and members of Committees of this Grand Lodge in accordance with such resolutions as may be adopted from time to time, fixing the rate of such mileage and per diem.

51.—The Committee on Petitions and Correspondence shall consist of five members, to whom shall be referred all petitions, and all afficial correspondence of the Grand Master and Grand Secretary.

.52.—The Committee on Districts shall consist of five members, whose duty it shall be to divide the jurisdiction into districts.

53.—All Committees meeting during recess shall be paid Mileage and Per Diem at the same rate as paid to Representatives of Grand Lodge, at the following Session, the chairman of each Committee to present the account.

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54.—The Reports of all Committees must be made in writing.

#### SPECIAL COMMITTEES.

55.—All Special Committees shall be named by the Grand Master, subject to approval by the Grand Lodge, unless provided for by special vote, and shall report at the next sitting following their appointment, unless otherwise ordered by this Grand Lodge,

#### AUDITORS

56.—Two auditors shall be appointed by the Grand Master, whose duty it shall be to examine the books, accounts, vouchers, &c., of the Grand Secretary and Grand Treasurer, prior to each annual session, and report upon the same.

#### SESSIONS.

57.—The Grand Lodge shall meet annually on the second Wednesday in August in each year, at such a place as may be appointed at the preceding session thereof.

58.—The Grand Master shall have the power to convene special meetings of the Grand Lodge, whenever and wherever, in his judgment, it would be for the true interests and benefit of the Grand Lodge and Odd Fellowship generally within its jurisdiction, and when the importance of the subject matter for consideration is such as to justify the expense necessarily involved in such meetings; provided always, that two weeks' notice shall be given to each Subordinate Lodge of the time and object of such meeting.

59.—At any special meeting of the Grand Lodge, no business shall be transacted other than that for which the meeting was called.

60.—At all regular and special meetings, the Grand Lodge may adjourn from time to time, as may be found expedient.

61.—To constitute a regular or special meeting of this Grand-Lodge, there must be in attendance a majority of the Representatives of all the Lodges within the jurisdiction present.

#### APPEALS.

62.—Upon the investigation of any appeal presented to the Grand Lodge, if it shall appear that there has been irregularity or informality in the form of the charges made, or in the manner of preferring them, or in the appointment of the Committee of Trial, or in the proceedings of the Committee or of the Lodge; or that incompetent evidence has been received, or competent evidence excluded; or that a fair opportunity has not been given the appellant to produce his evidence; or if it appear that the decision is contrary to evidence or the weight of evidence; then the decision of the Lodge may be reversed, and the case referred back for a new trial.

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64.—Or if it appear that the penalty inflicted upon the accused after such second trial has been contrary to the Constitution and Laws of the Lodge, or the Laws and usages of the Order, or disproportioned to the offence committed, the case may be referred back, and the Lodge instructed to impose such penalty as may be legal or appropriate.

#### SUBORDINATE LODGES.

#### INSTITUTION.

65.—Brothers desirous of establishing a new Lodge under this jurisdiction shall transmit to this Grand Lodge a written application to that effect, accompanied with their Withdrawal Cards or Dismissal Tertificates, and the charter fee (\$30) thirty dollars.

66.—Such application must be signed in every instance by at least five Brothers of the Scarlet Degree. Should one Lodge, or more, be already established in the proposed location, the signatures of at least ten Brothers, qualified as above, shall be requisite.

67.—On receipt of a formal application for a Charter, as above required, the Grand Master may issue a warrant for the immediate institution of the Lodge petitioned for.

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68.—The necessary Charges and Lectures shall be furnished by this Grand Lodge to every new Lodge on its institution, to be paid for at such rates as may be charged by the Grand Lodge. The travelling expenses of the Instituting Officer shall also be payable by the Lodge instituted.

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'69.—The first Noble Grand of a new Lodge shall be entitled to the Past Vice Grand's and Past Secretary's Degrees, and the first V. G. shall be entitled to the Past Secretary's Degree, in additionte the Degrees acquired by actual service.

#### GOVERNMENT.

70.—The Grand Lodge shall stand invested with full power, and it shall be its duty to issue, for the government of its Subordinate Lodges, a Form of Constitution and Rules of Order, subject to the approval of the Grand Lodge of the United States.

71.—Every Subordinate Lodge under this jurisdiction must adhere strictly to its Constitution and Rules of Order, as issued by the Grand Lodge; and also to the By-Laws framed by the Lodge, in accordance therewith, and confirmed by this Grand Lodge, and shall, in all cases, yield implicit obedience to the further regulations that may from time to time be promulgated by this Grand Lodge.

72.—No public celebration of any kind shall be held by any Lodge in this jurisdiction, without the express permission of the Grand Master or District Deputy Grand Master for said Lodge; nor shall any controversy be entered into relating to the Order through the public prints, without the express permission of the Grand Master.

73.—No communication from a Subordinate Lodge shall be recognized as official unless attested by its Secretary, and having its Seal affixed, of which seal an impression shall be furnished to the Grand Lodge, as soon as possible.

74.—The Grand Lodge shall divide the Province of Ontario into-Districts, making such arrangements thereof from time to time, ascircumstances may suggest and require, and as shall seem most fit.

75.—The Grand Lodge, or in its recess, the Grand Master thereof, shall have power to issue Dispensations, countensigned by the Grand Secretary, to any Lodge under this jurisdiction, to exempt it, imany particular case, from the operation of any of the various regulations, other than financial, by which it is governed, or to enable it to proceed in any matter with other than the usual and prescribed formalities, whenever the Grand Lodge or Grand Master may deem it for the interest and welfare of the Order so to do.

#### FORFEITURE OF CHARTER.

76.—Any Subordinate Lodge failing to make the Returns amp pay the Dues required by its Constitution, for twelve months, shall become liable to the forfeiture of its Charter, which may thereupon be recalled by the Grand Master, or by vote of the Grand Lodge at any regular session. Should any Lodge fail to forward its returns promptly to the Grand Lodge, as required by its constitution, the Grand Secretary shall immediately, upon receipt of such return, enter to the debit of such Lodge, a fine of two dollars per month for the time which may have clapsed since such return was due.

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77.—In the event of any Lodge failing to meet for three consecutive months, it shall thereby become extinct; and it shall be the duty of the officers last installed to transmit to this Grand Lodge the Charter, Books, Funds, and other property of said Lodge.

78.—The funds and properties of Subordinate Lodges are by the provisions of their Charters and the Laws of the Order, held only in trust for charitable purposes, and must be applied solely to these purposes; donating them for other than such purposes, or in any manner dividing them among the members individually, is a violation of such trust and the law—the penalty for which is expulsion. And if a Subordinate Lodge shall fail from any cause to work, all

moneys and properties, together with the Charter, shall be surrendered to the Grand Lodge to be held in trust and applied as hereinafter provided.

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79.—Upon the suspension or expulsion of a Lodge, or surrender or forfeiture of its Charter, it shall be the duty of its last installed Officers and Members having the custody of the Charter, books, papers, properties and funds of the Lodge, to assign, transfer, and deliver the same on demand to the Grand Master, or the D. D. Grand Master of the District, or to such Past Grand as may be specially deputed by the Grand Master or Grand Lodge to receive the same; and the same shall be held subject to the order of the Grand Lodge. Any Officer or Member having such properties in custody, refusing such demand, shall be forever excluded from membership or fellowship in the Order, notwithstanding such Lodge should afterwards be restored to good standing.

80 .- All effects or funds received by the Grand Lodge from any Subordinate or Degree Lodge under Clauses 77 and 78, shall be kept separate and apart from the property and funds of the Grand Lodge; and such funds shall not be estimated as part of the assets of the Grand Lodge, but shall be held in trust; first, for the benefit of any Brother and Widow or Orphans entitled to benefits in accordance with the By-Laws of such Lodge at the time of the dissolution or suspension of the same ; and the balance, if any, to be returned to such Subordinate Lodge should it ever be reinstated, or upon the expiration of the period of its suspension; provided, however, that should said Lodge not be restored to fellowship within five years, the funds and properties of said Lodge may be disposed of or used under the direction of the Grand Lodge in aiding or assisting any working Lodge or proposed Lodge needing assistance, or for such other charitable purposes as in the judgment of the Grand Lodge may be deemed advisable,

81.—Members of extinct Lodges, who were clear of the Books of such Lodge, at the time of its dissolution, or who shall have paid to the Grand Lodge all arrears then due, may, upon appli-

cation to the Grand Secretary, receive a Withdrawal Card under the seal of the Grand Lodge, which shall have all the force of a Withdrawal Card regularly granted. Provided always, that the Grand Master and Grand Secretary shall be satisfied that the applicant was not implicated in the breaking up of the Lodge, or in the illegal distribution or use of the funds of the same.

82.—Upon the application to the Grand Lodge of five or more members of an extinct Lodge, for the restoration of such Lodge to fellowship, such applicants as the Grand Lodge may approve, may be restored to fellowship in said Lodge, together with the Charter and effects belonging to such Lodge at the time of its extinction, unless such effects shall have been disposed of as provided in clause 80 of this Constitution.

#### FUNDS.

#### RECEIPTS.

89.—The Grand Lodge shall be entitled to receive from each Subordinate the sum of fifty cents a year, payable half yearly, for each unsuspended member on its books, as shown by its Semi-Annual Return.

84.—In case of failure or deficiency in the funds of the Grand Lodge, the amount required may be supplied by an assessment upon the Lodges under its jurisdiction, apportioned according to the number of unsuspended members in each Lodge, as reported in its last Semi-Annual Return.

#### EXPENDITURE.

85.—All claims against the Grand Lodge shall be first placed in the hands of the Grand Secretary, and by him submitted to the Finance Committee, who shall examine and report on the correctness of the same.

86.—When such claims have been reported correct and approved by the Grand Lodge, the Grand Master shall issue an order on the Grand Treasurer, attested by the Grand Secretary,

for the payment of the same, which payment shall be saily entered in the books of the Grand Lodge by the Grand Treasurer.

87.—In cases of urgency, during the recess of the Grand Lodge, the Grand Master may, at his discretion, issue such order, making report thereof to the Grand Lodge at its next regular sossion.

#### BY-LAWS, ETC.

#### BY-LAWS.

88.—This Grand Lodge shall stand fully invested with the power to adopt from time to time such By-Laws and resolutions as it may deem expedient; provided they do not, in any wise, contravene any part of this Constitution, or of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Grand Lodge of the United States, or the general laws, principles, or customs of the Order.

89.—Copies of such By-laws shall be immediately forwarded in duplicate to the Grand Lodge of the United States for approval, authenticated by the Seal of this Grand Lodge, and the signatures of its Grand Master and Grand Secretary.

90.—All By-laws and Resolutions of this Grand Lodge shall be provisionally in force from the time of their enactment; but any portion thereof not conforming to Clause 88, may be annulled by the Grand Lodge of the United States, and such annulment may also have retro-active effect.

#### AMENDMENTS.

91.—This Constitution, or any part thereof, shall not be altered, amended, suspended or annulled, unless by action of this Grand Lodge at its Annual Communication, and upon notice of such proposed alteration being given by the Grand Secretary, three months previous thereto, to each of the Subordinate Lodges.

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#### ORDER OF BUSINESS.

Lst.—The members will clothe themselves in their appropriate Regalia.

2nd .- The Guardian will close the door.

3rd.—The Officers will take their respective Chairs.

4th.—The Grand Master will make pro tem. appointments if needed.

5th.—The Grand Marshal and Grand Conductor will examine all present in the G. 1 Degree and Semi-Annual Pass-Word,

6th .- The Grand Chaplain will offer prayer.

7th.—The Grand Lodge will rise according to usage, and the Deputy Grand Master will declare the Grand Lodge open for business.

8th.—The Grand Secretary will submit the Credentials of Representatives and new members.

9th.—The Grand Master shall appoint the Committee on Creden- \tials, which shall report with as little delay as possible.

10th.—The reception and adoption of the Report of the Committee on Credentials.

11th.—The reception of new Members and Representatives, and the calling of the Roll of Officers and Representatives.

12th.—The Reading and adoption of the Minutes of the last Annual Session, and all Special Meetings of the year past.

13th.-The Appointment of Regular Committees.

14th.—The Reading and Reference to Appropriate Committees of the Reports of the Grand Officers.

15th.—The Reception of Petitions, Communications and Appeals, and the reference of the same to Committees.

16th.—The Roll of Lodges shall be called for the presentation of Questions and Business, and proper reference of the same.

17th.—The Election of Officers.

18th. - Unfinished business in order of its priority.

19th.—The reports of Committees shall be read and considered.

20th.—The presentation and disposal of miscellaneous business.

21st.—The adjournment of the Grand Lodge.

#### RULES OF ORDER.

Rule I.—After each adjournment the Grand Lodge shall be opened in the manner prescribed in the Order of Business, and the minutes of the preceding sitting shall be read and approved.

Rule II.—During the continuance of the Session the most decorous order shall be observed, no one leaving the room without the permission of the Grand Master, nor entering without the consent of the Grand Warden.

The order of procedure, after opening adjourned sittings, shall be as follows:

1.—The calling of the Roll of Officers and Representatives.

2.—The consideration of any excuses which may be offered by Absentees from previous sittings.

3.—The receiving and consideration of any Reports from the Committee on Credentials, on claims for admission as Representatives or Members.

4.—The admission and instruction (when requisite) of new mem-

5.—The reading by the Grand Secretary of the Minutes of last sitting, the consideration of any objections which may be made to any part thereof, and their approval, with or without amendments as the case may require.

6 .- Reading of Accounts, Petitions, and other communications.

7 .- Reports of Standing Committees in the following order:

#### On Returns.

- " Finance.
- " Appeals.
- " Laws of Subordinates.
- " Printing.
- " Legislation.
- " State of the Order.
- " Mileage and Per Diem.
- " Petitions and Correspondence.
  - " Districts.

8.—The receiving of any reports from Special Committees, in the order of their seniority.

#### 9.-New business.

10.—Unfinished business, in order of priority at previous sittings.

11.—Closing or adjournment (as the case may be), of the Grand Lodge.

RULE III.—Notwithstanding the Order of Business in Rule II, the Grand Lodge may, by resolution, make the consideration of any

matter coming before it, a special order for any particular hour or day.

Rule IV.—No question, unless regularly moved and seconded, and submitted in writing, shall be put to the Grand Lodge by the Presiding Officer.

RULE V.—No question shall be open for consideration until regularly put from the chair; and when so put, no other motion shall be receivable, unless it be a motion—

- 1-To adjourn ;
- 2-To lay on the table;
- 8-To put the previous question ;
- 4-To postpone;
- 5-To refer; or
- 6—To amend.

These several motions, if made, shall have precedence in the order above stated, and the first, second and third thereof, shall be decided without debate

RULE VI.—The previous question shall be put from the chair, only after it shall have been ascertained that the call therefor is sustained by a majority of the representatives of the Grand Lodge present, and then shall always be put in the words following: "Shall the question be now put?" which words shall be understood to have reference to whatever question may be pending immediately before such call for the previous question may have been made.

RULE VII.—If the vote of the Grand Lodge, taken pursuant to such call for the previous question, be in the affirmative, the Presiding Officer shall thereupon put forthwith to vote the question so pending, immediately before such call, and shall not allow any ameudment or further debate thereon.

RULE VIII.—Before taking the vote on any motion, the Piesiding Officer shall ask, "Is the Grand Lodge ready for the ques-

tion?" and, should no member stand up to speak, the Presiding Officer shall rise to take the vote, after which no member shall have a right to speak on the question.

RULE IX.—After any question, except that of indefinite postponement or the previous question, may have been decided, any two members, having voted in the majority, may, at the same or next sitting, move for a re-consideration, but no discussion on the main question shall be allowed upon such motion.

Rule X.—Any representative may require the division of a question, when the sense will admit of it.

Rule XI.—When a blank is to be filled, the question shall first be taken on the highest sum or number, or on the longest or latest time proposed.

RULE XII.—The Yeas and Nays shall be taken and recorded on the call of any three representatives.

Rule XIII.—Every representative present may be required to vote on any question, unless excused by the Grand Lodge, personally interested in the result, or otherwise incapacitated.

Rule XIV.—Any member intending to speak on a question shall rise in his place and respectfully address the Presiding Officer, confining himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personality and indecorous language, as well as any reflection on the Grand Lodge or its members.

Rule XV.—No representative shall speak more than once on the same question, until every member entitled to speak shall have had an opportunity of doing so; nor more than twice, unless by permission of the Presiding Officer.

RILE XVI.—Should more than one member rise to speak at the same time, the Presiding Officer shall determine which is entitled to the floor; and no member shall interrupt the business of the Grand Lodge, or in any manner disturb another in his speech, unless to call him to order for words spoken, or rules infringed.

RULE XVII.—Any member, called to order while speaking, shall resume his seat, and the debate shall forthwith be suspended until the point of order thus raised be determined; nor shall any member speak upon such point of order unless it be to make necessary explanations, or appeal from the decision of the chair.

RULE XVIII.—The decision of the Presiding Officer on questions of order shall be without debate, unless, entertaining doubts on the point, he should invite it; and on such questions alone shall he have the privilege of speaking from the chair.

RULE XIX.—In all cases where a member may appeal from the decision of the chair, he shall use the words following and none other, unless it be for necessary explanation: "Most Worthy Grand Master, I respectfully appeal from the decision of the Chair to the Grand Lodge,"—and the Grand Lodge shall, after such explanation as the Presiding Officer may deem necessary, proceed forthwith to consider and vote upon the question: "Shall the decision of the Chair stand as the judgment of the Grand Lodge?"

RULE XX.—Any member who may have been ruled out of order for manifestation of temper or improper feeling, must apologise to the Grand Lodge, or to any aggrieved party if required to do so by the Presiding Officer; and shall not speak again on the impending question, except to explain and apologise, unless specially permitted to do so by the Presiding Officer.

RULE XXI.—Visiting Past Grands, not members of this Grand Lodge, may address the Grand Lodge, on receiving permission to that effect from the Presiding Officer.

RULE XXII.—A motion to alter or suspend the Order of Business for the remainder of a sitting may at any time be carried by a two-thirds vote, but no motion to suspend or alter any such Order of Business for a longer term shall at any time be put to vote.

RULE XXIII—These Rules of Order, or any part thereof, shall only be altered, amended, suspended or annulled, (except in the case provided for by Rule 22nd) by action of the Grand Lodge of Ontario, in the same mode as required in Clauses 88, 89, 90, 91 of the Constitution of this Grand Lodge.

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## CONSTITUTION

AND

## RULES OF ORDER

FOR

### SUBORDINATE LODGES.

#### CONSTITUTION.

#### PREAMBLE.

For the purpose of ensuring, as much as possible, uniformity in the administration of the privileges, honors and benefits of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows within its jurisdiction, the Grand Lodge of Ontario—the Supreme Tribunal of the Lodges within the limits of the Province of Ontario—doth hereby ordain the following Articles, as the Constitution of all Subordinate Lodges working under its immediate jurisdiction:

#### TITLE AND POWERS.

1.—This Lodge shall be constituted of at least Five Members of the Scarlet Degree, and shall be hailed and entitled,—
Lodge, No.———, I. O. O. F., of Ontario, and shall possess the full powers and privileges of a Subordinate Lodge, holding a legal, unreclaimed and valid Charter, duly granted and formally presented by the Grand Lodge of Ontario.

#### MEMBERSHIP.

#### ADMISSION.

- 2.—Candidates for Membership by Initiation in this Lodge, must be free white males of not less than 21 years of age, of good moral character, and in sound health, and residents within the jurisdiction of this Lodge at least six months.
- 3.—Every proposition for membership must be submitted in writing by a Brother of this Lodge, and must state the name of the Applicant, and his residence, age and occupation, supported by a reference to at least one other member of the Lodge.
- 4.—The proposition so made shall be referred to a Committee of three Brothers, two of whom shall be appointed by the N. G., and one by the V. G., who shall report thereon at the next regular meeting, unless excused by a two-thirds vote of members present, or the petition be withdrawn by the proposer.
- 5.—A ballot shall be taken on the proposition immediately after the presentation of such report; when, if less than three black balls be found, the Candidate shall be accepted; if three or more, he shall be rejected, and so declared.
- 6.—Any Brother or Ancient Odd Fellow desirous of joining this Lodge, must present a Withdrawal Card or dismissal Certificate from the Lodge of which he was previously a member, and his application shall then be disposed of according to the above regulations
- 7.—Every member, on his admission, shall sign a promise to support and abide by the Constitution and By-Laws of this Lodge and to pay all legal demands against him so long as he shall remain a member.
- 8.—Any Candidate requiring admission more than thirteen weeks after his election, must be again proposed and balloted for, as in the case of a new Candidate.
  - 9.—The rejection of any Candidate for membership shall be im-

mediately intimated to every Subordinate Lodge in the City, Town or Village, in which such rejection takes place.

10.—No Candidate who has been rejected can be again proposed for membership, until, at least, six months after his rejection.

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11.—No person shall be admitted to Honorary Membership in this Lodge, nor hold membership in this and any other Subordinate Lodge of this Order at the same time.

12.—No proposition for membership, either by initiation or by card, shall be received or acted upon if the applicant's residence be out of this jurisdiction, (without the consent of the Grand Master of the jurisdicsion in which he resides); nor if his residence be nearer to any other Lodge, unless consent of the latter be obtained.

#### DEGREES.

13.—Every Brother, previous to his receiving any of the Five. Degrees, shall present a certificate from the P. S. that he is not in arrears to the Lodge, and that he has puid all charges for the said Degrees, and then shall be balloted for.

14.—If, on such ballot three or more black balls appear, he shall be rejected; otherwise, he shall be considered eligible and shall be admitted to the Degree, or Degrees, applied for. In case of rejection, two weeks' notice in open Lodge must be given, before a ballot can again be had.

15.—No certificate for Degrees shall be granted until after the Candidate shall have paid the fees required therefor.

16.—No Brother having been less than one month in Membership, shall be Eligible for Degrees; and not more than three Degrees shall be conferred on any Brother at one and the same meeting, except by dispensation.

#### WITHDRAWAL CARDS.

17.—Any Brother in good standing and clear of the books, desiring to withdraw from this Lodge, may signify such desire either

personally in open Lodge, or by a letter addressed to the Secretary, whereupon the Lodge shall proceed to a ballot, with ball ballots, and a majority vote of the members present shall be necessary to the granting of such Withdrawal Card. If a majority of the members present refuse to grant such card, the applicant therefor may tender a written resignation of his membership, and shall be outitled to eccive from the Secretary, under the seal of the Lodge, a certificate that he has resigned membership, and such certificate shall be sufficient evidence that the Brother was in good standing at the time of his resignation; provided that, upon the refusal of the card, the member applying for the same shall have the right of appeal to the Grand Lodge.

#### RE-ADMISSION

\* 18.—Should any Brother receiving a Withdrawal Card from this Lodge apply within twelve months thereafter to be re-admitted a member, and be accepted, the Lodge may remit in his favor the Entrance Fee, or such proportion thereof as they may think fit.

#### OFFICERS.

#### ELECTIVE OFFICERS.

19.—The Elective Officers of this Lodge shall be Noble Grand, Vice Grand, Recording Secretary, Permanent Secretary, and Treasurer; and the Lodge may also provide, by its By-Laws, for the election of a Degree Master and a Physician.

20.—Any Brother to be nominated for the office of D. M., must be a P. G. having the three P. O. Degrees; for the office of N. G., a V. G. or P. V. G.; and for any other of the Electivé Officers. except Physician, he must have served at least twenty-six nights in some inferior office and have attained to the Scarlet Degree.

21 .- All officers shall be eligible for re-election

22.—Nomination for the Elective Officers shall be made only at the two meetings next preceding that fixed for the Elections thereto, and no Brother shall be nominated who has not signified his willingness to accept the office for which he may be named, and no nominee shall be allowed to retire after the nominations have been declared closed.

- 23.—The election of officers shall take place at the last regular meeting in each term, except in the case of D. M., P.S., and Physician, who shall be elected to serve for a term of six or twelve months as the Lodge by its Dy-Laws determine.
- 24.—If, for any Elective Office, only one Brother shall be in nomination, such Brother shall be declared elected by acclamation; should there be two or more candidates duly nominated, the members present shall proceed to elect one of such candidates by ballot, and only members in good standing shall be entitled to a vote.
- 25.—A majority of all the legal votes cast shall be necessary to election; should there be no choice of an officer at any ballot, a new ballot shall forthwith take place, and after each ballot, the name of the candidate who may have received the smallest number of votes as well as those who shall receive no votes, shall be withdrawn.

## APPOINTED OFFICERS.

- 26.—The appointed Officers of this Lodge shall be W.; C., O.G., I.G., R.S.N.G., L.S.N.G., R.S.V.G., L.S.V.G., and R. and L.S.S.; and the Lodge may, at its option, add a Chaplair.
- 27.—These Officers shall be appointed by the N. G. immediately after his installation; except the R. and L.S.V.G., who shall be appointed at the same time by the V. G.
- 28.—All Brothers appointed as Officers must be in good standing, and the W. O. G., and I. G., must have attained the Scarlet Degree.
- 29.—The N.G., with the consent of the Lodge, may appoint as O G. a Brother of the Scarlet Degree belonging to any other Lodge.

## VACANCIB

30. - Any office, the occupant of which may have been absent

without satisfactory excuse from three successive regular meetings, may be declared vacant by vote of the Lodge, on a motion to that effect; provided notice of such motion has been given at the regular meeting previous to that at which the vote is taken.

31.—Any vacancy in office shall be filled by election or appointment as the case may be; in the case of elective officers the election may take place on the second night of nomination; and Brothers so elected or appointed, shall be entitled to the privileges. and honors of the office, provided they complete the term.

## DUTIES AND POWERS.

32 —The Officers of this Lodge shall perform such duties, and be invested with such powers as are prescribed by the Charge-Books and Usages of the Order, the Laws of the Grand Lodge, and the Lodge to which they belong.

33.—This Lodge shall have authority to add thereto such duties and powers, as may not be inconsistent with the provisions of the preceding Clause.

## SESSIONS, TERMS AND RETURNS

## SESSIONS.

34.—This Lodge shall hold its meetings weekly or fortnightly; on such evening and at such time as may be provided by its By-Laws; provided always, that as decided by the Grand Lodge of the United States, twenty-six nights' service be required as the term of office.

35.—Special Sessions may be called by the N. G., such noticed thereof being given as may be required by the By-Laws of the Lodge. The notice shall contain the particular reason for calling the same, and no business but that expressed in such notice shall be entered upon at such special meeting.

36 —No business shall be transacted at any regular or special: meeting unless at least five members of this Lodge be then present, nor otherwise than according to the Rules of Order, annexed to this Constitution.

37.—Members of other Lodges may be admitted as Visitors, provided they give the Pass-Word for the Term, present a proper Card, or are introduced by an Elective Officer of the Grand Lodge, or by any Representative to the G. L. U. S., from the Grand Lodge or Grand Encampment of Ontario.

38 This Lodge shall have no lower to resolve itself, at any time, into Committee of the Whole.

## TERMS.

39. —The Terms of this Lo Ige shall be Semi-Annual or Annual, as provided by its By-Laws, and shall commence on the first regular meetings in July and January respectively if semi-annual: and on the first regular meeting in January, if annual. Should the D.M., P. S., or Physician, be elected semi-annually, their Terms shall commence at the first regular meetings in July and January respectively; and, if annually, then at the first regular meeting in January.

40.—Every Term shall be held to close on the day on which the succeeding one may commence.

#### RETURNS.

41.—It shall be the duty of the last Past Officers to prepare and forward to the Grand Secretary of Ontario, immediately on the expiry of their term of Office, a regular return of the work of such Term, with the result of the Election of Officers, &c., in accordance with such blank form of semi-annual or annual return, as the Grand Lodge may from time to time direct to be used.

42.—Such semi-annual return shall be accompanied by the amount due the (iran) Lodge; the same being 25 cents for each unsuspended member on said return.

43 .- A fine of two dollars shall be payable by this Lodge for

every month that may elapse after the close of any semi-annual term previous to the Returns required by Clause 41 being placed in the possession of the Grand Lodge.

44.—Should this Lodge, or the Officers thereof, fail to make the Returns required by the preceding Clauses, for twelve months, it shall thereby become liable to the function of its Charter; and it shall be the duty of the last installed Officers, to transmit or surronder to the Grand Master, on requisition from him to that effect, (or to such other Brother as may be appointed, by the Grand Lodge or Grand Master to receive the same,) the Charter, books, papers, furniture and funds of the Lodge.

#### FUNDS.

#### CONTRIBUTIONS.

- 45.—There shall be two regular Funds of this Lodge, to be known respectively as the Widow. and Osphans Fund and the General Reneft Fund; and the Lodge may provide, by its By-laws, for the institution of a Special Fund or Funds for any of the benevolent purposes contemplated by the Order; provided always, that in the case of every such Special Fund the receipts and disbursements on account thereof shall be kept altogether distinct from the Regular Funds hereby established.
- 46.—The Entrance Fee of this Lodge must be paid in every case previous to the admission of the candidate, and shall not be less than five dollars.
- 47.—The charges for Degrees shall not be at a less rate than one dellar for each of the five Degrees; and all moneys received on account of Degree charges shall be applied to the General Benefit Fund.
- 48.—The contribution of each member to the regular Benefit Funds of this Lodge, shall be determined by the By-laws; such portion thereof shall be placed to the credit of the W. & O. Fund as the Lodge may see fit, provided it be not less than one-fifth nor

more than one-third, the remainder to be placed to the credit of the General Benefit Fund.

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49.—The Lodge shall have the power of exacting such fies for Visiting and Withdrawal Cards, and Dismissal Certificates, exc∈pt when otherwise provided by the G. L. U. S., (to be applied to the General Fund) and such fines for neglect of duty, &c, (to be applied to the Widows' and Orphans' Fund) as may be determined by the By-laws.

## DISBURSEMENTS.

50.—Every member, qualified as required by the By-laws, if rendered incapable of following his usual or oth r attainable occupation, by sickness or disability, not occasioned by drunkenness or other immoral conduct on his part, shall be entitled to receive from the General Fund, such weekly Sick Benefit as may be fixed by the By-laws; Provided always that the Lodge shall not be held to pay such Benefit for any term of sickness shorter than one week unless specially so provided by its By-laws.

51.—In case of the death of a Brother, qualified as require l by the By-laws, there shall be paid to his nearest of kin, or other legal representative, from the General Fund, towards defraying the funeral expenses, if any are incurred by the family or legal representatives, such sum as may be fixed by the By-laws of this Lodge, and the Lodge may also provide by its By-laws for the payment of a Funeral Benefit to a duly qualified Brother, on the demise of his wife, to assist in defraying the expenses of her funeral.

52.—The Lodge may, by its By-laws, make such provisions as shall seem meet for the relief of Brothers in a state of pecuniarydistress.

53.—The Lodge shall make such dispositions of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, for the relief and benefit of the Widows and Orphans of deceased Brothers of this Lodge, by annuity or otherwise, as it shall see fit.

#### PENALTIES.

54.—Any Brother who shall violate any of the principles of the Order, or infringe the Constitution or By-laws of this Lodge, shall be subject to be fined, apprimanded, suspended or expelled, as the By-laws may direct, ancient usage require, or the Lodge determine.

#### TRIALS.

55.—Every Brother charged with any offence involving reprimand, suspension or expulsion, (unless for non-payment of dues), shall be entitled to a fair trial, in accordance with the provisions of the Clauses following.

56.—No member of this Lodge shall be put on trial, unless charges duly specifying his alleged offence shall first be submitted to the Lodge, in writing, by one or more Brothers of the Order in good standing.

57.—Any charge or charges so preferred, shall be referred to a Committee of five Members, three of whom shall be a quorum, to be chosen by ballot; which Committee shall, with as little delay as the case will admit, summon the parties, and examine and determine the matter in question in accordance with the Constitution and Rules of Procedure on Trials. In selecting this Committee, only one name shall be written upon any ballot.

58.—Should the decision of the Committee not involve the suspension or expulsion of a member, and should no appeal be made "therefrom, it shall be final, without further action from the Lodge,

59.—Should the Committee be convinced of the necessity of suspending or expelling a Member, a motion to that effect shall be submitted to the Lodge by three or more of their number, in their name.

60.—Any motion for the suspension or expulsion of a Member shall be announced at the two regular meetings previous to that on which it is to be decided, which last meeting the Brother under

charge shall be summoned to attend; and at the time so appointed, whether the implicated Brother be present or not, the Lodge may proceed to consider and determine the question.

61.—The Lodge shall have the power, at the meeting appointed for the decision, to vary the penalty to one more or less severs than that contained in the motion submitted by the Committee.

(For the convenience of Lodges the Rules of Procedure on Trials are placed here, though not part of the Constitution.)

# RULES OF PROCEDURE ON TRIALS.

1st.—All charges against members of this Order shall be drawn substantially in the manner prescribed in "Form A," and be submitted direct to the Lodge of which the accused is a member, in duplicate, signed by a member of the Order in good standing. The general charge shall be an averment of "Conduct unbecoming an Old Fellow," followed by specification or specifications, stating the time place and circumstances of the offence or offences.

2d.—The Lodge shall, immediately after the reading of the charge, choose by ballot a Committee of five, as near as possible from among the peers of the accused, three of whom shall be a quorum, to whom the charge shall be referred. In selecting this Committee only one name shall be written upon any ballot, and the first elected shall be the convener thereof.

3d.—The accused or scenaer, or any member of the Lodge acting for either of them, may challenge, for cause, any name appearing on the ballot. The grounds of challenge shall be stated and considered by the Lodge, and a majority vote shall be necessary to sustain the objection made.

4th.—The Secretary shall affix the seal of the Lodge to one copy of the charge and specifications, and certify it substantially according to "Form B." and serve or cause the same to be served upon the accused, either personally or by leaving it at his usual place of residence. The Secretary shall also certify under Seal the duplicate charge and deliver it to the Convener of the Committee, with the notice, according to "Form C," of these rules.

5th.—The accused shall, within one week from the receipt by him of the charge and specifications, serve his plea or answer to the same upon the Convener of the Committee, by either or several of the answers shown in "Form E."

6th.—The Convener of the Committee shall, on receipt of the pleas in defence, or at the expiration of the time limited therefor, with reasonable diligence call a meeting of the Committee, to attend which the accuser and accused shall be served with personal notice if they can be found, or by leaving the same at their usual place of residence, according to "Form D," at least one week prior to the time affixed for trial.

7th.—At the meeting a Chairman and Secretary shall be appointed, and the trial proceed by examination of the parties and witnesses on their behalf. Either party may amend their proceedings, by leave of the Committee.

8th.—The report of the Committee shall state their finding on each specification of the charge, according to "For" F," and shall be accompanied by an accurate record of their proceedings, rulings and decisions, together with the original evidence taken during the trial, which shall be submitted to the Lodge within a reasonable time after the case has been submitted to them. Should there be a minority report, it may be presented in a similar manner at the same time. The minutes of the Committee should show—

- 1. The date and place of each meeting, and the parties present,
- II. The exceptions taken by either party, and the decisions thereon.
- III. Parol evidence in full, subscribed by the witnesses.
- IV. All documentary evidence, marked as exhibits.

9th.—The finding of the Committee shall be entered in the Lodge min utes by the Secretary, who shall forthwith notify both parties that the report has been submitted, and all parties shall be entitled to make a copy thereof.

10.—The Lodge shall take up the report for consideration at the regular meeting to be held two weeks after it has been submitted, and may amend, affirm or reverse the finding of the Committee upon any one or all of the allegations in the charge or their ruling thereon.

11th.—The final decision of the Lodge shall be notified to both parties by the Secretary, immediately.

12th.—Bither party may appeal from the decision of the Lodge to the Grand Lodge, within three months from the action of the Lodge thereon.

The Lodge shall transmit to the Grand Secretary a copy of all the proceedings, regularly certified, upon receiving the costs and charges of copying and mailing the same.

#### SECTION II.

#### EVIDENCE AND WITNESSES.

- i.—The evidence competent to be admitted before the Committee of trial shall be—
- a. Parol evidence (i. c., testimony of living witnesses before the Committee,)
  - b. Depositions, procured in the manner prescribed by the Grand Lodge of the United States.
    - c. Regularly certified minutes of Lodge.
  - d. Regularly proved documentary evidence. Hearsay evidence cannot be received. The Committee will determine the admissibility of evidence offered, subject to exception by either party. The exceptions so taken shall be noted by the Committee upon its minutes.
  - 2.— Members of the Order shall testify under their obligations as Odd Fellows, according to "Form G.," to be administered by the Chairman of the Committee.
  - 3.—Depositions of absent witnesses shall be procured by interrogatories and cross-interrogatories, in the form prescribed by the Grand Lodge of the United States, subject to objection by either party, to be determined by the Committee.
  - 4.—The attendance of witnesses must be procured by the party desiring to call them.
  - 5.—Any member of the Order refusing or neglecting to give evidence or produce documentary evidence in his possession, upon the application of the party requiring his testimony, shall then be required by the Committee to give such evidence, and if he still refuses, after being so required by the Committee to give or produce such evidence, he shall be reported to his Lodge, which Lodge shall take such action as they may deem necessary to compel the production of such evidence.

## DECLARATION OF WITNESS.

#### APPRALS.

62.—Any Member shall have the right to appeal to the Lodge from the decision of a Committee, given under Clause 58; and notice of the meeting appointed for trying the appeal shall be given at least one regular meeting previous.

63.—On the evening appointed, the Committee shall present to the Lodge, in writing, the grounds on which their decision was founded, and the parties interested shall have the privilege of being heard before the Lodge; and the decision shall then be confirmed, annulled or modified, as a majority of the members present shall determine.

64.—Any Member interested shall have the right of appeal to the Grand Lodge of Ontario, provided such appeal be forwarded to the Grand Scoretary within three months from the date of the final. action of the Lodge on the matter to be appealed against; and the Lodge shall be required to provide the appellant with a copy of all the proceedings in the case, regularly certified, upon receiving the costs and charges of copying and mailing the same; which charges shall be refunded to the appellant in the event of his appeal being sustained

#### RE-INSTATEMENT.

65.—When any Brother, suspended for a definite period, for any other cause than non-payment of dues, desires to be reinstated before the expiration of his suspension, his case shall be referred to a Committee of five Brothers, who, after due investigation, shall report at the next regular meeting; and if a majority of the members then present shall vote in his favor, he shall thereupon be declared eligible for re-instatement, and, with the consent of the Grand Lodge, may be re-instated.

66.—No Brother shall be re-instated until he shall have paid any arrearages against him at the time of his suspension, and all dues that may have accrued since then, except in cases of suspension for non-payment of dues.

67.—No Brother who has been legally expelled, or who has ceased to be a member for non-payment of dues, except members of defunct Lodges, and those possessing dismissal certificates, shall be again admitted to membership in any Lodge of this Order without the consent of the Lodge from which he was expelled or dropped, and in no case shall he be re-admitted without compliance with all the forms for new applicants, excepting the ceremony of initiation.

68.—Any Brother suspended for non-payment of dues, may at any time prior to six months thereafter, become re-instated in his Lodge upon payment of the amount due by him at the date of his suspension, together with such sum as may have accrued since that time. Any Brotherso suspended for six months, shall cease to be a member.

## REGALIA AND JEWELS.

## REGALIA.

69.—The regalia of the Order shall be as follows, to wit: Collars of Subordinate Lodges shall be white, trimmed with the emblematical color of the degree intended to be represented, namely: First degree, white; second degree, pink; third degree, blue; fourth degree, green; fifth degree, scarlet; rosettes of the appropriate colors can be worn on the collars. Among those who may have attained the Royal Purple Degree, rosettes composed of black; yellow and purple, may be worn on the collar either in connection with the other colors or as a separate rosette. The Noble Grand shall wear a scarlet collar; Vice Grand, blue collar; Secretary, green collar; Treasurer, green collar; each of them trimmed with white or silver. Supporters of Noble Grand, scarlet sashes; of the Vice Grand, blue sashes; Warden and Conductor, black sashes; Scene Supporters, white sashes; Chaplain, white sash; Outside Guardian, red sash; Inside Guardian, blue sash.

#### JEWELS.

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70.—The jewel of a P. G. is a five-pointed star; of Noble Grand, crossed gavels; of Vice-Giand, hour glass; of Secretary, crossed pens; of Treasurer, crossed keys: of Warden, crossed axes; of Conductor-crossed wands; of Guardian, crossed swords; Supporters of the N. G., a wand having branching arms connected with three links, and encompassing a gavel; Supporters of the V. G., a wand arranged same as that of the Supporters of the N. G., encompassing a hour glass; Seene Supporter, arranged in same manner, encompassing a burning torch; Chaplain, arranged in same manner, encompassing a bible; all to be of white metal. Past Grands, having the Royal Purple Degree, may have trimmings of yellow.

## FUNERAL REGALIA.

71.—Funeral regalia consists of a black crape rosette, having a centre of the color of the highest degree to which the wearer has attained, to be worn on the left breast, with a sprig of evergreen

above, and such jewel or jewels as the Br ther may be entitled to wear, suspended below. But the Lodge may wear the ordinary regalia at funerals, either in connection with, or as a substitute for this simple regulia, by obtaining a dispensation from the Grand Ma-ter or D. D. G. M.

72.—The ordinary mourning badge to be worn in memory of a deceased Brother, is a strip of black crape passed through one but ton hole of the left lappel of the coat, tied with a narrow ribbon of the color of the highest degree the wearer has attained. To be worn for one month.

73.—Past Officers and Members of the Encampment Degrees, and all other Members of the Order, when visiting Grand or Subordinate Lodges or Encampments, are entitled to wear the regalia and jewels pertaining to the highest degree they have taken.

## BY LAWS, ETC.

#### BY-LAWS.

74.—This Lodge shall stand fully invested with the power to adopt from time to time, such By-Laws and Resolutions as may be deemed expedient; provided they do not in any wise contravene any part of this Constitution, the Constitution and By-Laws of the Grand Lodge of Ontario, or the principles or customs of the Order.

75.—All such By-Laws shall be immediately forwarded, in duplicate, to the Grand Secretary, authenticated by the Seal of the Lodge, and the signature of its N. G., and Secretary; one copy to be retained by the Grand Lodge, and the other to be returned to the Lodge, certified as approved, or otherwise, as the case may be, and no such By-laws shall be operative until approved by the Grand Lodge, or in its recess, by its Committee on Laws of Subordinates.

## AMENDMENTS.

76.—This Constitution, or any part thereof, shall not be altered, amended, suspended or annulled, unless by action of the Grand Lodge of Ontario.

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## RULES OF ORDER

Rule I.—As soon as the Presiding Officer shall have taken the Chair, the Officers and Brothers present shall take their respective stations, and the Lodge shall then be opened in ancient form.

Rule II.—The order of procedure after opening, shall be as follows:

- 1.—The calling of the Roll of Officers.
- 2.—The reading by the Secretary of the Minutes of the last Lodge night; the consideration of any objections which may be made to any part thereof, and their approval, with or without amendment, as the case may require.
- The consideration of any excuses which may be offered by Absentees from previous meetings.
- 4.—The receiving and consideration of any Reports from the Visiting Committee, or from other Brothers who may have to report the fact of any Brother being sick or in distress.
- 5.—The nomination or election of Officers, on the evening designated for such nomination or election.
- 6.—The receiving and consideration of reports of Committees on Character, and balloting thereon.
  - 7.—The Initiation of Candidates for Membership.

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- 8.—The receiving of Propositions for Membership, and their reference to Committees on Character.
- The receiving and consideration of any Reports of Officers or Standing Committees, which may require to be made in pursuance of the By-laws.
- 10.—The receiving and consideration of any Reports of Special Committees, in the order of their seniority.
- 11.—The Reading and consideration of Accounts and other Communications in the hands of the Secretary.

12.—Good and Welfare being first, Unfinished business, in order of priority at former meetings; and secondly, New Business.

18 .- The closing of the Lodge.

RULE III.—Any member offering a motion must do so in writing, if a request to that effect be made by the Secretary, the Presiding Officer, or the Lodge.

Rule IV.—No question shall be put by the Presiding Officer, unless regularly moved and seconded; nor be open for consideration until so put; and, when put, no other motion shall be receivable, unless it be a motion—

- 1-To adjourn ;
- 2-To lay on the table;
- 8-To put the previous question;
- 4-To postpone ;
- 5-To refer; or
- 6-To amend.

These several motions, if made, shall have precedence in the order above stated, and the first, second and third thereof, shall be decided without debate.

Rule V.—The previous question shall be put from the chair, only after it shall have been ascertained that the call therefor is sustained by a majority of the members of the Lodge present, and shall then always be put in the words following: "Shall the question be now put?" which words shall be understood to have reference to whatever question may be pending immediately before such call for the previous question may have been made.

RULE VI.—If the vote of the Lodge, taken pursuant to such call for the previous question, be in the affirmative, the Presiding Officer shall thereupon forthwith put to vote the question so pending, immediately before such call, and shall allow no amendment or further debate thereon; and if, on the other hand

the vote of the Lodge be in the negative, the Presiding Officer shall be thereby precluded from putting to vote, during the remainder of the current term, the question so pending as aforesaid.

RULE VII.—Any member may require the division of a question, when the sense will admit of it.

RULE VIII.—When a blank is to be filled, the question shall first be taken on the highest sum or number, and longest or latest time proposed.

Rule IX.—The Yeas and Nays shall be taken and recorded on the call of any member, duly seconded.

RULE X.—After any question, except that of indefinite postponement or the previous question, may have been decided, any two members, having voted in the majority, may, at the same or next regular meeting, move for a re-consideration thereof; but no discussion on the main question shall be allowed upon such motion.

Rule XI.—Any question decided by the Lodge shall not again be brought before it, otherwise than by re-consideration, as provided in the foregoing Rule, unless notice thereof shall have been given at the meeting immediately preceding: and such notice shall not be received during the term in which the question has been decided.

RULE XII.—Every member shall have the privilege of speaking twice on any question, but not oftener, unless by permission of the Presiding Officer.

RULE XIII.—Any Brother intending to speak on a question shall rise in his place and respectfully address the Presiding Officer, confining himself to the question, and avoiding personalities; and should more than one Brother rise to speak at the same time, the Presiding Officer shall determine which is entitled to the floor.

RULE XIV.—The Presiding Officer, or any member, may call a Brother to order while speaking; and, in such case, the debate shall be forthwith suspended, and the Brother so called to order shall not proceed, until the point of order thus raised be determined, nor speak upon such point of order, unless it be to make necessary explanation, or appeal from the decision of the Chair.

RULE XV.—In all cases where a member may appeal from the decision of the Chair, he shall use the words following, and none other, unless it be for necessary explanation:—"N. G., I respectfully appeal from the decision of the Chair to the Lodge," and the Lodge shall, after such explanation from the Presiding Officer as he may deem necessary, proceed forthwith to consider and vote upon the question:—"Will the Lodge sustain the decision of the Chair I"

Rule XVI.—Any Brother who may have been called to order for manifestation of temper, or improper feeling, must apologize to the Lodge or to any aggrieved party, if required so to do by the Presiding Officer; and shall not speak again on the pending question, except to explain or apologize, unless specially permitted so to do by the Presiding Officer.

RULE XVII.--The Presiding Officer of the Lodge may, at any time, require all members present to vote upon any pending question, or may excuse any member or members from so doing.

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Rule XVIII.—Brothers, not members of this Lodge, may address the Lodge, or receiving permission to that effect from the Presiding Officer.

RULE XIX.—No Brother shall retire while the Lodge is open; without the permission of the Presiding Officer.

RULE XX.—A motion to suspend or alter the Order of Procedure, as contained in Rule II., for the remainder of a meeting, may, at any time, be carried by a vote of not less than two-thirds of the members present and voting thereon; but no motion to sus-

pend or alter such Order of Procedure for a longer term, shall at any time be put to vote.

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RULE XXI.—These Rules, or any part thereof, shall only be altered, amended, suspended, or annulled (except in the case provided for by Rule XX.), by action of the Grand Lodge of Ontario.

## CONSTITUTION

AND GENERAL REGULATIONS FOR THE FORMATION AND GOVERNMENT OF DEGREE LODGES.

1.—Whenever it may appear to the brethen of any Lodge or Lodges in any city or town under the jurisdiction of the R. W. Grand Lodge of Ontario, that it would be consistent with the interests of the Order to establish a Degree Lodge in such place, it shall be proper for them to authorize ten brothers of the Scarlet Degree to make a written application to this Grand Lodge to that effect.

2.—Such application shall be signed by the full number of the brethren so authorized: and shall be accompanied by the Charter Fee, \$5; by a certificate from the D. D. G. M., that the petitioners are properly qualified, and by a certificate over the Seal of the Lodge or Lodges with which they are connected, that they are members in good standing, and that they have been duly authorized by their Lodge or Lodges to apply for such Charter.

On receipt of a formal application for a Charter as above required, the Grand Master may issue a Warrant for the immediate establishment of a Degree Lodge.

4.—As soon as the necessary authority shall have been obtained from the Grand Master, the D. D. G. M. shall summon all Scarlet Degree members in good standing in their Lodge or Lodges, and proceed with the institution of the Lodge and the election and installation of the officers, after the momer and form prescribed for the same.

- 5.—A Degree Lodge shall be composed of members in good standing in the Order of the Scarlet Degree, resident within the jurisdiction of the Degree Lodge, and all business (except that of conferring the 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th Degrees of this Order), shall be transacted when open in the Scarlet Degree, and five members shall constitute a quorum.
- 6.—The Elective Officers of a Degree Lodge shall be a Degree Master, Deputy Degree Master, 1st Assistant Deputy Degree Master, 2nd Assistant Deputy Degree Master, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually by a majority of the votes polled for that purpose.
- 7.—Nominations for Elective Officers shall be made upon the last two meetings in the Term, and the election shall be held upon the last regular meeting in the Term, and the Iustallation of Officers shall take place on the first regular meeting of the succeeding term.
- 8.—The Appointed Officers shall be a Warden, Conductor, and Outside and Inside Guardians, to be appointed by the Degree Master, upon the night of his installation.

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- 9.—No brother shall be eligible for the office of Degree Master or Deputy Degree Master, who is not a P. G. in good standing in some Subordinate Lodge of this Order in Ontario.
- 10.—Loss of good standing, suspension or expulsion from membership in a Subordinate Lodge, shall at once similarly affect the member's standing in the Degree Lodge, and re-instatement in the Subordinate shall work re-instatement in the Degree Lodge.
- 11.—The Degree Master shall preside, and shall have power to convene special meetings, and perform such other duties as are prescribed by the official obligations and the usages of the Order.

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12.—The Deputy Degree Master shall occupy the usual position of the V. G., assist the Degree Master in the discharge of his duties, and in his absence shall preside.

13.—The 1st A. D. D. Master, 2nd A. D. D. Master, Treasurer, Warden, Conductor, Inside and Outside Guardian, shall perform the duties assigned to them at their installation, and by the usages of the Order.

14.—The Secretary shall keep accurate minutes of the transactions of the Degree Lodge; he shall conduct all correspondence, and report promptly to their respective Lodges the names of brothers upon whom Degrees are conferred, and also the date and the name or names, or numbers of the Degrees conferred. He shall make out for the Grand Lodge, at the first regular meeting in each term, a report of the Officers for the current term, and the number of each Degree conferred, and also of the funds of the Degree Lodge, particularizing the sources whence such funds have been derived. He shall enter in a separate book or record, the name of every brother receiving Degrees, together with the name of his Lodge, and date of receiving the said Degrees, and perform such other duties as are prescribed by his charge of office, and the laws and usages of the Order.

15.—The application of a brother for any Degree, with the fee for the same, must be received by his Subordinate Lodge, in which Lodge he shall be balloted for by the members of the Degree for which he applies, when opened in that Degree. If three, or more, black balls appear, he shall be declared rejected, otherwise he shall be deemed eligible, and a certificate to that effect shall be granted him, which certificate, on being presented to the Degree Lodge, shall be its authority for conferring the Degree or Degrees applied for.

16.—A Degree Lodge may, with the consent of two-thirds of the members of the Subordinate Lodge or Lodges connected with it, present and voting at a regular meeting of such Subordinate Lodge or Lodges, charge its members an entrance fee and stated dues. Should no fees or dues be charged, the expenses of the Degree Lodge shall be borne by the Subordinate Lodge or Lodges to which the Degree members belong.

17.—A Subordinate Lodge may provide by its By-Laws for the payment to the Degree Lodge of a part or the whole of the regular charge for the Degrees.

18.—Any Degree Lodge shall have power to adopt necessary By-Laws, rules and regulations for its government, conformable to this Constitution, and to the Constitution and Laws of the Grand Lodge of Ontario, and the laws and usages of this Order.

19.—Degree Lodges shall be subject to all the laws applying to Subordinate Lodges in the matter of sessions, terms, returns, trials, and penalties, and forfeiture of Charter; except that they shall not be required to pay per capita tax to the Grand Lodge.

## CONSTITUTION

AND GENERAL REGULATIONS FOR THE FORMATION AND GOVERNMENT OF REBEKAH DEGREE LODGES.

1.—Rebekah Degree Lodges may be instituted on the application of ten or more persons in possession of that Degree, five of witom shall be members in good standing of some Subordinate Lodge or Lodges in this Jurisdiction, and five wives of Scarlet Degree members in good standing in the Order. Such application shall be signed by the applicants, and shall be accompanied by the Charter Fee of \$5, by certificate of qualification from the Lodges to which the applicants or their husbands may belong, and by a recommendation from the Lodge or Lodges in the city or town from which the application comes.

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of ate Deion by the and 2.—Rebekah Degree Lodges shall have power to confer the Degree of Rebekah on such Scarlet Degree members and their wives as present certificates from Subordinate Lodges within this Jurisdiction; and also upon widows of Odd Fellows presenting certificates from Lodges of which their husbands were rembers at the time of their decease. No fee shall be charged for conferring such Degree, but the Lodge may ordain fees of admission and dues, to be paid by all who may be admitted to membership.

3.—Rebekah Degree Lodges shall have power to adopt such By-Laws and Rules of Order as they may see fit; provided always, that no such By-Laws or Rules of Order shall become operative until after they have been approved by the Grand Lodge of Ontario, or in its recess, by its Committee on Laws of Subordinates.

4.—Rebekah Degree Lodges shall be subject to all the laws applying to subordinate Lodges in the matter of sessions, torms, returns, trials and penalties, and forfeiture of Charter; excepting that they shall not be required to pay a per capita tax to this Grand Lodge.

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
