False Prophecy and False Doctrine.

The Sun came out in full view on Monday last. The single issue of that day hit all around the camp of the hated "Grits." The bones of the late Hon. George Brown were turned over as tribute to a general onslaught upon the late Administration. "Messrs. Isaac Burpee and Charles W. Weldon" were called upon to reproduce a circular issued by them, during the election contest of 1878, in which they stated that the proposed N. P. would make the price of flour higher than it then was.

It is true that a larger number of ships were in port at one time during the present season than at any previous date, but that was owing to the backwardness of the season, by which the spring fleet was prevented from making its way to the Gulf. There will not, however, be as many ships loaded in the Miramichi this year as there were in 1877—the year preceding that in which the Tories regained power. The statement that any lumber merchant on the Miramichi "never made so much money" as the ex-officio member of the National Policy, but that is in a vein of ignorant impertinence which few journals would care to imitate.

The Sun may be near right in supposing that there are now "not over 7,000 people" in the port. Five years ago it was estimated that there were from 9,000 to 10,000, but since 1878 there has been such an out-going of the people, particularly of young men and women—to the United States, as must have reduced our population very materially. Still it is to be hoped that the Sun overstates the exodus.

We had occasion, last week, to refer to the boasting of the Sun over its absurd inference that the N. P. had increased the number of ships in the port. It puts forth the same statement and erroneous idea in closing the above-quoted paragraph concerning the Miramichi lumber business and we cannot but express the correct view entertained of its position, in this regard, than by repeating what we said in reply. When the Sun and other Protectionist organs claim credit for their policy because there is an increasing demand for lumber in Great Britain, it is not a great compliment to the intelligence of their readers. The Rise in Bank and Other Stocks. The St. John Telegraph says:—As before hinted in an article on another subject, the Montreal market lately made great gains, and it is not surprising that the St. John market has also advanced. The increase in value in the bank and other stocks in six months. The increase amounted to nearly \$3,000,000.

A Paradox. In one Report of the Speech made by Sir John Macdonald we find the following:—"They had encouraged the industries, and now they desire to encourage trade, and they desire to encourage trade through High Commissioner Galt, and with the strong assistance of the British Government. NEW YORK, July 17. The temporary injunction obtained by the Direct United States to retain certain wharves throughout New York from proceeding to adjudicate upon certain claims made by the Dominion Telegraph Co. of Canada—notably the right of possession by them under their agreement with the Direct Cable Co. to compel the said cable company to charge as low a tariff rate for their cable as may be charged by the Anglo or any other competing company—has been dissolved by Judge Donohue on the preliminary objection, that the articles of agreement under which the suit is brought by the Direct company, are not under the jurisdiction of the American courts, but under that of the courts of England.
