### LET THE PROBE SINK DEEPER.

The best of laws may be placed on the statute book, but if they are poorly administered or mal-administered they may better never have been enacted. The best of policies may be laid down for the guidance of our fiscal affairs, and for the development and safeguarding of our great national interests, but if these are weakly that an awakened electorate will expect and enforce carried out or corruptly administered, they fail of effect, and become in fact prolific of evil. It is, therefore, not done on the platform where policies are enunciated, nor in Parliament, where laws are made that the test nor in Parliament, where laws are made, that the test of a party or of a public man is to be applied, but in the department where, in pursuance of the powers given and the money provided, the minister administers the trust reposed in him. If administration is incompetent

areas of the most available sources of fuel and lumber supply in the West. The arable lands were next at-tacked, and large tracts were sold for a song to party friends, not omitting members of Parliament, who friends, not omitting members of Parliament, who straightway marketed them upon the actual settler at advances of from 100 to 1,000 per cent. The beneficiaries made fortunes out of it. Coal and mineral lands were then taken up, and, under the facilities provided, valuable areas of these resources of the nation were distributed to favorites and friends. Great fishing areas aggregating 15,311 square miles were leased to lawers and newspaper editors, and others for periods varying from 5 to 21 years, for less, in all, than \$300 per year. These areas covered the best fishing grounds of the Eastern Northwest, and the speculators straightway proceeded to market their franchises to the best possible advantage.

Then came in order the fertile field of contract mon-

Then came in order the fertile field of contract mongering, where the middleman and the party steerer came in. The five cents per cubic yard tacked on to the Mayes contractor who got all he wanted to pay his labor and give him his profit out of his 50 cents per cubic yard. It came out of the public treasury, and according to Mr. Mayes' affidavits, was brought to birth in consequence of the shrewd advice given by one William Pugsley shortly afterwards, and during the working out of the contract, the Minister of Public Works. Another phase is illustrated by the Lodge and Pearson transactions, when a guileless and confiding Minister of Railways allows these clever partisans to turn into their pockets tens of thousands of dollars of the people's money by a shrewd divination of the exact lands the minister designs to purchase, a paper transaction of option and purchase and a prompt re-sale to the finisher of public Works. The Kentville rifle range was wrought out on similar lines with the Minister of Militia, and Mr. Dodge, the minister's bosom friend, pooketed a neat \$5,841. When newspapers were to be acquired for the party, the contract scheme was worked with charming case. The minister who purchased the

A nice little arrangement for printing, given out to men who had no printing plant, netted the favored Pearson some \$7,155, being a 25 per cent. advance over the sub-contractor's bills. And so on, through Strubbe's file deal, which stocked up the Marine Department for a quarter of a century and incidentally gave Strubbe a rake-off of \$2,471; through Merwin's rake-offs of 34 to 187 per cent.; through sub-target payments of \$250 for each machine which cost \$64 at the Sherbrooke foundry; through Sawdust Wharf purchases up to the big deals through Sawdust Wharf purchases up to the big deals of the Grand Trunk Pacific, where earth turned to rock, and loose rock to solid in strange defiance of all geological conditions, but with immense profit to the fortunate contractors in whose areas nature worked these

This astonishing condition of things has existed for more than a decade, and the printing and stationery revelation is proof that it still exists. Graft, peculation, rake-offs, commission taking, contract shaving, false certification by officials, open thieving under the very eyes of the ministers, and although it is hard to believe it, yet it is absolutely true that from the beginning of their administration until the present every demand for administration until the present, every demand for thorough examination by unpartisan and business men has been denied by the Government. Of all the long and humiliating list of cases, limited and partial, and partisan investigation has been allowed only in the Arctic, the Hodgins, and the Lumsden charges, one partial limited investigation by Judge Cassels—all others have been cynically, curtly, and defiantly denied.

There are two great functions of government: legislation and administration, and of these the latter is certainly not unimportant. Indeed, in some respect it may be held to be the more important of the two. The best of laws may be placed on the statute book, the first appropriate and competency and competency and competency and the great spending departments. 





### MARKET TAKEN UP WITH R.R. **STOCKS**

New York, N. Y., Nov. 28.—A number of factors combined to cause acute weakness of stocks today, some positive and some merely passive. The most significant fact in the day's greatly expanded dealings, however, was that United States Steel, Union Pacific and Reading held to the full the overwhelming preponderance of tetrity over the whole market combined which have characterized these stocks for weeks on end. This fact offered convincing evidence that repressal of position by the small group of wealthy speculators and bankers, who have practically carried the whole of recent markets was in progress. The fact which seems to have most influence on this action by the leading speculative forces, was the pesimistic interview sent from St. Paul osterday with Chairman James J. Hill, of the Great Northern Railway. An effective and timely supplement to Mr. Hill's interview in forcing the decline in prices, was the tone of advices from the iron and steel trade.

Mr. Hill's specifications of diminished requirements of his own system for material were taken as fairly typical of general conditions, Reports that the woontracts for steel products are still falling behind current shipments, with consequent curtailment of operations, did not point to the expected revival of demand from the railroads. The disappointing action of Lehigh Valley on its introduction to the New York stock exchange was a more passive influence on the day's weakness, out not less effective on that account. This stock, of a par value of \$50 having become familiar on the Philadelphia stock exchange for quotations in dollars, became subject to the New York rule of quotation of percentage value. The closing price of Saturday in Philadelphia being 94½, was translated into New York terms of 183½, therefore and the fluctuations were accordingly doubled in range.

### SEAMEN TELL THRILLING STORY OF RESCUE BY MOUNT TEMPLE

Capt. William Coffil of Wrecked Schooner Lone Star and Two Sons Spent Two Desperate Days Drifting in Bay--Returned to Grand Manan Homes-Winter Port Notes.

After a good passage the big C. P. R. liner Mount Temple arrived in port yesterday afternoon and docked at 2 o'clock at No. 1 berth, Sand Point. She cama Trom Londoor and 'Antwerp direct and brought to this port 677 passengers of which 532 were destined for Canada and the remainder for the United States. All boarded the steamer at Antwerp and all were continentals being made up of Swedes, Russians, Belglans and Hungarians. They were a fairly good looking lot and except for a few mild cases of measles, the steamer had a clean bill of health. The Mount Temple also had a fairly large cargo.

The voyage from the Belgian port was without incident until the steamer was entering the bay yesterday morning. Then it tell to the lot of Captain Moore and his men to play the part of life savers to three wrecked fishermen from the little schooner. Was wrecked during the gale of Saturday morning. Since that time the big steamer hove in sight and rescued them. They were brought to this port in the steamer. The schooner Lone Star was built at Halifax in 1866 and still halled from that port.
