

IRISH LOCAL GOVEPNMENT.

THE BILL INTRODUCED IN PARLIAMENT. LONDON, Feb. 18.—Mr. Balfour in-troduced the Irish Local Government troduced the Irish Local Government Bill in the Howse of Commons this afternoon. The announcement of the bill met with cheers from the Government supporters. Mr. Balfour said ever since the formation of the present Government, and even before, the extension of local government to every part of the United Kingdom had been a cardinal point of the Conservatives' policy. That intention had been constantly a thered to and reiterated since by the Government. They had introduced Local Government bills for England and Scotland. If they had not done the same for Ireland it must have been besame for Ireland it must have been be-cause great specific and obvious dangers attended such a course. The present bill was not merely a county councils bill, but it was what in England would be described as a district and countres bill. By its provisions administrative duties will be given to baronial councils, leaving wholly unt uched the judicial duties now entrusted to the grand jury. The members of the county and baronial years. The Government proposed fol lowing the Scotch rather than the English measure in the matter of aldermen There undoubtedly existed a large body of people in Ireland who dreaded a measure of this kind. 




