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THE TURF.

Trotting and Running at York Driving Park.

Two Days' Successful and Satisfactory Sports.

Mr. Reid Carries Out His Long Programme in its Entirety.

The second heat in the two mile running race resulted the same as the first, Yorktown first, Goldin Maxim second, and Lily Havelock third. Maxim had a very close second.

Pony Steeple Chase—Purse \$25.
Capt. O'Neill, R. A. Halifax, "Honest Injun," colors, dark blue, gold belt and cap, ridden by owner, weight 12 stone.
Mr. Knox, R. A. Halifax, "Why Not," colors, chocolate and blue, ridden by owner, weight 12 stone.
Mr. Genderson, R. A. Halifax, "Stella," colors, light blue and dark blue, ridden by Mr. Arkwright, weight 11 stone.
Capt. Dawson, Halifax, "Hunchback," ridden by owner, weight 10 stone 7 lbs.
Mr. Arkwright, R. A. Halifax, "Mittie," colors, light blue, ridden by Mr. Crockett, 10 stone.

This race, by mutual agreement, was decided in one heat. It was a very pretty race and formed the greatest attraction during the day. Capt. O'Neill's "Honest Injun" took the lead from the start and kept it to the finish, taking the hurdles very gracefully. Stella and Hunchback followed closely, while Why Not and Mittie experienced considerable difficulty in leaping the hurdles. The novelty of the race made it particularly attractive to many of the spectators, but there was little local interest, all of the entries being from Halifax. The finish was as follows:—
Honest Injun, Capt. O'Neill, 1st; Stella, Mr. Genderson, 2nd; Hunchback, Capt. Dawson, 3rd; Why Not, R. Knox, 4th; and Mittie, Mr. Arkwright, 5th.

2 1/2 Trotting Race—Purse \$1 25.
In the seven entries in this race there were five to start, viz.—ch. s. "Johnny G," H. M. Grant, Canterbury; b. g. "Crockshank," Ben Chase Woodstock; b. m. "Lucy Douglas," A. C. Taylor, Woodstock; blk. g. "Billy Mack," M. Jackson, Eastport; and s. "Sir Garnet," A. L. Shipp, Truro.

In the first heat in this contest Sir Garnet took the lead from the pole and led to the finish, "Billy Mack," driven by Dave Stockford of Fredericton, kept a good second under the most trying circumstances, for just as the word "go" was given, one of the traces came unhitched which the driver grasped with his left hand and held both of it over the whole course. Mr. Jackson counted Dave out of the race when this unfortunate accident occurred, but he drove on, and reins in hand, to win second position. In the second heat the race was much the same as before. There was a lively struggle between Crockshank and Johnny G. for third place which was secured by the former. In the third heat Sir Garnet again went to the front from the first, and his long and graceful stride made him a great favorite with the spectators. Billy Mack was allowed to take it easy, and on the home stretch there was a pretty tuck and neck race between him and the former having a slight advantage at the close of the command of his driver.

Four Year Old Class.
Of the six entries in this race five horses started. These were Thistle, Governor Douglas, Maud C, Maud F, and Goldstone. This was one of the most keenly contested races during the meeting and none was watched with greater interest. In the first heat Maud F, who was driven by his owner, got a long lead during the first half mile and the gap was closed to within a few yards at the finish by Maud C. Thistle got third place, Goldstone fourth, and Governor Douglas brought up the rear. After the first heat, there was much talk and betting going on over the two colts Maud F and Maud C, and excitement was high when the second heat was started. Maud F again took the lead and maintained it to the home stretch when Maud C rapidly came on her, coming within a few yards of her with only a yard or two to spare. A new interest was also aroused in this race for Governor Douglas, who was driven by his owner in the first heat, was taken in charge by Dave Stockford who brought him in a good third amid the shouts of the spectators; Goldstone was fourth and Thistle last.

Darkness prevented this race being finished on Tuesday and the final heats were postponed until the following morning at 10.30.

Second Day—Wednesday.
The second day of the races opened fine and continued so pleasantly throughout the entire day. At half-past ten in the morning the officials and a hundred or more of sporting men were on hand to witness the final heats in the four year old class. Both the favorite colts had new drivers, Maud F being driven by C. Bell and Maud C by A. L. Shipp, and as both of them were professional drivers the interest quite naturally became more intense. Stockford still had charge of Douglas and Thistle was withdrawn from the competition. The third heat resulted in a victory for Maud F. Maud C made a bad break at the half mile point, and was unable to close the long gap. Douglas got third position again, in spite of a number of breaks. The fourth heat was the most exciting race of the day and still left the race unfinished for Maud C was the winner this time. Maud F had the lead again until the last turn when Maud C, collared her and the brush from that to the finish was one of the finest races ever witnessed, the latter winning by a neck. Another heat had to be called to declare the winner. The other colts were drawn from the contest and the two champions and their steady drivers had the field to themselves. The fifth heat resulted in a draw, time 2:47. There was considerable delay in securing for the sixth heat and when at last they were sent off,

FREE BAPTIST CONFERENCE.

The Doctrine of Entire Sanctification—A Scriptural Discussion on the Whole Question.

On Tuesday evening the secretary submitted the report of the executive committee to the conference. It showed that six members were absent. Rev. E. S. Jones, our oldest minister, is one of them. He should be excused on account of his age. Rev. J. S. Jones should be excused, and our sympathy and prayers should be for him in his present infirm state of health. Rev. S. H. Wrennan, we learn, is in poor health, and should be excused. Rev. John H. Erb, who is in Texas for his health, no doubt, is with us in heart although not in person. We are glad to learn his health is so far improved that he can labor in that climate, and that doors are opening before him to be useful there. As Rev. J. S. Jones is laboring in Nova Scotia he will be transferred to the general conference of the F. C. B. church in that province. Rev. S. W. Shaw has been absent now two years and should be excused by this conference.

Rev. Mr. McDonald claimed that he had not departed from the spirit of the resolution passed two years ago. He believed the matter should be recommitted. He would like to have some voice in expressing to the public what he believed. He believed the Lord perfected him in love and he preached that. He did not use what people call extravagance in his teaching. In his conference sermon he stated everything he preached. After hearing that sermon he did not think he could be accused of preaching extravagance.

"Question" was then called on the amendment to refer back the first action, the first motion being to adopt the resolution.

The amendment was voted down and the original motion carried.

On Tuesday and Wednesday it was found that Rev. J. S. Jones had voted for the resolution and 23 against.

Sections 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 were adopted without discussion. Section 7 was slightly amended in the report maintaining that it was a censure upon them.

Rev. Jos. McLeod could not see why, under the circumstances, any member of his church to get sanctified during the year. There was no reply.

TOBY CONVENTION IN NEWBURY.

A Bakers' Dozen of Ex-Officials Paid. Pursuant to notice the "Independent Electors" of Newbury met at the county court house at Newbury Tuesday afternoon for the purpose of choosing a candidate to contest the county against the Liberals. At this much talked of convention, there were present 15 persons present to transact the business, 11 electors and two others who have no votes, but are living in hopes, that they soon will have. Ex-Sheriff Mitchell presided and ex-Sheriff White acted as secretary. The bakers' dozen had considerable of a squabble over the choice of a candidate, but finally it was decided that the audience, although large and respectable in some instances, was not quite representative enough for nominating a candidate to go to Ottawa. The four adjacent parishes only were represented, and by ex-scholars, defeated candidates and ex-scholars. Finally, after a long gathering before adjourning, however, decided to hunt up a candidate in the county, and large committees of absentees were appointed for this purpose.

The show ended with a very exciting 4-round set-to between Gibbons and his young brother, the latter holding his own well with his big brother.
