PRISON REPORT FOF 1873.

The Reformatory at Penete graines, has not been used to such an atom of formerly, and apparently receives not more than a tenth of our criminals under 16 years of age. It is said to think that 323 lads, under 16, were during the year committed to our common gaols, while only 31 were sent to the Reformatory. Juvenile crime is, we are informed, grustely on the increase, and our common gaols are for boys simply schools of vice.

In fourteen years only 676 oys have been sent to the Reformatory. So that really the use made of such a means of punishment and amendment has been so limited as not to give it a fair trial. The expense for the year was 126,631, 85; of this \$1,619,51 was erned by the convicts labour.

A large amount of information is given in reference to the Central Prison,—its extent, the object for which it is intended, the number of prisoners to be accommodated, the work to be done, and the expense likely to be incurred. It is expected that this institution will act as a reformatory for grown-up criminals, as well as a means for making them to a great extent self-supporting and more likely to be both able and

them to a great extent self-supporting and more likely to be both able and and more likely to be both able and willing to preserve in honest industry when they are again set at liberty.

The increase of criminals during the year in our common gaols has been great—rather more than 13 per cent.—while the increase of juvenile offenders have been greater still. The cities have chiefly contributed to this increase, many of the rural gaols showing a marked diminution. For instance, the united Counties of Prescott and Russell, with a population of 35,991, sent only

12 prisoners to the County gaol, and of these only seven were for criminal offences.
