THE WAGES QUESTION. Protection, which is another name for high taration, as we in Canada have learned to our cost, does not raise wages. The re numeration which a man obtains for his labor is regulated by his productiveness and the law of supply and demand. This is shown in a marked degree by a recently published German official report, which supplies some details about wages and hours of labor that are peculiarly interesting at of the pay received: Machine smiths and fitters earn 3s. per day of ten hours' work joiners, locksmiths and upholsterers, 3s. for eleven hours' work; painters, carpanters and glaziers, 3s. 21d. for eleven hours work; builders and plasterers, 3s. 6d. for eleven hours' work; cartwrights and farriers, 2s. 91d. for twelve and a half hours' work. Laborers or unskilled men work the same hours as the skilled or craftsmen, and are paid 1s. 91d., 2s. or 2s. 6d. for eleven ours' work, according to circumstances.
