LONDON, Sept. 17.—The steamer James
Turpie, from New York for Malmo, has arrived at Falmouth shorthanded. During

weather. Several immense seas boarded
the steamer and the mate and steward were
swept overboard and drowned.

SUNK IN A COLLISION.

BOSTON, Sept. 7.—The steamer Indian,

two children and the erew of the schooner
Andrew J. York, of Portland. Capt.
Nickerson reports that the Indian ran into
the York shortly after midnight Saturday
during a dense fog, half way between Cross
Rip and Handkerchief Lightship, cutting
the schooner half way through. The crew
of the York immediately lowered their boat
and all hands boarded the steamer, saving
nothing but what they stood in. The
schooner filled and sank in two minutes.

THE SFORT OF THE WAVES.

LONDON, Sept. 7.—The steamer Dubbeldam, from Amsterdam for New York, with
266 passengers, has put back to Flymouth.

the steamer was scraped and her rudder

boats. On the morning of Sept. 1, a steering gear was rigged up, but it was deemed
unsafe to attempt to continue the voyage,

St. Paul., Minn., Sept. 7.—As threshing progresses throughout the Northwest reports of large yields of wheat increase. The

The most conservative estimates place the wheat yield of Minnesota and the Dakotas at 125, 000,000, as against 90,000,000 last year. The Great Northern people claim that the wheat crop of the three States would fill a train 250 miles long.

Chicago, Ill., Sept. 7.—Vessels have been chartered here to carry 1,750,000 bushels of grain to Buffalo. Not only were all the boats now in port taken by the grain shippers, but nearly all the fleet to arrive here within a week were chartered, and still the shippers wanted more. Rates were advanced to the basis of 3 cents on corn and 3½ cents on wheat.

Kansas City, Mo., Sept. 7.—The unprecedented movement of grain from the West is choking the Kansas City market. There are miles of side tracks full of leaded cars. The Chicago, Santa Fe and California road cannot furnish enough engines to haul the cars here to Chicago. Yesterday there were over 7,000 cars in the Missouri Pacific yards.

New York, Sept. 7.—Latest news from
Hayti is to the effect that President
Hippolyte is in constant apprehension of an
attack by the revolutionary exiles under
the leadership of Gen. Legitime. All the
Hayti ports are garrisoned and an extra
guard protects the palace in Port-an-Prince.
He particularly fears treachery among his
own subjects. The general feeling among
the merchants at the ports is that an outbreak is only a question of a short time.

Is not this an awful indictment: 'Bribes in the shape of hetter terms to Provinces; bribes both to Provinces and single constituencies in the shape of grants for local works; toils taken for the Government election fund on the thicit gains of contractors; the virtual sale of senatorships for money spent in elections, or in support of the party organ; the capture of societies and Churches by doles of patronage distributed to them through their representatives in the Cabinet; the capture of the great distilleries and other powerful interests by special legislation in their favor; the capture of the press by largesses of 'pap;' and above all, the capture of the whole body of manufacturers by pledging to them the commercial policy of the country. Such have been the means by which Government since Confederation has, with little intermission, been carried on."

There stready exist in the midst of us an abundance of "feeders" for the university, and there is no reason why every municipality in the West should not contribute its quota to that seat of learning, and send forward students who would be proud to look upon the Western University as their alma mater. We already have two ladica' colleges and numerou

ion might be a poor university city if it lacked other needed qualities. It affords nuch consolation to a parent to know that the place to which he sends his offspring is The salubrity of our climate no one can dispute. Fathers and mothers in all parts of the continent send their daughters to our ladies' colleges as a consequence. They know that the excellent spring water which we drink does not require to be boiled before it is drinkable, and they are assured that good health will be enjoyed here if anywhere. Then, in point of accessibility, the city has an enviable position. It is the center of a network of railways, leading to all parts of Canada and the United States, and affording easy transit to and from every point in the Western Peninsula. No Western city or town need refuse to

aid in the scheme for fully equipping the Western University on the ground that it is established in London, and that in some way it may prove a rival to institutions existing within their bounds. Now that Victoria University has been moved from Cobourg to Toronto, the only universities existing outside the Provincial capital are Queen's College, Kingston, and the Western University, of this city. The policy of the Legislature is to grant no new charters for universities, and it is not at all probable that this policy will be changed. The Provincial rulers rightly reason that while a certain amount of decentralization is ad visable-nay, is of advantage to the people -the needless multiplication of degreegranting seats of learning is to be avoided. There is no reason, therefore, for expecting that the Western University will have a rival in the West, any more than Queen's will meet with opposition in the East. There is a distinct field for both seats of education, as well as for the Provincial University in Toronto. The people of London and the West will show very little public spirit if they do not fully recognize this fact, and lose no time in making the Western University as much a distinctive institution of learning as is Queen's. What Kingston has accomplished may with intelligent and united endeavor, be done in London. The university is here; an excellent field for its operations is presented. All that is needed is a generous response to the appeal now made by the university management.





LABOR MOVEMENTS.

Opening of the Trades Union Congress

NEWCASTLE, Sept. 7.—The Trades Union Congress opened here this morning. There are over 500 delegates present, and they represent about 1,500,000 British workmen, skilled and unskilled. Thomas Burt, member of Parliament for Morpeth, Northumberiand, a member of the Labor Commission, was elected president. Mr. Burt is the son of a coal miner, and formerly worked in the coal pits. Since 1865 he has been secretary of the Northumberland Miners' Mutual Association, a trades union having a membership of 12,000. Prominent among the matters to be discussed will be the question as to whether eight hours should or should not constitute a day's work, and the question of State insurance for workingmen and their employers liability in cases of accident.

THE BITTER FRUITS OF DELAY.

Considerable comment has taken place over the cause of the outbreak of typhoid fever on Craig street, South London. Probably the following extract from the report of the medical health officer, submitted to the city Beard of Health on Oct. 31 last year, affords the best explanation that can be given:


