Serious Charge Against Clemenceau PARIS, Aug. 6.—The trial opened here yesterday of M. Ducret, editor of the Cocarde, and M. Norton, charged with having forged documents, alleged to have been stolen from the British embassy, which showed that certain Frenchmen been stolen from the British embassy, which showed that certain Frenchmen were guilty of treason. During the proceedings a sensation was caused by the marquis de Mores, a witness for Ducret, shouting to M. Clemenceau: "You have been for two years a secretagent of England!" "Prove it," replied M. Clemenceau. "Nothing is easier," retorted the witness. The president of the court refused to permit the Marquis to continue, and he left the stand saying: Everywhere I meet you, Clemenceau, I shall say you are a secret agent of England." M. Clemenceau then took the witness stand and gave a detailed account of the conspiracy, after which the advocate general summed up the Government's case.

### SAD ACCIDENT AT SARNIA!

Two Little Lads Killed by a Locomotive.

Their Bodies Shockingly Mangled Engineer Rutherford's Account of the Catastrophe.

SARNIA, Ont., Aug. 6.—One of the saddest accidents that has ever happened in this locality occurred this morning about cality occurred this morning about whereby the two little sons of Mr. Alex. Mitchell, gardener, who lives in the

outskirts of the town, lost their lives. outskirts of the town, lost their lives. Roland, who is 15, and Norman Il years of age, were as usual driving the milk delivery wagon to Point Edward, and when going over the Grand Trunk Railway crossing at Exmouth street, between the town and Bay View Park, the rig was struck by light engine No. 698, in charge of Driver Rutherford, on its way to the Sarnia tunnel.

It is not known how the accident came

It is not known how the accident came about—whether the boys (who made the trip twice every day) were not aware of the approach of the engine, or whether the engine failed to blow the whistle, is not known.

The little fellows were both instantly killed, their bodies being horribly mangled. The eldest boy was entangled in the pilot of the engine and carried for a distance of 200 yards, where the body fell into a 200 yards, where the body fell into a culvert. The wagon and contents were smashed into atoms, but the horse was not

hurt.

The engineer's statement is that he noticed the rig and was ringing the bell. The wagon stopped before coming to the crossing, but on the approach of the engine the horse started suddenly, carrying the rig in front of the locomotive.

Coroner Fraser will hold an inquest tomorrow morning.

Windsor, Aug. 6.—Last evening at 7 o'clock, just as the Hope had landed her cargo of passengers in Windsor, those who were on the back part of the boat saw a woman fall from the upper deck of the boat into the river. Among those who heard the eplash was the night watchman of the boat, Ben Rose. He ran to the end of the boat, and without waiting to divest himself of any of his clothing, jumped in, and as soon as she came to the top he caught her. Gateman Burke threw a life-preserver to Ross, but the line attached was too short, and Ross, holding the woman with one hand, endeavored to swim to the preserver. The swift current and the fact that she was quite a large person precluded him from making but little headway. Finding his strength failing him, he let go of her and made a stroke for the preserver. He caught it with the left hand, and with the right managed to catch the end of her dress and pull her to him. They were then hauled to the boat and taken aboard.

The brave act of Ross was highly praised, and it was the general opinion that he should be suitably rewarded. He struck his left knee when he went over the rail, and could only use one leg while in the water.

The woman was Mrs. Goldstick, the wife of a Bellaire, Mich., business man, and she was thrown overboard by a lurch of the boat caused by the swells of the passing steamer.

Washington, Aug. 6.—The caucus of Democratic members of the House of Representatives last night selected Speaker Crisp unanimously as the Speaker for the approaching session. Mr. Crisp, thanking the members of the House, said:

"Insomuch as the condition of the country is attributable to existing laws, we are in nowise responsible therefor.

"Now, for the first time in more than thirty years, we are in full power. Our financial system should be revised and reformed. The strictest economy in public expenditures should be equalized and greatly reduced. To these purposes are we thoroughly committed. We must redeem our pledges. Let us lay aside every other consideration than the public good and endeavor to so discharge the duties assigned us as to restore confidence, promote prosperity and advance the general welfare of all classes of our people."

SAVED BY A DOG.

Nomen Bathers Rescued from Drown

Wemen Bathers Rescued from Drowning by a St. Bernard.

New York, Aug. 5.—Hans, a big, handsome St. Bernard of high degree, wore a huge pink bow yesterday as a tribute to his skill and bravery in rescuing Mrs. Rose Krause from drowning at South Beach, S. I., yosterday morning.

The woman had sunk under a wave hundreds of feet from shore and lost consciousness when Hans caught hold of her bathing suit and dragged her to land. Mrs. Bruno Wolfram, Hans' mistress, and Miss Jennie Berg, of Vienna, were rescued at the same time by Mr. Krause and Mr. Wolfram after all three women in their fear of death nearly drowned the heroic dog by trying to cling to him.

Charles Krause, who has a saloon at No. 76 Second avenue, his wife Rose, Miss Jennie Berg, who is visiting them, and Mr. and Mrs. Bruno Wolfram, accompanied by Hans, went to South Beach early on Tuesday and entered the surf in front of Gebhardt's Hotel.

Hans and the men swam out several hundred yards, but as none of the women could swim they kept well in shore. Miss Berg, who had started to walk along the beach to an unused pier, auddenly screamed for help. Mrs. Wolfram, not knowing Miss Borg was in deep water, but thinking she had become ill, started to her assistance, and was quickly beyond her depth.

The cries of both women prompted Mrs. Krause to go to them, and like the others she stepped into one of the numerous holes that had been dreged around the pier.

The tide swept the women out quite a distance, but they managed to catch hold of a pillar, where, however, the waves broke over them. Miss Berg became faint and would have let go her hold but for Mrs.

Wolfram, who held her up, as a hundred yards away she saw her brave Hans riding the waves and barking furiously in answer to his mistress's agonized cry for help.

He had heard the first cry and in the race to the terrified women he beat Mr. Krause and Mr. Wolfram twonty yards.

The three women immediately jumped for Hans, who is appeared from view under their combined weight. Mr. Wolfram, but when he hear

A moment later his face was turned toward the shore with the unconscious Mrs. Krause. Neither Mr. Krause nor Mr. Wolfram could go to the assistance of Mrs. Krause, as the women they had in charge gave them all they could do.

Hans had hard work dragging Mrs. Krause, who weighs 150 pounds, through the surf, but he paddled with a will, and although he was nearly exhausted he took his mistress's friend ashore in safety. The woman had swallowed plenty of salt water but was soon revived.

I saw Hans at No. 76 Second Avenue yesterday. He welghs close on 200 pounds, is well marked and very intelligent. His owner told me Mrs. Krause was the fifth person he had rescued from drowning.

"Anybody who'll call for help while in the water," Mr. Wolfram assured me, "iff only in jest, will be dragged to a safe place whether he wants to be or not."



Who Are the Owners of This Mundane Sphere?

One Class Should Not Collect Tribute

Difference Between Sale of Land and Sale of Goods.

and to All Peoples. In the Canadian Methodist Quarterly for July appears a comprehensive paper on a question that has occupied the serious attention of millions of the inhabitants of this continent within the last year or two. The writer, who is known to be a well

ersed student of the subject, takes as the foundation of his remarks the text:

'The Land Shall Not Be Sold Forever.'

Levificus.xxv. 23,

Was this injunction the declaration of some eternal principle resting on a basis of justice, obligatory on all ages or conditions of society, or was it only a temporary expedient, applicable merely to a certain peculiar condition of the Jewish people? The question resolves itself into this: Can land be justly treated as an article of commerce, to be bought and sold, just as food, clothing, shelter, or any product of labor, or does land differ from other things, so that justice forbids its sale?

Between the land, the gift of the Creator, and commodities the product of the laborer, the Mosaic economy made the widest distinction. No restriction whatever was placed on the sale of land was strictly forbidden. No one could do more with the land than to give a léase till the jubile year.

This method has been spoken of as an entail, resembling the entail common in Britain. But these two entails differed as widely as two things could differ. The Jewish entail secured land to everyone, the British entail secures it to particular heirs only, and exoludes all others. The one entail insured equality, the other perpetuates and intensifies inequality.

To determine the rightness or wrongness of selling land, we must examine what selling means. How does anyone acquire a right to sell? Evidently a man can sell only what is his. That which he owns absolutely, evidently he can sell absolutely, and that which he owns only limitedly, he can sell only limitedly.

When one man catches fish and another catches game, and they exchange their product, this constitutes buying and selling. The one sells fish and buys game, the other sells game and buys fish. We call this selling fish or selling game; in reality it is exchanging services. Each renders a service; each confers a henefit; each is enriched only on condition that he enriches.

After a man has toiled to catch

After a man has toiled to catch fish or game, to raise a crop or build a house, on what condition can I justly demand any of these commodities from him? Should I attempt to take them without offering some equivalent product or service, would he not immediately and intuitively recognize that I was subjecting him to an injustice, and would he not feel that he was justified in resisting my efforts? Undoubtedly he would. It requires no demonstration to prove to a man that he is defrauded when he is compelled to render or surrender service without receiving an equivalent service in return.

Are we not quite safe in assuming this as one of the basal principles of ethics, that honesty demands that services should be reciprocal—service for service, product for product, benefit for benefit? Suppose we deny this doctrine, and assert that one part of humanity has the right to claim service without rendering service, do we not at once proclaim the doctrine of slavery, fraud and thet?

When a man toils, raises a crop, provides a house, cures a disease, clucidates a philosophy, invents a machine, organizes an industry, or charms our souls with the beauties of song or oratory, then he establishes a right to sell. The right to make a charge rests on a service rendered or a product furnished. Can anyone, on any other condition, justly claim the right to demand product or service from his fellowman? Unquestionably he can not.

Can any man, any combination of men, any Government, furnish land? Is land a product of industry? To the Mosiac system we are in debted for a picture perhaps unparalleled inhistory for its purely democratic character, its absence of those vicious extremes only too smailest in other countries, an aristocracy reveling in excessive, unmerited wealth at one end, and its natural complement, a mass of degraded toliers, steeped in unmerited poverty at the other ond—the baron and the villain, the millionaire and the tramp.


