

Shortly after Confederation a boundary dispute developed between the and the Province of On-The Ontario Government and the Mackenzie Government in 1874 refer the question to arbitration. An eminent and impartial tribunal decided in favor of the Province, but the Government of Sir John A. Macdonald repudiated the solemn undertaking of its predecessor, and refused to ratify the award. Sir John comprised only 116,782 square miles. The Government of Ontario Government, and its ally, the Opposition in the Ontario Legislature. After years of struggle he secured a reference to the privy council, which sustaind the claim of the Government of Ontario in all particulars.

In the meantime the Dominion Government had been parceling Ontario's domain among party heelers and favorites. This statement is not partisan misrepresentation, but a matter of official record. In 1883-4 nearly a million acres of timber limits in the disputed territory were placed under license by federal orders-in-council at an average rate of \$5 per square mile, or Macdonald Government wished to deprive Ontario of this territory, and annex it to the Province of Manitoba, because Manitoba crown lands were under federal administration, while Ontario crown lands were under the control of the Ontario Government. The second anniversary services of the Unitarian Church were held yesterday at the Chapter House on Piccabeing at the same time dedicated. Two years ago the Unitarian movement was inaugurated in this city, services being held at Channing Hall on Dundas street. Seven months ago the old Chapter House was purchased, and meetings have since been held in the completion of alterations in the chapel and yesterday's services were the first held in that part of the edifice. In the morning Rev. President Southworth, of Meadville Seminary, occupied the pul pit, the evening services being conducted by Rev. G. H. Badger, secretary

Mr. Southworth in his discourse dwelt at some length on the work the the objects and aims of its mission. The Unitarian Church, he said, was not running in opposition to any other church, but it wanted to do its share

of Christ's work. Mr. Badger spoke almost entirely on the subject of Unitarianism, and explained the workings of the church. He chose for his text, "Ye shall know the truth, and it shall make you free."

"Unitarianism," said the speaker, "is a method of universal progress. We do not aim to build up a great sect, an ecclesiastical corporation, or to procure a monopoly of religion; but, we do seek to bring to God the man or woman who, for various reasons, cannot bring themselves to accept the ironbound religion offered by some of the other denomin ations." The Unitarian Church, the speaker explained, believed in broadness of mind, broadness of intellect, and a fullness of the blessings that the Lord has provided. Unitarianism, however, did not countenance frivolity or sinfulness in any form. 
