So far as could be learned the al dermen line up as follows: Ald. Stewart-I am a spring water man through and through. I think the scheme is a good one and will support it. Filtration should be put off as long as pos-

Ald. Stevenson - I think the scheme is excessive in cost. I amin favor of the high-pressure end of it, and that is the only end that I do favor. We should have sent the high-pressure system We have plenty of spring water with a high-pressure sys-

tem to last the city a long time. Ald. Booth-I am a spring water man, and am in favor of a highressure system. studied the new scheme sufficiently to give an opinion on it, but it should go to the people.

Ald. Rose-I am in favor of spring water; lots of it, and right away. I think that there is an abundance of spring water along the south branch that will cost less than that of the north end. Ald. Armstrong-I am in favor

of sending it to the people. I have not studied the scheme sufficiently to form an opinion of its Ald. Gerry-I have not studied the scheme sufficiently to discuss




