PROCLAMATION IS REQUIRED BEFORE CELEBRATION HERE

War Not Ended Until Ratification and Official Announcement, Borden Explains.

Ottawa, June 30.—Peace will be celebrated in Canada on formal proclamation that the war is at an end. Mr. Bureau asked in the House this morning if it was intended to celebrate the signing of the peace treaty. Sir Robert Borden replied that the signing of the treaty did not bring about peace. That could be only accomplished by ratification and by proclamation. Under the terms of the treaty the proclamation could not be made until three of the allied powers had concurred in the ratification. It was thought by the Dominion Government that the most appropriate time for a peace celebration would be when peace was proclaimed.





Reservoir Overflowed in Early Morning, Bank Being

Eaten Away.

DISCOVERED IN TIME If Pumping Had Continued Much Longer, Wall Would

Have Collapsed. London had a narrow escape from being without a water supply Sunday. Early Sunday morning the water in the reservoir began to overflow, and before the fact became known at the pumphouse and the pumps which force the water into the reservoir had been stopped, erosion had taken place to such an extent that the outside slope of the blg tank had been undermined for a length of about thirty feet, leaving the wall thin and perpendicular instead of well propped up by the banked earth. The damage occurred on the south side of the reservoir, and a considerable quantity had been distributed over the adjoining land in that direction before the cause of the mishap had been stopped. Men were on the spot this morning building up again the bank which had been eaten away, and citizens who saw the reservoir before repairs were commenced, declare that the dis-covery of the trouble was barely in time to prevent a general collapse of the retaining wall and the con-sequent loss of all the reserve water
