FIGURES THAT TALK.

Mr. Fielding said that he had to deal with the most prosperous year in the history of the country. The revenue for 1898-9 was \$40,555,156, being \$1,855.238 more than he assumated for, and \$2,725,459 more than the revenue of the previous year. The increase in customs duties was most pronounced; in very few lines had there been any occreases whatever. The decline of \$1,298,000 in excise was due to anticipations during the previous year of changes in the tariff. On consolidated fund the total expenditure for the year was \$8,82,565-somewhat more than had been estimated, and \$482,000 more than the expenditure for the previous year. There had been a considerable reduction in postal expenditure, due to the business-like methods of the lostmaster-General, the revenue having increased \$324,871 and the expenditure reduced \$214,066-a total betterment of \$538,937, ast regards this department. The consolidated fund revenue last year amounted to \$40,555, 238, and the expenditure, including railway subsidies, and \$930,821 expenses of the loan, there had been a fiet addition to the debt during the year of only \$2,417,802. He estimated that they would have to increase the antiqual debt this year only \$1,700,000.

In regard to the government's extravagance Mr. Fielding said that no government was likely to realize the expectation of all its friends as to possible reflection of expenditure. (Hear, Lear.) The Tories had promised to condition to the four years they increased it from twenty-three and a half to twenty-teven millions of dollars.

The order was entered by one of the clerks, and in making out the cable, the order was given for 5.—900 shares igatesd of 500. The stock was purchased, and Mr. Forget was naturally not a little astonished when he found out the mistake in the returns which was made for him. He received a cable to the effect that 4.—500 shares had been realized if London, and that the profit placed to his credit was just \$113,000. 



GREAT LAYERS.

One of the new Belgian breeds of poultry, says the Autrican consul in Antwerp, is the Herve chicken, which is black and has a moderate single, straight comb reddish brown eyes, red and the vertical tail is quite well feath and the vertical tail is quite well feathered. The legs, of a very dark bluish or blackish color, are not long. This fowl is healthy, active and rivals the best layers. It is originally from the district of Herve—hence its name—in the province of Liege, where it has long been known to farmers. It has, however, been much neglected and bastardized with breeds of lesser value.

The Manheid is similar to the Herve, it has the same characteristics and diff.

The Coccoo of Malines sits summer and winter, and as a result of great care by skilled breeders a sufficient number is raised for the demands of the annually increasing trade. In the vicinity of Merchtem there is found a variety of Coccoo of Malines known as the Coccoo of Merchtem, which is gradually surpussing the other varieties in weight and delicacy of meat.

While these are all right for table poultry, they are good for nothing else, if several hems in a flock lay soft eggs, it is a sure sign of overfeeding.—Live Stock Soft Eggs.

Gradually outsiders began to come in, and now one must engage a seat at breakfast two days ahead. ## Suffering caused TO CURE A FELON

How to Treat Those Dangerou and Painful Sores.

Is a Severe and Us ally a Most Painful Inflammation of the End of the the Finger

A felon is a severe and usually a most painful inflammation of the end of the finger, more commonly either the thumb or index finger of the right hand for the reason that these are most exposed to the little wounds from which the trouble starts; but any of the fingers, or even one of the toes, may be the seat

or even one of the toes, may be the seat of a felon.

The inflammation starts generally from the prick of a pin or needle or from a scratch or cut, but often the wound is so slight that no notice is taken of it until the finger begins to grow sore. The soreness soon passes into actual pain, and this rapidly becomes most intense and throbbing, and sometimes is felt all the way up the arm. It is worse when the hand is allowed, to hang down. The ball of the finger is hot, red and swollen. At the same time the patient feels more or less ill, is feverish, and has a headache and rapid pulse.

When the inflammation is deep seated, pus collects beneath the periosteum, or membrane covering the bone, and this greatly increases the distress as well as the danger. If allowed to go on unrelieved, the inflammation way creep up the finger into the paim of the hand, and then the condition becomes a most serious one. In almost any case when once pus has formed beneath the periosteum more or less of the bone will die, leaving the end of the finger crippled or disfigured by a deep scar.

When the treatment is begun very early it is sometimes possible to cut short the inflammation by cold cloths applied continuously to the inflamed part. These must be frequently renewed, for if allowed to get warm they will set as poultices and rather hasten suppuration than arrest it. At the same time the arm should be kept in a sling, with the hand raised and resting on the chest.

If the inflammation does not rapidly subside under this treatment, we must pulse.

If the inflammation does not rapidly subside under this treatment, we must reverse it and try to bring matters to a head by means of poultices or wet cloths applied as hot as they can be borne and changed very often.

The only thing to be done when pus has formed is to cut the finger and let it out. This is painful enough for the instant, but it will prevent many days of acute suffering and all danger of severe inflammation of the hand and arm, with subsequent blood poisoning arm, with subsequent blood poisoning.
