A cow newly come in should not drink cold milk, then sour milk, taking care that all the changes are gradual by adding only a portion at first, and gradually a little meal.

Calves weil fed and taken care of, with a quart or two of meal daily in winter, will be double the size at two years they would have attained by common treatment.

Heifers thus treated may come in at two years old, and will be better than neglected animals at three, and one year of feeding saved Heifers dried up too early for calving will often run dry in after years, therefore be very careful to milk closely the first year until about six weeks before calving.

Hearty eaters are desirable for cows, and hey may usually be selected while calves. A dainty calf will likely be a dainty cow. Heifers should become accustomed to be free

How to TREAT BAULKY Horses .- If you have baulky horses, it is your own fault, and not the horses', for if they do not pull true there is some cause for it, and if you will remove the cause the effect will cease. When your horse baulks he is excited, and does not know what you want him to do. When he gets a little excited, stop him five or ten minutes; let him become calm; go to the baulky horse, pat him, and speak gently to him; and as soon as he is over his excitement. he will, in nine cases out of ten, pull at the word Whipping and slashing and swearing only make muster worse. After you have gentled him awhile, and his excitement has cooled down take him by the bit; turnchim each way, a few minutes, as far as you can; pull out the tongue gentle him a little; unrein him; then step be fore the baulky horse, and let the other start first; then you can take them anywhere you The starts is by standing before him the other starts first. By close application to this rule you can make any baulky horse pull. If a horse had been badly spoiled you should hitch him to the empty wagon and pull it around a while on level ground; then put on a little lead, and in a crease it gradually, caressing as before, and in a short time you can have a good work horse.
