## REFORM IN ITALY

intrigues more artful and unceasing than at any intrigues more artful and unceasing than at any peared torbe travelling for pleasure or instruc-
tion-sometimes in the interest of science tion-sometimes in the interest of science or
commerce- sometimes they affected to be study-
ing the religious system ing the religious system of the Hindoos; but
their objects, however outwardly varied, were their objects, however outwardiy varied, were
always reallv uniform, -nanely, to sy the
nakedness of the land, and to send intelligence as to any faulty or assailable point to the Rus-
sian Chancery at St. Petersburg. Thera is abundant evidence, both in Fort enhallstreet, of the proceedings of these Mus-
covities, and we should not be surprised if some of the Oude nobles, and functionaries, and some
of the Brahmins were under agents in the pay of the Brahmins were under agents in the pay
of the paramount and superior practitioners of the paramount and superior practitioners who
were immediately instructed from the Russian Chancery." This is startling at the present time,
because it bears upon an event which has an immediate pressing interest. But we have heard
the same cry of " wolf" so repedly the same cry of "wolf" so repeateddy that we
cease to attach any importance to it. Whatever were the desigus of Russia hefore the late war on
our Indian possessions, the Czar has other work to do now than tronble himself about any thing
so Eutopian. His coffers are empty, his people bankrupt, his credit gone. We learn at the very
time ulat our astute contemporary has discaver ed this mare's nest that the standing army of
Russia is to be reduced, and that the Prussian system of a landwehr, or militia, is to be adopt-
ed -a course which is sadly at variance with the ed-a course which is sadly at vayiance with the
policy indicated in the foregoing extract.
