THE MILITARY SERVICE ACT

The decision of the Supreme Court of Canada, that the amendments to the Military service Act, promulgated by an Order-in-council, are legal and binding, has a wide spread effect all over Canada.

The case in question arose from the application of Private George Edwin Grey, a farmer drafted under the terms of the orders-in-council, canceling all exemptions of men between the ages of 20 and 22, for his release from military service by way

of habeas corpus.

There is at the presert time several other applications for habeas crows pending in Quebec and the West and the decision of the highest tribunal in the land, will likely result in all being refused.


