The Toronto Mail vs. the Conservative Party.

We have had occasion, more than once, to call attention to the mischievousness of the Toronto Mail—a paper which poses as the principal organ of the Dominion Government, at least in the Province of Ontario. It seems to be affected with a hatred of anything Catholic or Irish, and the mention of an Archbishop's name, or the recollection of a Cossigan in the Cabinet, has the same effect upon it as the waving of a red rag has upon an angry bull. In its virulent abuse of the Catholic hierarchy it has done much to alienate Catholic support from the party whose interests it professes to serve, and it is really time that the position of the Mail in politics should be understood. It is quite enough to combat the attacks and rebut the misstatements of our opponents, without being compelled constantly to disclaim the sayings and doings of one of the principal papers of our own party.

As a supporter of the Conservative party our opinions regarding Reciprocity are on record, and we have been at some pains to prove that they coincide with those of the administration which we support. We are anxious and willing for the enactment of a measure whereby the markets of the United States may be obtained for our products, and where by our fisheries may be thrown open to American fishermen. This is what we want; this is what the present Dominion Government have in view, and what they are awaiting a favorable opportunity to obtain.

But the Toronto Mail assumes an oracular tone, and undertakes to lecture the Dominion Government upon their duty in the matter. This is the way it speaks:

"Canada has done quite enough—all that she can, or will, for the present do—in the affair of Reciprocity. We believe that the people of Canada must not only see their own interests, but also the interests of the Dominion as a whole. It is not our duty to support a measure which would open our markets to the products of other countries, and which would deprive our own people of the fruits of their own industry. It is the duty of our business men to see that our own interests are protected, and that our own markets are not opened to the competition of other countries. We believe that the people of Canada should be satisfied with the present state of affairs, and should not be led astray by the promises of Reciprocity."

We observe that the Mail professes to speak for the people of Canada in saying that they want nothing so little as Reciprocity. The story is an old one of the three knights of the needle who described themselves as "the people of England."

We lately read, and with sorrow, of a small ring of political speculators who endeavored to usurp the functions of the people of Ontario, and change its local laws. The individual who, in the Mail, speaks for the people of Canada, has no more authority to do so than had the political speculators of the electorate of Ontario. The people of the Maritime Provinces constitute at least one-fourth of the population of the Dominion, and will decline to allow the Mail to act as their spokesman. The inhabitants of this Island, few as they are, repudiate the opinions of the Mail.

We have no complaint to make of the National Policy; but we can tell the Mail that the National Policy was held out to the people of this Island as the lever whereby Reciprocity was to be obtained. What said Sir John Macdonald in the resolution which he moved during the last Session of the Mackenzie Government, but that "the welfare of Canada required the adoption of a National Policy which will benefit and foster the agricultural, the mining, the manufacturing and other interests of the Dominion, and moving, as it ought to do, in the direction of a reciprocity of tariff with our neighbors, so far as the varied interests of Canada demand, will greatly tend to procure for this country, eventually, a reciprocity of trade." What was that but the recommendation of the National Policy, in order to procure a reciprocity of trade? Why was the Hon. J. C. Pope, the champion free-trader, as he was called, elected to support the National Policy, but that the people believed and expected that thereby they would eventually secure reciprocity? What did Sir Charles Tupper tell the meeting in the Drill Shed but that he expected within ten years, to see reciprocity with the United States?

We belong to neither of the three classes whom the Mail sets down as the only parties desiring Reciprocity, but if we must be described as "very imperfect exponents of Canadian feeling," we may be allowed to congratulate ourselves that we have in our company those whom the Mail delighted to honor—Sir John Macdonald, Sir Charles Tupper, Sir Leonard Tilley, and the whole Conservative party.

Let the people make no mistake: Reciprocity with the United States is the settled policy of the present Government. Sir John Macdonald has said, in his place in Parliament, that "the value

of reciprocal trade, or trade of any kind with the United States, is fully admitted; that it would be well that we had a large trade with the United States rather than a small one, and that Canada has done everything she could in order to secure that desirable object; that it was to be regretted that the Reciprocity Treaty of 1854 had been terminated. Canada had attempted, by every possible means, to induce the American States to enter upon a renewal of the Treaty, as a Reciprocity Treaty of some kind. The termination of the Reciprocity Treaty of 1854 was a loss, and checked the prosperity of Canada." He begged the withdrawal of Mr. Davies' resolution as being ill-timed, and tending to hamper the action of the Government in the matter—and he proceeded to say that "the Americans know that we are ready, at any time, to renew the Reciprocity Treaty of 1854, and to go on with the fishery arrangements made by the Washington Treaty on the same footing as they were before. They know perfectly well that Canada is always open to enter into any reasonable arrangement with them, but it would frustrate any hope of entering into such an arrangement if Mr. Davies' resolution was passed. He did not feel it right to say what the course of the Government would be, nor what, after consultation with Her Majesty's Government, might be done before July, 1885." Those utterances scarcely harmonize with those of the Mail, but so much the worse for the Mail.

With the best intentions we suggested in our last issue that our contemporary, before writing again on this subject, over which it seems so hopelessly bewildered, had better bestow on it some further consideration. After reading the Examiner of Thursday, we regret to see that our kind advice has been disregarded. The article is even a more labored attempt than formerly to prove that it is a mistake to take our Nova Scotia mails go and come by Pictou, that it is after all not the best route to suit our convenience. Notwithstanding the prominence of the idea, to mystify matters the writer gave a faint glimmering of conviction that what he was saying was not exactly true. He says:

"For practical purposes we are as well off, or almost as well off, with respect to the Halifax mails, as if they went and came by Pictou every day of the week. If the statement be correct why does it require the qualification 'almost as well off.' In this qualification is contained the whole trouble and annoyance to which we are subjected.
