The sole head of a family, Crany male over 18 years old, who was at the com. mencement of the present war and who has since continued to be a British emblect or a subject of an allied or neural country, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta pplicant must appear in person Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions Duties-Bix months residence upon and cultivaion of land in each of three yars e In certain districts a nomestead

may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption. Price \$3.00 per acre Duties-Reside six months in each o hree years after earning homestead stent and cultivate 50 xtercasre May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain con

ditions.
A settler after obtaining homestead patent, if he cannot secure a pre-empsion, may take a purchased homestead m certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erest a house worth \$300.00.

Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm labourers in Canads during 1917, as residence duties ander certain conditions.

When Dominion Lands are adverhised or posted for entry, returned solderis who have served overseas and have been honourably discharged, reseive one day priority in applying for entry at local Agent's Office (but not Sub-Agency). Discharge papers must


