

### Death of the Grand Old Man of Placentia.

Mr. William O'Reilly died Jan. 21st, 1911, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. E. J. Dorney, on Webster Ave., Somerville, Mass. The funeral was held Feb. 2. Requiem Mass was offered at 8:00 o'clock at St. Joseph's Church. Interment was at St. Paul's Cemetery, Arlington, Mass. O'Reilly's health was failing for several months past, and he was practically confined to his bed for the past two months. At the time of his death three daughters, one son and a number of grandchildren were at his bedside. He died a peaceful and happy death characteristic of the happy life which he lived. When the news of his death was spread in the community, both in Somerville and Cambridge, there was sorrow on every side. He was well and favourably known, and always had a kind word for everyone. It was nothing unusual to hear the remark "He was a grand old man," and he will be missed in his favourite resorts for a long time.

I have known "Uncle William" since boyhood, and to meet him almost daily in the streets of a distant country brought to memory the fond remembrance of other days. I have been at a loss to know why a man of his years could be so contented and happy to spend his last remaining years in a foreign land. The boys of Placentia, of which there are quite a number hereabouts, will think of him for many years to come. All one had to do was to speak of the "Hero," "Cape St. Mary's" or any other point of interest in Newfoundland, not to mention politics, was sufficient to start any kind of a story by gone days. He seemed to take an active interest and always kept well posted, and his interest in the daily affairs, much as we read of in the newspapers, could always be intelligently discussed. Aside from all this his fondness for a game of "frisky chess" seemed to be his favourite pastime, and many times would he mention his favourite opponents—Jim Clancey, Mike Collins, and as "Uncle William" would say, "Yes, and Jim Croke was not a bad player." The above mentioned gentlemen will agree with me that he always played on the square from start to finish. Thus the late leaf in the Book of Life is closed, and there in the historical town of Arlington, Mass., rests the remains of the late William O'Reilly in the little graveyard on the hillside. He was a beautiful life, not an enemy to visit; him ill, and legions of friends and acquaintances to mourn and speak kindly of our departed friend. The promptings and teachings of his heart were always manifest in his efforts to benefit and help his fellowmen. He was of a kindly disposition, lovable in nature and an unflinching friend. These are the essential qualities that stand for his sterling character. Many a man and woman of to-day were children when Capt. O'Reilly was at the zenith of his prosperity, and right well would he be in keeping to speak of him as one of the prosperous and progressive men of his time. He was of the progressive type of Newfoundland, far sighted, capable, and could always and ever speak intelligently of the affairs of his country. Fourteen years ago "Uncle William," as he was best known to his friends, came to Cambridge, Mass., to take up his home there so as to be near his children, one son, Patrick O'Reilly, who holds a responsible position in the Water Department in the City of Cambridge, three married daughters, Mrs. W. J. Dorney, Mrs. W. Willworth, Mrs. Henry F. Green. Apparently the surroundings of his adopted country were as natural to him as the home of his boyhood.

### Kelligrews Notes.

For the past week Conception Bay has been filled with heavy ice, but a very strong breeze of South West wind to-day is fast taking it out. Several men travelled over to the mainland from Bell Island yesterday and will have to return by boat.

Why is it some of the men in this vicinity cannot get berths at the seal fishery? Now that the icebergs are taking a larger number of men surely a chance should be given others instead of filling up the steamers with northern men. Why not take the extra eleven hundred men from the city and Conception Bay?

For the past two weeks everybody has been busy getting out a stock of fire wood. The distance is so great and the weather so very stormy that many will not get enough to last till mid-summer, so that we shall have to turn our attention to "peat." Many are asking if any areas in this vicinity are to be worked, and if the output will be sold at a reasonable rate? We trust so.

It is understood that the Atlantic Cable Co. will employ a large number of men the coming summer. Large boats are now being built to handle the pebbles and facilitate the loading of steamers. The boats will cost 265 each, and the builders of same complain that the price is too low, timber being so very scarce.

Work will be much needed the coming summer as the farmers here have very few potatoes to dispose of. Many sold in the Fall at a cheap rate, and others that kept their stock through the winter, now find that the rot has

played havoc with them, the "Dakota Red" alone keeping well. They are now readily selling at \$2.00 per bushel, and will probably reach \$3.00 before the end of March.

Owing to the scarcity of capital the past summer, fertilizer will be much needed for grass lands. We understand that the Agriculture Society will support same at cost price for farmers. This is a step in the right direction. In putting lime on potato land it will cause "scab," and although the potato will be good for eating quality, they cannot be sold readily.

Cattle for beef purposes are in great demand and high prices are being paid for them, so much so that in a few years all stock will be sold out if care is not taken.

Many people are suffering from influenza, and now that the streets are getting "slushy" wet feet will be the order of the day unless well supplied with a pair of "Smallwood's" boots.

Hay is selling at the low price of 40 and 50 cents per cwt. At this time last year it fetched one dollar per cwt. and was eagerly sought for at that price.

Several persons from Kelligrews went to the "Iron Isle" last week seeking employment, but failed to secure same. It is to be hoped that the blockade will soon be raised and that work will be found for all.

Tram System Interrupted by Storm. The severe snow storm of yesterday afternoon blocked all traffic in the city and piled drifts high along all the thoroughfares. Snow to the depth of several feet rendered the suburban roads almost impassable at a comparatively early hour yesterday, and country people going homewards had a hard battle to get through the storm to their several destinations. The electric trolley system was obstructed during the afternoon, and by 4 p.m. the cars could not negotiate the belt line which was covered with over two feet of snow in a short time. Last night only one track on Water Street, that on the south side, was kept open, and cars ran over this to the junctions at Holyway Street and the Cross Roads at regular intervals. The street sweepers were at work all the afternoon, and at night when the snow fell ceased they kept clearing the tracks all over the system, while in places where the snow was beaten down by the feet of pedestrians men shoveled it clear and the lines will be in working order to-day. On the higher levels and on the country roads drifts in several instances cover the fences.

Cable News. The Veto Bill Introduced Yesterday. Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, Feb. 21. Premier Asquith faced a full House to-day when making his explanatory statement on the introduction of the Veto measure. The Premier lost no time in letting the Opposition know that he felt that he had the country behind him, and therefore did not hesitate to re-introduce the Veto Bill without the change of a word in the form in which it had its first reading last year. The measure, he said, had gone before the electorate at the recent elections, and had been endorsed by the return of its supporters, with a majority of 126. When the Lords rejected the Budget in 1909, the Premier declared, they committed political suicide. History would say that their action on that occasion was the most stupendous exhibition of political blindness ever perpetrated. Hereditary in its origin, irresponsible in the exercise of its powers, overwhelmingly partisan in its actual composition—such was the body that had been intrusted with the right to delay and check the considered decisions of the elected representatives of the people. The Premier did not purpose to dispense with a second chamber, but the country required an immediate remedy for present evils, and could not await for a release from the dangerous and intolerable situation, until the long and labourous process, necessary for the creation of a new Second Chamber, had been completed. It had been asserted, Mr. Asquith observed, that the Government's proposals would have the effect of enabling a despotic single chamber to ride rough shod over the electorate, and the Government was charged with enforcing, under the subtle disguise of democratic forms, a power which would set at naught the very spirit of democracy. Such a view was one of the most unsubstantial nightmares that had ever afflicted the imagination. 'The Government presents this bill as the first and most urgent step towards the attainment of perfection,' were the Premier's concluding words. Mr. Balfour, Leader of the Opposition, commented upon the absence of all evidence of a conciliatory spirit in the Premier's Speech. All agreed that there should be a modification of the relations between the two Houses, but the reconstruction of the House of Lords should be the subject of cautious deliberations. A bicameral system must prevail, and the Commons

**The Veto Bill.**

The final round of the struggle against the power of the House of Lords has begun. Premier Asquith introduced the Veto Bill of last year which passed the House of Commons, but was not taken up by the House of Lords. They may be somewhat of a fight, but in any case, the main features of the Bill will become law, though it is quite possible there may be some alterations.

The power of the House of Lords will be broken and the supremacy of the House of Commons established. There are features in the bill, however, of a decidedly objectionable character, which will tend to facilitate deals between Governments and small groups, which will have the effect of putting on the Statute book laws which are dear to the hearts of small groups, regardless of the opinions of the majority of the electorate. The only safeguard against this danger is the referendum.

**HOW THE HOME WAS FLOATED.**

Mr. A. D. Brown, the engineer, who were at the wreck, and diver William Butler arrived here by the Placentia train at midnight on Monday. The Home in making Flat Islands, P.B. struck on the bilge keel on the port side on the 4th inst., and several holes were made in that part of the hull of the ship, while several "beds" of timber were badly smashed under the saloon. After she was beached at Rushoon she was totally submerged, and sank about 3 feet in the mud and there were fully 12 feet of water above the deck aft of the bridge. Mr. Brown with the diver and engineers arrived there on Sunday, the 5th inst., and on Tuesday, the 7th, Diver Butler went down under water and surveyed the hull of the ship. The Petrol arrived Wednesday morning and operations began at once. The powerful wrecking pumps were taken out of the Petrol and placed on board the Home, after which a coffer dam was built on the deck of the wrecking tug and when finished it was thrown overboard and then sunk on the Home over the after hatch. The coffer dam was screwed down with large bolts and a very powerful pump was placed above it on the after hatch. Another big pump was placed on the "fiddler" at the entrance to the engine room, and a third pump was put on the fore hatch. When everything was in readiness they got steam from the Petrol and began work, after being delayed for a day owing to the very severe weather prevailing. Diver Butler previous to this made several descents and stopped the holes in the hull with wedges and plugs composed of tallow and oakum, while the seams were also covered with the same, as well as the doors, ventilators and other apertures in the vessel. The pumps were started on Wednesday, the 15th inst., and ejected water from the hull at the rate of a ton per minute, so that by midnight the vessel was free. Then the engine room was cleaned up and put in order. Fires were put in the furnaces, and in a short while steam was got up on the ship, which was kept free by her own pumps. She was delayed four days getting her trim for her voyage to port, and before she started to leave another dam was erected on the inside of the hull where the damage occurred by collision with the rocks. This was built of wood and concrete and kept the ship completely water tight with the aid of her pumps. She left Rushoon at 8.30 a.m. Monday under her own steam and reached Placentia at noon, making 8 knots easily on the run, a fact which shows that the temporary repairs effected were done in a thoroughly workmanlike manner. She completed her run to this port. Diver Butler did excellent work on the ship, was down every day from the time of his arrival at the wreck, and the repairs, which were supervised by Mr. A. D. Brown, are highly creditable to that gentleman, it being no light task to get the ship once afloat. Several new plates must be put into the hull.

# GUARD YOUR BAIT!

## Bait Exclusion is Our Gibraltar -- Let Us Hold It and Not Hand It Over to Subsidized Foreign Promoters.

(Concluded.)

Now, while it may be advantageous to place a cold storage plant in a settlement by reason of larger fish supply and water power, will any one be lead to believe it will be for the benefit of our fishermen to turn them into the "bogs." The timber area in our coastline is a very limited quantity and is reserved by law for the use of fishermen. Will this Act be annulled and the few copies of wood, already too sparse to supply the need, further to be shut up to the poor toiler of the sea and handed over to

Subsidized Foreign Adventurers to Supply Packages for Frozen Squal for the Gloucester Men!

Will the poor man that wants timber for his firing, his boat, his fence, his stage, be driven to the backwoods and finally to the barrens, that the necessary preserves may be made convenient for this Company? Why not send those packers into the lumber market, like the rest of us, and reserve the few starlings for the fishermen? Sir Robert in the close of his admirable speech refers to the fact that he was once a strong advocate for Reciprocity with the United States, but now suggests a very different policy.

"Manners with fortunes, humours change with climes; Tenets with book, and principles with times."

Sir Robert's principles have not changed, but his circumstances have altered his tenets. Rightly so. We are facing very different problems now from what we had to work out when he went to Washington to confer with the Blaine administration on the subject of Reciprocity. What ever could have been the advantage then by any exchanges, there certainly would be

None Now, if Bait Supply Got Into the Bargain.

I hope there is no fisherman in this country to-day so blind as not to see that we are standing on the threshold of a new career pregnant with glorious prospects. We control the fisheries of North America. We rule the markets on both sides of the Atlantic and determine prices. And it is the people of this country are no united to a man in defending every inch of sovereignty we possess, and guaranteed to us by a British Constitution and upheld for us by an International Tribunal, let that man be made to understand and feel that he has forfeited his birthright and that he enjoys the privilege of citizenship by toleration. We are masters of the situation. We are a kingdom. Every man that owns a home, a stage and a boat is a fishing prince. I there is any man having a voice in the Legislature of this country who will not use the best of his ability in upholding such measures as may be calculated to defend the rights and promote the welfare of our people, and defend them against forceful invasion of their birthright, let him be tried and condemned before the bar of public opinion as a traitor and a knave, who would avail of any opportunity to barter his country's honor and independence for his personal aggrandizement. Sir Robert Bond's change of policy shows that he realizes that

The Times Are Fraught With Danger yet with great opportunities, and the pity of it is that his ability and experience, backed by integrity, may not now be availed of in working out his country's destiny under new dispensations. The treaty of Canada with the United States is to us the granary of Egypt. The Bait Act mangles every headland with forts and guns that no foreign power can silence. We are the Gibraltar of the North American fishery. We dictate terms, we make conditions of surrender. This is our position. Let us hold it. It will be soon found that Canada's fishery will not be able to supply her demands; the American catch cannot supplement it. We can. The Americans are being driven from their own shores, having depleted their waters by purse seining, as one instance, and are being forced to abandon the Grand Banks through want of sufficient bait supply. Is it not clear as poondy that it would be suicidal for us under any conditions to supply the enemy with guns and ammunition to drive our people from the land of their birth, which should be prosperous, great, glorious and free? Under a wise administration, especially at this juncture, I see the day fast approaching when the exodus from Newfoundland will cease, and when our exiled countrymen will return joyfully. The best morals, the best health, and the freest life is that of our fishermen. The laughing

or lashing waters keep him vigorous in muscle, nerve and mind; the open forest (with no reserve areas) in winter time gives him interest in life. He works well, he eats well (even though it be not the best his grocer can supply), and he sleeps well, when those who indulge in luxury fall to enjoy it.

I Travelled the Best Parts of This Globe, Saw the Condition of the Working Classes in Many of the Centres of Industry, and Came Back With the Conviction That Newfoundland Was One of the Best Countries to Live in if Only Her Resources Were Developed and the Markets of the World Thrown Open to Her Products.

That time is coming, is at hand, is upon us. It only remains for those who have been trusted with the guidance of our destinies to guide them with wisdom and justice. Let them think deeply, move cautiously, not allow themselves to be ejected into any acquiescence in unfair demands. Sign no documents that have not our rights and interests doubly safeguarded, and above all, under all circumstances, to reserve right of appeal to that Tribunal from which alone, perhaps, we may expect impartial decisions. I have so far dealt with the question in relation to cold storage, bait supply and Canadian purchase, I will now turn my attention to cured cod. Here, as we have to drop her former customers, as it will take all her catch and more to supply home consumption, Norway will not be able to take her place, the local fisheries of southern climes need hardly be taken into consideration, so that there is left to us a readier and better market than heretofore. Fish will be, at least, for prime, eight dollars a quintal next season. Should it ever be found—a very unlikely thing—that Canada can supply her own neighbors and self, it should not materially affect us, there will be always a certainty of a paying price. It is the writer's opinion that the supply of salt cod will not in future be able to meet the demand. In the near future it will not be necessary for us to ship fish. Agents will be here to represent fish interests abroad.

The Supply and Grind System will give place in great measure to cash exchange, and the fisherman will be able to buy from his favorite supplier instead, as in many cases now, depending on the humours of a merchant for enough third rate provisions to keep body and soul together till the next season comes round. I will deal with this aspect of affairs in another article. What I say is no prophecy, for already the Spaniards are upon our shores. Men will not require to ship their fish, losing time and money, and all they will require to purchase will be brought to their doors. But some will say, why not let Americans step in and buy our salt cod if they may not buy our bait? We have that market already through Canada, and there will be time enough to look into details here. It may look like harsh discrimination against the U. S. A. fisherman. It is business. Well ordered charity begins at home. We do not grudge Uncle Sam to live at the top of his tates.

But Let Him Plough His Own Field and Reap His Own Corn.

Let us do likewise. I see, then, in the present outlook the most hopeful signs of better times; but the issues before us are momentous. There will be need for serious thinking on the part of those whose decision will be final, and there will be occasion for all Newfoundlanders to be on the alert while fishery questions are under discussion. The Government should not be too conceited in its wisdom and refuse to light their lamps from an adversary's torch. Neither should an adversary hold back the light if the way to others seems dark. It is not a time for envious or vindictive opposition. It is a time for building up, not for tearing down. It is the time to present "A Solid Front, Unbroken by Petty Party Squabbling and Jealousy."

This is the advice of the Leader of the Opposition, the Patriot Bond. The whole question of the fisheries just now affects every man, woman and child in the country. It is the cod's tail that wags the whole business. It is a joint stock concern, and on the principle that union is strength, every good man and true should labor for the common good. The good of the whole is the good of the individual. There may be cases in which private speculation may be hampered for a while, but in the building up of our fish kingdom every one must lend a hand and entitle himself to reward in no distant future. It is time, then, for united effort. North, South, East and West should work together in the Legislature and out. Benjamin Franklin says: "We must all hang together or assuredly we shall hang separately." "One Country, One Constitution, one Destiny," says Daniel Webster. My readers will say I am very optimistic. Why not! Pessimism is the bane of enterprise and nips all hope of progress in the bud. The man who takes a pessimistic




