
\$400,000,000 Spent in Diamonds.

The Romance of a Wonderful Industry.

It is just now about fifty years ago since Africa began to attract diamond seekers, and it is estimated that since the opening of the mines in Africa to the end of 1908 the world has paid no less than £400,000,000 to possess diamonds. From Africa alone, according to W. R. Cattelle, in his book, "The Diamond," there have been exported during that period about 90,000,000 carats.

If to this is added the quantity stolen—which in the early years was quite large, and has always been considerable—and the diamonds mined in Brazil and elsewhere during the period, 100,000,000 carats would be a conservative estimate of the quantity produced. In the rough the value is put down at £150,000,000. But if the cost of cutting, the profits of the syndicate, importers, jobbers, and retail jewelers are added, the diamond produce of the world since the opening of the mines in Africa to the end of 1908 would have amounted to much more.

Mr. Cattelle mentions, among other famous diamonds, the Braganza, called also "the King of Portugal's diamond," which is said to weigh 1,680 carats. It was found in Brazil. It is still in the rough, and no one is allowed to see it. But one of the most important stones from the mines of Brazil was the Star of the South. It was picked up by a negro in 1853. Her master gave her, as a reward, freedom and a pension for life, and sold the stone for £2,000. The new owner, upon de-

posting it with the Bank of Rio de Janeiro, got advances of £30,000 upon it.

Ultimately it was sold to a syndicate, and it was cut to an oval brilliant in an Amsterdam establishment at a cost of nearly £500. An Indian rajah offered, through a merchant, £110,000 for it, but the offer was refused. Later Mr. E. Dresden bought it for the Gaekwar of Baroda.

The Porter-Rhodes is one of the finest diamonds of large size. It was taken from the Cape diggings in 1880 and was valued at £200,000. The vizan of Hyderabad gave £400,000 for a diamond which came to Europe from the Cape in 1884.—T.H.B.

Regiment Revolts and Massacres 1000 Manchus.

Special Evening Telegram.

PEKIN, To-day. The massacre of natives at Hankow by the Imperial troops, intelligence of which reached both the War Board and the German Legation, may prove a serious hindrance to peace negotiations. Hankow streets are narrow, houses are closely packed, and there are many Chinese merchants and manufacturers of gold and silver. The Concessions are divided from the native city by streets 50 or 60 feet wide, and it will be difficult to protect the foreign houses from fire or attacks; as the Imperial troops have evidently got beyond the control of the officers. The foreign defences include marines from twelve gunboats of eight or nine nations and also volunteers from among missionaries and business people. The exodus from Peking continues and shops and private houses are closed in anticipation of a massacre. A dispatch from Shan Si province says a regiment of Shan Si troops, dispatched to assist the Imperialists, mutilated, killed the General, then bombarded a Manchu city, massacring a thousand Manchus, including the Governor and his family.

Well, says Mrs. Tucker, I see our
Governor, Sir Ralph Williams, is back
again safe and sound. There's a kind

Mrs. Tucker welcomes back His

suite. Mrs. Tucker doesn't quite
understand what the "suite" is, but
any way she welcomes it back, for it
must be something worth welcoming
when 'tis in company with the Gov-
ernor. Mrs. Tucker thinks 'tis about
time that they cut out firing twenty-
one guns when the Governor arrives.
There's nothing of the genuine, sponta-
neous character about it—nothing
wholesome or original. I'll bet
twenty dollars, says Mrs. Tucker, that
if you were in chums with the Gov-
ernor and could talk to him in a
straightforward fashion, and if you
asked him what he thought of this
twenty-one gun business, he'd tell you
'twas one of the numerous ordeals
you have to undergo when you are a
Governor. Another, is being accom-
panied on the landing by a fleet of insur-
gence well wishers, who tell him a
dozen times that they are delighted
to meet him once again, and shake
his hand in an official, gingerly man-
ner. You see the same old "second
eleven" team on the wharf in all wea-
thers and at all hours, and if the
Governor cut out the twenty-one gun

out being bored to death.

One of our Governors, who by the
way died early, being asked if he

land in the winter, said he didn't

yards admit goats, and as soon as the
report of guns resound o'er south-
side hills, through the gate will
swarm the same old-fashioned faces
that drove Governors in days gone
by the untimely deaths, either that
drove them to the Bahamas or to
warmer climates.

Grand Falls Robbery.

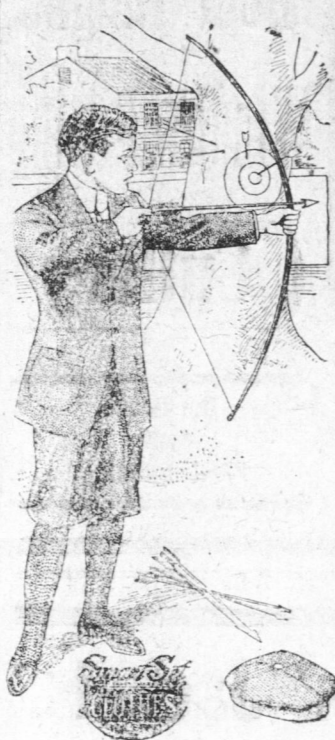
