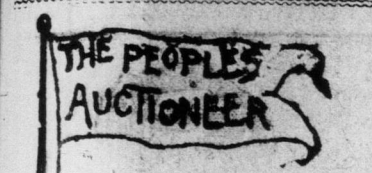

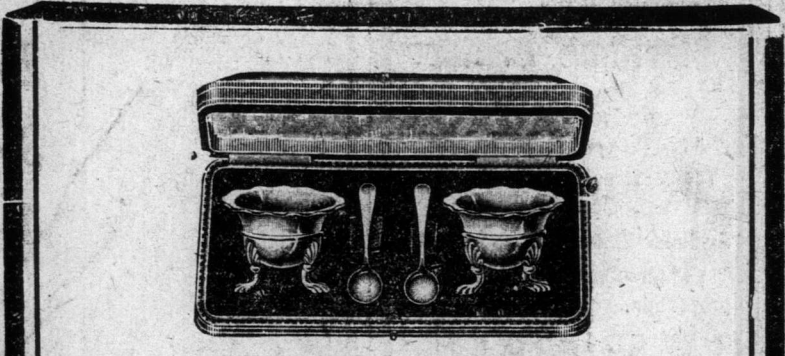

## Many Pupils Suicide.

GERMAN SCHOOL SYSTEM BLAMED.

Fill Pupils With Dreariness of Life, While England Now Makes Schools Most Attractive Place.

The sad crop of suicides amongst desperate little German schoolboys because they have done badly in the Easter examination lists suggests that the Germans have by no means all the right on their side in their methods of education, says the London Standard.

In England we are often inclined to admire the rigorous efficiency of the German educational system, and to compare unfavorably our own lively and careless schoolboys with the closely packed repositories of learning who gaze seriously through their spectacles at Herr Professor in the German schoolrooms. But in our usual careless way it seems that we have got a lot, if not most, of the right on our side after all.

Sir J. H. Yoxall, M. P., thinks so, at any rate, and as general secretary of the National Union of Teachers there is little that he does not know about elementary and secondary education in this country.

'We are getting farther and farther away from anything bearing the remotest resemblance to the iron-bound system of Germany,' he said to a representative recently. The whole movement in England is to make school attractive and to leave pupils with a desire for study in after life. If you treat a boy like a machine and try to stuff him with knowledge—without taking any account of his capacity for assimilation—you disgust him with the idea of learning anything, and the distaste most likely remains with him forever. But if you go into a teashop now and see what the young clerk is reading you will generally find that it is something pretty good. The taste for reading remains after school, and the production of cheap classics has helped enormously in this direction.

HOW UNLIKE GERMAN SYSTEM

Not many years ago the visit of the inspector for the periodical examination was a great ordeal for the youngsters, an ordeal which sometimes approached sheer terror. Now that has been done away with. The individual examination has been relaxed, and the inspectors come not to examine but to inspect. The teachers are thus left more free to develop the intellectual side of their pupils and to differentiate, instead of trying to bring them up to one level standard. And the consequence is that the elementary schools have now become pleasant places. The children, boys and girls, too,

like to be there. The German system seems to develop a weariness of life, and morbid ideas creep in with the brain fog that comes of prolonged studying. In our secondary schools there has been no relaxation. Examinations are as stiff as ever they were, but then they have never been near so hard as they are in Germany. The Germans are over-systematized, but I am inclined to think our fault is that we are a little under-systematized.

Do Lessons During Holidays.

But no doubt the method suits us. The individuality of the English boy makes him want to strike out on a line of his own, and his training helps this. The German boy, on the other hand, is Prussianized even in his schooldays, and has to do his lessons with all the earnestness and severity of military drill. And then, with all this fierce competitive education, there are comparatively few prizes at the end of it, and with the examinations tragic disappointments are bound to come, and as we see, suicides, at sixteen. And there is a tremendous difference in the character of the English boy and his Teuton cousin, which has much to do with this question of suicides. With the German boy amatory symptoms, for instance, develop very early, and the combination of a serious passion and hard study in early youth may prove too much for him. A check at an examination is sufficient to cause the catastrophe. With the English boy his healthy open-air games save him from morbid or amorous fancies. The German boy has his gymnastics, but all these do not compare with foot-ball, cricket, and paper-chasing.'

Search Unknown Wilds.

U. of P. Finance Expedition to the Head of Amazon River.

DETROIT, May 18.—An expedition into the heart of South America, the one remaining part of the earth of which secrets are not known to white men, will leave the United States this summer, headed by Arfot Lange, who has left Detroit for New York. The expedition will be financed by the University of Pennsylvania.

The explorers will endeavor to penetrate to the head of the great Amazon River, braving fever, cannibals, wild animals and other dangers of the jungle. They will be gone three years. The expedition will be fully equipped by the university for study of 275 tribes of Central South America. Moving pictures of the natives and of the country will be taken. A steam launch, between eighty-five and one hundred feet long, will carry the party, which will include besides Lange, who is known as 'The Man from the Amazon,' a doctor, skipper, engineer, moving picture machine operator, cook, and all-round man, stenographer and a couple of native guides.

Saves Man's Life, Then Loses His Own.

Uses Canoe to Rescue Swimmer and Drowns Later When Craft Capsizes.

NEW YORK, May 27. Within three hours after he had risked his life to save a drowning man Carl Jeffel, twenty-four years old, employed in a boat house at 149th street and the Hudson River, was drowned when the canoe he was paddling in front of the boat house was overturned by the waves from a steamboat. Jeffel was drowned within sight of more than five hundred persons in Riverside Drive, who watched him struggling in the water. Within a few yards of him as he sank for the last time were ten or twelve small boats full of pleasure seekers.

Many of those who saw Jeffel's canoe overturn had watched him three hours before when in the same craft he had paddled out into the river and rescued a swimmer who was attacked with cramps. Although unable to swim, Jeffel, at the risk of capsizing his canoe, reached over the side and, grasping the drowning man by his bathing suit with one hand, paddled the canoe to shore with the other.

Three hours later Jeffel put out from the boat house for a short paddle. When fifty feet from the boat house the canoe overturned and Jeffel was thrown into the water. The canoe floated away from him, and when he came to the surface he was struggling wildly and calling for help. Persons who stood on the shore were powerless to aid him.

In a motorboat nearby was Millard Hotelling, of No 414 West 154th St. He steered his boat to the overturned canoe and dived several times after Jeffel's body, but failed to recover it. Jeffel, who served three years in the German navy, was unmarried and had been in the United States about a year.

Work Being Rushed  
On new White Star Liner, which will be 20 feet longer than Titanic and which will be fitted on same imposing scale.

LONDON, May 7.—Two new liners for the White Star Company are at present under construction at the yards of Harland & Wolff, Belfast. One of these vessels, the keel of which was laid several months ago, will be nearly twenty feet longer than the Titanic, and will be fitted and finished throughout on the same imposing scale as were the Olympic and Titanic. In view of the loss of the latter, the work of completing this new vessel will be accelerated. Every available man in the Queen's Island works is engaged, in order to have the liner finished as soon as possible.

It will be over a year before the new ship will be completed, and sufficient time will be afforded to embody the latest details regarding life boats and other life saving appliances which the Board of Trade may direct, after the forthcoming inquiry.

Story of a Diamond.

Pitt's Purchase of the Great Mogul and its Sale to France.

In his 'Feuilles d'Histoire' M. Bioges published a mass of correspondence that had not hitherto seen the light relative to the history of the diamond of the great Mogul. This correspondence consists of letters of Thomas Pitt, grandfather of the Earl of Chatham.

In 1701 Pitt was governor of Madras, and at the same time he represented an English company. One day a man came and offered to sell for eighty nine thousand pounds a diamond of extraordinary size, evidently stolen from the mines of the great Mogul.

In his position of governor Pitt should have denounced the theft; in his position of commercial agent he should have thought first of the interests of his company. He did neither, but used his authority to intimidate the man and beat down his price, and eventually the precious stone came into Pitt's possession for the sum of £20,000.

He committed it to the care of his son Robert, ordering him to take it to England and have it cut. When his son had started on his journey the father began to have qualms. He calculated the value of the diamond at £800,000, and the very idea of such a vast sum frightened him.

His wife was already a great spendthrift, and he feared his son would take after her. His fears were not groundless, for Robert hastened to marry a dowryless girl and began housekeeping on a ruinous scale.

The diamond when it came into the hands of the cutter, Cope, by no means fulfilled all the expectations founded upon its value. Impurities and fissures necessitated a wholesale cutting down, and from 426 carats it fell finally to 128.

To make matters worse, Thomas Pitt found himself in hot water. His political enemies made things warm for him, and his company talked of bringing an action against him to recover the value of the diamond. He judged it wise to return to Europe himself and get rid of the stone and wind up the whole affair.

His patriotism would have liked to see the diamond remain in England, but Queen Anne's funds were always at a low ebb and were not equal to the strain of buying the great Mogul's stone. George I. admired the stone whole-heartedly, but declined to buy it on the ground that it was Parliament's duty to make him a present of it. So Pitt resolved to offer the jewel to the regent of France, who decided to purchase it for the sum of £100,000.—Paris Journal des Debats.

**The High/Low Price.**

There is a certain condition of modern business against which I wish the women of this country would in some way protest, and that is the influx of articles, which, though good enough to all outward appearance, are so cheaply made that they are almost entirely useless for practical purposes.

For instance, I tried five matches the other day before I found one which would accomplish the purpose for which matches are presumably made. The first two broke, the third had no phosphorus, and from the fourth and fifth the phosphorus snapped off, in the last instance alighting on my hand and burning itself out there, a happening which did not improve my opinion of cheap matches.

Again, I am constantly finding blotters that do not make any pretense of blotting, at least not in the desirable sense of the word—they certainly blot things in the other sense. Sometimes the reverse side is elaborately decorated, but the blotter side is absolutely useless. And when I am ready to blot a letter, it is not a picture card that I want, but a blotter.

How often we find envelopes which have no intention whatever of being stuck together. The glue upon them is so scarce or of such inferior quality that it is impossible to make the envelope actually envelope anything, without an auxiliary in the shape of some more glue or a dab of sealing wax.

And surely you have noticed how much more easily the pencils of the present day break than those which we used to buy ten or twenty years ago. Why, I have often seen a pencil break so many times during a

single attempt to sharpen it that half the pencil was consumed that way. Very good business for the manufacturer, but not so good for the unfortunate under dog, the consumer. These are a few examples of the cheap, well appearing, but practically futile articles, with which the markets are so flooded nowadays. Doubtless you can add many other examples from your own experience.

When the manufacturer of a century ago produced the wooden nutmeg, the joke went round the world, and Connecticut received a nickname that will probably last her for life. To-day we have many articles that are just as much "jokes," as far as utility is concerned, as the nutmeg, but we don't nickname any states for them—they are too common.

Now to me this is one of the most pernicious manifestations of the high cost of living. To pay thirty per cent. more than you did ten years ago for a substantial and desirable article is a bad enough. But to pay more for the shoddy made that is worth next to nothing is really far worse.

What can women do about all this, you ask? Well, they simply use the only weapon left to the consumer; they can refuse to consume. They can denounce the shoddy article to the retail shopkeeper, so that he, in his turn, will denounce it to the wholesaler, and who knows but that in the course of time the manufacturers might get the idea that shoddy goods are not wanted. They can buy the substantial article even if it does cost a little more. Believe me, it will not be more expensive in the end.

Shoddiness and cheapness—not in-expensiveness, mind you, but the cheapness which is most costly in the end—are the curses of the age. Let us protest against them in every way we can think of.

It is a loss to the whole country, for it was a natural park that attracted tourists to its lakes and streams.—Western Star.

**Surgery Without Blood.**

A Knife That Cauterises as it Cuts. Included in the electro-therapeutic department of the Middlesex Hospital is an instrument called the "cold cautery." It is a little brass knife or spoon with blunt edges, on the surfaces of which an intensely hot arc flame is produced by electricity. Used for the removal of certain forms of malignant growth this spoon or knife cuts its way through tissues and at the same time seals the cut ends of the veins and arteries, preventing all bleeding.

**Gen. Booth's Sight Gone.**

Surgeons Issue Statement—At First It was Hoped That Operation For Cataract Would be Successful.

London, May 30.—That General William Booth, the head of the Salvation Army, who recently underwent an operation for the removal of a cataract from his left eye, will henceforth be totally blind, is the opinion reached by the doctors after a consultation this afternoon. An official bulletin issued by the surgeons says: "It is now evident that there is little hope of the preservation of General Booth's sight."

**Government Affords No Relief Whatever!**

"Tim Shannahan" is doing excellent service in drawing attention to the Housing Problem, which is without doubt one of the acute phases in the city of the general problem of living. We mention this as one of the phases, for it is only one. There is a general rising of prices in the necessities of life, which make the problem of living increasingly difficult.

There is the coal problem and the food problem, especially that of beef. The remarkable feature is that the cost of living has increased in America, the British Isles and Europe. The beef trouble is felt in the States and in England just as it is in Newfoundland, and the general pressure is especially felt, where there has been practically no rise worth while in the rates of wages. That is probably the underlying cause of the social unrest which has been so marked the past few years in Great Britain. In St. John's, happily, there is no unemployment problem, and there has been a rise of wages among workmen generally, but it is questionable whether the ruling high prices of housing, heating and feeding has not wiped out the advantages of the rise in wages, whilst in the case of the classes whose means of living has not increased in recent years, they are positively much worse off than they were in days of lower prices.

The irony of the situation arises from the fact that everything has been favourable in Newfoundland for the Government to attack the problem and afford the relief needed. Instead of doing so, yearly the Government is piling up the public debt and making it increasingly difficult to live. The Railway Loan to be raised this year cannot realize sufficient to pay for the work under the 1910 Railway Extension Contract, and a third Railway Loan must be raised in the future, and this does not take into account the promises of extensive railway building outside that contract. Extravagance in the expenditure of public monies has been the rage the past three years, and instead of affording relief the Govt. have been extracting more from the hard-earned wages of the people. The Morris Government were pledged to Reduction of

## Cable News.

**Special to Evening Telegram.**  
WASHINGTON, June 5.  
The frank confession of President Gomez that he was unable to meet the demands of the large plantation owners of Eastern Cuba for adequate guards against marauders and insurgents, was the factor to-day that led Captain Kline, commanding the U. S. Naval Station at Guantanamo, to set in motion a body of U. S. marines, gathered there for such a purpose. Kline's action in despatching nearly half his available force of marines into the interior of Cuba gave the signal for the departure from Key West to Guantanamo of half the second squadron of the Atlantic fleet, which had been lying at anchor at Key West for the last week. The facts as disclosed at the State Department are that several large American, French and Spanish Companies, operating plantations and mines in Eastern Cuba, telegraphed the Cuban Government a demand for 100 regular troops for each of their mills and cane fields. Gomez pointed out that the request would require 1,250 of his best troops for the protection of the group of foreign properties in the single section disaffected, while his whole regular army did not suffice for police work alone. By acceding to the request he would have no forces left with which to carry on the campaign against the insurgents.

## Spectacular Fire.

New York, June 3.—A seven story building almost under the Brooklyn Bridge, aflame from basement to roof, to-night provided one of the most picturesque fire spectacles which New York has seen in many years. The building was occupied by Lewis Bros., ink manufacturers.  
The explosion of great quantities of chemicals sent windows and doors and bricks flying across the street, causing a small panic among the patients in the Volunteer hospital, less than two blocks distant. Hundreds of the police reserves were called to clear Brooklyn Bridge of traffic, and for more than three hours the firemen fought the blaze from the bridge and street. A dozen firemen were hurt by falling glass. The loss is upwards of \$100,000.

Rawlins, Wyo., May 24.—Springing his own death trap, Joseph Senz, at the State prison here to-day, paid the penalty for the murder of William Lloyd.  
Senz walked to the gallows, where he was to hang himself, with head erect and with a slight smile on his lips. He stepped quietly on the trap and pulled a plug from a bucket of water which, emptying, released the weight which sprang the trap.

Chancellor Lloyd George stated in the Commons to-day that with the spirit of moderation exhibited on both sides there would seem to be little difficulty in the way of an amicable settlement of the dock strike. The strike leaders, he said, no longer insisted on recognition of the employees' federation ticket as the condition upon which work would be resumed. On the other hand, the employers said it would be impossible to comply with the demands of the strikers for the reinstatement of all the men, as many of their places have already been filled. They agreed to take on as many men as they could and as opportunity offered. Permanent peace in the port of London was so important, the Chancellor said, that the Government hoped means would be found to give effect to their proposals for the formation of a joint conciliation board, fully representative of the whole body of employers and men, with a view to settle all disputes arising in the future.

"I did," said Mr. Ismay. "Where were those passengers?" asked Sir Rufus. "I can only assume that they had gone to the after part of the ship. I was not thinking about them at the time."

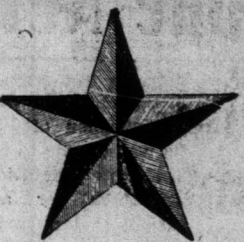

Meat, eggs, butter, fish, potatoes, coffee, tea, sugar, salt, molasses, beans and peas average 22 per cent higher, wheat, corn, oats, barley, flour, etc., 33 per cent higher.

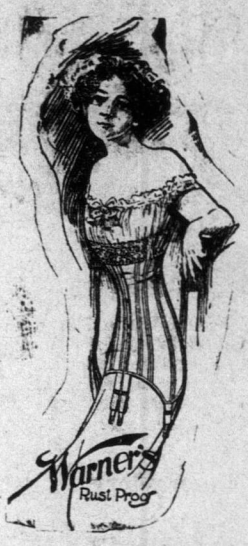

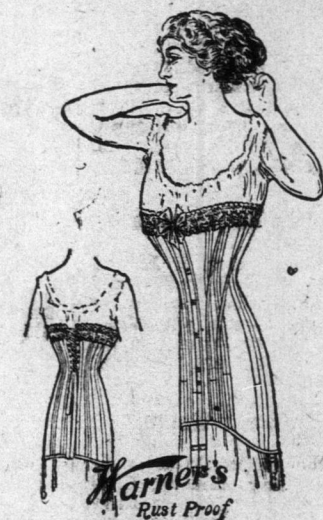

**The Dock Strike.**

Strikers Offer Monetary Guarantee to Observe Award of Proposed Joint Board.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day.

On a motion to adjourn the matter of the strike was again brought up in the Commons last night by O'Grady, labor member. He urged the Government to do something to end the strike and denounced the employers for breaking agreements. MacDonald labor leader, said he was authorized to state that if the men had a substantial guarantee that the Government, in conjunction with employers, was going to do something to set up a Joint Board immediately, the men would be asked to return to work without waiting until everything was settled. Bonar Law regarded the establishment of a Joint Board as most desirable, but in the meantime it was the clear duty of the Government to guarantee protection to all men desiring to work. He taunted ministers with being afraid to do anything which they might risk losing the labor vote. Negotiations have brought a settlement of the dock strike appreciably nearer by the introduction of a novel element in the relations between capital and labor, which may have far-reaching importance. This was the offer by the Transport Workers Federation of a monetary guarantee for the observance of awards made by the Joint Board, which the Government proposes to establish. The disputants are now considered nearer agreement than at any time during the strike.

**Supreme Court.**

Before the Full Bench. Howell vs. Taylor.

This appeal case was set for to-day, and Kent, K. C., was heard for the appellant. It was held by the Court that the magistrate who gave judgment in this case had no jurisdiction.

Mark Gibbons vs. Walter Crosbie and A. W. Piccott.

This case was continued this morning. The typist from Mr. J. C. Crosbie's office was called and sworn, and examined by Mr. Mews. The evidence given was as to typewritten documents. The plaintiffs counsel, Mr. Mews, endeavours to prove that certain documents which were alleged to have been typed in Mr. Crosbie's office were not done there.

Mr. William White was called and sworn. Mr. Mews moved to have evidence heard as to Mr. Piccott's financial standing at the time of the transaction. Howley, K.C., objected to the evidence being given. Counsel admitted that the defendants were neither of them in a strong financial position at the time of the transaction.

Mr. Alec Marshall was called and sworn and examined by Mr. Mews who states he cashed two cheques for \$1,200 and \$5,000, respectively, for (Walter Crosbie) paid in twenty dollar bills and ten dollar bills, mostly in twenty dollar bills. Neither Walter Crosbie, nor his wife had accounts at the Royal Bank, nor had A. W. Piccott. Thomas Mott of the Bank of Nova Scotia was called and sworn and examined by Mr. Mews, stated Walter Crosbie had no account at his bank, neither had his wife. A. W. Piccott has an account at this bank. Copy of Mr. Piccott's account with the Bank was produced, showing deposits of \$600 and \$500.

T. D. Carman, accountant of the Bank of Montreal was called, sworn and examined by Mr. Mews. States neither Walter Crosbie nor his wife have any account there. Copy of the account produced. Account was not put in evidence, as it was not a personal account. This concluded the additional evidence.

Howley, K.C., asked for an adjournment to confer with his clients. The Chief Justice and Mr. Justice Emerson gave it as their opinion that in this action strong effort should be made by Mr. Howley to arrange a settlement on behalf of his clients, particularly so said Mr. Justice Emerson as one of the defendants was a Minister of the Crown. The case thereupon adjourned till June 14th, at 11 o'clock.

Well, Tim, said Mrs. Tucker, I see by the paper that you had an interview about the tenement house problem with old "Pay your lawful debts." the other night.  
Yes, said I, we had, what did you think of it?  
Oh, the same as usual, said she, ends up in a bottle of smoke. It's just as well for you, Tim, said she, to try and get life in a dead cat as to try and arouse enthusiasm in the tenement question. Of course of you needn't get vexed, but my opinion is you're wasting valuable time.  
I don't know so much about that, says Tucker, Rome wasn't built in a day; no great movement that ever amounted to anything was ever brought to a success without a little trouble. I'd advise Tim to keep it going and never cry "halt" till he gets some one interested.  
Oh, that's it precisely, said Mrs. Tucker, get some one interested, but it all depends on who the some one is. It's like getting up the annual Regatta, you must have some big gun mixed up in the job, or 'twill fall flat as a pancake. You must have philanthropy mix with business in order to get the thing started, but keen business men will tell you that you can't mix philanthropy and business. It does not work.  
Well, if that's the case, says Tucker, what's the use of men making long-winded speeches and almost promising that they are going to erect twenty houses for the poor as soon as the spring opens. 'Twould be a great deal better if they'd close their mouths and say nothing about it at all, for it only creates false hopes which end up in bitter disappointments.  
They are talking Parks and Hotels says Tucker, but we'd get on first-rate without any more parks; why isn't the whole country a park? They say our people will stay for the rent. They say that they chorp up the inside of the house and make kindling wood of them. But this is my mind, says Tucker, is like the story of the "Three Black Crows," the oftener 'tis told the worse it grows. Surely our people are not as barbarous as all that, and if they are well, the sooner we put the park money in a lecture hall and send for an up-to-date lecturer who will be able to civilize us the better.  
No, says Tucker, the boot only pinches the poor. The politician can smoke his ten cent cigar in his rocking chair out in his flower garden, while the poor house wife perspires to death over the bed of a sick child in a 6 by 8 room situated in a tenement that contains two such cells as what is known as a kitchen. No sewerage and very often no backyard consequently, as Rev. Mr. Hackett stated, the night soil can has to be kept in the house all day, and the politician who chewed the rag all winter where is he? He preaches better tenements when the winter storms howled. He prated about open windows and no splitting. But now the fine weather has arrived what's he doing to make things better? Is it giving him a thought? Does he as a public man feel that he is responsible, no matter how slightly, for the big death rate? Not he. He smokes his cigar on the veranda and makes up another rattling speech to dele out to the poor next winter.

### The Eskimos of Labrador

It is suggested by Dr. S. K. Hut- ton, who spent five years in Labrador, that the progenitors of the Labrador Eskimos come from Siberia, and that they are physically related to the Mongolians. So far as is known, they are the aboriginal owners of the Labrador coast, and their territory extends inland more than a hundred miles. Two hundred years ago they occupied the whole length of the coast from north to south, about 600 miles, and their numbers were greater. Now they are confined to that part which lies between Makovik and Killinek, between latitude 55 degrees and 60 degrees 30 minutes north. In that area there are now fewer than 1,300 people, practically all that remain of the Labrador branch of the Inuit race. They are all professing

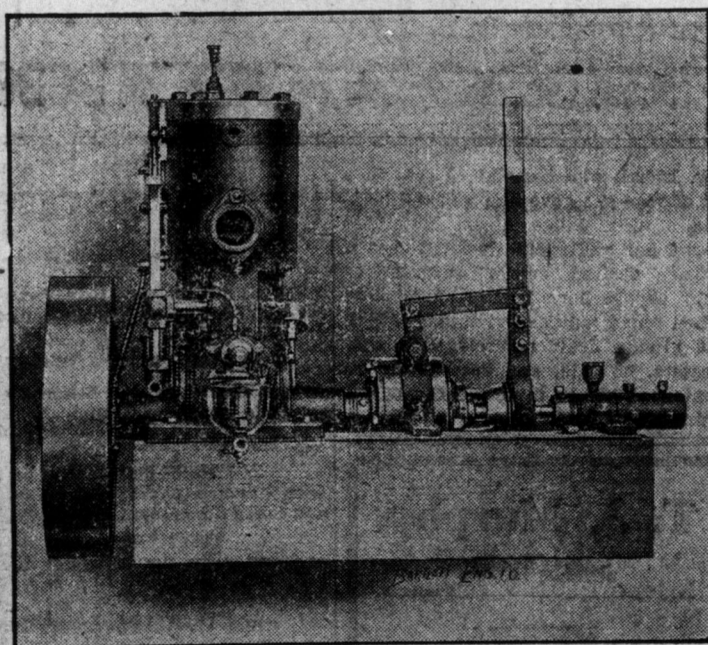
