LONDON, Feb. 11.
Despatches give details of the Antarctic tragedy. Capt. Oates evidently set out from the tent in which his four companions had all but succumbed to starvation and extrustion, to brave death alone in the blizzard which had overwhelmed them. After a braye struggle of weeks, with his hands frostbitten, Oates declared to his comrades that he was going to set out in the storm, but did not know when he would come back. He left the tent and was never seen again. The oth-rs, later, tried to push on, but were after nine days' struggle with the blizzard. Food and fuel were alike exhausted. Probobly realizing that his party were doomed, Captain Scott-entered in his diary, four days later, out to misfortune. He said nobody in the world could expect successfully to storms as they had met, and which had so retarded their progress. When they arrived within 11 miles of the denot they had only fuel enough for one his rough notes. He said that these and their bodies must tell the tale, He appealed to his countrymen to care for those depending on the per ishing explorers.

According to special despatches the Terra Nova Relief Party, which found the bodies, read a simple ritual then set out to search for the body of captain Oates, but, although they overed over twenty mile discovered no trace of it.
