### **Thoughts Upon** the Times.

We should bow our heads to the people of England and to the incomparable valor of her armies and fleets. The willingness, too, of the people to sacrifice themselves for the good of the nation is truly remarkable. Nay, it is inspiring, for what people have willingly made greater sacrifices during the war than the British, both in blood and treasure? The last vote of credit which the House of Commons passed unanimously on March 7th was for £600,-000,000. This brings the total amount voted for war purposes since the great struggle began, up to £6,842,-000,000 or the staggering amount in our currency of about thirty-four billion dollars. The human understanding can hardly grasp what this stupendous amount means. It means that the war has so far cost every man, woman and child living in England-and there are some thirty-five millions-about one thousand dollars each. Yet we can see no trace of panic among the people because of this colossal war debt. The nation. realizing that its manhood is fighting and dying for its national freedom, freely makes its sacrifice of treasure. The British people have long ago woke up to the fact that this war proves, if it proves anything, the necessity of having the strongest nerves and best intellects not only to carry on the war, but the government of the country as well. They realize that if the Empire is to survive, it must have for its government, not flatterers and demagogues, but statesmen who have the experience and knowledge of men and events adequate to the danger and difficulty of the times. This is why the nation has sought out and exalted to responsible positions such men as Sir Eric Geddes and his younger brother Sir Auckland, who were practically unknown before the war began. They were selected to fill the positions which they now hold because of their ability to organize and administer the resources of the nation to the best There appeared in yesterday's pa-

pers the advertisement of an outport planter (well known to the writer) offering his house, lands, stores and fishing property for sale for the small sum of fourteen hundred dollars. He gives as his reason for disposing of his property that his two sons had volunteered. There are many instances like this in Newfoundland which could be used to show how unfair is the system of voluntary enlistment. I have seen statements in the newspapers made by politicians to the effect that selective conscription could not be enforced in this country, but I do not remember to have seen one reason as to why, it could not. I have also remarked that it is always the politician who is so ready to make this assertion. I have further remarked that while the politician is so ready to defend voluntary enlistment yet not one of them to my knowledge can personally say, "I have offered." It shows how hollow and how selfish is their patriotism. They ask the people to do what they lack the courage to do themselves. In expecting our young men to volunteer in sufficient numbers to keep pace with the losses taking place in the Regiment, is to expect them to be more patriotic than the men in England, the United States and Canada, for as is well known, selective conscription has been in force in those countries for some time. The writer, whilst anxious beyond measure, to see the gaps in the Regiment filled without delay, cannot agree with the suggestion of further wasting money and time on voluntary enlistment There is nothing before it but failure. No one realizes this better than the people themselves. Further, if after all its experience with military matters, this plan has been suggested to His Excellency the Governor by the present Administration, the sooner the public demand their resignation the better for the country and the Regiment which so sorely needs reinforcements. The need for men is too serious for us to waste further

time on experiemnts. Premier Lloyd George's appeal cannot be misunderstood. He says: "I would also urge the Government of Newfoundland to reinforce its heroic troops in the fullest possible manner and with the smallest possible delay. The struggle is only in its opening stages and it is our business to see that our armies get the maximum measure of support that we can give them. Let no one think that what even the remotest of the Dominions can now do can be too late. Before this campaign is finished the last man may count."

These are serious words and we would do well to ponder them over in our minds.

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
