MASTERPIECE OF EMBALMING But to my mind the most wonderful



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

Only about 7,000 barrels of Pork and 3,500 barrels of Beef have been brought to St. John's since January 1st.

FLOUR. - Flour imports to St. John's so far this year are short about 20,000 barrels as compared with 1913. This is said to be caused by shortage of tonnage more than from any other cause. Beside, there was a good surplus of flour on hand with dealers here at the close of the year. We do not think that anybody expects lower prices this side of September. MOTOR TRUCKS ORDERED FOR FIRE COMPANIES.

It will be learned with interest that nspector General of Police C. H. Hutchings has, in pursuance of his ambition to put the Police and Fire forces to top-notch condition, ordered two new motor trucks for the Central Station-one an accomodation truck and the other a chemical. They should arrive by the end of the month and eventually others will be ordered for the Eastern and Western Companies. In all cities abroad the horse trucks are retreating before motors and, in oider that St. John's shall no be too far behind in the swim, the present move has been made. The machines to arrive are two combination chemical and hose, motor driven trucks, each with 60 gallon tanks, 1000 feet hose, 200 feet chemical hose, 24 feet extra ladder and roof ladder, and are for use in down-town fires, the old trucks to be kept in reserve for fires on the higher levels.

state of Ireland to the Lord Mayor of Dublin says:-"The Home Rule Bill now before Parliament proposes to establish Self Government throughout the length and breadth of Ireland on lines more generous than the act of 1914. It provides means by which Ireland can attain its unity by the free act of its own citizens, without further reference to the Imperial Parliament. I do not believe that it is possible for Ireland to attain unity and peace except by these methods of reason and conciliation. The policy of Sinn Fein is exactly opposite. It depends upon violence in opinion and violence in action. It is a policy, which never can lead to the union of Ireland. It certainly can never achieve its avowed object of an Irish Republic. It can only condemn Ireland to a long continuance of terrorism and distress. NOTICE TO CARMEN, TRUCK-MEN, ETC.

The following Rules, Regulations and Bye-Laws, passed at a meeting of the St. John's Municipal Council, April 1st, 1920, are published for the infor-

No person shall drive a cart, truck or sled, for hire within the town of St. John's, without having first obtained a license therefor from the St. John's Municipal Council, under a penalty not less than \$5 and not exceeding \$10, or in default imprisonment not exceeding thirty days.

The said license shall be issued annually, signed by the Secretary of the Council, and shall remain force until the 15th day of April next after the date of issue. The fee payable therefor shall

The foregoing license fee shall be exclusive of and in addition to the usual Horse Cart and Sled

(5) All penalties under these rules may be sued for and recovered in the manner prescribed by the St. John's Municipal Act.

NOTE-The attention of Cab, Cart and Truck Drivers is called to sec-tion 4 of the Municipal Act, 1911, as follows:—"Owners of horses kept within the City limits for hire or private use shall register same, and owners of carts, wagons, cabs, sleighs, and other vehicles drawn by horses kept, within such limits shall also be registered. Such registration shall be made in the office of the Council not later than the 15th day of April in each year. The tax imposed upon such horses and vehicles shall be paid at the time of registration. All parties, who have not registered
