BRITISH POLITICS AND LABOURS LONDON, Nov. 2. The attention of the political world s absorbed in the result of the Muniipal elections in which Labour suffered overwhelming defeat. Returns in seventy of the leading Boroughs in the Provinces show that out of five hundred and seventy-four Labour candidates only two hundred and fifteen were elected, while Conservatives elected three hundred and fifty out of our hundred and fifty nominated. In London there was a similar landslide Labour held five hundred and seventy-three seats in the old councils, but will have two hundred and fifty-three in the new. Labour now holds only four London Boroughs, Battersea, Bermondsey, Poplar, Woblwich, against twelve formerly held, while n eleven of the London Boroughs not a single Labour representative was elected. There is no doubt that the action of Poplar Council in paying exorbitant unemployment doles, and the tendency of Labour generally to indulge in costly reforms in services for sanitation, education and poor relief, which, however beneficial, have thrown heavy burdens on rate payers, have frightened householders nto voting against Labour. There is difference, however, between Muniipal and political contests, and it is usafe to draw inference from Muniipal elections. Nevertheless the returns have caused a certain amount dejection in the Labour Party and satisfaction in the opposing parties.





BOYAL BETROTHAL OF JAPANESE

TOKYO (Canadian Press)-On the rince Regent of Japan presented his betrothal, and to finally seal the contract the Emperor and Empress donated five rolls of silk, a cask of sake and a box containing two tal, a variety of fish. That, howver, was only a very small part of he ceremony. Early on the morning of the betrothal day Count Tokugaus the grand chamberlain to the Emperor, through Viscount Makino, minister to the Imperial Household, told the Prince Regent that Prince Kuni, father of Princess Nagako, had given his consent to the match. The young Prince Regent wore the yelowish brown court costume that for centuries has been the formal regalia of Japanese royalty. He received the minister in the famous Crysanthemum Hall of the imperial palace and, having heard his message, he accompanied Prince Kujo, the chief ritualist, to the imperial shrine. There, he announced his engagement to the spirits of his ancestors. After that. the Prince Regent formally thanked the Emperor and Empress and returned to his own palace, where he received the congratulations of the most prominent personages in Japan. A banquet followed and the Prince Regent was invested with the First Class Order of the Crown, one of the highest of Japanese decorations. Then came the presentation of the betrothal sword to the Princess. The sword is a simple instrument about one foot long, but made by the best swordmaker in all Japan. On its handle is carved a presenthemum. the crest of the imperial house. The esentation of the bales of silk, the vine and fish came later, but that did not terminate the ceremony. As an additional part of the betrothal service Tokyo representatives of the royal house visited the great shrine of Ise, the Sun goddess and mythical ancestor of all Japan; the grave of Jummu Tenno, the first emperor, and the Monoyama mausolea, where great men of old Japan lie buried. To the spirits of these departed giants it was announced that the future ruler of the kingdom has chosen the girl who some day would be the first lady of the land.

OF EXTERNAL SENSES.

NEW YORK, (Canadian Press)— Hearing with the fingers and seeing through the nose are the accomplishments of Willetta Huggins, a Wisconsin girl of 17. Stone blind and completely deaf for the past five years, she has learned to distinguish sounds by their vibrations, and to tell colors by smell. Up to the age of 12, Willetta had enjoyed the partial use of her eyes and ears, and her physical development had been normal. When their loss became complete she went through a long period of dejected apathy. Then she learned of Helen Keller and morose indifference to everything about her changed to lively interest and the desire to emulate Miss Keller. To-day Willetta carries on conversations by touch and attends concerts and lectures which she "hears" by touching her fingers to an audiphone. Says Dr. Thomas J. Williams of Chicago in the current Journal of the American Medical Association: "Her fine sense of touch does not stop here. She can actually read by running her fingers tips over newspaper headings of half-inch or even smaller type, and she can readily and rapidly distinguish the denomation of paper money by feeling the imprint of the number and difference of the designs." Dr. Williams tells of a number of experiments to which he submitted the girl. She "heard" him talk, he says, by resting her finger tips on his larynx, his head or his chest. She learned to differentiate between the vibrations of speech through intervening objects such as a billiard cue resting on the speaker's head or chest. She caught the vibrations in the air by holding a sheet of paper between her hands and letting the speaker talk against it. She heard words spoken over the telephone by resting her fingers against the receiver. She learned to talk by holding her fingersson her own larynx. She can tell by smell how many persons, up to eight, are in the room with her, and by smell also she knows flowers and detects the colors of materials. She was able to affirm that a sweater which the doctor handed her was of two colors—lavender and purple, and could correctly place her fingers on the dividing line. Beads all smell green, she says. 



Resumption of Anglo-American Cable Letter and Week-End Letter Services.

The Anglo-American Telegraph Co. announces the resumption on November 1st of the Cable Letter and Week-End Letter Services to Great Britain and Ireland. Cable Letters may be filed at any time and are delivered the following day. Week-End Letters may be filed at any time prior to midnight on Saturday and are delivered on Monday morning.

The rate for a Cable Letter to London and Liverpool is one-third the regular cable rate, and the rate for a Week-End letter one-quarter of the regular cable rate, in each case with a minimum of twenty words including the necessary prefix placed before the address to indicate the class of service. To places in the United Kingdom other than London and Liverpool there is an added charge of two cents per word in both classes of service to cover the landline transmission on the other side.

Both forms of service are designed for plain language business and social communications which do not require instantaneous transmission but are still of sufficient urgency that they should not be subjected to the delay incident to the carriage by trans-ocean mail. Each has its own peculiar field of usefulness, the Cable Letter serving for such correspondence as is not of immediate urgency but should still be disposed of within a day or two and the Week-End Letter for communications of perhaps still less urgency but never-theless sufficiently important to require their trans-mittal in quicker time than can be done by the overseas mail. Thus each in its own way supplies a distinct convenience of which the cable using public will no doubt be quick to take advantage
