Officers of the International association of Machinists report their strike has very largely succeeded in establishing the nine-hour rule in the trade. They claim the settlements reached have given 60,000 machinists a shorter work day; 11,000 others are affected by compromises reached, and 75,000 machinists will receive an average of 25 cents a day increase in wages.

It would appear from returns turnished by the customs department that the increase of the head tax on Chinese from \$50 to \$100 is checking the influx of this class of immigration. In 1900 there was paid in head tax about \$148,000, while this year the amount collected from this source net less than \$76,000, despite the fact that the price per head is double. The number of Chinese arriving at this port in 1901 was 761, of which 728 paid the head tax. During the same period 1,127 Chinese departed.

At a strike in one of the large cities the men hired a man with a hand organ to play in front of the factory in order to attract attention of the public to the non-union concern. The man with the organ played just one tune: "You!" Get All That Is Coming to You." then he was arrested. At the trial, the judge who was once a workman himself, asked the musician to play a tune in order to judge of his ability. The man with the organ complied, playing. "I'd Leare My Happy Home for You." He was discharged and rendered his thanks by reeling off "You're the Nicest Man I Ever Knew."—Ex.

An agitation has been started to induce the 19 cigarmakers' unions of Candala, with an aggregate membership of 1,500, to co-operate in a "Union Label League," with the purpose of driving non-union cigars from the market. It is proposed to raise funds by a special assessment of 15 cents per capita per month. This would give \$2,340 annually, which, with \$1 per capita tax from the International would total \$3,640 annually. It is proposed to emplay an agent to travel all over Canada to distribute advertising matter and address meetings with a view of booming union label cigars.



"THE GOOD OLD TIMES."

/ Discussing whether the "old times" can be properly called "good," Engineering recalls that in 1811, the mail coaches, on account of the deplorable condition of the roads, occupied 41 hours in the journey from London to Holyhead, and even in 1837 the time was 27 hours.
