The Chicage & Atlantic did not a gree to this arrangement, for the reason that its eastern connection, the Erie, insisted upon its old differential, which on the new basis would inferential, which on the new basis would inferential, which on the new basis would be 6½ cents below the tariff. The resolution covering the dressed beef subject was consequently adopted without the vote of the Chicage & Atlantic, and it is hoped the Erie may be induced to accept the authorized differential. The restoration of rates is to take place Dec. 17.



It was a remarkable case and revives interest in the question of the alarming prevalency of the 1-toxicating and fashionable cirarette labit among society women in this city.

Mrs. Walter, who is now twenty-eight years old and still shows traces of former beauty, is the wife of Joseph C. Walter, a traveling salesman for Parkhurst & Wilkinson, fron mechanis, 162 and 164 Kinzie attreet. He resides at 237 Huron street, but the nature of his business compels his absence from home most of the time. Mrs. Vigilter was thus left much alone and it was a very facile descent from Purtan ideas on the subject of tobacco to the gayety and novelty of cigarette seances in private parlors with her lady acquaintances. Was it not an exuting and intoxicaving method of whiling away the heavy hours? Mrs. Yellowplush and other ladies who were the pink of propriety bought packages of cigarettes containing highly-colored pictures from the corner druggist and smoked them when they went to call on their lady friends of an afternoon. They pronounced their experience just too lovely for anything. It was a new and deligible and subscient and leacribed and she could not resust the temptation.

With unlimited generosity abe had also visited a men's furnishing store and ordered more fine outfits for her husband than he could possibly use in several years. When objectious were made to her extravagance she became violent. Sunday night it was resolved to remove her to the detention hospital for the insane. When she was brought to the jail a package of cigarettes was found in her pocket by the attendants who searched her clothing.



CARTERS AND DRIVERS. The attention of all persons interested is respectfully called to the following extracts from

Bylaw No. 467 of the City of Toronto as amended by Bylaw No. 2189, passed Nov 20th, 1888. (6d) That all carts, wagons, sleds, sleighs or other vehicles used for the conveyance of manure, earth, sahes or other material which is loose and might otherwise drop upon the streets, shall have buxes of such size and mode streets, shall have contents thereof in such manner as that the contents thereof shall not be or extend higher than the top of such boxes, and we as to unevent any of such manure, and so as to prevent any of such manure, earth, ashes or other material from dropping upon the streets.

(6b) That all carts, wagons, sleds, sleighs or other vehicles used for hauling manure, earth, ashes or other material shall in all cases have tail-boards the height of the sides of the box. Any person or persons quilty of an infraction of any of the pravisions of this Bylaw shall, upon conviction before the Mayor, Police Magistrate or any Justice or Justices of the Peace, forfeit and pay at the discretion of the said Mayor, Police Magistrate or Justice or Justices of the Peace convicting, a penalty not exceeding the sum of
