Another and later dispatch has now been
received, and its contents are such as to
leave nothing for Congress to do with re-
gard to the President's message. It not
only confirms all that has been said in
the dispatch received by the President,
but also contains many things which
are in accord with the most friendly
views of the situation.

The dispatch received yesterday
is utterly denied. In effect the dispatch
received says that the charge that Chilean
soldiers were engaged in looting in
the United States, and to its flag and uniform,
is utterly false. We will remember, how-
ever, that the Chilean soldiers who were
engaged in looting in the United States
were not in Chilean ports protecting us
and aiding in our struggle for our in-
dependence, but were engaged in a
struggle for our independence.
