



Several vexatious questions were left undetermined by the dects-ion of the Behring Sea arbitration tri-bunal. The application of the principles laid down by that august body has not been followed by the results they were intended to accomplish. Much correspondence has been ex-changed between the two Governments on the subject of preventing the ex-terminating slaughter of seals. The need of an effective enforcement of existing regulations, as well as the adoption of such regulations as er-perience has shown to be absolutely necessary to carry out the intent of the award, has been earnestly urged upon the British Government, but thus far without effective results. In the meantime the depletion of the seal herds by means of hunting has so alarmingly progressed that unless their slaughter is at once effectively check-ed their extinction within a few years seems to be a matter of absolute cer-tainty.


The Burning of Ferguson's Barn in August Being Investigated.
