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THE MONEY QUESTION

Principally Dealt With by President Cleveland

IN HIS MESSAGE TO CONGRESS.

Arbitration Advocated in regard to Venezuela.

Also in the Matter of the Canadian Sealing Claims, which have been paid—But "the Financial Evils From Which We Suffer" Take Up Most of the Deliverance—Advocates a Gold Standard and Cancellation of Greenbacks...

Washington, Dec. 3.—The message of President Cleveland to the 54th Congress was delivered to-day. In the message, the President, after calling attention to the reports of the heads of the several departments, presents the important phases of the American relations with the foreign powers...

Our relations with Great Britain, always intimate and important, have demanded during the past year even a greater share of consideration than usual. The application of the principles laid down by that august body has not been followed by the results they were intended to accomplish.

Much correspondence has been exchanged between the two Governments on the subject of preventing an exterminating slaughter of seals. The need of an effective enforcement of such regulations as well as the adoption of such regulations as experience has shown to be absolutely necessary to carry out the intent of the award, has been earnestly urged upon the British Government...

The President points at the condition of affairs arising from the seal slaughter in the British Islands and from the unsatisfactory delimitation of the respective jurisdictions in the waters of the United States and Canada...

The President says: "It being apparent that the boundary dispute between Great Britain and the Republic of Venezuela, concerning the limits of the Republic of Venezuela, was approaching an amicable settlement, it was deemed the interests and policy of the United States as regards the controversy seemed to require that both on its account and in view of its relations with the friendly powers directly concerned, the message should be despatched at London, for communication to the British Government, in which the attitude of the United States was fully and distinctly set forth.

The general conclusion reached was that the territorial dispute between Great Britain and Venezuela, the territorial dispute between Great Britain and Venezuela, should be settled by friendly and impartial arbitration, and that the resort to such arbitration, which is a subject of whole controversy, and is not satisfied if one of the powers concerned is permitted to draw the line of demarcation through the territory in debate and to declare that it will submit to arbitration the portion lying on one side of it.

In view of these conclusions, the President in question called upon the British Government for a definite answer to the question whether it would consent to submit to arbitration the controversy between itself and Venezuela in its entirety to impartial arbitration, which in principle, he believed, would be met by the British Government has not yet been received, but is expected shortly, when further communication on the subject will probably be made to Congress.

After dealing with American foreign relations, the message says: "As a return from a review of our foreign relations to the contemplation of our national financial situation we are immediately aware that we approach a subject of domestic concern more important than any other that can engage our attention, and one at present in such a perplexing and delicate predicament to require prompt and wise treatment.

Continuing he says: "I am convinced the only thorough and practicable remedy for our troubles is found in the retirement and cancellation of our United States notes, commonly called greenbacks and the outstanding Treasury notes issued by the Government...

I believe this can be quite readily accomplished by the exchange of these notes for United States bonds of small value as large re-issuements being a low rate of interest.

The increase of our bonded debt involved in this plan would be amply compensated by renewed activity and enterprise in all business circles...

The currency withdrawn by the retirement of United States notes and Treasury notes to the amount of \$480,000,000 must be supplied by such gold as would be needed on their retirement...

The President thinks that the national banks should be allowed to issue circulation of the full par value of the bonds they deposit to secure it...

Further on, after suggesting the means which he believed will put the financial system of the country on a sound basis...

"Whatever is attempted should be entered upon fully appreciating the fact that by careless or unwise action we have reached a dangerous depth...

"I cannot but think there has been some confusion of ideas regarding the issue of bonds and the results of the withdrawal of gold...

"While I have endeavored to make a plain statement of the disordered condition of our currency...

"No Government, no human contrivance can be added for hoping that such action would maintain the value of the silver dollar...

"I have ventured to express myself on this subject with earnestness and plainness of statement...
