## CHRONICLE.

BM R. R. BOCART.
Argentine.-Le Timbre Poste illustrates the 50 pesos blue, which was not issued, however, 100,000 copies having been burne.d. It is of the usual large size and contains the portrait of Dean Funes.

Bolivak.-The Stamp Neres has received a new set dated 1891 , and in new colors. Ic. black, 5 c . orange, IOc. blue, 20 c . red, 50 c . green, I peso violet.

BaHamas. - The 4 d . envelope has been surcharged $21 / 2 \mathrm{~d}$., ( 1 ) in red, (2) red surcharge barred out and newly surcharged in black, (3) original value barred and surcharged in black.

Bolivia.-There is a $2 \quad$ ac. card closely resembling the $\approx c$., but the stamp has only nine stars and the words "American Bank Note Co., New York," are below the stamp in very small letters. Forn. T 4 . Blue on pale buff.

Britisil Honduras.-There is a new issue of stamp of same design as Seychelles. We hear of the Ic. green, 2c. rose, 3c. brown, 6c. blue, 12c. purple and green, 24 c. ycllow and blue.

Chili.-Some of the post offices in the hands of the Congressional party having run shont of stamps they are making use of the fiscal and telegraph stamps.

Falklanl) Isi.anis.-A $1 / 2 d$. green stamp of current type has been issued.
Haycr.-In addition to the values already reported we note 3c. gray, 5 c . orange.

Honduras.-We hear that the 1890 stamps are obsolete and a new series was issued August ist. The head of President Bogran is in the center, "Republica de Honc'uras" above and value below. Ic. blue, 2c. brown, 5 c. green, 10c. vermilion, 20c. red brown, 25 c . maroon, 30c. slate, 40 c . green, 50 c . brown 75 c . purple, I peso brown, 2 pesos black and brown, 5 pesos black and purple, Io pesos black and green. The stamps in two colors have the head in black and are larger than the others, $33 \times 38 \mathrm{~mm}$. Perf. i2. The envelopes have embossed head of the President in large engine turned oval frame, "Republica de Honduras" above, "Servicio, I891, Postal" below, and figures of value at sides. 5 c . green on white, $158 \times 92 \mathrm{~mm}$., Ioc. vermilion on white, same size, 20c. blue on white, $230 \times 100 \mathrm{~mm}$., 25c. brown on white, same size. Wrappers, ic. brown, 2c. blue, 5 c . green, loc. vermilion all on blue, $210 \times 270 \mathrm{~mm}$. Post cards same design as 1890 , but with the 1891 stamp. $2 c$. and $2+2$ c. orange on white, $3 c$., $3+3 c$ c carmine on pale green. The reply cards are $\mathrm{T}_{4}$.

Luxemburg. - Two of the new set have been issued. The head of the Grand Duke is in an oval band inscribed "Grand Duche de Luxemburg," value below. 10c., carmine, 25 c . blue.

Monaco.-The 15 c . cuvelope, with head of Charles III, cxists on green, instead of white, $153 \times 117 \mathrm{~mm}$.

Natal.-There is a new $21 / 2 \mathrm{~d}$. blue. Head of Queen in circle surrounded by oval band inscribed "Natal Postage." The value is at the bottom on iarge label. Blue, watermark CA, perforated 14.

Nilw SouTu Wales.-The id. has been surcharged $1 / 2 \mathrm{~d}$., and the $1 / 2 \mathrm{~d}, 21 / 2$, $71 / 2$, and $121 / 2$ now have "O.S."

NiCARAGUA. - The current cards 3 c. and $3 \times 3$ c, are on yellow card, not buff as already noted, and the 5 c . blue envelope is also on yellow, not amber.

Phinibine Ishands.-There are a ioc. carmine and 25 c . blue of current type.

Salvador.-The 2 c. and $2+2$ c. cards of current issue are on pale yellow. The Ic. envelope is on white, $2 c$. on salmon, 5 c . on amber, IOc. on amber, IIc. on bluc, $20 c$. and $22 c$ on salmon, and not as heretofore reported.

ST. LUCIA.-There are a 5 sh. lilac and orange and iosh. lilac and black.
SWEDLN.-A 2 ore orange has been issued with figure of value in center, also an official of the same value and color.

Travancore.-The 2ch. has been seen in rose instead of vermilion.

## FOURTH ANNUAL CÖNVENTION, C. P. A.

The fourth annual Convention of the Canadian Philatelic Association opened at Belleville on Aug. 25th. Out of a total membership of 96 , only 57 were entitled to vote at this Convention, and of these 48 were represented, either by person or proxy. A preliminary meeting was held on the evening of the 24th at which all important matters that would come before the Convention were thoroughly discussed and a definite plan of action decided upon, so that no time would be lost when the Convention opened on the following day. As the attendance was not large, the meeting was held in the office of Mr. H. F. Ketcheson. Dr. Cameron, being the only officer of the Assocation present. presided and Mr. T. S. Clarke acted as Secretary. Before opening the Convention, the following telegram was read :-

Pictou, Nova Scotia, Aug. 25, 1891.
President hopes Convention whll be pleasant and successful, regrets extremely inability to attend. Grecting to old friends present.

## A. J. Craig.

After the meeting was called to order, the chairman appointed the following Committee on Credentials:-T. S. Clark, Walter McMahon, H. F. Ketcheson. This Committee immediately met and after a short time made the following report:-

Your committee beg to report as follows:-Dr. Cameron, proxies 42 ; H. I. Ketcheson, 2, rejected 5 ; these five were rejected because the menbers giving them had not paid their annual dues and were, therefore, not qualified to vote. On motion roll call was dispensed with and minutes of last meeting taken as read. The next order of business taken up was reports of officers. The only reports received were those of the Treasurer, Exchange Superintendent and Librarian. The Treasurer's report was read and showec total receipts for the
year $\$ 225.17$, total expencitures, $\$ 202.61$. Balance on hard, $\$ 22 . j 6$. The report was andited and found correct. The Librarian's report was next read and is as follows:
To the Members of the C. P. A.:
I herewith beg to present the annual report of the Library of the Canadian Philatelic Association for the year ending August, IS91.

At the time of my last report at Montreal in August, 1890, there were 2,012 pieces in the Library. Since then I have received the following :

I consider this a very formidable showing and will give an idea to the members of the size of the Library. I wish to draw the attention of the Society to the fact that of the above total no less than eleven hundred ( 1,100 ) pieces were donated by Mr. Watson during the past two years. This is a magnificent gift which an American friend has given to our Canadian members. - Mr. Wurtele's donation of 263 pieces comes next, with Mr. E. O. Evans third with a total of 14.3. There are several who have contributed over a hundred in the two years and have helped considerably to build up a good Library:-

Mr.Watson has loaned the Library the use of the London Society's works on the stamps of Oceanica and British North America.

Current copies of the American Jhilatclist, Easterin Philatelist, American Journal of Philatily, Quaker Cuty l'hilutelist and Dominion Philatelist were received regularly, but all other publications may be classed as semi-occasional in their visits.

My term of office expiring with this report, I desire to thank those members who have helped me in my endeavors to make the Library a suceses, and would suggest that the valuable volumes, catalogues, etc., now in it would be more used if the Library were situated in a city with a live local Society or Branch.

The report of the Exchange Superintendent was then read and is as follows: Brantloord, Ont., August $260 t h$, I 89 I.
To the Offiers and Mimbers of the C. P. A.:
In offering you my fourth ammual report, I do so regretting that the Exchange Department, which was once so flourishing, has this last year dwindled down to so great an extent. The reason for this is easy to reach. At the beginning nearly all the members were advanced collectors in want of good stamps only: During the four jears since organization of the C. P. A. nearly all of the best collectors have sold out their collections or ceased collecting. Of those remaining the majority were dealers or sellers in it. only for what might be had in cash from the sale of their stamps. Even member No. I has not taken any stamps from Exchange Books since December, 1590 , and notified me not to send him any more books. The Secretary's report will show that very small cfforts were put forth to increase our membership since last Conyention.

Since ist September, iS90, I have circulated 50 Exchange Books, value \$1876.46. My last report shows SS Exchange l3ooks, value $\$ 5366.00$. There is, of course a great falling off. The 50 books as above were the contribution of 24 members and from the fifty books were removed s ' mps to the amount of $\$ 300.42$.

All accounts were made up and rendered ist August and I opened Balance Sheet. Owing to the fact that 9 books sent to Halifax l3ranch on February I th last have been just forwarded by them to next on circuit, after retaining them six months, I am unable to make a complete balance, but do so as far as possible. Until I receive the 9 books and return them to their owners, their accounts cannot be satisfactorily balanced.

Accompanying this report was a statement of assets and liabilities of this department which will be commented on in the near future, as the Association wish to ascertain what proportion of the amounts owing to this department can be collected. The next order of business was election of officers. Owing to the neglect of duty of the late Board of Trustees, the election of officers had not been held as provided for in the Constitution.
H. F. Ketcheson moved, seconded by Walter McMahon: That the Constitu tion be suspended and that the election of officers be procecded with in open Convention and by ballot. This was done with the following results : President,

The next business taken up was the Revision of the Constitution. In order that this might be satisfactorily dene the Convention resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole and took up the Constitution clause by clause with the result that a number of changes were made and the Constitution of the Canadian Philatelic Association as amended now reads as follows:


## PREAMBIE.

The objects of this Association are, to assist its members in acquiring knowledge in regard to Philately; to cultivate a feeling of friendship among philatelists.

ARTICLE I. -NAME.
Section r.-This organization shall be known as the Canadian Philutelic Association.

> ARTICLE II.-MEMBERSHIP.

Section $x$.-Any stamp collector who has attained the age of 18 years may become a member of this Association by applying to the Secretary; such application shall be signed by at least two members of the Association. The Secretary shall thereupon cause the name and address of the applicant and his references to be published in the next number of the Official Journal, and if no objection shall be received by the Secretary within one month after such publication the applicant shall be considered elected, and entitled to receive the membership card of the Association. In case any member shall object to an applicant the application shall be submitted to the Trustees. The Secretary shall notify the objecting member that he must submit the reasons for his objections and proofs to substantiate them. The applicant shall also be notified of the reasons for the objection and of the proofs offered and may submit his defense. The Trustees shall consider the matter and shall aicept or reject the applicant, sending the papers in each case with their report to the Secretary as soon as they have determined the matter.

Section 2.-Any member of the Association against whom charges shall be preferred in writing addressed to the Trustees shall be tried by a court composed of the President, Vice President, Secretary-Treasurer and the three Trustees, any three of whom shall form a quorum ; the court may in its judgment suspend or expell such member and its action shall be final and binding upon all parties.

ARTICLE III.-CONVENTION.
Section 1.-The Association shall meet in Convention each year, on such date and at such place as may have been designated by the last preceding Convention.

Section 2.-A quorum for the transaction of business shall consist of one-half of the voting membership, represented either in person or by proxy. ARTICLE IV.-OFFICERS.
Section s.-The officers of the Association shall be a President, a Vice Presi-
dent, a Secretary-Treasurer, a Librarian, a Superintendent of Exchange, a Counterfeit Detector and three Trustees.

## EIACTION OF OFFICERS.

Section 2.-A general election of officers for this Association shall be held each year and they shall serve till the close of the Convention following the eiection and until their successors shall have been elected. All officers must be elected by the members and it shall be the duty of the Secretary-Treasurer $t_{0}$ issue a complete form and to mail a copy to each member, at least one month before the annual meeting; the form must be filled in and returned to the Sec-retary-Treasurer before the meeting of the Convention, that they may be examined as provided for in the regular order of business.

## vacancies.

Section 3.-In case of death or resignation of any officer during his term of office, a substitute shall be appointed by the votes of the President, Vice President, Secretary-Treasurer and Trustces.
ARTICLE V.-IUUTIES OF OFFICERS.-PRESIDENT.

Section .--The President shall preside at all meetings of the Association. He shall submit an Annual Keport, to be printed in the Official Journal. He shall sign all warrants on the Treasurer for moneys required by the Association.

Prior to every Ammual Convention he shall appoint a Committee of Arrangements, and all expenses incurred by such committee in the performance of their duties shall be defrayed from the general fund of the Association.

By and with the consent of the Official Board, or at the call of twenty-five members, he shall call for a general vote of the members of the Association upen any desired question. The vote shall be by ballot under the direction of the Trustes, and a majority of the votes cast shall determine the question submitted.

## VICE-PRESIDENT.

Section 2.-The Vice-President shall act in absence of the President.
Section 3.-The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep a true record of the proceedings of the Association and preserve all documents, receive all applications for membership and publish same in the Official Journal every month, tugether with the names of all new members and all other news he may have gathered in his official capacity that may be of interest at large; he shall print therein a complete form for the election of officers as provided for in section 2, art. IV, he shall issue cards of membership when the dues have been paid and furnish a copy of this Constitution and of ail publications of the Association to each member in good standing; he shall furnish duplicate copies of the Constitution Official circulars and other publications of the Association in his charge upon payment of the charges fixed by the Official Board. He shall receive and take charge of all moneys, property and securities of the Association; collect all dues from members and all other moneys due the Association, and submit to each Convention during his term of office a complete financial statement. He shall deposit all money in a chartered bank. His compensation shall be at the rate of $\$ 35$ per annum to be paid semi-annually.

Section 5.-The Librarian shall keep in trust for the Association all philatelic
literature, albums, collections, etc., which may be purchased by or presented to the Association, subject to the provisions laid down in the By-Laws.
sulerintenient of exchange.
Section 9.-The Superintendent of Exchange shall conduct the exchange business of the Association, subject to the provisions therefor laid down in the By-Laws.

COUNTERFEIT DETECMOR.
Section 9.-The Counterfeit Detector shall pass upon the genuiness of stamps, subject to provisions therefor lain down in the By-Laws.

## TRUSTEJES.

Section 9.-The Trustees shall perform such duties as are required of them by this Constitution and the By-Laws, or the Association.

> ARTICIE VI.-FINANCES.

Scction I.-The revenues of the Association shall be derived from the dues of members and the revenues from the different departments, as provided in the By-Laws.

Section 2.-The revenues shall be used for defraying the expenses of the Association, including its publications.

Section 3.-All dues shall be payable semi-amually in advance, on the ist day of January and the ist day of July each year.

Section 7 .-The fiscal year shall commence on the ist day of January and shall be divided into quarters. The dues to be paid by new members shall be computed from the beginning of the following quarter in which they shall have been clected to membership in the Association.

ARTICLE VII.—PROPERTV.
All officers shall, at the expiration of their terms of office, deliver to their successors all books, papers, moncys and other property in their possession, belonging to the Association; and they shall not be relieved from their obligations uutil this requirement be complied with.

> article vil.-branch societies.

The establishment of Branch Sorities shall be encouraged in every location containing five or more members of this Association, and shall be subject to the provisions therefor laid down in the By-Laws.
article in-hmeniments-constitution.
Section I.-This Constitution can be altered or amended only by the assent of two-thirds of the members of the Association voting on such alteration or amendment, and provided such two-thirds shall constitute a majority of the voting membershp of the Association. All notices of amendment shall be published at least one month previously in the Official Journal.

The vote shall be by ballot under the direction of the Trustees, or in open Convention.
BY-IAWS.

Section 2.-Any By-Laws of this Association, not in conflict with this Constitution, may be made or amended by the officers of the Association ; but in case ten members shall object to the proposed by-law or amendmen', it nust be submitted to a general vote in the manner provided in Article V, Section I, of this Constitution.

Section 3 - It shall require the assent of a majority of all the voting membership of the Assosiation to make, amend, or alter any By-law in Convention.

Section 4 .-In all cases where an election or a general vote of the Association becomes necessary under this Constitution or the by-laws, not less than 30 days shall intervene between the date of mailing the notice of such election or vote and the date of closing the polls; and the votes of such members only as were entitled to vote on the day of mailing such notice shall be counted or taken into consideration in determining the result.

The next business before the Association was the selection of a place for our next annual meeting. It having been reported to the Convention that the American Philatelic Association had decided to meet in 1892 at Niagara Falls, the Convention unanimously decided to meet at Niagara Falls on the Canadian side the two days following the A. P. A. Convention. As there was no other business to come before the meeting, the Convention adjourned to meet again at Niagara Falls in August, 1892.

The American Philatelic Association held their amual meeting in the Times Building, New York City, on the 17, iS and igth of August. The attendance was much smaller than last year and most of the business transacted unimportant. The representation was so small that at the opening session it was feared there would not be a quorum. The meeting throughout was harmonious several old feuds between members having been amicably settled to the satisfaction of all concerned. It was decided to incorporate the Association under the laws of West Virginia, the laws of that State making it a comparatively cheap and easy matter to do so. The trustees were also made elective. These two acts of the Convention will be certain to help the Association very much, as many persons refused to join an unincorporated society owing to individual responsibility. The members who travelled furthest to attend the Convention were S. B. Bradt. and Mr. Leland, of Chicago ; C. H. Mckell, of St. Louis, and H. F. Ketcheson, Eelleville, Ont. Most, if not all, of the others lived quite close to New York. The annual meeting for 1892 will be at Niagara Falls and will open on the third Monday in August.

Ir is now quite probable that all the mails from Great Britian for India, China and Japan will in future pass across Canada via., the Canadian Pacific Railway. A recent experiment has proved that mail can be carried from China to London in 21 days by the Canadian route, while by the Sue\% Canal it takes from 43 to 45 day's.

On the first day of the Convention we received a letter from him asking for our influence to assist him in getting the office he coveted.
