

Corner Stone laid by His Excellency, 1.ord Aberdeen, Governor General of Canada.






ABERDEEN HIGH SCHOOL

GEORGE J. OULTON, M. A.,

Is a graduate of the University of Mount Allison College. While at College he always took a high place in his class. He taught successfully the Dorchester Superior School for a number of years, during which he raised the School, particularly in its science department, to a high state of efficiency. In 1895 he became Science Master in the Moncton High School, since which time the Scientific Course has improved by leaps and bounds. He is at present taking a course in his favorite subjects at McGill University. He will again take charge of the School at the beginning of the month of May, 1899. His subjects comprise all the science subjects, with Geometry.



H. L. BRITTAIN, M. A.,

RADUATED at the University of New Brunswick in 1895, taking first-class honors in Chemistry and the Natural Sciences. He won the Governor-General's Silver Medal for proficiency in Chemistry in his sophomore year, and the Douglas Gold Medal for best essay among undergraduates in his senior year. He is Acting-Principal during the absence of Mr. Oulton. The subjects are: History, (ancient and modern) Algebra, Drawing, etc.



FRANK ALLEN, M. A.,

GRADUATED from the University of New Brunswick in 1895 withfirst-class honors in Physics and Chemistry. In his junior year he won the Brydone-Jack Scholarship in Physics, and in his senior year the Alumni Gold Medal for the best Latin essay among undergraduates. He was a successful Principal of the County Grammar School at Shediac for three years. He takes Mr. Oulton's subjects during his absence.

H. A. SINNOTT, B. A.,

RADUATED from the University of Mount Allison College in 1895. While in College he was a painstaking student, and has since proved a successful teacher, both of the Queens County Grammar School at Gagetown and in his present capacity. His subjects are the Classics, Arithmetic, Book-keeping, etc.



SUSIE B. GRAY, B. A.,

Is a graduate of the University of New Brunswick, at which Institution she was a highly successful student. Her subjects are connected with Grammar and English Literature wholly, and she brings a wide reading to aid her in her work.



PROFESSOR D'ORNANO, B. Sc.,

S a Graduate of the University of Paris. He taught his native tongue successfully at Mount Allison, and has been engaged to teach French in the Aberdeen High School. His French is Parisian. No High School in the Province can offer such opportunities [for the study of this great language. Professor D'Ornano, besides being a linguist, is an artist of no mean ability.

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The Building.

HE New High School Building recently opened in the city of Moncton and now occupied for school purposes, is situated on the site of the central grounds, which were formerly occupied by a number of small wooden school buildings which, being utterly inadequate to the requirements of the times and to the growing population of Moncton, it became necessary that a new and commodious up-to-date building should be erected. That has been done. Moncton to-day has one of the best equipped, largest, and most commodious school buildings in the Maritime Provinces. It is constructed of brick and stone, having a frontage on School street of 129 feet and on Botsford and Alma streets, 90 feet. It is three storeys high, besides an elaborate basement. It contains seventeen classrooms, the average size of which is about thirty-five feet square, a large assembly room capable of seating six hundred adults, a library room, officers' room, and two rooms for the teachers.

The laboratory is situated in the basement, being well lighted and ventilated.

The halls of the building are a striking feature, being exceedingly wide, admitting of eight abreast marching through the hall. The stairways are of ample and easy ascent; four abreast can march at ease and up the stairways.

The building is so constructed that there are three avenues of descent from each flat, so that in the space of one minute the occupants, nine hundred, can be dismissed from the building in ease of emergency. Ample precaution has been taken against fire accident. Through the basement and three storeys is a standing water pipe, with hose attachment, in each flat. There is also provided in each flat a chemical fire extinguisher for putting out incipient fires.

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Connected with the principal's room by rolling doors is the Natural History room, which is shelved and protected by glass for the reception of natural history specimens. In this room also is the large sink, also tables upon rollers capable of being moved into the main room, thus enabling the principal to demonstrate small experiments before the school without going to the laboratory in the basement.

The furniture of the entire building is a striking feature, as it is uniform throughout, being the latest, and in the opinion of the Board of Trustees, the best school furniture that can be furnished, being the automatic ball-bearing desk, which is noiseless in its action and apparently very strong and comfortable. It was furnished by the Moncton Carpet & Furniture Company, of Moncton, N. B., and gives entire satisfaction. The building is lighted by the electric light, and a system of electric bells connects the principal's room with the others. The heating and ventilating system, which is that of the Record Foundry and Machine Company, of Moncton, embraces a system of hot-air ventilation, in which nine furnaces are made use of in the basement. Attached to each are fans driven by water motors for the purpose of forcing the air through the building. This system at present seems to work very successfully.

The interior of the building is finished in white wood and native spruce, which gives a very bright and pleasing effect. About nine hundred pupils are accommodated in the building, and there are at present one hundred and eighty-eight pupils in the High School.

The contractors for the building were Messrs. Rhodes, Curry & Co., Limited, Amherst, and the architect, Mr. J. C. Dumaresq, of Halifax. Mr. C. O. Rowe, of Moncton, put in the plumbing. The whole cost of the building and equipment is \$40,000.

The Building Committee, who had under its direction the election of the building, consisted of the following members of the board: H. H. Ayer, chairman; Mrs. Emma R. Atkinson, Mrs. Hannah Nugent, D. Grant, L. N. Bourque, W. D. Martin, James Flanagan.

The grounds about the building have been nicely graded, and asphalt walks have been laid around the building and each approach.

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

One of the rooms in the building is now being used with the permission of the board for a kindergarten school-room. This is not in connection with the public schools; the board merely allowed the use of the room to be given to a kindergarten teacher at the request of a number of the citizens of the town, who, at their private expense, are supporting a kindergarten teacher.

The late Secretary, Mr. C. R. Palmer, did much to further the building of a new High School, and his name is coupled with that of the present efficient Secretary and Superintendent, Mr. Frank McCully, in the corner stone. Lord Aberdeen, whose name the building bears, laid the corner stone in the fall of '97.

THE CHEMICAL LABORATORY.

A large well-lighted room has been fitted up in the basement for Practical Chemistry. This has a concrete floor and is provided with six large tables, affording room for forty-eight pupils to do individual work. Each pupil has at his desk a Bunsen burner and a water tap and sink, together with a complete set of apparatus necessary for successful work. The tops of the tables are covered with tiles, while the shelves and woodwork have a hard oil finish. Gas is used for lighting and heating purposes at the various tables.

At each end of the room are chambers for foul gas, and a large storeroom connected with the laboratory contains surplus apparatus and a large supply of the necessary chemicals. Everything in this room has been designed to afford the student an opportunity to obtain the most practical course in Chemistry possible, and in doing this no reasonable expense has been spared.

The cost of the laboratory and chemical apparatus will exceed \$650. In this department the facilities afforded are unsurpassed by any High School in the Provinces.

PHYSICAL DEPARTMENT.

No separate room has been set aside for a Physical Laboratory, but liberal provision for practical work has been made. A large and well

selected amount of apparatus has been purchased for illustrating mechanics, hydrostatics, pneumatics, heat, light, sound, electricity, and magnetism. A thorough elementary course in this subject is thus rendered possible. The complete equipment of the building itself, with its elaborate ventilation system, electric lighting and electric bells, will afford practical application of these subjects to the pupil.

A solar projection apparatus is also used for projecting on a screen diagrams and pictures of scientific interest. The cost of this equipment will exceed \$250.

OTHER EQUIPMENT.

The building is furnished with a good supply of excellent maps, both modern and classical. \$150 were lately spent in this department alone. One of the finest of this set is Parkins' "Map of the World," showing the British Empire in red, with coaling stations, cable lines, etc.

There is also a complete set of Yaggy's Charts, with globes, models and kindred appliances.

LIBRARY.

The library room is a beautiful room on the second floor. It is to be nicely shelved throughout. About 200 volumes, including the Encyclopædia Britannica, all useful as well as interesting, have been purchased mostly from funds raised by two successful Concerts given by the pupils of the High School. It is expected that this number will be largely increased by donations. Several valuable presentations have already been made.

MUSEUM.

The museum is a room on the second floor also, connecting with the principal's room. It is provided with shelves and cases for natural history specimens, a goodly number of which it already contains. A new lot is expected from the Dominion Geological Department. Donations have already been received this year, and others will be thankfully received and carefully preserved.

ASSEMBLY ROOM.

This is a fine room which will seat six hundred. It gives a fine opportunity for School Concerts and Entertainments. It is beautifully lighted by the incandescent electric light, as indeed is the building throughout. It is seated with individual chairs, so that the seating capacity can be greatly increased, when necessary. There is a teaching room at each end of the Assembly Hall, connecting with it by folding doors, so that these two can be thrown open and thus increase the length of the hall by fifty feet.

THE VIEW FROM THE BUILDING.

The corner rooms on the south side of the third flat give an excellent view of the whole city. From this vantage ground, the much-defamed Petitcodiac River appears beautiful, and no suspicion of Moncton mud appears upon its surface. The green hills of Albert County can be seen distinctly in the distance. In fact, a good view of a territory at least fifteen miles in length is obtainable. 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
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
