



For 1886-7.

During the past year the Board assisted in erecting fifteen churches, in purchasing two buildings to be used as churches, in removing a mortgage that was to be foreclosed, (and the foreclosure of which would deprive a congregation of its place of worship), and in erecting three manner. The drought that prevalled in several parts of the country and the financial stringency induced thereby, checked building operations somewhat, but increased activity is shown this spring. Grants and loans were voted for the following congregations:—

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PRESBYTERY OF WINNIPEG.

- EMERSO:.—A town near the international boundary line, on the Pembina Branch railway, surrounded by a good farming country. Suffered much through the "boom," but is recovering.

 Loan of \$500 to help remove mortgage that was to be foreclosed.
- FORT FRANCIS.—Situated at the outlet of Rainy Lake. Important farming and lumbering district, of which the town is the business centre. Additional grant of \$101.40, making in all \$137,49 on church worth \$1000.
- BLYTHFIELD.—Important farming and ranching district, 20 miles southwest of Winnipeg. Loan of \$340 on Manse costing \$680.

PRESBYTERY OF ROCK LAKE.

- MORDEN.—Important town on Pembina Mountain Railway. Additional loan of \$250, making \$750 on a church worth \$1500.
- PILOT MOUND. -Situated on Pembina Mountain Railway, in the midst of a fertile farming districts.

 Loan \$500 to purchase a hall that cost \$1000. The original cost of the building was \$3000.
- BOISSEVAIN.—A growing town on the Pembina Mountain Railway, 183 miles from Winnipeg, autrounded by a good farming country. Loan of \$500 on a building costing \$1000.

PRESBYTERY OF BRANDON.

- KNOX CHURCH, BRANDON.—Brandon, the most important town in Manitoba west of Winnipeg.

 Loan of \$370, to purchase a hall worth \$1250. Knox Church is the new congregation recently organized.
- NERVAWA.—Thriving town on the M. & N. W. Railway, near the Riding Mountains, surrounded by well-settled farming district. Loan \$400 to erect a manse costing \$850.
- TUMMEL—Farming district in Shell River County. Grant of \$100 to assist in building church, to cost \$500.

SHOAL LAKE.—Town charmingly situated on Lake of same name. Summer resort. Loan of \$300 on church costing \$1200.

STRATHCLAIR.—Station on the M. & N. W. Railway. Fertile farming district. Grant of \$100 on church worth \$900.

BIRTLE.—Enterprising town on the M. & N. W. Railway at the crossing of the Bird Tail river.

Loan \$550 on a church costing \$2000.

PRESBYTERY OF REGINA.

FORT QU'APPELLE.—Beautifully situated in the valley of river of same name, surrounded by a good farming country. Congregation built stone church, and when near completion it was destroyed by fire. With great energy the congregation undertook to rebuild, and the church was opened in January last. In the exceptional circumstances the Board voted grant of \$400 on a church worth \$2000.

ROXBORO.—Fourteen miles north of Qu'Appelle, good farming country. Loan \$200 on a church worth \$700.

FILE HILLS.—Farming district, northeast of Fort Qu'Appelle. Land well taken up and settle ment close. Loan \$200 on church costing \$700.

CATHCART.—Additional grant of \$17.35, making \$1516.16 on buildings worth \$1600.

MCLEOD.—Station connected with Broadview, and in a good farming district. Grant of \$150 to build a church worth \$800.

BATTLEFORD.—Former capital of the N. W. T., situated near the confluence of Battle and Saskatchewan Rivers. Important station of M. Police, site of Indian Industrial School, and important post of Indian department. Grant of \$250 on a church costing \$3000.

WINLAW.—Mission station in S. E. Assinibola, good farming country. Grant of \$100 on church worth \$600.

LETHBRIDGE.—Headquarters of N. W. Coal and Navigation Co., important mining district. Loan of \$750 on manse costing \$1500.

ORKNEY.—Station in York Colony. Good farming district. Grant of \$125 church worth \$500.

ARMSTRONG LAKE.—Farming district in same locality. Grant of \$125, church worth \$500.

YORKTON.—Principal town of the York Colony. Grant of \$200 on stone church costing \$1000.

WALLACE.—Station in one of townships of York Colony. Grant of \$125 on church costing \$500.

Of these buildings 77 are Churches, 4 Church-Manses and 13 Manses. 19 are built of hewed logs, 67 are frame buildings, 3 brick and 5 stone.

Two of the Churches aided by the Board were consumed by fire last summer. One of these was insured for nearly three times the amount of the grant made by the Board. The other was without any insurance. Both congregations are building again.

The foregoing statement will enable the Church to understand over how wide an area the operations of the Board extend, and how much has been done to give visibility and permanence to the work of the Church. The aim of the Board has been to assist Presbyteries in planting churches in all centres of population; and the success has been such that no village or town of any size or promise in the Synod is without a church or the prespect of one this season.

The Board are pleased to report that congregations repaid on moneys advanced them \$2,002.15 last year, as against \$322 the previous year. As the circumstances of the country improve repayments may be expected to become more and more a source of revenue. For some time, however, owing to financial stringency, the Board cannot hope to call in its loans. Good security, in the shape of mortgages or notes, has been obtaine. In almost every case.

The Board feel the debt of obligation under which they lie to members and adherents of the Church in the Eastern Provinces who have so generously helped in this work of church extension. The Board can assure the subscribers to this Fund that every care is taken to grant aid only where there is promise of usefulness, and that steps are taken to see that those who receive aid exert themselves according to their ability.

Grants rather than loans have been made oftener than was contemplated when the Fund was created. The Board regard this method of helping congregations as more economical in many cases than making loans. The circumstances of many congregations preclude the prospect of their repaying any moneys loaned them for several years, if they are to assist in the support of ordinances. Hence small grants were made instead of larger loans, leaving congregations free to support ordinances. As the circumstances of these congregations improve an annual collection will be taken up which will soon recoup the Board for their outlay. The interest received from investments and from money at credit in the Bank has paid these grants in part. Part of them, however, has been made from capital. As the extent of the Board's power to make grants from capital is not clealy defined in the regulations, it is suggested that any apparent ambiguity be removed.

Since the number of congregations and Presbyteries is likely to increase the Board would suggest that the number of the Board be increased to fifteen, due regard being had to Presbyterial representation. At present the Board is composed of nine members.

From the census (taken two years ago in the Territories, and in Manitoha last year) it would appear that at least one-third of the white population is Presbyterian. Presbyteries are planting stations and organizing mission fields at a rapid rate. It is most desirable that congregations should be delivered from the necessity of meeting in "dugouts" or uncomfortoble outhouses. There are nearly 400 separate points at which the services are held and the churches number about 100, or a church for every fourth station. There are about 110 separate congregations and mission fields and

There is submitted herewith the Treasurer's statement, and also a letter from the Superintendent of Missions showing the effect of the Fund on the work of the Church in the Synod.

The Board cordially welcome the Assembly to Winnipeg, and express the hope that Commissioners may be able to visit different parts of the country and see for themselves the effect this Fund has had in advancing the cause of morals and religion.

The Board are convinced that church extension in this country will be greatly impeded without, a healthy Building Fund, and they are convinced that information only is required to secure the means needed to keep pace with the demands of settlement.

The regulations with changes proposed are as follows :-

- 1. The Fund shall be called The Church and Manse Building Fund of the Presbyterian Church in Canada for Manitoba and the North-West.
- 2. The amount to be aimed at in the first place shall be one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000); the Fund shall be raised by subscriptions and bequests.
- 3. The management of the Fund shall be entrusted to a Board of fifteen members, twelve of these to be appointed annually by the General Assembly. The other members of the Board shall be the Superintendent of Missions for Manitoba and the North-West, the Convener of the Home Mission Committee of the General Assembly, Western Section, and one member to be appointed by the said Committee. The Board shall have power to fill any vacancies made by death or resignation until the meeting of the next General Assembly thereafter. The usual place of meeting of the Board shall be Winnipeg.
- All applications for aid in the erection of churches or manses shall be made to this Board through the Presbytery within whose bounds the congregation is situated, and before being con-sidered by the Board must be recommended by the Presbytery, but the Board shall be sole judge as to the merits of the application, and the nature and amount of aid to be given.
- 5. The money constituting the Fund shall be, at the discretion of the Board, either invested and the revenue accruing therefrom given in the form of grants to congregations to assist in the erection of churches or manses, or the capital shall be employed to make loans or grants to such congregations.
- 6. Such loans shall be for a limited number of years, and at a moderate rate of interest. For good reasons the Board may remit the interest.
- 7. The assistance given, when in the form of a grant, shall not exceed one-fifth of the total cost of the building; and when in the form of loan shall not exceed lifty per cent. of the cost, unless in either case the circumstances are by the Board deemed exceptional. The money shall be payable only when the building can be used for servivice, in the case of grants. In the case of loans the money voted may be paid in instalments as the work of construction advances. No grant, however, is to be made or loan effected until the Board is satisfied that a valid title to the property, or a bond to that effect, has been secured by the congregation, and that the deed is in the form approved by the General Assembly.
- & It shall be competent for the Board, with the approval of the General Assembly, to make changes in these regulations, but such changes shall have due regard to the proper preservation of the capital entrusted to the Board.
 - 9. The Board shall report its transactions annually to the General Assembly.

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STATEMENT

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SUPERINTENDENT OF MISSIONS.

The Church and Manse Building Fund was born of necessity. For several years before the Northwest was connected with the outside world by rail, settlers in considerable numbers were coming in. Their numbers increased as the prospects of a railway brightened. A large proportion of the new comers were Presbyterians. Many of them were young, with characters unformed and with religious convictions unsettled. Some were in quest of homes, others of wealth. The wholesome restraints of settled society were wanting. With the break-up in associations and the absence of restraint there lay the danger of the religious instincts becoming enfeebled and the sense of moral obligation blunted. If religious institutions were not planted among them and the teachings of early life followed up, indifference, irreligion and vice were certain to become prevalent. The facts were laid before the Church and prompt and energetic action was taken. Missionaries were appointed and money voted to support them.

But no sooner did missionaries appear on the ground than other difficulties presented themselves. There were neither churches in which to hold services, nor houses to shelter missionaries and their families. The Foreign Mission Committee appropriates its moneys to erect chapels, purchase bungalows or procure health retreats. The moneys of the Home Mission Committee can only be voted to help pay the salaries of missionaries.

My first tour through our mission fields opened my eyes. Settlement was being rapidly effected but for the eight years between 1874 and 1882 only 15 churches had been erected. School houses were few in number, and when available the low seats and narrow spacing proved rather trying to the long leg and longer thigh of the athletic Manitobans. I shall say nothing of the trials of female dress with its projections and distensions. Services were consequently held for the most part in private houses, and as the ceiling was sometimes low and formed of hay or sod it seemed a blessing to be short of stature. In summer, stables and stable lofts, byres and granaries, were fitted up, but the crowing, clucking and cackling of irreverent poultry, the barking of dogs, or the gambols of cattle, were too trying to the risibilities of the young; and odors more pungent than pleasant gave the sensitive nostril or the refractory stomach an excuse to rebel.

Railway stations and section houses, unfinished stores and dwelling houses, private and public halls were extemporized into churches wherever available; but the rent of halls frequently left little of the revenue to be applied on salary, as such halls were built "on spec" and supposed to any themselves in three years. Hotel parlors and dining rooms, billiard and bar rooms were secured, but only occasionally. It was feared by the owner that the service might interfere with the legitimate trade of the place. I have preached in the front of the house when the proprietor was selling whiskey in the rear, but I had the satisfaction of knewing that he was fined \$900 and sent six months to good. Ludicrous incidents could be given and laughable stories told. But missionaries compelled to labor n this way felt as if they labored in vain and spent their strength for naught.

The need of manses was greater still. Missionaries could get houses to rent at only a few points, and \$20 per month was asked for very inferior accommodation. When it is borne in mind that the salary was only \$800, it will be seen that it was impossible for a minister to engage a house at such a figure. I have visited delicate refined women and caltured ministers in houses scarcely fit to shelter cattle. Dr. Guthrie, in appealing to Scottish audiences for money with which to build manses for Free Church ministers, pointed his appeals with incidents of heroic suffering. Cases of greater hardships could be cited in the history of missions in Manitoba. Disappointment, sickness and diminished power for work followed. Men lost their "spring" their energy, and the work languished. An effort was made to reach the ear of the East, but a wilderness lay between, and eastern pastors were busy with their own work.

But why did not the people build? They could not. Many of them were poor—financial pressure drove them from the homes of their youth. For the first few years it was all out go and so income with them. Building timber could not be had but at a few points; lumber and hardware were dear. Something had to be done to encourage, to atimulate, else the work would fail. Such were the circumstances that called the Fund into existence and sin liar circumstances created funds in the American churches.

The effect of the Fund on the work of the Church has been unmistakeable.

It has given visibility to Presbyterianism. There is not a village or town of any importance between Lake Superior and the Rocky Mountains that is not provided with a church, and many of the buildings are creditable structures. Rat Portage, Carberry, Brandon, Oak Lake, Virden, Whitewood, Mossomin, Wolseley, Grenfell, Indian Head, Qu'Appelle, Regina, Moose Jaw, Medicine Hat and Calgary, on the main line of the C. P. R.; Gladstone, Neepawa, Minnedosa, Rapid City, Strathclair, Shoal Lake and Birtle, on the M. & N. W. Railway; Morden, Manitou; Pilor Mound, and Boissevain, on the Pembina Mountain Railway, not to speak of Lethbridge and McLeod, Edmonton, Battleford, Fort Saskatchewan, Carman, Fort Qu'Appelle and the rest, all owe their churches to this Fund. During the last five years 82 churches, 4 church-manses and 17 manues have been built, or 103 structures in all, and of these 94 were assisted from the Church and Manae Fund. For the eight years prior to the existence of the Fund only 13 churches and manses were built, or not quite an average of 2, while since the existence of the Fund the average has been nearly 21 a year.

The possession of a church has increased the audience and widened the sphero for the ministers usefulness. Jones would not attend services held in Brown's house and Brown honestly paid Jones back; both attend services in the church.

A church affords facilities for the prosecution of Sabbath School work. In a country where religious training is too often neglected at home, the Sabbath School is scarcely less important than the public service. The attendance at the Sabbath School has increased nearly ten fold since the Fund was organized.

Churches have increased attendance on public service and swelled the revenues of congregations. Until Port Arthur had a church it received \$300 from the Home Mission Fund; with the dedication of its church the congregation became self-sustaining. The contributions of Edmonton went up from \$300 to \$700, and those of Rat Portage from \$550 to \$1000. Calgary became self-sustaining in three years and now gives its pastor \$1,200 per annum. Regina, Boissevain, Virden, Qu'Appelle, Oak Lake and other centres experienced similar benefits.

The increase in congregational contributions has enabled the Church to extend her operations. The money saved in older districts has been available for work in new fields. If to-day, there is no settlement of any size or a centre of any promise where a missionary of the Church is not ministering to the religious wants of the people, it is to a considerable extent due to the operations of the Church and Manse Board. The Fund has been a valuable aid in church extension.

It has saved money directly to missionaries and the funds of the church. Seventeen manses have been already erected. At an average rental of \$15 per month an annual saving of \$3000 is effected. This sum capitalized at 8 per cent., the ruling rate of bank interest would amount to \$38,250 or four-fiths of the total amount expended by the Board. Wherever the minister of an augmented congregation is provided with a manse, he receives \$50 less from the Augmentation Fund. These manses have contributed to the comfort of our missionaries and so removed the reproach of neglect on the part of the Church, It has increased their power to help young people and so to weld the congregation into a compact whole.

The timely aid extended has cheered the hearts of missionaries and people, it has helped to make the church one and keep the west closely attached to the east. In their times of political disintegration this is a national blessing.

With all that has been done the work of the Board is only beginning. New fields in considerable numbers are being occupied every year. Four-fifths of the ministers are without manses and three-fourths of the points occupied are without churches.

During last summer several contributors to the Fund from Toronto, Montreal and other centres visited the country. They expressed themselves much pleased with the work of the Board and they have increased their former contributions. Their cordial approval influenced their acquaintances to help the work.

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
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
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DESIGN 1. CHURCH AND MANSE COMBINED.

SEATS 90 ON GROUND FLOOR; COST \$1200 CO.






Disign No. 2. Cost \$900 co.

Form of Bequest.
