

#### NEW ARMY OF 100,000.

LONDON, Aug. 10 .--- Great Britain will raise a new volunteer army of 100,000 men for the war.

This announcement came this afternoon from Premier Asquith, in the house of commons, and is interpreted as signifying that the entire available British army is under orders for continental service, and that a considerable portion of it is already on the ground.

It is reported that a great army, composed of British and French soldiery, is being mobilized to help the Belgians retain Namur.

GERMAN FLEET LOCATED.

The previously published announcement that the British battleship fleet had sunk the German submarine U15, definitely locates the fleet, which must be somewhere off the German naval base at Heligoland, since the U15 was designed for coast defensive work exclusively, and therefore has a limited steaming area. As the Germans apparently are utilizing their coast defence submarines, it is taken to mean that the British fleet must have closed up on them and has them bottled. It is also probable that the British fleet is now subject to continuous attacks by submarines, destroyers and torpedo boats.

While it is known that many British troops are on the continent, the closest secrecy is being maintained here regarding the soldiers' movements.

#### FIRST BIG EATTLE NEAR NAMUR.

It is generally expected that the first big battle of the war will be fought in the vicinity of Namur, which the Belgians are trying hard to retain. Both the British and the French armies are concentrating there, and it is thought that the larger part of the Belgian army is ascembled. The announcement that the kaiser had gone to Aix-la-Chapelle is taken here to mean that he will command in person the great German army of invasion. The advance guard of this force is under Gen. Von Emmich in Liege, and is besieging the forts around the city, which have successfully held out against the attack.

#### HUNDRED SPIES EXECUTED.

Captured spies were dressed in every conceivable sort of garb, including uniforms of soldiers and officers of the Belgian army, gendarmes, civic guards, etc. Some were found armed with bombs and revolvers, and others were caught while riding in automobiles carrying false numbers. ' Letters and telegrams bearing the counterfeit signature of the Belgian minister of war were found on the person of some of the spies.

It also became known today that just previous to the fighting at Liege strange marks were found on various bridges, aqueducts and military works, indicating that they were to be destroyed.



VIENNA.—A force of Montenegrins yesterday bombarded Teodo, a town situ-ated on the Gulf of Cattaro, in Dalinatia, Austra, with unknown results.

Bombarded Antivari. ROME (via London).—Two Austrian cruisers and two torpedo boats of the Austrian navy have bombarded Antivari and destroyed all the buildings in the town, except the Italian consulate and the Hotel Marine. Prince Joins Guards. LONDON.—The Prince of Wales left Buckingham Palace at 6 o'clock this morning to join the battalion of the Grenadier Guards, to which he has been

assigned. He is to be stationed at the Warley Barracks, Brentwood.

German Submarine Sunk. LONDON.-The British Admiralty an-nounced today that one of the cruiser squadrons of the British fleet was attack-ed this morning by German submarines. The British ships were not damaged, but the German submarine U15 was sunk. The engagement took place presumably in the North Sea. Volunteers Join Colors. German Wireless Gone. LONDON.—A British cruiser has de-stroyed the German wireless station at Dar-Es-Salaam! an important port and military station in German East Africa. German Fleet Active. TOKIO.—The German fleet at Tsingtau has already seized the Russian steamer Riazan, cartying British subjects, has driven one hundred merchantmen to the refuge of the Japanese ports and has embarrassed the entire Japanese shipping in the orient.

PARIS.—New war developments an-nounce humerous skirmishes with the Germans along the entire front, one of which was severe, with serious losses to both sides. Both sides are getting rein-forcements rapidly. Austrians For Alsace. ROME.—Eight Austrian regiments are reported to have crossed Lake Constance en route for Alsace.

Is Laden With Dynamite. LONDON.—A despatch from Rome to The Daily Chronicle says the Austrian steamer Bayern, laden with dynamite and live projectiles, is reported to be trying to penetrate the Adriatic Sea. It is suspected that her mission is to re-plenish the munitions of the German cruisers Goeben and Breslau. LONDON.—The reason for the failure of the commissary to properly support German troops at Liege was that the Ger-mans expected to force the forts in a few hours. The great defence of the Liegois has proven an immense victory for the anti-German forces.

### German Cavalry Retired.

BRUSSELS.—Reports from the front confirm the statement that the German troops have ceased their advance in the Valley of the Ourthe and have retired on their reserves and are throwing up intrenchments. German Cavairy Retired. BRUSSELS.—Reports reached here from many directions today of the re-treat of the German cavairy before a large French force, who are said already to have cleared considerable territory. The locality of the fighting is not re-vealed by the military authorities. In official circles here it was asserted today that there had been no further battle in the vicinity of Liege or in the town itself.

WASHINGTON. — Charge d'Affaires Huebscher of Switzerland has notified the state department that Switzerland is under martial law. This automatically calls the reserves to the colors. town itself.


