the future well being of the Dominion atrikingly lllustrated in the case of Great Britain. The products of the forest and of the fisheries have for many years been secure sources of wealth, partly because they were productions in which, to a large cxitent, we enjoyed monopoly. Earlier in our history as much, or more, could be sald with referonce to thie peltry trade.
More recently, agrleulture has come to the front, and here we have had to compete with the woild. A great overproduction has taken place in grain and live stock, the common products of many countries. But in spite of all draw backs Canadlan wheat, cheose apples, live stock, etc., have but ingreased thelr good name and reputation. Untll quite recently mining operations have been jestricted; bult so tapid has been the dervelopment of the iron industry, that in a few years Canada will not be dependent on any country for supplies of fron. The importance of this can scarcely be over estimated, as tending to find diversifled employment for our people and keep them in the countirs. It cannot be denied, however, that the present dutles are a heavy tax on con: sumers and stroing pressure is likely to We brought to bear on the Government to equalize the burdens. No feature in the tarlf! will be watched with greater interest, but it is noit thought posfilble that any change likely to deliver a vital blow at our new development in fron manufacture will be made. Canada is a large consumer of iron and steel and la likely to be for many years to come. It is belng amply demonstrated that the native ores are of superlor quallty, that capable men have at last entered the field, and that the products of thelr! furnaces are of the best. Such facts are a bright augury for the inture.

In one way and another, manufacturling operatious are becoming more extended and here Canada is seen to possess many advantages of her own : an industrious and frigal popatation, in. meuse water power, cheap communication, added to a long winter, anl annual reminder of the valua of indoor occupa. tions. Last but not least must be reckoned our deposits of soit coal, useful for manufacturing purposes. The marked lead taken by Montroal in manufactures may we attributed as much to a cheap coal supply, as to the density of her population, her wealth and other causes. Before the present duty on soft coal, which has reduced Importations of the British product in favor of Nora Scotlan, ito was cheaper to bring out coal than stone ballast, when the difliculty and cost of disposing of the intter, were taken inta account. At the present day a fleet of coal ships keeps the market amply supplied aud the out puti of the Cape Breton mines was never so large as last year. Owhing to the cost of transport it does not pay to send this coal for manufacturing pur. poses, to any important point west of Cornwall, and Toronto ds obliged to Duy both soft and hard coal in the United States. The latiter, used al. most exclusively for houselold purposes, owing to tts relative defnrness should be cheaper in Toronto than in Montreal, but the west, to use a current expression. "Is not in it" with Montreal when the price of soft, or manufacturing coal, is concerned, transported all the way from the lower sea. hoard by steamship. This is where Montreal, has long held, and will conthue to hold the advantage ovep all competing manufacturing centres in Canada, of any importance. During 1885, 860,000 tons of Nova Scotia coal came up the st Lawerence, lest season the tigures had risen to 700,000. Montreal got the bulk of this, a mall pro.
portion going to Quebec, Sorel and Three Rivers. To de exact we recelved $491,88 \mathrm{in}$ toms of Nova Scotia coal at this port in 1S92 aud 611,459, in 1898. Oul importations of Scoteh and Englisls coal were 32,876 tons in the former year, and 36,074 in the latter. It has ween calculated that the comang steamers made 360 trips last sedsoin and spent aloout $\$ 450,000$ at this port In stores, provisions, etc. This is a goodly trade in itiself, but the figures are of value as being an inder to the growth of manufactures in our midst. Coal is the basls of our new devalopment in Iron smelting and manufactures of all kinds, and no other country possesses such inmense deposits. In the future the coal beds of the Pacific const and the Northwest, will be worked to the great advantage of those parts, but for many years to come Montreal and the east may be expected to bo the workshop of the Dominion.

## THE BOALRD ON TRADE.

An edltorial in the "Pharmaceutical Journa!" for Feburary ultimo, arralgns the Board of Trade of thls city for remissness in not using its influence to compel the Government' to remove the inequalities now existing in the lm . position of customs duties and in the appralsement of Imported goods. No doubt, owing to the number of custom houses scattered throughout the Dom. Inlon, unlformity in classifying and rating goods for duty is next to the impossible, and no doubt, also, that this fact militates against the larger im. porting centres where complete staffs of expert appralsers are stationed. But Whether the atmost efforts of the Board of Trade could have brought about the rectification of 1nequalities Inseparable from the propent custome system, and arising from inherent de fecto thereln, we are hardly prepared to say.

There has certalaly been of fate a growing lmpression amoug pusiness mein in this clty that the representations of the bourd of Trade carry too Hetle weight with the prosent cubfnet. Deputations are courtcoously received and Mstened to, and then bowed out with the kssurance that the mpulster will consult his colleagues in 'the matter. This is often the last that is heard of it, and as the Board of Trade luas seen content to be satis. fied with this treatment in the past, the Government seem to have come gradually to look upou its deputations In the same ight as the deputations in favor of compulisory prohiwhion, female suffrage, and the aboition of war, as peopie to te judiclously "tuffied" but of no consequonce as factors at the polls. The "Pharmaceutical Journal" goes farther than this, and asserith that thif ladiferenco upon the part of the Government is bused upon the beHef that the influence of the Board of Trade is largely controlled wy certain prominent ancinbers whoso poitical predilections, are such that they whl inaluce the other onembers to submit to any treatment ratice : than cause crouble to the party. Werg this correct it would argue that eifler the remaluing members were extraordinariiy suphe, or that the "Cique" were gifted with unusual powers of persutsion and generalship. But wa do not thiluk it Is. There are too many men whose polltical views are opposed to the Governument's polley to render such unanimity possible. We thifk the Govern. ment's indifference to the wishes of the anercantile communty is due to their knowledge of the indiference of business men towards polities. Merelants growl against unwelcome legislation; but they will not waste hall an heur to vote agalnst the men who imilated or supported it. They never think of working for theif enndidate, or of makmge theanselves felt as a power in pollifics. Naturally the Govermment gives Its first atitention to placating those who do both, and mercantile intercsts are quictly trelagated to the wack ground until the mutierings of discontent become too loud to be distegarded. We camot blame the Board of Trade for this neglect of its representations by the Government. From the plotical istandpolnt, a wody to be respecteri must also we feared. The Government do not fear it, and it can only expect perfunctory recognition at their hands until they do.

## the bank statements.

The fluctuations in the financial situation, as indicated in the bank statements for January are less important tham they appear at first sight. True, criculation, loans and discounts, ánd deposits on call, show a. conslderable deline dur. ing the month of January last; dut this may be, and probaibly la, due to a judicious contraction of speculan tive business in view of the ungettied state of the tarlif on both sides of the line and not to any impairment of the volume of ordinary transactions.
A dectine in the circulation is always expected at this perlod of the year. circulation is dependent almost entirely on the movement of agricultural produce and, duriug the month under review, this movement was practically at a standstill. Not only was the North-Western wheat crop of last ycar under the average, but the bulk of it went forward unusually early. The Low prices rallag induced farmers to hoard what remained until delivericts from interior polnts weut down to a quinimum. The same reason caused spocuiative grain to be beld in the vain hone that wheat would go higher. Speculators were reluctant to face the losses that now look to be linevitable, and henee the movement to the sensoard practically ceased. Naturally the elfeulation and the railway tarfle returns showed the effect at once, and censequently the volume of the carculation fell $\$ 3,847,561$ under the figures of December last. This is a purely normal decrense. The only disquicting polnt about it is that it lorings the circulation for January 1894 down to the lowest point it has reached in the last five years.

Puble deposits on domand were redueed by $\$ 2,441 ; 995$, partially offset by an increase of $\$ 1,081,775$ in the deposits after notice. This probably represente the transern of that sum from the one account to the other in scarch of hilgher interest. We have thus a deficit of $\$ 1,360,220$ in call deposits to deal with, and the question is whether this defielt represents money drawn out because its owners were forced-by stress of hard times to use it for pres. silug needs, or whether it means simply so much withdrawn for investment in mortgages or in new commercial ventures. It is to be hoped it is the latter. If it is, a gradual reduction of the depasits would not be regarded as a de. triment by the banks. In times of lack
of confldence the public are ant to pour their surplus into the banks and throw upon those institutions the onus of Investing it. This the managers naturally ifind it difficult to do in times like the present when interest rates rule low for anything like gilt-edge investment and when money is a dyug in the great speculative centres. Conseguently when the burden of deposits becomes too heavy for use in legithate commercial needs the banks are compelled to handle paper of a class they otherwise would never touch. They thus buha up a number of "straw"-firms, whose competition may prove' disastrous to their soivent customers and whose collapse may result in loss to themselves, simply because they are obliged to use the money in some way. For this reason a gradual reductiou in the volume of deposits. would le rather iavorable than otherwise to the mercantile and financial interests of the country, pro. vided it was not attended whith any panicky symptoms. It would be better for gound substantial firms to be relieved of the competition of men with nothing to lose and everything to gain, and it would be better for the banls whose difficulty in disposing of the surplus money they now hold is emphasized by the increase of nearly two and three quarter millions in their holdings of-municipal and arailroad sceurities during the year. Of this total $\$ 665$, 03t can we credited to last January. - The deciense of $\$ 2,860,304$ in the volume of loans and discounts, and of $\$ 292,000$ in that of call loans on stock, possibiy Indicates the conservative attitude of the commerelal and industrial community pending some decision as to the future of the tariff on woth sides of the linc.l. It may also represent a return to healthler and more conservative methods of doing business; for it is certalnly due, more or less, to a curthailment of the spirit of speculation. The total is still $\$ 780,000$ higher than it was in January 1803, and hence it is mot caused by any decrease in the volume of the country's trade during the year; so that whem the presenti period of suspense, as to the future lis. cai polley of both countries is finally ended, we shall witness a prompt revival of speculative enterprise. Unthí that time arrives it is just as well that the loans and discounts should Indicate a cautious policy upon the part of our mercantile iustitutions.
The smaller items in the statement call for mo particular comment. The decrease of $\$ 658,840$, in the balances
due ijy American banks and agencles is the result of the extremely low rates for " money ruling in New York and Chicago. No bank can afford to pay 84 or 4 per cent for money here and lend it out at $1 / 4 /$ per cent in the United States, and hence Amerlean balances
are kept at the lowest possible point compatible with the actual peeds of the agencies: During the moith the specīe held by the banks declined $\$ 291,328$ but there was an increase of $\$ 631,848$ in their holalugs of Dominion notes.

## OPIUM AND LIPE INSORANCE.

If life insurance had nọ greater ciaim npon public gratitude than the record of the fallacies it has exposed it would stlll rauk high among the bencfactors of the human race. One by one the cherished theories of extremists have been disslpated before its practical testa. Dogmas propounded as absolute truths, simply from thelr constanit reiteration, have been awept away like cobwebs by the experience of the actuary, until cranks of every lind have come to dread his quict aritical Investigation of thelr theories more than the most furious attacks of their opponents. The actuary is not thelr opponent, us thes are well aware, and therefore they dread him the more; for What he says ls the result of actuall practice-and absolute facts are stubborn things to contend with.
The latest popular bellef to be swept away by the remorseless actuary is the long-cherished ldea that the consumption of oplum; even in moderation, des-
troys the consumer, body and soul, He says it does not. And he.puts forward mortailisy statistics, gathered from companies Insuring largely among the natives of India, apparently confirming this ratatement. There are now thousands of natives carrying life insurance in India, and it is estimated that a large percentage of these are habitual users of opium and yet one of the largest carrlers of native risks in India, the Orlental Life Assurance Co., which has 20,000 artive lives on : its books, says that not one out of the 973 death clalms it has pald can be attributed to the use of opium. This is a strong argument; for a Iife Insurance company can have un interest in acceptlag bad lives, and it the use of oplum did really involve the "destruc. tion of God's lmage more terrible than lunacy or ldiocy" (as we have so often been told it does) the companies would long since have found it out and rejected every fisk offered by a conpumer of that drug.

The fact is the public have been unwittingly led astray by misconceptions of the effect of opium in its differant forms. It has confounded the evil et. fects of oplum smoking, which is the vice of the very few, with the result of oplum eating, which is its ordinary form of consumption In India. It has thus deceived Itselt by false generaliza. tions trom a misapprehension of the real facts of the case. Perinaps too, it may not have been altogether univiling to be thus deceing. Most men, like Hudibras, are disposed to "compound for sins they are Inclined to, by dammligg those they have no mind to." And it was pieasant, if a little pharisaical, to think that we were not as other men are. Europan races might drink lie, cheat and gamble; but the curse of oplum had never been ours. Hero was one sin-and we were disposed to exaggerate its enormity-that was pecullar to Asiatic countries, and hence it was one which could de denounced unsparingly without hurting the feel. ings of the most thin-skinned of our brethren. And so it was denounced; until the insurance aetuary investigated the deadiy drug and poked the finger of cold stern fact into the pleasanth litthe soap-bubble of fiction. It is imposshble to believe that all the insurance managers, medical experts apd actuar. ies of the companies doing business in India are conspiring to conceal the truth, or are furnishing thelr home of. fices with fraudulently cooked statis: ties. We have therefore anly the option before us of coming round to their Istatement that the use of opium (even habitually) in hot cllmates is no more deleterious than is the tem. perate use of alcoholle or fermented llquors in colder zones.
Equally strong is the testimony glven by the secretary of the National Cham. ber of Commerce of Bengal before the Royal Commission on Oplum which closed In Calculta last January. He held that it had been proved by a care. ful lavestigation made under the aus. pices of the Chamber that the temperate use of opium is not only innocuous but a valuable preservative, among a population liable to malarious disease. Ho instanced the robust physique and muscular vigor of the Sikhs and Rajpoots, who are the largest consumers of the drug, and stated that people. undergoing severe fatigue or subject to exposure at night deemed it a necessity to take opium in moderate doses as a propliylactic against malaria and chllls. In fact the testlmony of the ex.
perts all through the eeselon of the commisslon was to the comparative hamessness of oplum when not takes to excess.
The truth is that so long as man existh he will seek a stimulant to recruit exhmusted mature. He aiways has done so, and he aiways will. it; may de alcohol, it mny be oplum, it may be bromo-caffeine or ehloral; but it whil be taken all the same,. It then remains to choose the form of stlmulant least deleterious in its action. So fur as the evidence of the insurance eompaniles go, the conclusion is overwhelmlag that oplum is in every way better adanted to India than alcohol. The later slmply maddens the Aslatic; whle the former seems comparatively fmocuous. $\Lambda$ s the insurance actuaries Dase their deductions upon abso:utely tunglise facts and results, while the public reason largely from their sympathies, we must priforce recelve thelr conelusions as eorreet, and therefore we must add the hiftherto aceenited statement that "the use of oplum destroys a man body and soui" to the tong list of exploded falaches.

Six monthe ago the partics carrying the loan notified us that on account of the stringency in the money market and for other reasons, they would expect the loan 1.o be paid in full on the 16 th January when it fell due. To meet this and provine for the further manufacturing of maehines, the shareholders authorized the directors to issue $\$ 50,000$ worth of bonds, which were to be gubscribed for by the shareholders at the rato of $\$ 5$ per share and were to run for five years. Of this, $\$ 25,000$ was to take up the present luan aud the bainnee to be used as a further working capitni for the company. The subseriptious for these bonds were rers insignificant and came nowhere near heing enough to pay off the present indebtedness, and the 10 shareholders who had guaranted the payment of the oricinal $\$ 20,000$ were compelled to go down in their pockets and pay the monoy. They granted the company 30 dajs' exteusion to see if anything could be done towards raising it nud thus provent any severe mensures being taken by tham to secure themselves, but as nothing bas been done, it rests entirely with these gentlemen what action will be taken when the extension falls duc. It is probnble, however, that the mortgage will be foreclosel and a re-organization of the company take piace, provided no other purchaser than the Nondholders presents himself. Until some action is taken I ann not in a position to state what will be done, but as soon as I am able to will ndvibe you, Yours very truly,

We have ibeen making preparitions yor some weeks past to return to the old system of typesetting by hand and hope to appear before our readers in a "hew dress" before long. We deem this explanation necessiary in view of the isomeurhat imperfect typography apparent in our columns lately.

## DOC"TORS' BILLS.

Could the medical profersion in thie and other citis be brought to realize the amount of trouble and anopiance they: give to many of their clients by their pergistent disegard of ordinary business, methods tiny would speedily reiorm their present unsystematic and procrastinating way of rendrring and collecting their accounts. Other professions send in regularly itemised bills of costs that enable their clizule to see at a ghance the items for which they are called upon to pars: Why then should a doctor be entitled to mask his charges under the cloak of secrecy, and demand payment of a lump sum without atating how that sum, is arrived at?

When only the total is given it is impassible for the client to be certain that some of the amount demanded has not already been paid and not credited, or to find out whether any of the items appear twice. Doctors are not infallible. Indeed in matters of bookkeeping they are often careless and inaceurate. "Consequently a lusiness man can never feel certain that he really owre the amount lie is called upon to pay. Ii the bill prosented is dated back two or three years the uncertainty becomes still grcater, and yet he cannot check the account simply because the doctor shields himsell behind the buckler of professional utiquette and rofuses to furnish any particulars as to it.
Now there is no reason why a doctor should not present a regularly made up bill the same as a lawyer, architect, or any other profesesional man. If the others coulorm to businesse regulations there is no reason why lie should not do so also ${ }_{\text {e }}$ Professional ctiquintte is a raluable safeguard in many ways, but when it lends pitself to concenlment, and possibly at times pyen to fraw in monetary trausactions, it is time that; ite rigor should be mitigated, and the sooner thie doctors recognise this fact the better.

## ERASTUS WIMAN.

Mr. Wiman, of New York, whoes arrest on several serious charges and incarceration were referved to at some length last week, was admitted to bail in $\$ 25,000$ a lew days aiterwarda, and is now at large and as frea as Timon of Athens to test the value of the servico tendered him by some old time fricads. Mr. Wiman denies the chargee' brought againgt him by R. G. Dum: \&.Co., who on the other hand claim to have dis-
covered further baces of forgery by him, Makine all due allowanees for the exaggerations of sensational reporters of New Yorls newspnpene, which eren their businces jourmals do not seem to be always free from, the charges against ilr. Wiman appar too serioue to be explained away. If he was accurtomed to usa the name of the firm as indicated, the firm must long ago hare become acquainted swith the fact. Or was there no weight attached to accounts again ureudered, underatood to hare been paid by Wiman, as in the case of Brower of Campbell Preks Co ? or ware these matters cons doned as long as the firm believed in the reputed wealth of the Staten Island magpate? The bookkeping, it may be inferred, was not given the supervision demandc.d. It is sugerstive inther of the proverbs respecting the shocmaker's wife and the blacksmith's horse. The issuc will be watched with interest by the business community all over the continent; but some propla may suepect that a grand scheme for advertising the purties concerned may underlie it all, in which case the history of the Mercantile Agency bystem in America would be merely repeating iteelf.

## THE WESTERN INSURANCE CO.

The report presented at the forty-third annual meeting of the shareholders of the Western Insurance Compuny (which is reproduced in another column) shows that, in spite of the unusually heavy losses experienced during the year just past, the progress of the company has been unbated. In conformity with the resolution passed at the special meeting in February, 1893 , the paid-up capital of the company has been increased to $\$ 1,000,000$, and. its total cash assets now reach $\$ 2$,412,043 . The revenue account shows a total income of $\$ 2,525,808$, and after paying dividends at the rate of 10 per ceut. per annum the company can boast of a reserve fund of $\$ 1,000,000$ and a surplus for policybolders of $\$ 2,0 \div 8,036$. Conidering the exceptional financial and commercial conditions that prevailed during the period under review, and the inevitable increase in the moral hazard resulting therefrom, the fact that so good a showing has been made reflect's great credit upon the officers. Now that the ware of industrial depression is passing away and the commercial horizon is birightening daily, we may reasonably - hope that the expericace of last year will not be repeated during the present one.

## HE HAD NO EXPERIENCE.

One of those instances where an honest hard-working man, who hae saved up a litthe money, becomes suddenly seized with ou desire to risk it by entering the already over-crowded rauks of the mercantile community, is furnished by the failure of An. gus Cameron, a retail dealer in grocerics and liquore at Carleton Place. Cameron has been a laboring man all his life. He was looked upon locally no an hogast man but totalls unlitted for commercial life. He had no business experience, and hence his - prospecte of success were problematical in the extreme. But he had about $\$ 1,200$ in capital, and buoyed up by this ho launched himself upon the troubled sea of com-
meree just sixteen months ago. To-day ho is one of the many wrecks strewed along its shore. His capital is gone, and he shows linbilities of $\$ 1,800$ against assets nominally worth $\$ 1,500$. The estate, howerer, is a good one, and if it is properly handled, his creditors should rcalize a fair dividend. If other ambitious agriculturists will take waraing by his example, and stick to their farms instead of thrusting themselves into the already over-crowded ranks of trade. it will be a good thing, not only for themselves, but fo: the business community as a whole.

## THE RECORD CLIP.

Even should the Wilson tarifi bill ultimately place wool on the free list Canallian wool-growers are likely to benefit but little by it, for the American wool elip last year was the largest in the history of the country. It amounted to $348,538,138$ pounds, or 4.66 per cent. more than 1802, while it exceeds the record year, 1883 , by nearly $10,000,000$ pounds. Not only this, but the quantity of wool on hand in the principal Uuited States markets on the first of last January was. $126,362,000$ pounds of domestic and 23 ,TT2,500 pounds of foreign wool, or nearly $43,000,000$ pounds more than the supply on hand a year ago. In addition to this there is an unusually large and indefinite supply still withbeld from the market, so that the present year began with so large an amount of old stock available as to preclude the probnbility of any advance in price even if thore were a vigorous revival in the manufacture of woollen goods. With prices as low as they are now, nad in some cases 40 per cent. below last year's figures, there can be rery little money for Canadians in importing wool to the United States even if it should be admitted free.

## WHAT IS A BUILDING?

The question of whether a search warr rant authorizing the seizure of goods in any private dwelling, store, shed, or other "buidding," permitted their seizure on bourd a schooner, has been decided in the affirmative by the Court at Quebec. The case was that of the $\$ 13,000$ worth of iurs belonging to the Hulson's Bay Cor, which were seized ly a gamekecper om board their echoonor last July for being. taken out of scason. Judges Blanchet and' Bosse upheld the contention of the comp pang that the word "buidding" meant a house or similar structure with a foundation in the grouul; but the Chief Justice, Sir Alex Lacoste, and Julges Hall and Wurtele decided that the term "building" applied to anything that was "built," and hence would cover a schooner as well as o house. The decision will be appealed.

THE HOME gAVINGS AND LOAN CO. The Home Saringe and Loan Co. forms a gratifying exception to most of its competitors in the fact that it considers the past year the mosit auccesstul it has had during all its experience. In tho filteeuth annual report it is Bhown that after paying dividends at. the rato of 7 per cent. to the oharoholdori, and meat-
ing every item of expenditine, as well as providing for commissions and bonuses, the net profits amounted to $\$ 32$,000 , of which $\$ 28,000$ was added to the reservo and $\$ 3,000$ to the contingent fund. This brings the reserve fund up to $\$ 175$,000 , or equal to the pail-up capital. The company has now deposits to the extent ot $\$ 1,828,50 \overline{5}$, its loaus on collateral rach $\$ 1,175,854$, inul it has $\$ 952,772$ out on mortgnge, beside $\$ 43,420$ in municipnl bouls. $\cdots$ This is a prosperous showing and one that must have been specially grateful to the shareholders, considering the condition of the money market during 1893. The votes of thanks to the President, Vice-President, and Mr. James Mason, the manager, were evidently welldeserved.

## THE BISHOP PRINTING CO

 The directors of the Banque Nationale have definitely decided that they will not necept the offer of 50 cents in the dollar, payable in two years and unsecured, made by the George Bishop Printing and Publishing Co., and the company will accordingly go into liquidation. The bank authorities argue that after the stock valued at $\$ 31,412$ had been reduced by $\$ 12$,000 , or 38 jer cent., the book debts estim'ated at $\$ 18,803$ decrensed by $\$ 8,381$, or 44 per cent., and the machinery valued at $\$ 03,394$ reluced to $\$ 35,000$, or 44.8 per cent., the estate still showed a surplus of $\$ 20,000$. If this surplus were written off the machinery and the price of the latter reduced to $\$ 15,000$, the esfate should still pay dollar for doliar, and if the machinery were reduced to $\$ 6$,500, or to legs than 10 per cent. of its egtimated value, it would still bhow 85 cents in the dollar. Uuder these circumstances they do not feel like necepting half the hmount of their claim especially on such unsatisfactory terms.
## TMMELY ADVICE.

Country merchants visiting the cities to attend the millinery openings should not fail to recornise the value as news of the advertisements in this journal. A careful perusal of them will keep them posted as to what the large housss are doing, and they will read in our advertising columma. mang things that they are not liable tol find elsewhere. By making a memorandum of the fabrics and novelties there adver-1 tised by the makers, they will be especially well equippad when visiting their Wholesalers, and thus they can go back feeling certain that they lave not neglect: ed any deairable article that their neight. bors are likely to get. The value of trade nuvertisements as news items is not as fully recognized as it ought to bo, But tho shrewd buyer never omita to exninine them carefully; for they may contain opportant ities for film that are too valuable to be pacsed over, and he is well aware of thic fact.

## THE BANK OF ENGLAND.

It has just transpired that the Bank of: Englame has been compelled to settle for $\$ 760,000 \mathrm{un}$ overdrait for $\$ 2,100,000$ which they had parmitted one of their largeat: depositors, the well-known speculator, Allian Hope, to make. It was a case of doing this or foreing Hope to become insolvent, in which case they would have lost all. This has renewed the outcry in England for some clange in the management of the bank. Merchante say that the periodical change in the post of Governor involves a loss of continuity in the bank's policy as well as causing friction between the heads of the various departments. To remedy this some suggest a permanent governor, while others would prefer a general namger to be responsible to the board of Directors. This, they think, would bring the bonk into closer touch with the outside market, and incrense its power and influcuce in keneral trado.

## MAY CHANGE HBR POLICY.

There are rumors that financial exigencies may compel the Indian Government to impose a heary tarifi on imports as well as on exports. It is believed that India must abumba her present free trade policy and adopt one of tariff for revenue, if not one of absolute protictionk The cable reports have alarmed bigglish and Amerienn houres doing an East Indian trade, and goods aro being rushed forward in anticipation of "he expected clanges Cargoes both ways are likely to be very heavy for some time to come; but as tho Indian Govermment is so essentially bureaucratic that it can only move very slowly, merehants are likely to have ample warning of any alterntion in its commercial policy.

THE CANADA ACCIDENA CO.
The amual report of the directors of the Canada Aecident Co. slows that the come pany's premian income for the year just closed amounted to \$78,374, or an inerease of $\$ 6,740$ over the figures of ite predecessor. Tho directors, in submitting the fifteenth annual report, with accompanying financial statement, for the year ended 81st December, 1893, have to congratulato the shareholders on the fact that this has been the most suceessiul year the company has yet had.
There was a stendy demand for money all throughout the year for "Loans on Collaterals," and at good rates of interest.
after paying and providing for two halfyearly dividends at the rate of seven per cent. per annum, and paying all expenses, including salarics, printing, advertising, auditors' fees, a bonus of $\$ 500$ voted cerlain members of the office stafl by the sharcholders, also a bonus of $\$ 500$ to the late auditors, and all commissions on loans, and providing for directors' compensation, there remained a net prolit of $\$ 32,002.43$. Of this sum $\$ 28,000$ is added to the reserve fund, $\$ 3,000$ placed to a contingent account, and the balance; $\$ 1,002.43$, placed at credit of profit and low account.

The directors have withdrawn from the contingent account the sum of $\$ 20,000$ which stood to its credit at dhe close of last year, and have applied it on the invest* ment or account to which reference has been made in several previous annual reports, and for which it was some years ago thourht necessury to specially create that contangent lund. Thus this old contiagent account does not appear in the statement of this year, but, as a contingent account is considered a desirable safeguard for the reserve fund, a new contingent account has been formed by a credil of $\$ 3,000$, taken from the net profits of this year.
The reserve fund has now reached the sum of $\$ 175,000$, and equals the paid up capital of the company.
Continued difficulty was found in obtaining good, safe mortgage loans at paying rates of interest, and the amount now invested in these loans shows a falling off of $\$ 20,476.26$, as compared with lust year.

During the year, Mr. Henry Joseph, one of the auditors, being unable, in consequence of failing health, to continue his duties as auditor, tendered his resignation. This was accepted, and Mr. John G: Hall appointed auditor in his stead, The directors, in cousideration of the long and fuithful services of the late auditors, Messis. Joseph and Macdonelh, voted them a bonus of $\$ 500$. This sum is added to the expenses of the year.
The shareholders will be asked to confirm a by-1aw pissed by the directors for a further issue and allutment of two thousand five hundred shares of the capital stock of the company, thus inereasing the capital stock to $\$ 2,000,000$, the full amount authorized by the charter of the company. This incrense is to keep pace with the increasing business of the company.

The Directors have pleabure in presenting herewith the forty-hird anmual report of the company, with revenue and expenuiture, and profit and loss accounts, lur the year euniag 3lat December last, and statiment of assets and habilities at the close of the year.
In contormity with the resolutions passed at the special meeting of shareholders held ou the 22nd of February last, the paid-up capital of the company has been inereased to $\$ 1,000,000$, and the total cash assets now amount to $\$ 2,412, \mathrm{c} 42.63$.
In regard to the business trangacted daring the year, it will be noted that the premium income shows a moderate increase over that of 1842 ; but, while the rates of premium obtained have, as a rule, been such ab, judging by past experience, would have been anple to sield n fair profit in an ordinary year, they have not proved sufficient to meet the exceptional losses which this companyin common with others doing business in Canada and the United States-has sub: tained during 1803. Your Directore consider, however, that the causes to which no inconsiderable proportion of the uxcessive déstruction of property hy fire during the pust twelve months is attributable, may be regarded as of a transitory nature; while its effecto are likely to be experienced in succeeding years in the maintenance of adequate rates to fully reimburse companies for the losees they have sustained. The experience of this company in the past, as will be seon by a reference to its annual reports, confirms this opinion, and at the same lime demonstrates the wisdom of accumulating in prosperous times an ample reserve to meet the demands of adverse years. In this connection it may not be out of place to refer here to the fact that from the earuings of the five jears preceding tho one under review wo have been able, after payiug dividends at the rate of ten per cent. per anuum, to carry $\$ 315,000$ to our reserve fund; and although in a business such as that we are engaged in no reliable forecast can be made of the probable outcome of any one year, your Directore feel that they have every reason to anticipate that the future experience of the company will prove at least as favorable as its record in the past.
The Directors feel that the thanks of the sharehollers are due to the officers aud agents of the company for their work in a year which has been a particutarly trying one to all concerned.

The thirty-seven companies licensea by the Dominion Government to do busiauss in Camada report total premfum receipts for the year of $\$ 6,740,958$, and total losses of $\$ \pm, 970,260, a$ ratio of losses to premiums of $733-4$ por cent., or 12 per ceast. is excess of the averuge ratio of the precediag sis years; and in the United States, allhough the total figures oi all the companies doing busines there hare not yet been compiled, we fiad in the report just issucd by ine Now. York State Superiatendent of Insurance unguestionable evidence that the business of the country has been done at a considerable loss to the companies. This report embraces the statements of one hunured and twenty-cight smerican and foreiga companies doing fire and marino business in the Uuited States, and shows a shrinkage of nearly $\$ 10,000,000$ in the combined surplus funds of these compunies, compared with that which they Lad a yoar ago, due to the extroardinary losses of the past year, and to the deeline in the market value of many of their assets.
Turning from these figures to our own experience, we find that our loss ratio in Canada is nearly 10 pei cent. below the average of the companies as a whole, aud that in the Dinited States we compare favorably with the American and foreign companies doing business there. I feel, therefore, that I may sum up the result of our jear's buainess by saying that, comparatively speakiug, we regard it as a favorablee one, when we consider the general experience as demonstrated by the igrures I have quoted.
In presenting the lust annual report to the shareholders a year ago, I pointed out that in the preceding twenty-seven years during which I had had the honor of occupring a seat at this board, we had, notwithstanding the adverse exporience of several years in which expenditure excieded income, bien able, out of the earnings of the businesa, to pay $\$ 1 ;$ 015,000 in dividends to shareholders, and to earry nearly $\$ 900,000$ to our Reserve Fund; and before remming my eat if

## SPRING TRADE 1894 ——n

Our Travellers are now on the road．
ont of farmers＇hande，the total wheat remaining on March 1st may be placed at $240,000,000$ bushels．This total is arvived at as follows．On March 1st， 1893，the estimated stock was 306,000 ， 000 butshels．To this must be neded the crop of 1803，which the revised estim－ ates have steadily increased to 450,000 ，－ 000 bushels．This gives us $756,000,000$ hushels as the total supply for the year ended resterday．From this we muet deduct $510,000,000$ bushels for food，seed， and export，which leaves us $240,000,000$ bushels．Of this it is estimated fully： $120,000,000$ bushels are still in farmors＇ hands aud it is the fear of this unmar－ keted surplus which has hung so heavily on the back of the market and pushed the price of wheat lower than any preceding record．

TLORTDA PHOSPHATESS
The incrensed demand for Florida phos－ phates is one of the factors depressing to the Canadian plosphate industry for some： time past．Last year 240,851 tome of hard rock phosphate and 165,495 tons of pebble． phosplate were mined and shipped from Norida，or an incrense of 70,000 tons over： the figures of 1892 and of 248，141 tons over those of 1801．The rapid ribe of this， industry from 18s8，when only 813 tones， were shipped，is most remiarkable．Flor－ ida phosphares suit the Burlish market： much better than our own．They can bo mined much more cheaply，and as the com－ punies are well supplied with cupital and． can use the most improved hydraulic ap－ pliances，they can afford to sell their phos－ plate at prices which would not prove pro－， fitable to the Canadian miner．Henco they have practically captured the Engt． lish murket．

## ARCHC WHALING．

The report on the whaling industry for 1803 shows that the day of the eniling ship as a whaler is over．Practically tha whole eateh in the Aretic was made by stean－whalers，who were the only once able to puss Point Barrow．The suiling vessels were compalled to cruise south of that point，and as a consequence the twenty vebsels composing the ileet only took 16 whales－－nine vessels going home without a single fish－while the thirteen steamers


captured 278 whales between themb This means that the total calch for the year was 29.4 whales agninst 214 in 1892 . Unless bome method of towiar the sniling vessels is used they cannot hope to make entehest now that the whalea have been driven so far noth, and ns a consequence the sailjung fleet will be reduced to ten vesseis this year, while the flect of steamers will bu rised to sixtent, of which eceven are now wintering at Jersehel Island. Prices for whalchont have been unsatisfactory: Whalehouse opened in Janmary 1893 at $\$ t$ for Alctic and $\$ 3.75$ for North-West. It fell to $\$ 2$ in Oetobor, but-recovered blighty and. closed ian December las't at $\$ 3$ for Aretic nadl \$2.50 for North-West. The stock in Duited States on the first of Inst January was 300,100 pounds athinst $342,100 \mathrm{in}^{\prime}$ 1893 mid 164,350 in 1802. Besides this. there are 160,000 pombls atill on board the seven steamers waiting at Hersehel Islana. Canada is a very amall consumer of crude, whalebone: During the last fiscal year we only imported 23,184 pounds valued ath $\$ 2,160$,

## A PEOPLE'S RAILWAY.

The populist party in Kangas have ancceeded in elaborating $\infty$ scheme for a "people's railwny" to be called the North and South Railrond. They bave mado a start by openiug a headquar? ter's oflice at Topeka. How they propose to raise the capital is explained by the following circular:
"Thie plan proposes the issuing of stock at $\$ 100$ per share. Each purchaser of a share of stock is to receive twentytwo ${ }^{5} 5 \mathrm{~F}$ transportation cortificates, which also may bo purchased separately. When the road is completed, these will be recoived as cash for lund the price of tickets, freight, and other charges. Income construction bonds are nlso to be issued by the company in sums of $\$ 5, \$ 10$ and 1820. These bear 5 per cent. interest and are to be paill out of the income of the road. They will be recoived for all dues, with a premium of 5 per cent. addod.

But at present the populist railroad does not oven possess the proverbial two streaks of rust and the right of way. All it has got, so far, is an office with a plate glass window and a general manager. Possibly this is all it ever will have. Dut, if it should be able to raise sufficient money to run a train, it will locus on itsell the interest of the entire railway world, a "haysced" road would be a new departure, even in Kangas:
