A small bark is reported chartered to load at Bay Verte, for W. C. England, at 39s.

Sch. Galatea loads dry hemlack boards at Fredericton, N. B., for New Bedford, at \$3.

Ship Equator, has been fixed to load deals at Grindstone Island, N. B., for England, at 378 6d.

The sch. Bessie Crane, and sch. Beaver, are chartered to load lumber for New York, at St. John, N. B., for \$2.50.

The big steel ship, Liverpool, which is being towed from New York to St. John, N. B., will be leaded at that port with deals.

Lumber freights from St. John to Boston and New York, have been advanced 25c, and to Sound ports, 1234c. Ocean freights are also firm.

The Rock City, from Halifax, has reached Manchester, Eng., with 360 deals; also the Barcelona, from the same port, with 250 standard deals, and a general cargo, including a quantity of wood pulp,

The following vessels are loading at Vancouver, B. C., Chillian bark, Lake Lemon, for Valparaiso; Earl of Hopetown, for Adelaide, N. S. W., British ship Blairgowrie, for South Africa; British ship Aighurth, for Valparaiso; American bark, Arcturus, for Santa Rosalia; American sch., Aida, for Shanghai.

The following arrivals, or expected arrivals, of Canadian timber, at Liverpool, Eng., are noted by the Timber News, of Liverpool: A shipment of pine deals, the first of the season, for Robert Cox & Co., which left Montreal, May 5th, by a Johnson liner. Pierce, Watts & Co., expect the early arrival of the Pharos to Fleetwood, with a miscellaneous cargo of Quebec wood goods. Williams & Davies have about due by the Sardinian, a consignment of Booth Quebec pine deals and red pine deals. James Webster & Brus., have due 150 stds Quebec spruce deals, 2nd and 3rd quality, 3x7 and up.

CURRENT TRADE CONDITIONS. ONTARIO.

ANY improvement in business, and happily there is some improvement, is of a very moderate character. Orders are being picked up by travellers on the road, but hard work is required to secure them. There is marked inaction in purchases made direct by visitors to lumber markets this season. Whilst shipments are going forward to the United States, they are not nearly in the same size as would be expected this late in the season. A Canadian mill man, who visited Buffalo during the week, and with whom the writer has since conversed, says he found business very slow. The same is reported throughout the eastern states. Orders are not abundant. And yet the report comes from good sources, that stocks on hand have been thinned down to a fine point, and if any activity shows itself at all this summer, there must be some fairly generous-Luying by the trade. The advance in prices of yellow pine is likely to check any hold that it was obtaining in Ontario. We learn, in the case of one of the large buildings in Toronto, recently destroyed by fire, and in which yellow pine joists were used, that in the rebuilding, which is now going on, the order has been placed for white pine joists, and at prices considerably less than the best quotations obtainable this month for vellow pine. The note that we make in our Stocks and Prices column of the sale of a timber berth by the Muskoka Mill & Lumber Co., adds configuration to what we have remarked before that timber limits hold a firm position in the market, and are in good de-

QUEREC AND NEW BRUNSWICK.

The week has not closed in Quebec without a start having been made in the season's shipments of lumber to Great Britain, and there is good reason to suppose that this will keep up steadily for some time. Large rafts of lumber are on the way east, for McArthur Bros. & Co. and others, in Ontario, as also from Michigan. Prices for deals in the British market are not, perhaps, as firm as shippers on this side would like to see them, but on the whole, exporters are not dissatisfied. The shipments of lumber from St. John, N. B., for April, were about 25 per cent. greater than that of the corresponding month a year ago. This activity continues during May, so that the season's trade starts off incouragingly. There is reason to expect that an advance will take place shortly in prices of certain lines of timber from these provinces.

BRITISH COLUMBIA.

A good deal of activity in the lumber

trade of British Columbia is reflected in the strong demand that exists for vessels at the present time. This improvement in the shipping trade is helped, no doubt, to some extent, by the fact that wheat freights are strong, but the lumber business itself is calling for a large amount of tonnage. R. P. Rither & Co., Ltd., report that a very encouraging demand for lumber vessels has lately been shown from China. and now that the war is practically over, this may be expected to develop. Enquiries from other quarters are well distri buted although the volume of business is not large. The home demand for lumber holds a good position, the general state of trade being considered.

UNITED STATES.

Accepting white pine as the timber in which LUMBERMAN readers are largely interested, it cannot be said that it partakes of as much strength as some other classes of wood. Yellow pine has taken on strength this season, where white pine has shown weakness, and hardwoods, as we have occasion to note elsewhere, are holding a better position also. Sales of white pine, of course, are being made. With a wood that goes so much into consumption, even in dull times, this could not otherwise than be the case. But there is a restriction of the outgo that is in contrast with conditions in former years. report of conditions that comes to us from the Shepard & Morse Co., of Burlington, Vt., is worthy of notice here, as giving emphasis to this view, showing where spruce and southern pine are strong, and the demand for white pine small and spasmodic. It is hardly to be expected, however, that these conditions can prevail for any great length of time. Stocks at leading distributing centers are low, and if there is any activity in build ing operations, and the consumption of lumber generally, it must mean that there will be a good call for white pine stocks in the near future.

FOREIGN.

A most lugubrious view of the British lumber market is pictured by the Timber Trades Journal of current date. Not only is it proclaimed that the timber market is almost barren of news, but nobody has a good word to say for it. To quote: "Prices have been dropping since the year began, and what assurance is there that bottom is touched? On the eve of the opening of navigation, the trade, who have bought, show no anxiety to get ther purchases for ward. This is evident from the small amount of chartering done. Why is this? Simply because there is no special demand, and stocks on hand are sufficient for present purposes. When prices have

reached the bottom then business will improve and not before." All this, out contemporary says, it saw coming, and had warned the trade, but they persisted in making contracts when the situation called for restriction. When, however, a reference is made to specific markets it is found that trade, after all, is not so theroughly demoralized. At Manchester, the timber trade is putting on considerable activity, the number of vessels fixed to arrive in the canal is increasing, and there is every outlook of a good season's trade. Quietness prevails at Liverpool. and yet beneath the surfacea strengthening of conditions is said to be manifest, and the lumber trade is securing benefit in this way. Glasgow trade does not by any means call for a gloomy statement. At other foreign points, Australia, South Africa, West Indies and China, a fair trade is reported.

HARDWOODS.

The growing uses to which hard woods are being put is shown in the measure of firmness that exists in this branch of the trade, where white pine is slow. A fair trade has been done throughout the week. Maple is reported in good demand, and it is to be explained to some extent by the growing activity in building operations. Quartered oak still holds a strong position. Cherry is dull, and the price declining somewhat. Birch does not hold quite as strong a position as early in the season. It is said there is a reversion from cherry and birch to mahogany. A report from Philadelphia says, that hardwood is coming into increased use among house finishing men, and that many houses are being erected finished nearly altogether in hardwoods. In the Buffalo market, oak is in fair request, with maple weak. A good demand continues for basswood.

STOCKS AND PRICES. CANADA.

The American sch. Compeer, has left Vancouver, B. C., with a cargo of lumber, from George Cassady & Co., Ltd., for San Francisco, consisting of 430,000 feet of rough lumber, which is valued at about \$5,000.

Shipments from St. John, N. B., for the past week, embraced 3,250,000 feet of deals, etc., for British ports, and 2,000,000 feet of long lumber, 1,300,000 shingles, 1,112,000 laths, and 485 cords of wood, for United States ports.

The Muskoka Mill & Lumber Co., closed a sale this week of berth No. 127, in Montgomery township, with Col. A. T. Bliss, the well-known Michigan lumberman, who buys on behalf of the Central Lumber Co., of Zilwaukee, Mich., in which he is interested. The berth constitutes 36 square miles, and with the exception of some square timber that was taken off it about eight or ten years ago, it is practically virgin forest. The new purchasers will likely work it next winter, and the logs will be brought down the Blind river.

The Shores Lumber Co., sold 500,000 feet of Norway piece stuff to B. H. Wood & Co., of Medina, O. Not a bad week for Ashland.

NEW BRUNSWICK SPRUCE.

New Brunswick spruce deals, says Timber, of London, Eng., are more active; considerable sales have already been made, and a large Halifax sailer now loading has been secured by a well-known

Gloucester house, while another cargo by the same shipper has just reached the Bristol Channel and been sold to a second firm at the port named at current low rates. At St. John, N. B., a big sailer is being loaded by Mr. Alex. Gibson for Liverpool, and as she is expected to bring about 1,800 stds., the largest shipment ever sent from New Brunswick in one bottom to this country, some interest is arising as to which firm will purchase and handle this leviathan cargo. Liverpool stocks are much depleted in several useful sizes, so this, together with another St. John shipment, about due, should prove useful additions, and ought to go promptly into consumption. Contracts are being freely made on the lowest of last year's c.i.f. rates, and recent sales have been :-St. John and Miramichi, £5 15s. to £6; Halifax, Parsbro', &c., £5 10s. to £5 12s. 64.; Bay Verte and Shediac, £5 5s. to £5 7s. 9d.; Pugwash, £5 3s. 9d. to £5 5s. For Irish specifications, £5 to 10s. extra has been obtained, as usual, a large quantity having been sold for early summer delivery.

LUMBER TRADE IN GREAT BRITAIN.

Farnworth & Jardine, of Liverpool, Eng., in their wood circular for May, say: The arrivals from British North America during the past month have been 3 ves-

sels, 2,107 tons, against 1 vessel, 770 tons during the corresponding month last year, and the aggregate tonnage to this date from all places during the years 1893, 1894 and 1895 has been 41,874, 43,510, 44,395 tons respectively.

The market continues in the same quiet condition reported in our recent circulars. The deliveries during the month have been light, and stocks of all articles are ample; values generally rule low.

CANADIAN WOODS.—For waney and

square pine the market is unchanged, and stocks sufficient. Red pine has not been enquired for; prices rule low and the stock is moderate. Oak.—There is rather more enquiry, but no change in value, and the stock ample. Ash.-The arrivals have been again from the United States, the bulk of which is going direct into consumption, the stock, however, is still too heavy Elm has moved off more freely; prices are steady and stocks are moderate. Pine deals have moved off slowly, buyers holding off until the new import. are easier in sympathy with the decline in freights; the stock held is much too heavy.

New Brunswick and Nova Scotia Spruce and Pine Deals.—Of spruce the arrivals have consisted of three shipments fron. Halifia, which are going into consumption. The deliveries have been disappointing, and the stock is still too heavy. Prices are easier.

BIRCH.—Of logs there has been no arrivals. The deliveries during the month have been large, and the stock is now reduced to a more moderate compass. Prices are steady. Of planks, the stock is still much too heavy, and prices continue exceedingly low.

UNITED STATES OAK .- The arrivals have consisted of one parcel of Mobile wood; the stock is still too heavy and prices rule low. Of oak planks the import has been too heavy for the present limited demand; stocks are increasing; values have declined throughout the month, and sales are now very difficult to

PITCH PINE.—The arrivals during the past month have been 5 vessels, 5,945 tons, against 6 vessels, 5.150 tons during the same time last year. Of hewn there has been only one large parcel, a fair quantity has gone into consumption; values particularly unchanged; the stock is ample. Of sawn, the arrivals have been chiefly from Pensucola; the consumption is again small; prices continue very low, and the stock is excessive. Planks and boards have arrived ficely: there has been a moderate consumption; the stock

on hand is far too heavy.

SEQUOIA (CALIFORNIA RELWOOD).—
The arrivals have consisted of one large cargo, 109,000 feet, which is all going into the yard; prices are very low, and the stock is too heavy.

fell, Assa., have sold out to C. J. Roseboro & Co., who will continue the business. Francois H. Racine and David Mercier,

have been registered proprietors of Racine & Mercier, lumber, Quebec. Beaudy & Frere, in business a short time at

Longueuil, Que., as manufacturers of sashes and doors, have been asked to assign.

LUMBER FREIGHT RATES.

LUMBER freight rates for pine on the Grand Trush Railway have been made a fixture, as below. Of any intended change due notice will be given lumbermen General instructions in shipping by G. and T unk are embodied in these words in the tariff schedule. On tumber in carloads, minimum weight, 30,000 lbs. per car unless the marked capacity of the car be less, in which case the marked capacity (but not less than 24,000 lbs.) will be charged, and must not be exceeded. Should it be impracticable to load certain descriptions of light cumber up to 30,000 lbs. to the car, then the actual weight only will be charged for, but not less than 4-000 lbs. The rates on lumber in the tariff will not be higher from an intermediate point on the straight rus than from the first named point beyond, to the same defination. For instance, the rates from Tara or Hepworth to Guelph, Brampton. Weston or Toronto would not be higher than the specific rates named from Waston to the same points. On the Canadiar Pacific the rates on pine and soft woods may be illustrated as follows: Cache Bay, North Bay, Sturgeon Falls and Warren, to Toronto, toc; Algoma, Cook's Mills, Massey, Sjannsh River and White-Lish to Toronto, 13c.; Ottawa to Toronto, toc From Ottawa, Hull, Aylmer and Duchesne Mills to station on the Lake Eric and Detroit River, Eric and Huron, Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo, and Michigan Central Railways, the rate is 14½C, per 100 lbs. Regulations apply as to minimum size of carload of 30,000 lbs., and an advanced rate is charged for hardwoods.

Lumber freight rates on the Canada Atlantic Railway are as follows. Ottawa to Toronto, to cents per 100 lbs.; Ottawa to Oswego, \$1.90 per M ft., (1,000 lbs. and under per M ft.); Armprior to

Montreal, \$1.50 per M ft., (1,000 lbs and under per M ft.), Ottawa to Quebec, \$2.50 per M ft. Amprior to Quebec, \$2.50 per M ft. Ottawa to Buffalo, 12 cents per 100 lbs., Ottawa to Port Huron and Detroit, 14 cents per 100 lbs., Ottawa to New York, five carloads or over \$5.00 per M ft., Amprior to New York, \$5.50 per M ft., Ottawa to Boston, Portland and common points, local 17 cents, export 15 cents per 100 lbs., Ottawa to Buffington, 6 cents per 100 lbs., Ottawa to Buffington, 6 cents per 100 lbs., Ottawa to Buffington, 6 cents per 100 lbs., Ottawa to Albays, 12 cents per 100 lbs., Ottawa to St., John, M. The Grand Irink Railway and Canadam Pacific have made the rates on hardwoods from certain paints to Toronto and Hamilton as follows. The regulations are over the squature of Mr. John Eads, W.D.F.A., of the G. T. K., and given in reply to a letter from T-ronto hardwood men.

"After careful consideration we have come to the conclusion that, on and after Jan. 184, 1855, a modification will be made in the present arrangements for hardwood limbs, 40 the effect that the rate will be 75c, per 100 lbs, from our Northern and Northwestern branches to Toronto and Hamilton. This rate, however, will not apply from main line points and the straight run between Toronto, Sarma and Winder, also that so far as rates on common lumber to points like Guelph, Galt, London, Woodstock, Ingeroll, etc., from all lumber shipping stations the rate will be the same on hardwood as on pin. On the old granople, we suppose, that half the boaf is better than none, hardwood men have something, possibly, to be thankful for, though there

is no good reason why the rates generally on hard-wood should not be as low as on pine. To is understood that the C. P. R. rate will be made orm at 7½c, from same joints.
