A FIGHT IN GREY.

Trouble over the Voters' List in No. 1 Division for County Councilmen.—Result May be Changed.

Owen Sound, Jan. 7.—(Special)—There is at present every prospect that the fight for the election of County Councilmen for No. 1 Division of Grey, composed of Owen Sound and the Township of Sarawak, is not finished. To-day it has been discovered that the deputy returning officer at one of the polling booths in Sarawak improperly amended the list used by him by striking therefrom the names of 19 voters, thus preventing them from polling their votes, and by adding one thereto. It appears that the Sarawak list was not revised by the revising officer this year, he deeming it not necessary to do this, but the deputy returning officer in question, who, by the way, is clerk of the Township, deeming that the list did not correspond with the assessment roll for the present year, and considering those persons not qualified to vote, took upon himself the responsibility of making amendments accordingly. If of course was not done maliciously, but no doubt in the belief that he was acting within his right. There were seven candidates for the two seats, and the disappointed ones seem determined to take advantage of this irregularity and to try if possible to have another election. They

NATURAL GAS A MINERAL.

The U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals Decides That Gas Pipers From Canada Have No Right of Burial.

New York, Jan. 7.—By a decision of the United States Circuit Court of Appeals handed down to-day natural gas is declared to be a mineral for all the purposes of the statutes and customs laws of the United States. The court affirms the decision of the United States Circuit Court of this district, which affirmed a decision of the Board of General Appraisers, declaring that gas pipes from Sarawak, Canada, into Buffalo was not subject to duty, as it comes within the definition of crude minerals.

CANADA'S PULP AND PAPER INDUSTRY.
 The Canadian Lumberman furnishes statistics showing the recent development of the pulp and paper industry. Between 3000 and 4000 cords of pulpwood are consumed annually by United States paper manufacturers. This aggregate figure is more than a million cords in the year. The largest pulp and paper concern in the world is said to be the Glen Falls Paper Mills on the Hudson River, which will make 275 tons of finished newspaper per day during the current year. This will require at least 475 cords of spruce timber each day, a quantity equal to 95,000,000 feet of spruce logs in a year. More than eighty per cent. of this spruce is cut in Canada, the balance being obtained in the Adirondacks. This single mill consumes in one year the product of 2,500 acres of forest. These figures show the size of the industry, and the rapidity with which the comparatively new industry is devouring our forests of spruce and poplar. The great facts for us to bear in mind in regard to pulp and paper is that Canada has larger supplies of the raw material of that many countries. Great Britain included, have no pulpwood whatever; that the industry is expanding all over the world; that Canada not only has abundance of the raw material, but she has valuable water powers and efficient and cheap labor to manufacture the wood into pulp and paper. There is no reason why Canada should not take a leading position among the nations of the world in this industry. We occupy an enviable position. If we take advantage of our opportunities we will not long be content with cutting wood for other countries to manufacture into paper. Canada should allow no more pulpwood to be exported. It should all be converted into pulp, if not into paper, before it leaves the country. The tendency of the times is towards concentrating the manufacture of pulp and paper in one establishment, and the Government extends to the industry the protection it should have there will be a great expansion of the business in this country.

THE GOVERNMENT SHOULD CONTROL THE ROAD.

The Roseland Miner, the leading paper of the Trail Creek district, takes pretty much the same view as The World in regard to the Crow's Nest Government Railway. It insists that the Government of Canada should build and operate the proposed national highway through the Rocky Mountains, connecting the fertile plains of the Northwest and the coal fields of the Kootenay with the mining districts of the southern part of the province. If the Government controlled this road, as it does the International in the east, "two of the principal links in the chain destined to rivet all portions of the Dominion in one homogeneous whole, would be successfully cast." The Miner points out that the principal reason for building the Crow's Nest Pass line is the obtaining of a cheap supply of coal for the mining districts. But, says our contemporary, "the great coal fields of East Kootenay have been reserved to a syndicate of local land sharks, who can only acquire title to these coal fields by building the Crow's Nest Pass Railway. It is the duty of the Government to build the railway it would forever prevent this syndicate from acquiring title to them, and the accomplishment of this object alone, would be ultimately worth to Canada the entire cost of the railway."

CANADIAN EGGS IN ENGLAND.

Mr. E. Morgan, a dealer in eggs and poultry at Delhi, Ont., has issued a circular to the farmers of that district, pointing out to them the fact that their eggs are being sold at a price which may be made from the production of eggs. In his opinion the poultry business is one of the best paying businesses open to the farmer. It must, however, be managed with care and intelligence to insure good results. Mr. Morgan states that he has sold \$24,200 in cash for eggs during 1896, all obtained in the Delhi district, while there was shipped from the same station \$2500 worth of turkeys. The total shipment of poultry and eggs amounted to \$30,000 for the year, or about \$100 a day for every week of the year. The only market for our surplus eggs, says Mr. Morgan, is Great Britain, and there we have to compete with the whole world. It is very essential therefore that the poultryman of Canada should study the British market and produce the right kind of article. In order to obtain a ready sale in Great Britain eggs should average up to 1 1/2 pounds per dozen, they should be clean and have a bright appearance. The only complaints that reached Mr. Morgan of Canadian eggs in the English markets last year were that they were small and had the output of eggs can be largely increased if they will only give more consideration to the poultry business.

CONSUMPTION'S VICTIMS.

The total number of deaths in Philadelphia for 1896 was 23,852. Of these 524 were caused by consumption. This is more than ten per cent. of the total, and such troubles as pneumonia and other lung diseases are not included. The same percentage prevails in nearly all the cities of America. It proves that the lungs are the most susceptible to disease of all the organs of the

body. Consumption is to a large extent a preventable disease. If the lungs were supplied with nothing but pure air there would be very few cases of this distressing malady. The victims of drink do not amount in number to one-third the victims of poison, and as the latter are so numerous that scientists take care of those who are already afflicted with the disease is a commendable object, our principal concern should be centred in the prevention of the disease. People should be encouraged to live in the open air as much as possible. Factories, offices and houses should be properly ventilated, and, as far as possible, consumptive patients should be isolated. The good work that Mr. Gage has interested himself in will, we trust, cause the people to take a more lively interest in the matter, and as equally bad sanitarians have declared against the greatest scourge of the human race.

MUNICIPAL DELINQUENCIES.

The Government really ought to do something to protect the public against incompetent and dishonest municipal officers. The finances of nearly all the minor municipalities adjacent to Toronto have been woefully mismanaged. The same thing prevails all over the province, and the affairs of the school sections are in equally a bad shape. Every few weeks we hear of a shortage in municipal funds or the skipping out of some delinquent treasurer. Remedial legislation of some kind is certainly called for. The accounts of every municipality should be audited every year, not by a blacksmith, or farmer, but by a competent auditor. To ensure such an audit the Government should appoint official auditors for each county or group of counties. The expense of a proper audit would not be large, while the saving to the municipalities would in the aggregate be very large.

THE AFTERNOON POLICE COURT.

The afternoon Police Court, presided over by Magistrate Miller, was degenerated into a baroque. The court is held three times a week. Its jurisdiction extends to the minor police court cases, including principally those relating to infractions of city by-laws. While the Magistrate is nominally the head of the court the Deputy Chief of Police is in the real power. No effort is made to maintain any sort of dignity or etiquette. It is a rough-and-tumble medley, in which bluster takes the place of argument, and where personal bias usurps the authority of the law. On an average there are at least ten cases at each sitting of the court. The city pays \$750 a year to the Magistrate for attending to this work. The salary is sufficient to command the services of a man who is capable of holding the police in check and protecting citizens from insult. The office should be filled by a lawyer who understands the conduct of judicial proceedings. The court should be put on a respectable and competent basis at once.

BUSINESS GOOD IN BRITAIN.

Large Increase in Both Exports and Imports for December.
 London, Jan. 7.—The returns issued by the Board of Trade for December, 1896, show an increase of \$2,640,000 in imports and an increase of \$1,111,000 in exports during that month, compared with December, 1895.

YANKEE GIRL WEDS A TURK.

Paris, Jan. 7.—The marriage of Miss Edith Lydia Collins of New York to Reuch Bey (Count Czaykowski), an attaché of the Turkish Embassy at Rome, took place in this city at 1 o'clock this afternoon in the Church of St. Germain l'Auxerrois near the Louvre. The porch and main aisle of the church were covered with carpet, and the entire hall filled by the Turkish commandant who is assassinated if opportunity offers.—Latest Reports From Cuba.

MONY'S MISSION.

The Herald's Havana correspondent says: Yesterday afternoon Gen. Lee called on Gen. Weyler with counter-offer. Money and Gen. Weyler assured him that he could guarantee very shortly the practical pacification of Pinar del Rio, Havana, Matanzas and Santa Clara Provinces, surely if he can do that he will not be removed.

CUBANS PROSPERING.

Delegates Palma of the Cuban Junta gave out the following statement last evening: We have received a letter from Gen. Jose Lacret, who is in charge of the Matanzas Province and who the Spaniards claim was killed on the 1st inst. Gen. Lacret writes me that everything is prospering in that Province and that the Cubans have started two newspapers, which shows they are not always fighting. He further states that he is expecting Gen. Gomez in his province and is making preparations to receive him. He reports everything within the Cuban line to be prospering."

UNCLE SAM'S BAD FAITH.

A dispatch to The Herald from Havana says: The United States says that the Three Friends' last expedition shows the United States is not in a hurry to get on with the United States, inasmuch as she was allowed to sail after Mr. Money's last proposed agreement had been set on foot. Mr. Money believes there will be an entente cordiale and a commercial agreement between Spain and the United States, and that claims for damages on both sides will be settled.

LAWYERS LEFT FOR ONCE. The Queen's Own Court Will Keep Things Straight WITHOUT ANY ASSISTANCE

Messrs. Barron and Mowat, Representing the Parties, Retire.

As the Enquiry is to be Conducted Under Strict Military Rules—List of the Charges Which the Assize Court Has Been Commissioned to Investigate—All is Being Carried on Under the strictest Secrecy

With closed doors and with the mouths of witnesses and all others concerned hermetically sealed, the Court of Enquiry appointed to take evidence in the difficulty between Lieut.-Col. H. B. Hamilton, commanding the Queen's Own Rifles, and his subordinate officers began its duties at the World's Court yesterday.

As has been previously stated by the World, the court is composed of the following officers: President, Lieut.-Col. J. Munnell, D.O.C., Military District No. 2; and Lieut.-Colonels John Duff, 4th Hussars, and George R. Barker, 2nd West-India, Victoria Rifles of Canada.

THE OFFICIAL CHARGES. The charges to be considered are in substance those published first and exclusively by the World of Tuesday last. The official document gives the following as the matters under consideration:

A DAY AT THE CITY HALL. Prisoners Cheaply Fed at the Jail—Work of the Fire Brigade During the Fire at the City Hall

WILL KEEP FAITH. A petition was received from the lessees of the stalls in St. Lawrence Market, asking that the city do not provide tables for the use of farmers.

THE FIRE BRIGADE. The fire and lightning committee also held its final meeting yesterday. Ald. Bell occupying the chair. The principal item of business was the report of the chief of the brigade during the year, for which it was voted that \$97,000 be allocated.

THE CONSERVATIVE CANDIDATE FOR NORTH ONTARIO. CHOICE MADE YESTERDAY

At a Large Convention Held in the Town of Beaverton.

A Lot of Names Were Proposed, But All Retired in Favor of the Candidate Named—A Strong Resolution of Censure Passed Against the Methods and Statements of the Liberals—Mr. McLeod Makes a Capital Speech, in Which He Urges a Square and Honorable Fight

Beaverton, Ont., Jan. 7.—The Liberal-Conservative convention of North Ontario met in Alexandria Hall here to-day for the purpose of selecting a candidate for the coming election in the House of Commons. Dr. Gillespie of Gunnington, president of the association, was in the chair, with Mr. Walsh, "the old veteran secretary" of Sunderland, in his place as usual.

UPWARDS OF 200 delegates, coming from all sections of the province, were present, and the names brought before the convention were as follows: A. McLeod, Ontario; George G. Proctor, N. F. Patterson, Q. C.; A. Hunt, W. Reid, Charles and William Jankin, and George G. Proctor. A. J. Reid, Hugh Wilson, William Bell, Thomas Drelawan.

Conservatives were never more energetic and unanimous in their support of any candidate, and in Mr. McLeod they found a strong ally.

development and not to rob the mine. Kamloops has one device advanced over any other camp I visited in that a loaded wagon may be driven to any of the mines direct, without expending a dollar for roads. The main line of the C. P. R. is only two or three miles away, and the country is like the foothills of Alberta, covered with grass, which supports thousands of horses and cattle the year round, but diversified with clumps of fine timber. Kamloops City is only five miles from the Iron Mask by the wagon road, and is called the Inland Capital. It has the finest climate in Canada, is a well-known resort of pleasure-seekers and invalids, and is a great distributing point, having fine waterworks, electric lights and good schools, both public and private.

Machinery on the St. Paul, Rosland.

Machinery is now on the St. Paul, and before the end of the week a steam drill will be working night and day, continuing the tunnel, which is in 22 feet, to strike the main lead of the claim. This property, which is quite well known, is situated to the southwest of the White Bear and Mayflower No. 2, southeast of the San Francisco, east of the O. K. and L. X. The main lead runs in the same direction as that of the White Bear, Black Bear and Le Roi. Development work has shown pretty conclusively that the Le Roi claim, which runs to the westward of the Annie Fraction, California and claims already mentioned, through the surface showing on which the St. Paul was located is a very wide one, running in a southerly direction through the whole length of the claim. It appears about 500 feet up the gulch that runs down from the O.K. Previous to the organization of the company the chief work done was to sink a shaft of 25 feet on this showing and crosscut from the bottom for 12 feet either way. Both shafts showed a distinct vein, one from which ran from 24 to 35 in gold. Other shafts and open cuts were made on the same vein, which proved it to be continuous with good mineral throughout. From these three 100 feet deep and abut 100 feet from the chief one Capt. Adams, who was in charge, lately took a sample of ore which on assay in Toronto upon his return yielded \$13.80.

The proposition being eventually tunnelling on the company started work from the Red Mountain Railway track and drove a vein tunnel of 50 feet. The contract has just been let to D. W. Slickney to continue it for 200 feet further, which will be a large tunnel, giving a depth of about 250 feet. Mr. Slickney is putting up a 25 horse power boiler, and will have a steam power drill at work before the end of the week. The entrance of the tunnel is at the level of the railway track, where ore is ready for shipment the facilities for loading it to cars are complete. When excavating for the blacksmith shop this working iron-bearing rock was found, and was found to run a prospecting tunnel following what appeared to be the vein, which showed iron and copper in almost every place broken off. A great deal of quartz is found in the country, and some are good for a body of pay ore being found there. Considering the width of the main vein of the claim, the steadily increasing values obtained with depth, and the fact that development on adjoining claims has shown a vein running in the direction of this one and of the same quality of ore, every indication points now to the St. Paul proving to be one of the mines that will make the camp famous. This ore has the advantage of many others from the fact that it is a tunnelling proposition. The tunnel now being prosecuted will cut the vein at a depth of 250 feet, and when that lead is worked out the tunnel can be run 300 feet further down the hill, giving so much additional stopping ground. Enough treasury stock has been sold to keep work going a year. Du Marais, the expert sent out by the French Government to report on the property, was so well satisfied with the property upon examination that he purchased a block and a large block is under option to English parties. It is probable that most of the treasury stock will be placed in England.
