Says Her Daughter Has Nothing to Do With Assassination of Rulers. SHE WOULD NOT ADVISE MURDER

But Despite Mother's Belief It Thought Her Followers Rejoice Over Czar's Death. Rochester, N. Y., Sept. 9.—"We are not Anarchists and we know nothing about this. This declaration was made last night by Mrs. Abraham Goldman, mother of Emma Goldman, the high priestess of Anarchy in this country. The Goldmans keep a furnished store in Joseph-street, this city, and plod along in the even tenor of their way, prosperous and happy. They have no desire to associate themselves with Emma in her Anarchistic theories, although they express a high regard for their daughter. Mrs. Goldman said:

Emma has nothing to do with the assassination of rulers. She is at present traveling for a New York firm, which sells office supplies. We have seen her nearly every week, and I am sure she is not preaching a doctrine of assassination, although she does not disagree with me when I tell her that she should be a good mother and be friendly and always kind to her mother, but that does not change my belief.

Would Not Advise Murder. When told that the papers said that the Emma Goldman Anarchists were rejoicing over the attempted assassination of President McKinley, Mrs. Goldman replied: "I don't know anything about that, but I don't think Emma would do it. She spoke for the love and laboring classes, but she would not advise murder. I am very sure. Yes, I know that in New York the Anarchists of Emma's faith make the saloons of 'Tough Mike' their headquarters. They gathered there and openly rejoiced over the murder of King Humbert a year ago. The Anarchists made no attempt to cover up their happiness over Brecht's murder, I know, and yet I don't think they would do anything like that. However, I know but little, in fact nothing about her Anarchistic movement. She knows me, and I approve of her and she tells me but little of her actions in this direction."

She Despises Rulers. In spite of the mother's faith in her daughter there are many who have followed the history of the notorious Rochester Anarchist, who believe that the attempted assassination of McKinley was inspired from the doctrine advocated by Emma. She despises rulers and all who are powerful. So rabid and radical has Emma become in her views that she has been sentenced to a term of ten months in the Penitentiary at Blackwell's Island for her part in an incendiary speech in Union Square to a mob of the unemployed.

Garfield Bulletins GAVE HOPE TO THE LAST Wounded Like McKinley. The Official Announcements of His Physicians Were From the Beginning Sanguine and Full of Encouragement—Points of Similarity in Two Cases.

New York, Sept. 9.—In the hundreds of bulletins issued by President Garfield's physicians frequent reference was made to the discharge of "healthy pus." Under the modern school of surgery pus is regarded as an extremely bad sign, and many surgeons hold that a suppurating wound is caused largely by the neglect of attending surgeons to properly cleanse it or use antiseptic instruments.

Despite the fact that Garfield was in a most precarious condition from the time of his hurt, the physicians constantly issued bulletins which were encouraging to the public. He was kept under the influence of morphia, and after the first probing light effort was made to ascertain the location of the bullet. In the autopsy the physicians declared that their course of treatment had been vindicated. The bullet was found completely encysted. The result of the autopsy as announced by the surgeons was:
