WON'T ARBITRATE FEARING TRICK ON COMPANY'S PART STRIKERS DECLARE

**Vice-President Murdoch
Makes Announcement—
Says Men Are Prepared
to Fight to Finish**

MONTREAL'S SUBURBAN TRAINS GOING AGAIN

MONTREAL, July 20.—(Special.)—There is no doubt that a great deal of bluffing is being indulged in both by the strike leaders and the railway officials. For instance, Vice-President Murdoch declares most emphatically that the trainmen will arbitrate, even if Sir Wilfrid Laurier came back from the west and asked them to give their case to an independent party, while Vice-President Fitzgibbon, of the G. T. R., states that by Saturday the backbone of the strike will be broken. It is, of course, very difficult for anyone here to size up the situation, as naturally nothing is given out by the representative leaders that will endanger their cause. One thing is sure, however, after to-day's developments, the men who were turned out of the shops are blaming the strikers for what has befallen them, consequently sympathy is rather on the side of the company. At Bonaventure Station this evening there is no appearance of a strike, and trains are arriving and departing with very near their accustomed regularity. This, however, is not the case in other parts of the city. The suburban trains began to move at 2 o'clock this afternoon, the train for Verdun being the first to get out of the station. In fact, they claim that it is all right to claim that cannot be justified, as men who formerly traveled to Lachine and other points by the G. T. R. are now using the electric.

Will Not Arbitrate

The feature of the day was the trainmen's decision that, now that the gauntlet had been thrown down, they would not arbitrate. Mr. Murdoch was a trick on the part of the company to make friends, for if it went out that Mr. Murdoch had declined to treat with people from the department of labor, for instance, a good many people might blame them for not doing so, hence his desire to avoid any false position that the company might want to force upon them.

Company is Recruiting

It was very evident to-day that the invitation of the company to the effect that all men who would show up to-day would be taken back at their old status, had failed, for none of the strikers have put in an appearance, at least on this part of the system. A great many, however, who had learned railroading and who were put off for trivial offenses against the rules of the company and former management, are now setting back, and it is surprising the number who have already found their way back to the passenger trains.

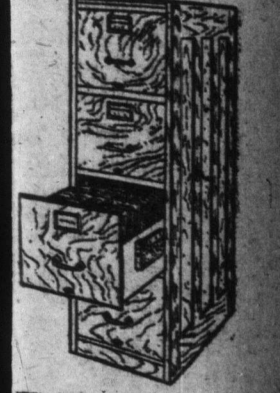

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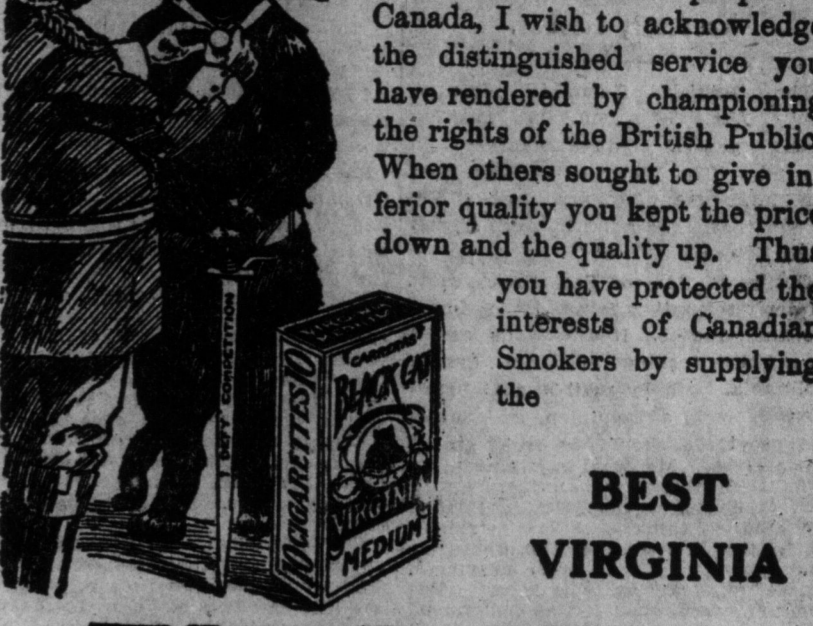

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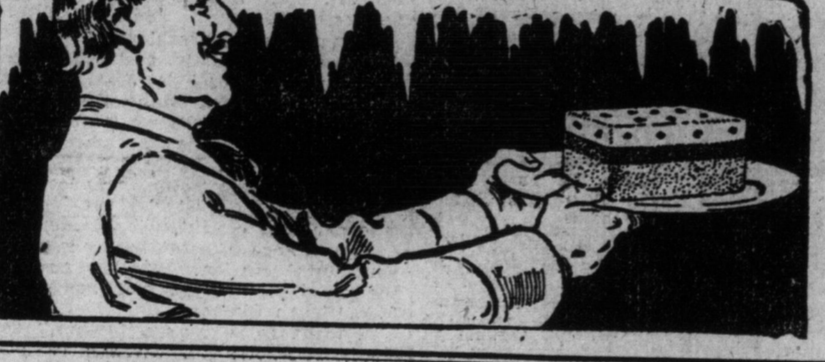

Wall St. Makes Little Progress Trading Keeps Very Narrow

New York Market Moves Up and Down in an Easy Fashion—No Features to Local Exchange.

World Office, Wednesday Evening, July 20. The Toronto Stock Exchange was about as dull to-day it is possibly could be, trading maintaining around the low record which has characterized the market for the past few days, and prices moving within very narrow ranges on both boards.

There was no feature whatever to the day's operations and sentiment throughout held apathetic, public participation in transactions being very limited.

The traction issues were traded in to a very moderate extent, Rio changing hands fractionally above yesterday's figures, the shares moving between 81 and 8-8 above that point. Sao Paulo was not dealt in, and at the close the best bid for the stock was 140.

Nova Scotia Steel moved up to-day, the shares touching 82 1-4 on the afternoon board. There is little interest being taken locally in the movement of the stock, the recent operations being engineered almost entirely in Montreal. At the close 83 was bid for the security, with none on offer under a three point advance from that quotation.

The general list of values was little changed from yesterday, and what little trading was registered was in many instances confined to broken lots.

Toronto Ralls lost 1-2 a point at 115 1-2 and Black Lake was also slightly off from the previous sale, but otherwise than these no alterations of moment were in evidence.

The market lacked initiative all day, and toward the close displayed an almost lifeless appearance, with neither buying nor selling orders in traders' hands.

Erickson Perkins & Co. had the following: After further show of strength early in the afternoon, stocks eased off in the last hour. Most active rails closed lower, but the metal group were higher, the with moderate volume from the top. From the looks of things the copper group was put up to help sell the metal. There was also confirmation of the rumor that the copper producers are to restrict output, the such policy would temporarily stimulate the metal market. The inter-state commerce commission that the railroads would postpone their rate advances voluntarily until November resolved widespread attention. Its exact meaning is not clear. Chairman Knapp's concluding words appear to be the commission will investigate as rapidly as possible and may be able to announce some advances before November. Our advice to sell out on bulges reported timely.

Chas. Head & Co. to R. R. Bongard: The market opened with a firmer tone, which, as usual, did not materialize, as prices fell off with small trading. As the day advanced an appreciable strength was noted in the copper per shares. Amalgamated sold up to 61, and Anaconda and Utah Copper gained two points; this brought about a recovery in the Boston market, with rallies of several points all along the line. It was reported that an agreement was under consideration to restrict and limit the production of copper, and W. A. Clark of Butte, gave a reassuring interview on the copper situation and outlook. In the late afternoon a reaction took place which carried prices down to about the same level as of last night, copper shares excepted. We still believe in buying on all good breaks and accepting moderate profits on the rallies while the market remains so narrow and professional.

J. P. Bickell & Co. from Finley Barrell: The rise in the copper stocks showed that the market could do in the leaders if the big interests as will. Profit taking and traders' short sales near the close caused fractional reactions. Evidently something has been done, or is brewing in regard to the regulation of copper metal trade, but even if any agreement is reached, public announcement may not be made because of the Sherman anti-trust law. The street impression is growing that the railway law after all may prove to be bullish, rather than bearish legislation. We still believe that good stocks are a purchase for further substantial advances.
