NEW SALES TAX RULING GIVEN TO C.M.A. SECRETARY

Montreal, June 22.-A definits and final ruling has been receivel by the secretary of the Canadian Manutacturer' Association here regarding the two per cent, sales tax on material sold by the manufacturer to the con-sumer or retailer, to the effect that all railway companies, power companies, steamship lines and utility corporations are ruled by the department of inland revenue to be public consumers and must, therefore, be charged by the manufacturer the two per cent. sales tax on each invoice. WHAT GOOD IS ARBITRATION?

THE TORONTO WORLD

THE Amalgamated Association of Street and Electric Railway Employes to which our employes belong, advocate arbitration as the best means of settling wage disputes. This principle has been honored more in the breach than in the observance by our employe members of this union.

They applied for a Board in 1910 and accepted the findings which gave them an increase in wages.

In 1917 they refused an Arbitration Board under the Industrial Disputes Act, saying that government arbitrations were too slow. They were then offered an Arbitration Board of Toronto citizens and an immediate hearing, which they likewise refused and went on strike for two and a half days. Efforts on the part of Provincial Government officials resulted in the men returning to work at an increase of 6c per hour and the promise of an Arbitration Board to further consider their case. They then accepted a government Arbitration Board, which they had previously refused, and were awarded an additional cent per hour and an agreement was made to run for two years, expiring in June, 1919.

In the Fall of 1918 the union "flopped" its policy, this time to ask for a Conciliation Board to grant a "war bonus." The Board was granted, and awarded 2c per hour although our agreement still had eight months to run.

AGE TWELVE

The Company has always accepted the award of the Arbitration Board, regardless of whether an agreement was in force or whether we considered the award to be just or otherwise.

When the eight-months' period was up and the agreement expired in June, 1919, the union "flopped back" again and refused to accept an Arbitration Board or to appoint a representative to it, and the Government had to appoint one for the union. While this Board was sitting, the men, in defiance of the law, went out on strike for twelve days. The Railway Board took possession of the property and offered the men the scale of wages then being paid on the civic lines, a maximum of 48c per hour, pending the decision of the Arbitration Board; but the civic wage scale was not good enough for them at that time and they refused it. Subsequently, the interim report of the Conciliation Board, recommending that a five-cent fare be granted the Company, and that the men be paid the present scale of wages, was announced, and the Railway Board offered this to the men, which they accepted and returned to work. This arrangement covered the period up to June 15, 1920.

This year the men accepted an Arbitration Board, appointed a representative to it, and the award of this Board states that the men are not entitled to a further increase in wages. The men once more "flopped" on their policy and decided they would not accept the award, and have gone on strike to secure an entirely different demand to that which was originally claimed by them. OUR EXPERIENCE IS THAT ARBITRATION IS ALL RIGHT IE THE AWARD SUITS THE MEN, BUT IS SOMETHING TO BE CAST ASIDE WHEN IT DOES NOT MEET WITH THEIR APPROVAL.

IS IT A QUESTION WITH THE UNION OF "HEADS I WIN, TAILS YOU LOSE"?

IS IT A QUESTION OF MIGHT AGAINST RIGHT ?

If the Company, despite its adverse financial condition, has accepted all of the awards when they granted increases, surely some element of fairness in public opinion will declare that the men should accept the award in this instance;

Otherwise Arbitrations are a farce.

If arbitration awards are for acceptance by employers when it means the payment of wages satisfactory to the men, but non-acceptance by the employes when the award is not satisfactory to them, how long will employers continue to respect awards of Arbitration Boards, and who will blame employers for not accepting adverse awards?

In these circumstances, is the public to expect strikes every year unless the Company hands out just whatever the employes demand?




