W. J. S. MYLES DISCUSSES PENSIONS FOR TEACHERS

An Interesting Paper at This Morning's Session of Teachers Institute.

Miss Wilson Presented Paper on Life of Dr. Rand, and H. H. Hagerman Discussed Drawing--Large Number of Teachers Present.

The St. John County Teachers' Institute sessions were resumed this morning in the High School building, when Miss Wilson read a paper on the Life and Works in the province of Dr. Theodore Rand; and H. H. Hagerman, M. A., discussed the subject of "Drawing" in an able and interesting manner.

The speaker, in opening said he would deal not so much with the value of drawing in schools, nor with the status of the drawing in this province, as with the aims of such a course and with the methods by which it is approached.

He next proceeded to call attention to the child and the development of his use of language, which is attained entirely by imitation of his elders and those with whom he is associated.

He then proceeded to discuss the child's ability to make crude marks, etc., and the development of this capability under proper direction to his energy along these lines is given as a school. To give the child a proper direction to the desire of the child to draw objects, the mode of teaching must be the same as that used in teaching language.

A method of this kind would, he claimed, be a very great change from those that have been employed in the province in the past. If good results are to be expected more interest must be aroused on the part of the teacher.

He then discussed the child's ability to draw objects in different positions to those shown (or represented) in the text.

In teaching drawing the instructor should take advantage of the fact that the child will undertake those objects in which he is most interested.

SHORT WEIGHT BUTTER IS BEING SOLD IN THIS CITY

At the present price of butter consumers will no doubt agree that they should receive full weight for their money and that when they buy a two pound print they should get 32 ounces.

A representative of the Times called at a number of the large retail groceries and weighed the so-called two-pound prints of butter sold at the counter.

For instance this butter is costing the dealer 28 cents a pound at the creamery and is sold to the householders for 32 cents a pound or exactly 2 cents an ounce.

In the next store, the Sussex concern's product was also tried and with two of the prints the result was 1 pound, 15 ounces--1 ounce short.

The proprietors of both these stores said they had called the attention of the makers to the fact that the butter was short weight, but it apparently had no effect.

The dealer said he had noticed short weight on this stock a while ago and had complained, with the result that they had been more careful and were now giving full weight, and occasionally a trifle over.

It is alleged that the main object of the provincial manufacturers is to shut out the dealer from the upper Canadian factories, where it is stated, they sell their product at full weight, not including the paper wrapper.

It was also stated by a dealer yesterday that some of the provincial creameries are in the habit of buying dairy butter from small producers wherever they can get it, and repacking it and selling it in prints as their own product.

At another store, where the Sussex Company's product was sold, the prints were found to weigh only one pound, fourteen and one half ounces.

ANOTHER EVIDENCE OF POOR FERRY SERVICE

Wun Lung Had a 'Brain Storm' This Morning and Caused Much Delay.

For Nearly Four Hours All the City Ferry Boats Were Out of Commission and the Service Was Performed by the Tug Dirigo.

The complete inefficiency of the ferry service was made painfully apparent this morning when the three ferry boats owned by the city were out of commission from 6:20 a. m. until 10 o'clock, and a very indifferent service was performed by the tug Dirigo.

FLOUR TAKES ANOTHER JUMP

Flour advanced again this morning 20 cents per barrel, and is now quoted at \$6.85. Oatmeal has also been advanced 40 cents a barrel by the millers, but the local dealers have not yet changed their price.

Only two days ago flour was advanced 20 cents, and again this morning was received of another increase of 20 cents in the quotations. This applies to Purdy and Ogilvie's and worth of a like advance Five Buses is expected at any time now.

It is probable also that Ontario brands of all grades of mill feed will also go up. The quotation for oatmeal was \$6.15 until this morning when the American Cereal Co. advanced the price to \$6.55.

The mails which left Liverpool on the Empress of Britain Friday afternoon last at 7 p. m. will be delivered in Montreal tomorrow morning. Owing to her fast trip the Empress has succeeded in getting her eastern and western mails delivered here before the giant Lusitania has reached New York. The latter will not reach her ship in the New York till some time tomorrow morning and before that time the mails of the Empress will have been distributed here. So far as Montreal and Toronto are concerned these mails are 24 hours ahead of the fleet Cunarder.

W. R. CHAPMAN RESIGNS Portland, Me., Oct. 8.—The closing day of the Maine music festival was a long and brilliant success, marred only by the announcement at the close of the morning rehearsal that director William R. Chapman, owing to a lack of general popular support, would resign as president. E. A. Noyes said later his resignation would end the excellent series of festivals here and at Bangor.

MIGHT AND PRICE. One man or corporation makes a million dollars by improper manipulation of a railroad franchise, or some other method known to high finance.

Another man or corporation makes one dollar by selling a case of butter prints that are short in weight. There is a good deal of difference between a million dollars and one dollar, but is there any difference in moral significance between the two acts?

Complaint has been made to the Times that the New Brunswick creameries sell short-weight butter. It is charged that they do so to shut out the competition of Quebec and Ontario makers, and that by selling short-weight they can meet the western price and make a snug profit.

The Times yesterday investigated the matter, and of the local samples of butter weighed all were short except the product of one creamery, and this one a leading grocer states, had also been remonstrated with for selling short-weight.

What is called a two-pound print was found in most cases to be an ounce or more than an ounce short, which would mean a difference of a cent per pound to the consumer. The grocer does not lose, since he merely acts as a middleman and makes his profit on the print, whatever its weight.

Then he consigned the shipment to East Liverpool, Ohio, where the local option law is in effect. There is a singular appropriateness in this choice of terms to represent the goods ordered. Halifax is losing considerable profitable business because of the strike of the dry dock employees. In Springhill the strike which has caused such a dislocation of the coal business is expected to end today. On the C. P. R. the company and telegraphers have come to terms as a result of arbitration, and there will be no strike. In Montreal a judgment has been delivered which confirms the legality of a combine of employers to oppose the demands of labor unions. The question of work and wages occupies a large share of public attention all over the country.

Father Vaughan, the priest whose attacks upon society recently stirred all London, continues to express his views on social conditions with a frankness that must command attention. In a recent reply to a protest by the Drapers' Chamber of Trade against remarks attributed to him, he said that he did not criticize young women in drapery establishments, but said that he would rather put a girl behind a bar where a living wage is paid than a starvation wage is paid.

A London cable quotes Dr. Geo. R. Parkin as saying that "the fact that during the last few years Canada had sent professors to the universities of Oxford, Edinburgh, Birmingham and Manchester indicated an extraordinary expansion of academic horizon." The illustration would be still stronger if an enumeration were made of the professors sent by Canada to universities in the United States.

With three ferry steamers in the harbor there was no service for nearly two hours at the busiest time this morning. When work-people and others are delayed and traffic is blocked in this manner somebody should be held responsible.
