MAY STRIKE FOR EIGHT HOUR DAY

Plan Prepared by Railway Brotherhood in United States

A PROGRESSIVE SERIES

Definite Action Not to be Taken Until After Conference With Managers to be Held on Next Thursday

New York, March 12.—Information received by the national conference committee composed of managers of the great railway systems and made public by that body today indicates that the four employer's brotherhoods have completed arrangements for a progressive series of strikes to begin at six o'clock, eastern time, on Saturday night if the conference on the eight-hour question held here on Thursday, fails to reach a satisfactory agreement.

Saturday, six o'clock, call out train men in freight service on the New York Central, Baltimore and Ohio, Erie, Atlantic Coast Line, Southern Railway, Louisville and Nashville, and Seaboard Line. Such an order would involve some 40,000 men.

Tuesday, six p.m., call out all the freight trainmen in the northwest and central sections of the country.

Wednesday, six p.m., if the railroads still refuse to grant the men's terms, extend the strike to all other freight trainmen and call out the passenger trainmen on every road in the country.

GERMANY IN WORSE LIGHT THAN EVER WHEN GERARD REPORTS TO PRESIDENT

Former Ambassador Said to Have Interesting Report to Make in Washington Tomorrow—Trailed by German Spies at Havana and on the Governor Cobb

New York, Mar. 13.—A despatch to the Herald from Havana dated last night, says: Secret agents of Germany trailed James W. Gerard from the moment he landed at Havana until the time of his leaving here on board the steamer Governor Cobb this morning.

While talking in the lobby of the Plaza Hotel this morning Mr. Gerard saw one of the German agents, who had been most observant and persistent in his efforts to shadow him. Mr. Gerard hastened up to the man, who was a typical German. The spy, taking alarm, fled.

The former ambassador's trail was taken up immediately by another German, who followed him to the steamer, aboard which the spy had reserved a stateroom. Through an authority close to Mr. Gerard it was learned that the persistent efforts made by Germany to stop the American diplomatist from reaching Washington. I am in a position to say that Mr. Gerard carries papers containing information which will place Germany in a more unfavorable position than she has yet occupied.

According to men close to Mr. Gerard, important documents are expected in the German situation soon after his conference with Mr. Wilson. The Gerard train is expected to reach Washington at half past twelve o'clock on Wednesday afternoon.

SECRET PAPERS OF VON BERNSTORFF IN IT? GERMAN TROOPS GET OUT OF HAND

Further Report on Swedish Trunk Seized on the Frederick VIII at Halifax

London, March 12.—The story of a mysterious trunk, which was on board the Frederick VIII, the steamer which brought Count Von Bernstorff from the United States to Copenhagen is given prominence by the Express. The trunk is said to have been consigned to Stockholm by the Swedish minister to the United States and to have borne the seal of the Swedish consulate in New York.

The story says that the trunk was held at Halifax because its seals had been broken and that it will be sent to England by a British warship. After it reaches the British capital it will be turned over to the Swedish legation where its contents will be examined in the presence of British officials.

PENSION BOARD IS TO SIT HERE

It is expected that a pension board, composed of officials from the department at Ottawa, will meet in St. John next week to hear the claims of local soldiers and soldiers' families who are entitled to pensions. LUMBER REPORT

Boston, Mass., March 12.—Although deeply stirred by war-developments lumber dealers here are confident, and throughout New England business is flourishing. A vast amount of new building is going on, despite the high cost of materials and labor. It is expected that this will continue indefinitely or until there is a much greater demand for money than there is now.

New England building contracts totalled \$84,922,000 for February, being exceeded in value only once before—February, 1916, with \$111,183,000.

Contracts awarded to Feb. 29 aggregated \$24,988,000, more than \$2,000,000 ahead of 1916, which broke eventually all New England building records for amount and value of work completed. It is slightly behind the record of \$25,235,000 for the corresponding period in 1914, however, which started in with great activity but slumped when war disturbed the building industry.

The building outlook for Boston has brightened considerably. February has been very productive of building projects and the requirements for lumber are very considerable. Reports from the building commission show that last month exceeded February, 1916, by almost \$1,000,000. Excluding alterations and repairs, permits were granted in February for \$2,959,298 worth of new structures, compared to \$1,729,915 worth authorized for the corresponding month one year ago. This is in part accounted for by the increase in the cost of building. Maiden reports a brisk demand for factory buildings, largely of heavy mill construction. Four large new concerns are now seeking locations in that suburban city.

COAL AT \$60 A TON

Boston, Feb. 10.—(Correspondence)—With coal selling at \$60 a ton and the government gradually taking over all existing supplies and prohibiting its use by hotels and boarding houses and with gas and electricity dear or the supply reduced, Italian households and business offices have had to revert to the ancient method of burning finely powdered wood charcoal dust in a two-gallon earthen jar.

The jar is filled half full of charcoal dust, placed in the open air or near an open window, and some live coals of wood or charcoal put in the centre and the dust. Slow combustion is started and gradually the entire surface of the dust burns to ashes while the smoldering fire reaches downward.

When, after 12 hours, no more smoke or little gas is given off, the heated jar is placed in the cold room and let stay there for 24 hours, after which a fresh layer of dust is placed in the jar and the process is repeated.

Before the war this means of heating had been abandoned except in the very poor.

GRADUAL RENEWAL OF CITY WATER PIPES

Plans for the gradual renewal of the water distribution system in the city are now being drafted by Engineer McInnis. Many of the mains are too old to be allowed to remain in use, especially under the present high pressure, and this condition may be accelerated by further increase in the pressure as the service is improved. The programme being laid out will cover renewals over a period of ten years, with the intention of installing the most needed changes as soon as possible and carrying out the others as the money is available.

A table has been prepared showing the age of the water mains now in use. The city shows a 2 per cent more than seventy years old, three per cent more than sixty years old, twenty-one per cent more than fifty years old, and 21.5 per cent more than forty years old.

GUILTY OF PLOT TO KILL LLOYD GEORGE

Mason, Wife, and Mrs. Wheelton Sentenced—5 to 10 Years Penal Servitude—Harriet Wheelton Acquitted

Mrs. Alice Wheelton, her daughter, Mrs. Winifred Mason, and the latter's husband Alfred George Mason, were found guilty on Saturday of conspiracy to murder Premier Lloyd George and Arthur Henderson, member of the war council. Miss Harriet Wheelton, another daughter, who also was tried on the same charge, was acquitted.

Mrs. Wheelton was sentenced to ten years' penal servitude. A sentence of seven years was imposed upon Mason, and his wife was sentenced to five years' penal servitude.

Judge Low, in summing up, said that if the poison that had been administered had been required for dogs, as had been asserted, it was unlikely that such particular poisons as the ones named would have been selected in such large quantity and with such secrecy and mystery. There was very slight chance against Harriet Wheelton, who appeared to know nothing of the poisons, he said.

The judge commented on the singularity of the fact that the spy, Booth, had been called to give evidence, while Gordon was not required to testify. He told Mason that but for the jury's recommendation he would have imposed the same sentence on him as he gave Mrs. Wheelton. Regarding Mrs. Mason he said that doubtless her position was largely due to the wickedness of her mother.

Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, suffrage leader, by permission of Judge Low, went to the witness box to controvert a statement alleged to have been made by Mrs. Wheelton to Booth that suffragettes had spent £300 in an attempt to poison Premier Lloyd George by driving a poisoned nail into his boot.

Pankhurst declared that such a statement was absolutely false in every particular, adding:

"The Women's Social and Political Union regards the premier's life as of the greatest value in the present crisis, and its members would, if necessary, take great risks themselves to protect it from danger."

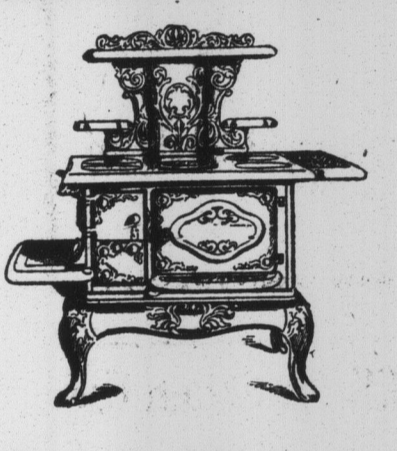

THE GROCERY MARKET.

The following comment on the market situation as regards food stuffs appeared in Canadian Grocer last week: "Potatoes in the Toronto market declined 81 a bag during the week and the demand continues light. With the big demand that is now under way for rice, there is insufficient rice on the spot market to meet the requirements. There is considerable rice in the export. Prices for eastern and southern rice are all higher in price. Flour advanced during the week and is still in a strong position. While there has been no advance recorded in the price of sugar, that commodity is in firm position, due to the estimated decreased production of raw sugar on the island of Cuba as a result of revolutionary disturbances. The still holds in the limelight with increased uncertainty as to how and when additional supplies will be secured. An attempt is being made to do business direct with Colombo, but so far without success. Pure lard and compound lard have been moved to higher levels. There has been an advance in a number of lines of cooled meats. Butter is higher in price, but eggs are cheaper. This is the only decline registered in the whole gamut of grocery quotations during the week. Some of the other lines that have advanced during the week are sardines, mustard, sugar powders, soap chips, baking powder, tomato sauce and rates on cutlery in Toronto have increased one cent per hundred pounds and the price of sugar will consequently be raised to that extent. Business in the grocery trade has been very satisfactory during the week."

URGES NEED OF PARENTAL SCHOOL

Only Solution Of Truant Problem, Says Dr. Bridges

Will Consult Magistrate

Authority of Commitments to Boys Industrial Home From Police is Questioned - Too Late for School Census

"If the truant officer is ever to be a success we must have a parental school," said Dr. H. S. Bridges, superintendent of schools, at the monthly meeting of the board of school trustees held last evening. The chief discussion of the evening centered around the truant question, which it was felt was growing to be a big problem in St. John. Commenting on the frequency of crime, especially stealing, among the youths of the city within the past few months, Dr. Bridges further said: "Do you think the child who steals a fit to go to school with the others? I don't think he is. I would rather see such a child out of school. In the large cities of the United States they are providing for these children by trade schools and I believe we should have one here."

A letter was read from R. P. Steeves, of the department of agriculture, urging the board to further in every way possible the cultivation of vegetables and flowers in available places. Boyd McMahon, showed that there had been 97 irregularities during the past month, six truant, 88 homes had been visited, one child taken over by the Children's Aid Society and 15 parents cautioned. Mr. Day asked the truant officer whether he had not been reprimanded by the police magistrate for seeming neglect of duty, and Mr. McMahon said he had, and then in explaining the case, said that he had never been notified of the absence of the boy who had been brought before the magistrate in court. In the course of the discussion it was said that the police magistrate could not commit a boy to the Industrial Home, but that it must be done by the county court judge. The magistrate has the power to confine the boy of school age only to the police authorities, and then only for a definite period. It was suggested that a conference be held with the police magistrate and some steps taken to more rightly carry out the school law. There was an expression of opinion that if the Trades and Labor Council's bill was passed in the next legislature, providing for compulsory education up to the age of 16, still greater difficulty would be experienced in carrying out the school law. "Why don't you get the school census taken?" asked Dr. Bridges. "That would help us to get the matter straightened out."

How Mersereau Saved 10th Bn.

Frederickton, N. B., March 12 - At the New Brunswick Klites officers' luncheon today a complimentary message was tendered Lieutenant-Colonel C. J. Mersereau, G. S. O., New Brunswick command on completion of his inspection of the 289th. After an excellent meal had been disposed of, Lieutenant-Colonel Percy A. Guthrie, commanding officer of the Klites, proposed a toast to the distinguished guest and in so doing unfolded some unwritten history of the second battle of Ypres. After briefly sketching the military career of the visiting officer, the speaker carried his story to Flanders during the climactic days of April, 1915, when the Canadians in the Ypres salient stemmed the tide of German onslaughts. At that period Colonel Mersereau was on the staff of the second brigade, having only recently arrived at the front. An order was given for the 10th battalion to advance to a certain position, which had been carried out, would have left both tanks up in the air. The situation was saved by the prompt and heroic work of the staff officers. Seeing the danger which the carrying out of the order would place the battalion in, Colonel Mersereau wrote out new orders and not satisfied to have the message delivered by an orderly in the usual way, he advanced across the open to the 10th battalion. Hardly had he left his dugout when a bursting shrapnel made an ugly wound in his head. By great effort he kept his nerve and finally managed by short bursts of running to reach his objective and delivered the message to Colonel Guthrie. The effort saved the "fighting Tenth." Subsequently Colonel Mersereau was found unconscious in a dugout. His wounds were bandaged and he was sent to a hospital, but it was days before his identity was discovered and months before he finally recovered the power of speech. Colonel Guthrie said that

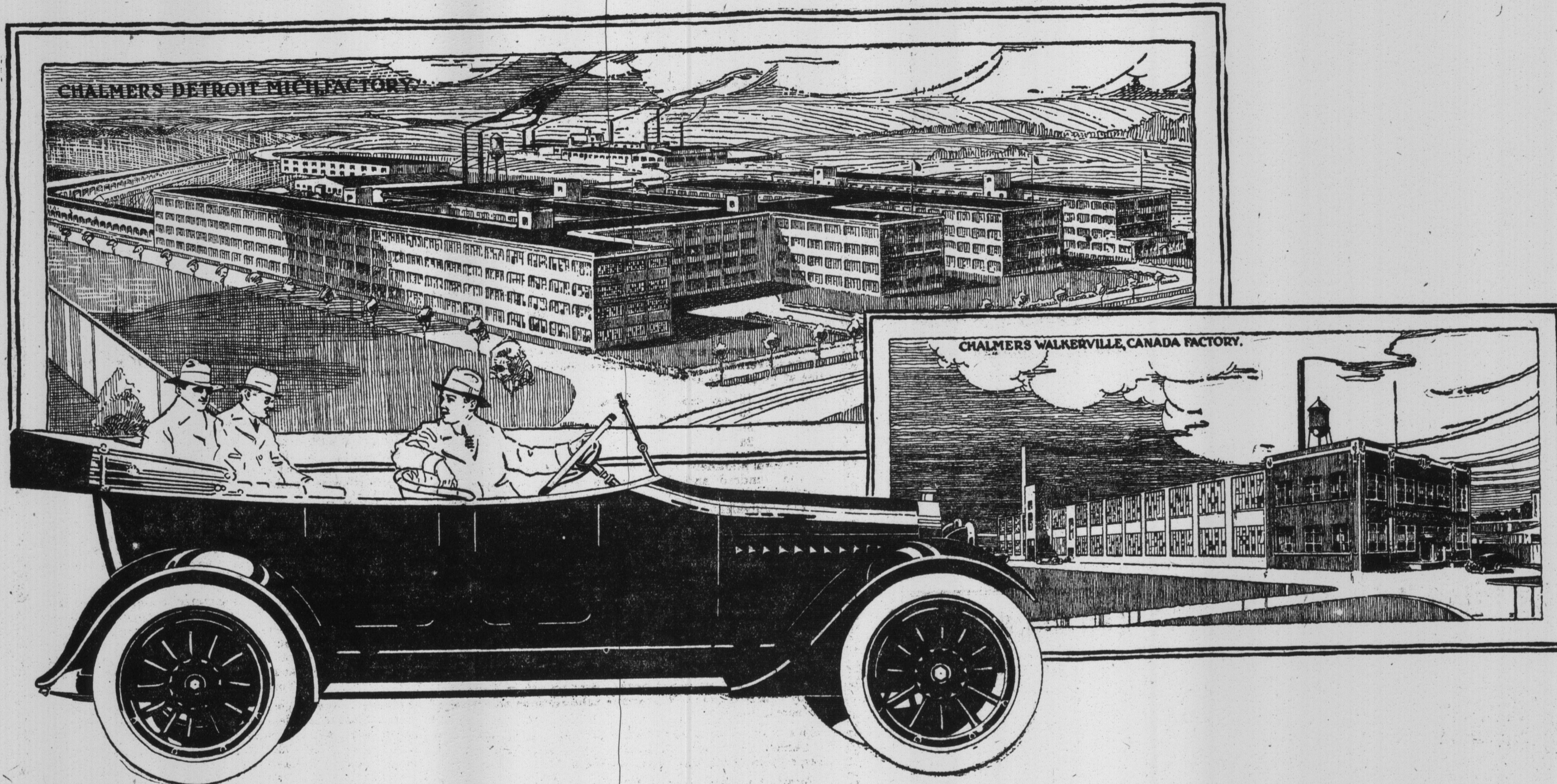

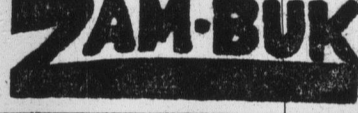

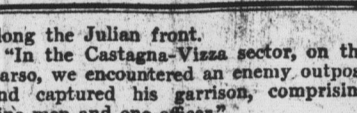

U. S. to Prepare For Emergencies

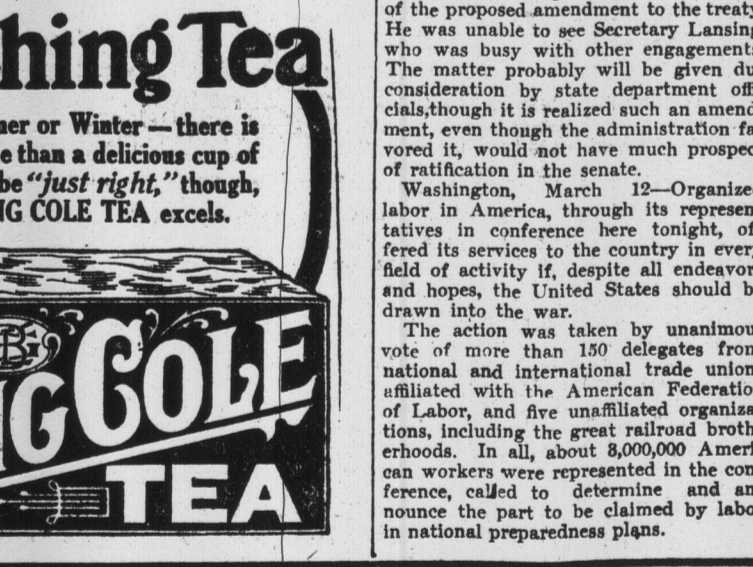

ALLIES GAIN ON WESTERN FRONT

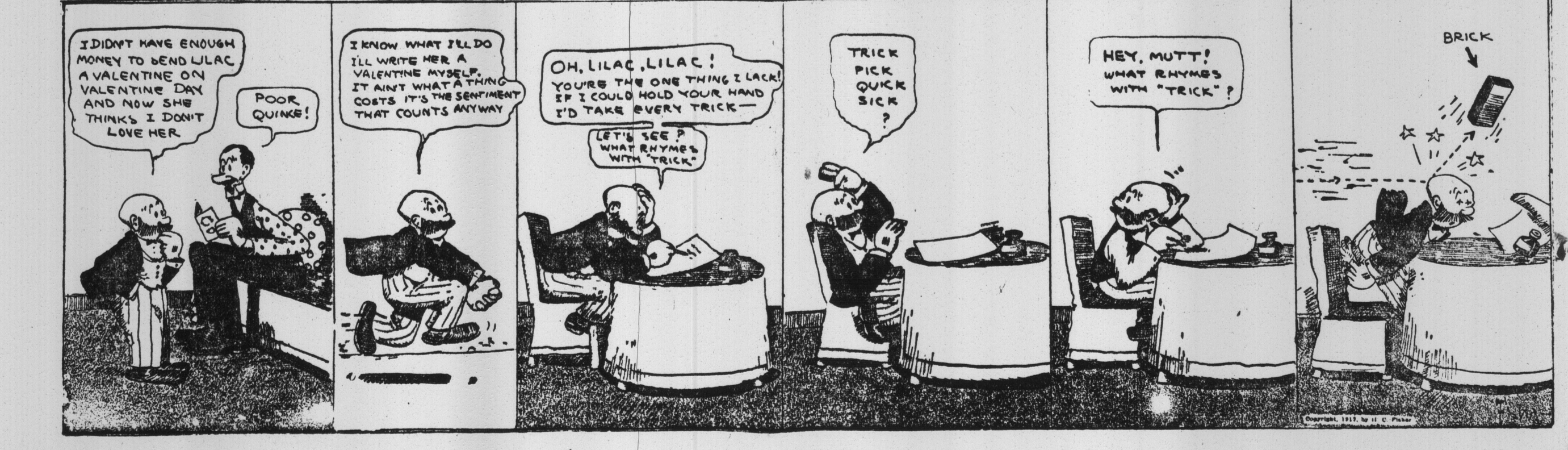

CONFERENCES

OVER U BOATS

May be Change of Policy—Arrival of Von Bernstorff Causes Renewed Discussion

London, March 12.—The arrival of Count Von Bernstorff in Europe has caused renewed discussion in Berlin as to the submarine blockade of political, naval and diplomatic representatives, according to the Norwegian mercantile shipping Gazette, says Reuter's Christiania correspondent.

"Some German naval attaches in neutral countries have been called to Berlin for a conference," continues the despatch. "The situation, but not the raising of the blockade is probable."

These conferences, it is indicated, arose out of developments during Count Von Bernstorff's stay in Christiania, when indirect efforts, it is said, were made to prevent the situation between Germany and America developing into war.

Supply Ships.
London, March 12.—(New York Times)—A despatch to the Daily Chronicle from Amsterdam yesterday said—

"News brought from Germany today is to the effect that two of the largest submarines of the Deutschland type are now acting as supply ships for smaller craft operating in the Atlantic. Four others of the largest submarines are also about to be commissioned for similar service. Great efforts are being made to sink shipping, especially between America and England."

Germany is attempting to perfect a plan whereby in case of war with America a decisive submarine campaign could immediately be put into operation.

WANT ST. JOHN SHIPBUILDERS

The St. John Board of Trade has received inquiries from British Columbia regarding the possibility of securing men here who would be skilled in the work of ship building. On the Pacific coast advantage is being taken of the opportunity to establish the ship building industry on a firm basis while conditions arising from the war continue and one of the difficulties is that of securing experienced workers. The local board has replied that it is expected that employment will be found at home for any such men as might be available.

SMALL BOYS DO THEIR BIT.

On last Saturday at nine o'clock nine small boys—Ted Stairs, Harold Dole, Desmond Purdy, Paul Fenton, George Fenton, Paul Lawton and Norman Anglin started out with a Red Cross banner stretched over a large sled and Red Cross hats on their heads, to do their bit to raise funds for soldiers. All day they energetically canvassed Lancaster parish for old shavers and collected three barrels full, which they will sell, the proceeds going to the Lancaster branch of the Red Cross.

The boys' housewives received the boys with the same kindness that they extend to the monthly collectors and promised them further patronage when they make their next collecting tour. The boys are very enthusiastic over the success of their initial effort and the club is likely to become a permanent organization.

Lieut.-Colonel Ducharme Dead.
Winnipeg, March 12.—Lieut.-Colonel L. J. O. Ducharme died here last night of cancer, aged fifty-seven. He was recently appointed to the command of a depot battery of artillery.

ANOTHER ARREST IN INDIAN PLOT CASE

German Student at Columbia University Taken in New York

New York, Mar. 12.—Heramba L. Gupta, a Hindu student at Columbia University, arrested here, was arraigned yesterday on a charge of violating the neutrality of the United States by conspiring with Franz Von Papen, former German military attaché to this country, to organize a military enterprise here to free India from British rule.

The complaint states that Gupta acted in conjunction with Von Papen and that Von Papen, at various times, paid to the student large sums of money to send him to Japan in furtherance of the enterprise.

CORPORAL F. MCL. CHEYNE PASSES AWAY IN HALIFAX

Member of the 246th—Body of Young Soldier Brought to St. John

Corporal Fred McL. Cheyne, a member of the 246th Battalion, Halifax, died in the military hospital in Halifax on Sunday from a severe attack of pneumonia. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John F. Cheyne, formerly of St. John, now of Bathurst. Corporal Cheyne was only nineteen years old. Since signing with the colors, he had been steadily climbing and was slated for a sergeant.

Besides his parents, he is survived by two brothers, Harold of Toronto and Robert at home; four sisters, Mrs. A. F. Kirkpatrick, of Gasperow, Mrs. Chesley Eddy, of Bathurst; Miss Ella at the home and Miss Lucella of Boston. The body has been brought to St. John for interment and the funeral took place this afternoon from Messrs. Chaugher's undertaking rooms. Services were conducted by Rev. Hammond Johnson, and interment was in Fernhill.

GEORGE F. MCKAY, NEW GLASGOW CAPTAIN OF INDUSTRY, DIED TODAY

New Glasgow, Mar. 12.—George Forster McKay died today at the age of eighty-two. He was one of New Glasgow's captains of industry and a most estimable citizen. He assisted in the founding of the Nova Scotia Steel and Wire Company and was its oldest director. William Cosman was in the police court this morning on complaint of his wife who gave him in charge last night in their house in Main street on charge of using threatening and abusive language to her and also for being under the influence of liquor. The defendant denied being intoxicated and said that he had used no threats to his wife. His wife, Police-magistrate Gorman and Mrs. Cosman's sister testified. The magistrate severely reprimanded the defendant and remanded him.

The case against William Mulcahy, charged with the theft of some \$40 from William London, was again before the court. The magistrate said that there was not sufficient evidence to commit the accused for trial so the case of theft would be dismissed. Mulcahy was fined \$8 or two months in jail for drunkenness.


