BRITISH CAPTURE IMPORTANT POSITIONS IN REGION OF YPRES

Heavy Fighting on Both Wings on Western Front

French Artillery Meanwhile Pounds at Germans to Prevent Reinforcements Being Sent to the Troubled Flanks

London, April 20.—The Daily Mail's correspondent at Rotterdam, telegraphs: "Accounts of fierce fighting southeast of Ypres reached me this afternoon. All yesterday wounded were arriving at Bruges, and it is said the Germans are preparing to evacuate Menin, fourteen miles southeast of Ypres. "There has been heavy hand-to-hand fighting in the neighborhood of Ypres and Comines, where the British captured several dominating positions after blowing up the German trenches with mines. The Germans have completely closed the Dutch-Belgian frontier. To-day barbed wire was erected at Eindhoven and some even foodstuffs were allowed to pass. "The correspondent of the Daily News telegraphs from Rotterdam—"Since twelve o'clock on Sunday night all communication between the Netherlands and Belgium has ceased. The frontier is completely closed. Persons with passes from the German authorities not even are allowed to cross."

GENERAL ATTACK ON GERMANS

Paris, April 20.—While British and French troops are assailing the right and left wings of the German army, French artillery is maintaining a heavy bombardment of the German front between the Oise and Aisne, and prevent reinforcements being sent from that district to the two flanks of the Kaiser's forces. "We urge the government," says the Times, "to use every effort to make the nation understand how small is the progress yet attained on land, and how great and manifold are the sacrifices which still must be faced."

Task Too Great and Soldiers on Fighting Line, Writing Home, Are Put Upon Honor

BEING SKILLED MEN HOME FROM FRONT IF NEEDED IN FACTORIES

This is Being Arranged in Connection With Turning Out of War Munitions

London, April 20.—The government has made arrangements under which skilled workmen now at the front fighting can be recalled to England to work in the factories producing munitions of war. Lord Esher, secretary of the War Office, announced yesterday a meeting of Birmingham manufacturers called by George Macanay Booth, chairman of the munitions committee. Lord Esher stated that the government's plan for organizing the supplies in the munitions industry and said what was known as a release committee had been appointed and in special cases where a particular man was needed who wanted back in a factory he could be got back if named and properly identified. The local committee under the government's organizing scheme was appointed in Birmingham and another has been appointed in Glasgow.

Paris, April 20.—German officers have arrived at Constantinople to take the pieces of other who have been killed. 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GALLANT WORK BY MEN OF NAVY

Destroy Submarine to Keep It Out of Turks' Hands

UNDER HEAVY FIRE

Had Gone Aground and Turks, It Was Feared, Would Retire and Use Her—A Characteristic British Action Warmly Commended

London, April 20.—The British Admiralty announced today:—"The submarine E34, which grounded on Kephos Point last Saturday, appears to have been in danger of falling into the enemy's hands, in a very delicate condition. Great efforts were made by the Turks to secure her. Attempts to destroy her by long range fire of battleships failed. "During the night of the 18th, two picket boats, that of the Triumph under Lieutenant Commander Eric Robinson, who commanded the expedition, assisted by Lieutenant Arthur Brooke Webb, R. N. R., and Midshipman John Woolley; and that of the Melampus, under Lieutenant Claude Godwin, both manned by volunteer crews, attacked the submarine. 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Russia Gets 600,000 More To Carpathians

These Troops Have Been Held Back For Training and Equipment—Some Guns From United States

Petrograd, April 20.—Six hundred thousand new Russian troops, held back from the front until they could be given adequate equipment and training, are now being sent to the front in the Carpathians. The difficulties of the Carpathian campaign have rendered reinforcements necessary in that region. Some of the troops now in the mountain ranges have been under fire night and day for some time. Thousands have been exhausted by forced marches through the rugged country, and, despite the efforts of the commissary department, it has been found impossible to supply them with the necessary food at all times.

GUNS FROM UNITED STATES

When the advance against Hungary is resumed, the Russian army will have with it cannon made in the United States. These guns, brought across the Pacific and through Siberia, have arrived at Lemberg, and are being transported to the southwestern front from there. As the Austrians, on their retreat from the San River, took with them or destroyed all railroad equipment except the cars left at Przemyel, the Russians have had to replace them. Three hundred cars, have just been finished and placed in operation on the Galician railways.

TURKISH DESTROYERS BLOWN UP

Paris, April 20.—Two Turkish torpedo boat destroyers were blown up, says a Saloniki despatch, while passing through a mine belt which Russian ships had succeeded in laying across the entrance to the Bosphorus, while the Turkish fleet was engaged in the Black Sea. The explosions caused by the destruction of the two Turkish boats, gave warning to the remainder of the fleet, which the despatch says, was obliged to remain in the Black Sea, because no mine sweepers were available.

VON HINDENBURG IN DISGRACE?

Paris, April 20.—The following despatch was received today from Petrograd: "Information has been received here that Field Marshal Von Hindenburg is in disgrace, says the official newspaper, Novoye Vremya, because of his failure to capture the general staff of the Austrians upon his dismissal, but the Kaiser decided that he should be given another chance to reinstate himself. RATE ON MARINE RISKS REDUCED 50 PER CENT

London, April 20.—Despite the German submarines sinking British merchant ships, the first month's experience of the Board of Trade in operating its plan for insuring officers and seamen of the mercantile marine against war risks has proved so satisfactory, it is announced that it has been decided to make a 50 per cent. reduction in the rates of the premiums charged.

WAR NOTES



FROM HIGH WINDOW TO BE IMPALED ON FENCE

New York Lawyer Falls or Jumps—Attempt at Suicide Charged

New York, April 20—Charles L. Hepburn, a lawyer, with an office at 115 Broadway, either jumped or fell from a front window of his apartment on the fourth floor of No. 144 East 22nd street and was impaled on the spikes of an iron railing. He was hurried to Bellevue Hospital in a critical condition, and is charged with having attempted to commit suicide. A picket had pierced his right leg.

There were many persons burying along the street when Hepburn came hurtling from the window, first striking the spikes of the fence and then slipping to the sidewalk. Some men carried him into the hallway of the house. In the room adjoining that occupied by Mr. Hepburn at the time he jumped was his wife, Mrs. Elizabeth Newport Hepburn, a magazine writer. Mrs. Hepburn, it is said, did not know what had happened until she learned that the man lying in the hall was her husband. She became hysterical. At the apartment house it was said Mr. Hepburn had been ill and despondent recently.

AUSTRIAN OFFICER SHOOT HIMSELF

Was Accused of Complicity in Recent Uniform Frauds—Horse Dealers Jailed

Venice, April 20—Lieut. Fanta, one of the army officers charged with complicity in the Budapest cloth contractors' scandals, has committed suicide before the beginning of the official investigation. News of Fanta's death was actually received with cheers by the populace, which is clamoring for the hanging of those chiefly responsible for the army uniform frauds.

The police have completed their preliminary investigation into the various cloth frauds. They have ascertained that the contractors for khaki cloth employed a woman as their means of communication with military officials. This woman is also under arrest, and has confessed to having received \$125,000 in cash and jewelry worth \$8,000 from the contractors. The jewelry and part of the money was found hidden among some rags in her house.

Some new frauds, this time in connection with the purchase of horses, have been discovered and have resulted in the arrest of six horse dealers and a number of accomplices, and in addition all the members of the official committee appointed to buy horses for the army in Belgrade. Here again a woman was intermediary between the committee and the contractors. When the presents brought in their horses for sale, the chairman of the committee, it is alleged, sent them to certain agents, who divided their profits with the committee.

In this fraud, according to official estimates, the government has lost nearly a million dollars.

HEAVY LOSSES OF THE ENEMY

Germany Has Lost 88 Per Cent of Regulars

TWO AUSTRIAN ARMIES GONE

Grand Duke Aims at Hungary Plains—Will Thus Deprive Germany of Vast Storehouse of Supplies

Petrograd, April 20—Military experts of the Russian press are divided in opinion regarding the true meaning of the present operations. The official military organ, Russky, for more than a month has been presenting the readers with the idea that as the Carpathian operations develop, and when Hungary has been invaded, the Russian will drive forward in irresistible force upon the direct road to Berlin.

The Novo Vremya expert scouts this idea, and points out that the Grand Duke's strategy has had one constant aim from the outset of the war, namely, to reach Berlin by way of Vienna. This expert shows that the combined enemy forces now arrayed against Russia from the Balkans to the frontiers of Rumania, are not under two and a half million men. Moreover, the disposition of the forces has changed during the past couple of months.

Some Austrian troops were with the Germans in the Niemen-Vistula raid. Between the lower Vistula and the Dunajec, a tributary of the upper Vistula, the Austrians are now in a majority, and the Germans, mainly represented by a disproportionately large artillery force, are concentrated especially on the northern section of this front and chiefly on the Bura and generally against Warsaw.

On the Carpathians front the further one looks the more numerous become the German forces and new formations and troops which have been again withdrawn from the Franco-Belgian front continue to move through Hungary.

It is evident, says the expert, that Germany is preparing a general attack along the whole strategic front. Where the men are fewer an endeavor is to be made by means of guns to supply their place, but the whole seven or eight hundred miles will shortly be aflame from end to end.

The Grand Duke's strategy aims at the occupation of the rich plains of Hungary, with the double object of waging war at the enemy's expense and assisting to starve the Germans, who have been deriving large supplies from Hungary, so that instead of striking at the German frontiers, which have been rendered as impregnable as human knowledge can make them, the Russians are thus little by little cutting away all Germany's supports until the moment is reached when Germany must stand bare and alone. A final effort will then bring the Teuton monster toppling down.

Russian strategy has turned all the German plans for this war upside down. A decisive battle, according to this expert, may be expected very shortly. The German dispositions are approaching their completion. In Bukovina and in the Niemen, the displays of energy are dimensions. The battle will shortly be opened by Germany. If this means anything beyond assumption, it means that the Germans hope to save the situation by an overwhelming blow from the Czeskoslowacka Crows front.

In any case, the next few weeks must see the greatest battle in the world's history, the numbers arrayed in arms against one another totalling five million men, extending over from 700 to 800

Therefore, the coming battle will be delivered by the Germans with troops of whom four-fifths will be last reserve men, while Austria's armies are wholly of an improvised kind.

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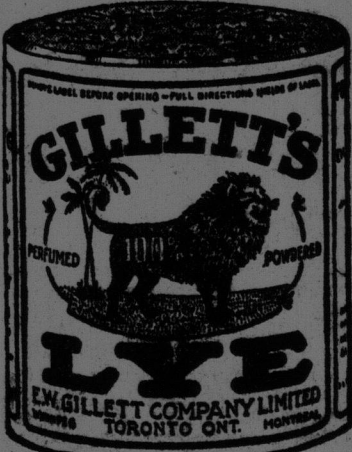

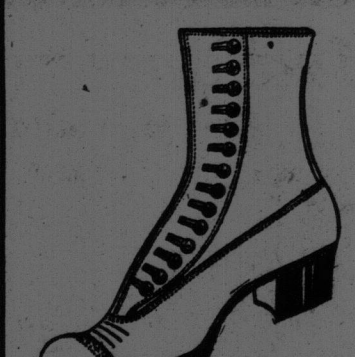

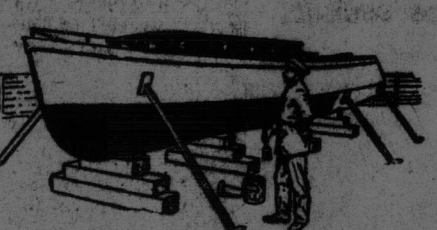
Good Words For 26th

DEMAND FOR A THREE CENT STAMP

Would Save a Lot of Trouble—Still Uncertainty Over War Tax in the Drug Store

Some of the druggists are still a bit at sea regarding the scope of the new war tax act. Some, it is said, are going so far as to stick a stamp on almost every article which leaves the store and others are trying to avoid their use as much as possible to save their customers the extra tax. Visitors to the \$50 and \$100 penalties are enough to make them all want to keep within the law but its interpretation has not been so indefinite that the merchants have some difficulty in learning what is required of them. One druggist said that the only way he had of learning what was required was through the newspapers and he was doing the best he could with no certainty that he was complying with the act. The rule covers any registered or proprietary medicine, liquid or solid and also any other preparation recommended to the public as "a specific preparation for any disease or affection affecting the human or animal body." This is the list of articles not regarded as medicines, such as medicinal soaps, etc. Some of the exceptions allowed so far in response to queries from druggists include poppin gum, which will not be classed as medicine; shaving soaps, which may be antiseptic but not remedial and even tooth pastes.

The latest modification of the law permitting the use of either war or ordinary stamps on letters to the full amount of the postage plus the war tax has simplified matters somewhat in the post office but there is still an inclination on the part of some persons to try to use inland revenue stamps as well and these are not recognized on letters.

There is now a general demand for a three cent stamp to cover the war tax and postage and save the time and trouble of placing two stamps on each letter sent out.
