SIXTEENTH ANNUAL SESSION

OF THE

SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF MONTREAL.

FIRST DAY.

The Sixteenth Annual Meeting of the Synod of Montreal was held on Tuesday, the 15th June, 1875.

Divine Service was celebrated in the Cathedral.

Morning Prayer was said by Rev. Canon Bancroft, D.D., and Rev. Canon Ellegood, M.A.; the Lessons were read by Rev. Canon Evans, M.A., the Ante-Communion service by the Most Reverend the Metropolitan and the Rector. sermon was preached by Rev. James Carmichael, M.A.; and Holy Communion was administered by the Very Rev. the Dean, LL.D., Ven. Archdeacon Leach, D.C.L., LL.D., Ven. Archdeacon Lonsdell, M.A., and Rev. Canon Bancroft, D.D., LL.D.

The Synod assembled in the Synod Hall, at two o'clock, for business.

The Bishop opened the meeting with prayer, after which the roll of the Clerical members was called by the Clerical Secretary; and the roll of the Lay members by the Lay Secretary.

It was moved and seconded:

That Rev. J. Empson be re-elected Clerical Secretary :—Carried.

It was moved and seconded:

That Mr. Pangman be the Lay-Secretary.

It was moved in amendment:

That Mr. F. Mackenzie be re-elected Lay Secretary.—Carried.

It was moved by Mr. Bethune, seconded by Canon Bancroff:

That Mr. Brydges be re-elected Treasurer.—Carried.

It was moved by Rev. R. W. Norman, seconded by Mr. MILLAR:

That Messrs. Sanborn and T. Simpson be re-elected Auditors.—Carried. The minutes of last Session were considered as read, and were approved after an alteration being made by substituting the Dean's name in place of Rev. R. Lindsay as mover for the adoption of the report of the Committee on the mode of the election of the Executive Committee, (page 510, XV Journal.)

The Bishop then named the members of the several Standing Committees. (See page 615.)

It was resolved:

That the Offertory at the Morning Serwice should be devoted to the Mission Fund.

The Bishop then announced that the election of the Executive Committee would take place to-morrow at eleven o'clock; of the Delegates to the Provincial Synod at twelve o'clock; and of the members to constitute the Diocesan Court, at two o'clock.

His Lordship nominated E. Carter, Esq., Q.C., as Church Advocate.

The Metropolitan then delivered the following

ADDRESS.

REVEREND BRETHREN, AND BRETHREN OF THE LAITY,-

In addressing you at the opening of this our Sixteenth Synod, I desire to sound the key-note of harmony and union—of harmony among ourselves, and of union with those who are at present estranged from us, but who love and serve the same Saviour with ourselves.

INTERNAL HARMONY AND EXTERNAL UNION.

As to the latter of these subjects, I have long felt, but more especially of late, that the divided state of the several Christian Bodies around us need not, and ought not, to be accepted as our normal and inevitable condition. It is a blot on our reformed Christianity, and it is clearly contrary to the will of our Lord, who will have us all to be one. And, further, it

cially nd us contrary ner, it acts as a most grievous hindrance to the advancement of Christ's work upon earth. Nor are we so far apart from one another that a way of access is hopeless; for the line of demarcation which now separates us from many of our brethren is a very thin one, and only a little is needed to obliterate that line, and make us one fold under one Heavenly Shepherd.

I believe that our Church is marvellously fitted to become the rallying point for the dispersed, offering such a platform of union as no other Christian body can offer. I throw this out, because it springs from my own conviction; and if men would think of it, speak of it to one another, and make it a matter of prayer, I believe that God would in his own good time make a way for its accomplishment.

The other point to which I alluded has an intimate bearing upon this—namely our own internal harmony, without which it is vain to invite others into our ranks. Nothing would so effectually enable us to hold out a welcome to those who stand aloof, as our united condition at home.

Can we present this united front? I think that in this Diocese, more perhaps than in almost any other, at the present time, we can. that it were so in every portion of the Church! In the Mother Church or England there has existed in the last few years somewhat of a disturbing influence. But it is perhaps well that lately her verdict has been unmistakably given against the extravagances in which a few have indulged. I sllude to the Public Worship Bill, and also to the recent address of the Episcopal Bench. These, with the moderate and judicious Canon passed by the General Convention of the Church in the United States, have I think declared in pretty plain terms, that there is a limit which must not be overpassed. I earnestly trust that the effect will be a closer and more loyal adherence to the rules and spirit of the Church of England, and less deviation from the path which she prescribes. What I desire in those who are acting under me in the sacred ministry is, that they should be good, thorough, earnest, and hearty Churchmen, at the same time avoiding novelties in the way of ritual, and very careful that their teaching shall be in accordance with the spirit, as well as the letter of our Church.

Whilst speaking on the subject of harmony, I must be allowed to announce to you that an important Committee appointed at the last Session is happily relieved of its labours. I allude to the Committee on the Cathedral Question. But I will recur to the subject presently.

DEATH OF REV. G. SLACK, H. CAULFEILD, AND ARCHDEACON BALCH.

Before entering upon other matter, I have a melancholy duty to perform in recording the departure from among us of two beloved brethren.

The one a Father in the Church—known to almost every man, woman and child within the Diocese, and valued by us all for his peculiar kindness of heart, as well as for his devotion in years past to the Mission work of the Church. He was ever ready to take the lead in any enterprise which commended itself to his active mind and earnest heart, whether for the temporal or spiritual good of his brethren.

SESSION

The other was known to very few of us. Coming from another Diocese, he had scarcely rooted himself in his new parish; and yet during the three short months that he ministered at St. John's, he won the affection of his flock to an extent which speaks volumes both for himself and for them.

They have both been called to a holier, and not less active, work in the Church above.

Neither can I be altogether silent respecting the death of one, who though not latterly associated with ourselves, once took a very prominent part in the work and organization of this Diocese. Many of us may have differed from him on some points; but those differences we shall hasten to forget, remembering only the gifted mind, and kind heart, of him who is now gone from us.

MISSION WORK.

Of the state of our Diocese in its missionary aspect I have reason to speak most cheeringly and thankfully. We have recently opened three new missions, and should be prepared to open six more, if the means and the men were ready to hand. I regard this as the very best and most satisfactory evidence of the Church's life.

THEOLOGICAL COLLEGES.

We have now two institutions for the Training of our Clergy. The elder institution, that at Lennoxville, is, I am happy to say, in a more thriving condition than it has been for years. I am sorry, however, to learn that in this Diocese so few Sermons have been preached for its support during the past year. I hope that this neglect may be remedied in future. Surely we should all feel that Bishop's College has a strong claim upon us in this Diocese, for it has furnished us in the past with many of our clergy, and still opens its doors to our Theological students, and helps to supply us with the men we need.

Of our College here in Montreal I desire to speak with unmixed thankfulness, its condition being in every respect most satisfactory.

Two years ago I complained, almost despondingly, of the dearth of clergy; but now, thank God, we have a sufficient number for our existing posts, all of which are supplied, and there is a fair prospect in the future that our demands will be sufficiently met.

Our able and efficient Principal is, however, still working single-handed, and we greatly need at this moment more Annual Subscribers to enable us at once to appoint an Assistant Professor. We also much need more Exhibitions for our students, for by these means we are enabled to reward merit, and afford help to those who would not otherwise be in a position to meet the expense of their collegiate course.

I heartily wish, now that the necessity for the establishment of such a college is pretty generally admitted, and its success is undeniable, it may henceforth be regarded by us all no longer as a private, but as a Diocesan Institution.

LADIES' SCHOOL.

I am happy to say that we have broken ground in reference to the establishment of a Ladies' School, by the commencement of a building at Dunham, in connection with the Church. This will meet the special wants of the Deanery, whilst it should commend itself to the cordial support of the whole Diocese. I should be glad if the still greater and more important work of a large Church School here in Montreal could be commenced.

MISSION FUND OF THE DIOCESE.

As to the Mission Fund of the Diocese, whilst I feel no positive uneasiness about it, I must needs urge my brethren to much greater exertions.

The state of things at present is this: Our actual expenditure on the missions of the Church exceeds, and if our missionaries were adequately paid, it would very far exceed, our receipts. onward progress. The church cannot extend herself territorially as she This cripples us in our might, and ought to do, for lack of funds. Never since I have presided over this Diocese has the field been so fair, and the real work of God so promising as it is at this moment. The attitude of our clergy is that of men waiting to be led on to greater triumphs. The opportunity is before us; let us seize it. Oh that our hands may not be paralyzed, and our knees enfeebled, for want of support! The members of our Church have yet to learn the luxury of giving for Christ's sake. They contribute money to our hospitals and other charitable institutions; and perhaps this is because they can actually see the immediate fruits of their giving. And for the same reason they spend money on individual churches, with which they are immediately concerned; again, they support with a free hand their own clergyman, in whose work they are interested, because that work is carried on before their very eyes. But when we plead with them for the Church at large Diocesan work which is beyond the field of their vision, their bounty forthwith slackens, and they seem to forget that there is a great and glorious work, which ought to interest them as much, or more than that which is being carried on in their own immediate localities.

Oh that God would enlarge our hearts, and make us feel that we are members of a great spiritual Body, depending for success'upon our prayers and efforts!

I wish very earnestly to call the attention of the Clergy and Laity to the importance of this Fund. Humanly speaking, the prosperity and extension of the Church depends upon it, and their hearty exertions are needed for its effectual collection. What we want is a regular weekly contribution from every Church member, whether rich or poor, and given through the Offertory as a gift to God.

And since the entire management of this Fund is in the Executive Committee, I believe it to be of great importance that this Committee, which is elected annually, should have the entire confidence of the Diocese. A body having such extensive powers must always be open to attack and be subject to censure. But as regards the past, I may truly say that I

may cesan pover acted with any Committee in my life, which dealt more fairly and honestly with the resources placed at its disposal than this Committee, over which I have presided for the last six years.

It should be borne in mind that the Committee has nothing whatever to do with the spiritual but only with the financial, interests of the Missions; and to this branch of the work they have ever applied themselves with untiring zeal.

There was a resolution passed by the last Synod which has for its object to render this Committee more popular and more efficient. This resolution will have to be confirmed before it can come into operation.

ORDINATIONS AND CONFIRMATIONS.

In the past year I have admitted four persons to the Order of Deacons and four also to that of Priests. I have held forty-two Confirmations, and received five hundred and eighty-two persons into full Church membership—the largest number that I have hitherto confirmed in any one year.

MARRIAGES

I wish to recur to a subject on which I have spoken to you on former occasions. You are aware that I have expressed a decided wish that all marriages should be celebrated in our churches. That wish still remains as strongly rooted as ever in my own mind; and as the Church's responsible minister I cannot do otherwise than use my influence to enforce her rules. It has, however, been suggested to me that it would be agreeable to the clergy if I were to leave the responsibility of departing from this rule in exceptional cases with them, rather than require them to refer to me in each instance. To this suggestion I most readily accede, feeling that the law of the Church will be as safe in their hands as in mine.

QUESTION OF ORDER.

I wish now to say a word regarding our Debates. Notice has been given of one or two motions, about which a question of order may probably be raised. At our last Session I ruled that the discussion of any doctrinal question involving differences of opinion was not strictly within the bounds of our debate. I still feel that it is my duty to stop such discussion when an appeal is made to the Chair. It is quite competent, however, to a member of the Synod simply to propose the reference of any question whatever to the Provincial Synod, so long as it does not involve any action on the part of this Synod, and with the full understanding that there shall be no debate thereupon. This is the distinction which I wish to draw, and which I feel will both meet the requirements of our Constitution, and will also be in accordance with the feelings and wishes of this House.

THE CATHEDRAL QUESTION.

There is one more subject I bring before you, and I have done.

When speaking of the state of harmony which exists at the present time within the Diocese, I briefly alluded to the happy settlement of a serious difficulty regarding the Cathedral.

ent time serious In the last few weeks a conference has taken place between a representative of the Cathedral body and myself, which has led to an arrangement satisfactory to all concerned, and setting at rest sundry questions hitherto undecided. A series of statutes have been drawn up for future guidance, and have received the signatures of the Rector and Churchwardens of the Cathedral, as well as my own.

As these statutes are interesting, not merely to myself or to the Cathedral body, but to the whole Church of the Diocese, I will now read them.

These statutes are intended only to meet the question at issue between the Cathedral and myself, and are not intended, of course, to cover the whole ground of the Cathedral constitution. Additions can be made at any future time, should fresh complications arise needing solution. The Bishop's position in the Cathedral, which up to this time has been undefined, is now settled in a manner which claims my approval, and will not, I would fain hope, be again disturbed.

It is a cause of no little thankfulness to me that a dispute, which has prevailed for many months, and has caused very great anxiety to myself and others, has thus been happily and effectually closed. I am sure that you, my brethren, will share with me the joy which I feel in the attainment of this happy issue.

And now I commend you to the guiding Spirit of God. May your counsels be subject to His influence! May He animate, direct and control us in all we say and do! May we speak as His oracles, and may His love tincture every expression that we utter!

Remember, we meet here not to contend, but to confer; not always to gain our own point, but sometimes to yield it; not to compass any selfish end, but to promote the glory of God, and the welfare of our beloved Church; not to triumph over any man, but to defer to wise counsels wherever they are expressed.

I may, perhaps, be allowed to express a wish that a more strictly religious character should pervade our Synod meetings. The harsh and contentious spirit which once prevailed here has, I trust, for ever passed away; but there is still room for more of that chastened tone of piety which ought, I think, to mark an Assembly like this, which meets for the avowed purpose of promoting the spiritual well-being of the Church in this Diocese.

It was moved by Canon BANCROFT, seconded by the CHANCELLOR:

That the report of the Executive Committee which was printed and circulated, be considered as read, and taken up for discussion to-morrow morning.—Carried.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE TO THE SIXTEENTH SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF MONTREAL.

The Executive Committee of the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal, beg to submit to the Synod at its annual meeting in 1875, the following report of its operations during the preceding year 1874-75.

MEETINGS.

There were four regular quarterly meetings held; namely, on Aug. 12; Nov. 11; Feb. 3; and May 12; also one special meeting, Nov. 26; and one adjourned, June 3.

TREASURER'S STATEMENTS.

At each regular meeting a statement was presented to the Committee, showing the condition of the several funds to be satisfactory, with the exception of the Mission Fund. By the following memorandum from these statements, it may be seen that this most important fund is not in the position, in which, the friends of missions would wish to see it.

At the August meeting there was reported a deficit of \$1128.43
Nov. " 1484.18

Feb. " " 3178.86 May. " " 1026.78

Before the November report was made, the sum of \$2750 had just been transferred to the Mission Fund from the Clergy Trust and Sustentation Funds; and the May report included \$1700, transferred from the same funds.

Your Committee felt that such a state of things was most unsatisfactory, and a special committee, composed of the Committee on Missions and the following clergymen, Rev. D. Lindsay, J. Fulton, G. C. Robinson, W. C. Merrick, and R. Lindsay, were instructed to "revise the list of missions "receiving grants from the fund, or to adopt such other means as they "might deem wise, to produce a larger extent of self-support among the "missions." And further, the Bishop was requested to write to the clergy, that the subscriptions should be taken up as soon as possible for the Mission Fund, the pressing wants of the fund being very strongly urged upon them.

The special Committee reported that the following missions or parishes fell short, last year, of the amounts proposed to be raised by them for the Mission Fund, viz., Christieville, Clarenceville, Dunham, Franklin, Hemmingford, Hull, Iron Hill, Kildare, Nelsonville, Ormstown, Philipsburgh, St. Andrews, Ste. Victoire, Thorne, and Vaudreuil. They considered that Hemmingford, Huntingdon, Ormstown, Philipsburgh and West Farnham, having received aid for so many years, ought to become self-supporting; and that the amounts contributed to the fund by

Tron Hill, Longueuil and Sabrevois were out of all proportion below what might reasonably have been expected. They recommended that the grant to Mille Isles should be increased to \$450, and thought the people there ought then to raise \$250 dollars for the Missionary. They further suggested amounts which they proposed should be raised by each parish or mission, and which, with few exceptions, were afterwards agreed to by the Rural Deaneries to which they were submitted, and were finally adopted by the Executive Committee as follows:

II. That the grant from the S. P. G. is constantly decreasing, and after paying special grants and pensions, leaves but little more than \$2,000 a

III. That the Society has given notice, that even the present reduced grant will be diminished until it entirely disappears.

IV. That constant appeals are made for grants to new missions, which it is impossible to deal with, owing to the Fund being inadequate to the

V. That several of the missions now being aided, have been paid out of the Mission Fund for a great many years, although the localities have greatly increased in population and wealth.

VI. That for several years the Synod has discussed the question, and decided that some of the older missions must become self-supporting, and the funds that are available applied to strictly missionary purposes in new and struggling districts.

VII. That with this view, in 1871, certain missions were ordered to be reduced 10 per cent. per annum until the grants entirely disappeared.

VIII. That the order of Synod was subsequently delayed for a year, and has not yet been carried into effect, but is legally binding.

IX. That in 1873 the Synod decided to make grants of \$100 a year to such missions as would themselves raise a further equal sum.

X. That nineteen missions have acted upon this resolution, and have each raised \$100 per annum in addition to their previous subscriptions.

XI. That wherever a church is supported solely by its own resources, it is always more valued and appreciated.

XII. That looking at the present means at the disposal of the Executive Committee, and the demands upon it for new grants for real missionary purposes, it is absolutely necessary to diminish grants in the older districts, which have been for so many years on the list.

XIII. That with that view, the Report of the Executive Committee of the 13th Synod, held in June 1872, be acted upon, as on and from the 1st of July in 1875, and reductions made in all those grants covered by the Report of the Lay Committee on Missions, dated 28th August 1871, and adopted by the Executive Committee on 30th August 1871, and subsequently confirmed by Synod, except as regards the special grants from the S. P. G. and the Clergy Trust Funds, which cannot be affected during the lives of the present recipients.

XIV. That all those missions so dealt with by the aforesaid Lay Committee's Report be informed that, from the 1st July 1875, the grants made will be annually reduced by one-tenth, so that they will entirely cease on 1st of July 1885.

XV. That in dealing with the list of missions ordered by the Synods of 1871 and 1872 to be reduced, the Executive Committee be authorized to settle and revise that list annually, at their discretion.

XVI. That strong efforts be also made, both in the city and country, to increase the general subscriptions to the Mission Fund, so that the Executive Committee may be in a position to make new grants when asked for by the Bishop, as he may consider desirable.

XVII. That in all future new grants, it be a condition that the grant be subject to a yearly or other reduction, so that the principle be kept steadily in view that the Church in each locality shall as rapidly as possible support itself.

The following are the Missions referred to in clauses vii, xiii and xiv:

Aylmer, Berthier, Brome, Bristol, Buckingham, Clarendon, Edwardstown, Grenville, Hemmingford, Huntingdon, Mascouche, North Gore, Onslow, Ormstown, Philipsburg, Portage du Fort, Rawdon, South Stukely, Terrebonne, West Farnham, West Shefford.

GRANTS

Boscobel and North Ely.—An addition of \$100 for one year was made to this mission, and the grant is now \$500, commencing from 1st January 1875.

Mille Isles.—An addition of \$100 was made to this mission, and the grant, commencing from 1st April 1875, is now \$450.

Edwardstown.—An addition of \$50, which makes the grant from the Mission Fund to this mission \$200 from 1st April 1875.

New Glasgow and Kilkenny.—Grant of \$300 to be renewed on the appointment of a missionary, when the grant now paid to Terrebonne will be discontinued.

Papineauville.—A new mission, \$400.

Adamsville.-A new mission, \$400.

West Farnham.—To be reduced to \$150 from 1st July 1875.

Rev. W. Richmond, North Gore, \$300 to assist him in returning to England.

That in view both of the present straitened condition of the Mission Fund, and also of the standing Missionary needs of the Diocese, the incumbents and church-wardens of the different city and country churches be earnestly solicited not to deduct, for the current expenses of their respective churches, any portion of the collection taken up after the annual sermon preached in aid of the Mission Fund, but to send in to the treasurer of the Synod the whole amount of the offertory contributed on that special

And further, That the Secretary be requested to transmit this resolution, adopted with the Bishop's entire concurrence, to the incumbents and church-wardens of all the churches in this Diocese.

A communication was received from the secretary of the S. P. G. to the effect that the Society would grant £1,600 for the year ending 31st December 1876.

The students of the Theological College have been engaged in supplying services in vacant missions, and the sum of \$331.10 paid for their services and travelling expenses.

A new mission has been opened at Templeton and Chelsea, and the stipend so far provided for by private subscriptions.

Application was made for the sub-division of the mission of Franklin, but it was resolved that no change can be made at present.

I append herewith the following statements of accounts in my hands as Treasurer of the Diocese:

No. 1 is the Clergy Trust fund, on which there is a balance to the credit of \$669.29. (See page 682.)

I have appended to this account a statement of the mortgages in which the Clergy Trust funds were invested. The annual interest receivable

No. 2 is the Widows and Orphans' fund, which has a balance to its credit of \$688.76. (See page 683.)

\$5000 of the amount belonging to this fund has been invested during the last year.

I append a list of the investments for this fund, amounting to a total sum of \$39,686, and yielding an annual interest of \$2,673.20.

No. 3 is the Capital Account of the Sustentation fund of the Diocese, which has a balance to its credit of \$3,594.83. (See page 684.)

\$3000 of this amount will be invested in the course of a few days.

I append to this account also a list of the present investments amounting to \$52,800, and yielding interest amounting to \$3,616 per annum.

Of the above amount, the sum of \$10,560, is on account of local endowments not belonging to the Sustentation fund.

No. 4 is the Interest Account of the Sustentation fund showing a balance to its credit of \$989.21. (See page 689.)

There has been transferred from this account during the year, to the credit of Mission fund, \$2,200.

The receipts and expenses will not vary, as far as it is possible to form an estimate, if the grants to Missions are unaltered during the current year, and if so, there will probably be a balance against the Mission fund on 1st June 1876 of upwards of \$2,000.

The amount received both from the City and Country has been less than in the previous year.

The interest from the Sustentation fund during the current year will probably be about \$3,500.

It seems, however, to be clear that the income of the Mission fund is not increasing, and that the expenditure is getting larger.

There will probably be some further amounts to come in during the next few weeks, but it will still leave the Mission fund in a worse condition than it was at the beginning of the last year.

Quarterly payments will again have to be made on the 1st July, 1st October, and 1st January next, the only apparent means of meeting which are the drafts on the S. P. G. and the transfers that can be made from the Sustentation fund and the Clergy Trust fund.

These amounts together will be considerably less than the amounts that will have to be met, and, therefore, at the end of the year, or say on the 3.st December next, the balance against the Mission fund will be very

This has hitherto been met, as the Committee are aware, by certain parties, interested in the matter, getting a note discounted at the bank, for which, of course, they are personally liable,

The amount which had thus to be raised last year, was \$5,000, and from the appearance of the account now, it would look as if a considerably larger amount would have to be provided in this way during the current year, unless such a revision of the expenditure takes place as has been recommended by the Executive Committee.

It is clear that with all the efforts that are being made to collect funds the annual subscriptions to the Mission Fund are falling off instead of increasing, and the outlay is also getting larger.

That this is an unsatisfactory state of affairs cannot be denied, and I suggest that it is a matter which should receive the earnest attention of the Executive Committee and of the Synod at its forthcoming meeting.

1. That with this view an annual meeting shall be held in every Rural Deanery, for the purpose of revising existing and recommending such new grants as the mission work of the Church requires, and also how much each mission or parish should contribute towards the Mission Fund.

2. That the reports of such meetings shall be sent to the Bishop, who shall submit them to the annual meeting of the Synod, and name a special time during the Synod for their consideration.

3. That the Synod shall have power to make such changes in these reports as it thinks proper.

4. That the grants shall be recommended and made with reference to the ability of the Mission to contribute towards the stipend as regulated by the Synod, and that the system of giving additional aid, upon condition of Missions increasing their subscriptions, be not continued, as it excludes poor Missions from the help they specially need.

It being now twelve o'clock the ballot for election of Delegates to Provincial Synod commenced. The scrutineers named for this ballot were Rev. J. Fulton, H. W. Nye, and T. W. Mussen for the Clerical vote; and Messrs. R. Evans, N. S. Whitney, G. W. Zuhlcke for the Lay vote.

Mr. Brydges then moved, seconded by Mr John Craw-FORD:

1. That it is exceedingly desirable, that the Mission fund should be placed upon a more satisfactory footing than it is at present.

2. That this is the more imperative from the gradual withdrawal of the grant from the S. P. G. which at present gives a sum of about \$2,500 a year to the general purposes of the Mission Fund.

3. That it is desirable to give the Executive Committee power to revise periodically the present grants so as to make those places which are able to do so, become as soon as possible self-supporting, and to permit of grants to new Missions where required.

4. That it is most desirable to make the salaries of clergymen more in accordance with the present cost of living, and the position they occupy.

5. That the principle of self-support wherever possible is the correct one and ought to be kept steadily in view as most conducive to the best interests

6. That a persistent and continuous effort should be made to increase the fund at the disposal of the Executive Committee.

7. That with this view, a list be obtained from every Parish or Mission in the Diocese of every adult person attending each church.

8. That the Executive Committee be requested to deal with those lists so as to secure a personal application to every adult churchman in the Diocese, to aid as earnestly as possible in the support of her Missions.

9. That the Executive Committee be recommended carefully to consider how far it is possible to arrange that all moneys raised for the support of Diocesan Missions, be sent in to the Treasurer of the Executive Committee, and that all the Clergy receiving aid from the Mission Fund, be paid their stipends quarterly directly from the Treasurer.

Moved in amendment by Mr. L. H. DAVIDSON, seconded by Rev. F. ROBINSON:

That to the clause of Mr. Brydges' resolution relating to rescision of grants &c., there be added the following. That the grant to any Parish or Mission shall not be reduced, without giving an opportunity to the Parish or Mission, whose grant is to be reduced, of being heard before the Executive Committee by special representation.

By permission of the House this amendment was withdrawn, and the following clause was added to clause 3 of Mr. Brydges' motion, which was carried with that addition.

Whenever any reduction is proposed, notice as far as possible shall be given to the Rural Dean, in order that the Parish or Mission affected, may be heard before the Executive Committee, if they desire it.

Rev. R. W. Norman read a report of Bishops College, Lennoxville, which was, on motion by him, received by the Synod.

The Bishop announced that on Wednesday next he will consecrate a portion of McGill College ground for a special purpose, and invited the attendance of the Clergy.

That his Lordship the Bishop of Montreal and Metropolitan be respectfully requested to name a Committee to draft a Petition to the House of Bishops and the Provincial Synod, to be presented at their next meeting, praying them to take action "and make such alterations in the Rubrics as may remove any of those ambiguities, which have caused such difficulties of interpretation as to their meaning and purpose."

Mr. L. H. DAVIDSON raised the point that the motion was out of order, on the ground that the Book of Common Prayer having been made the law of the Church in relation to its services, by an Imperial Act, this Synod, (in view moreover of the Declaration preceding its constitution,) and the limitation imposed by Act of 19 and 20 Vict. and the Synod Act, cannot appoint a Committee with a view to initiate a measure to infringe these laws.

The BISHOP ruled that the motion was not out of order,

inasmuch as the Provincial Synod has authority to deal with the Book of Common Prayer, and that this Resolution is merely a petition from this Synod to the higher Synod.

Moved in amendment by Rev. H. W. NYE, seconded by Rev. W. R. Brown:

That as the convocations of the Church in England are now engaged in the revision of the Rubrics, it is not desirable for the Church in Canada to take any present action in the matter.—Carried on division, 53 to 34.

That the Provincial Synod, through the Secretary of this Synod, be requested to have made and published from time to time, a compilation from the several Journals or Reports of the Diocesan Synods, of the Statistics concerning Baptisms, Confirmations and Communicants, in the whole of the Eccelsiastical Province of Canada.

Moved in amendment by Rev. T. W. Mussen, seconded by Rev. F. Robinson:

That a Committee be appointed by the Bishop to take into consideration the best means of disseminating among the members of our congregations some general information concerning the statistics and work of the Church throughout this Ecclesiastical Province, to report at the next meeting of Synod.—Carried.

Letters Patent by the Queen for the appointment of a Metropolitan," (1 Prov. Syn. Rep., p. 44.) Secondly, of the opinion of the Law officers of the Crown in England " that it was competent to the Crown to constitute His Lordship," (to wit the late Lord Bishop of Montreal and his successors) "a Metropolitan, and thereby to give him preeminence and precedence over "his suffragans, but that as to the coercive jurisdiction which the Metro-" politan may exercise and the manner in which it is to be exercised, these " are matters which must be settled by the Bishops, Clergy and Laity of "the Church in a General Assembly of the Province according to the pro-"vision of the local Act of the Canadian Legislature, 19 and 20 Victoria, " Cap. 121." (3 Prov. Syn., p. 12.) And thirdly, of the expressed acceptance by the said Provincial Synod of the principle of a fixed Metropolitical See and of that of Montreal as such See, and of her Bishop as Mefropolitan. (3rd Prov. Syn. Repts., p. 24). This Synod cannot but view the attempt by the said Provincial Synod to deprive the successors of the present Lord Bishop of Montreal of the dignity and office conferred upon them by the Letters Patent aforesaid, as a violation alike of law, agreement, and of the privileges of this diocese, and respectfully protest against the same, and reaffirm the claim of the Diocese of Montreal to be held the Metropolitical See and its Bishop, Metropolitan; and also, in consequence of the rescission by said Provincial Synod of the Canon for the Election of said Bishop and Metropolitan heretofore mutually agreed upon by the said Synod, this Synod re-affirms its right to elect its own Bishop and Metro-

FOURTH DAY.

"That the Moderator be requested to convey to the Diocesan Synod of Montreal, now in session, an expression of the satisfaction with which this Assembly has received the congratulations of the Synod, as conveyed by the Metropolitan, on the Union of the Presbyterian Churches, now so happily consummated, and its earnest prayer that the Divine blessing may largely descend on the members of the Diocesan Synod, in the work of the

Canon Bancroft, by permission of the House, withdrew the motion made by him yesterday in reference to the Theological College in Montreal.

It was moved by Rev. J. B. DAVIDSON, seconded by Rev. A. A. ALLEN:

That in the ordinary elections of the Synod requiring the use and counting of the ballots, the elections be so arranged as to occur at the close of some of the sessions, and that the Scrutineers be not required to report before the following morning, except the balloting occur upon the concluding day of the Session, when the Report shall be immediate.-

That no lay Delegate shall represent in the Synod of this Diocese more than one cure or congregation. In the event of any lay Delegate being elected to represent more than one cure or congregation, it shall be the duty of the clerical Secretary of the Synod, on information received by him of such dual representation, forthwith to communicate with such lay Delegate, and to require him to signify to the Secretary of Synod without delay, his option of the cure or congregation which he elects to represent, and until he does so notify the Secretary, he shall not have power to vote, or otherwise act as such lay Delegate.

And on the receipt of such notice aforesaid, the Secretary shall forthwith notify the Incumbent of the cure or congregation, which such lay Delegate declines to represent, of the fact that he so declines, in order that a new election may then be held.

Moved in amendment by Mr. BRYDGES, seconded by Mr. L. H. DAVIDSON:

No lay Delegate shall represent more than one cure, and in the event of a dual election the secretary shall notify both the Incumbent and the Delegate in every case where such dual election had been made.

Moved in amendment by Rev. J. Empson, seconded by the DEAN:

That no lay Delegate, although representing one cure, shall vote more than once on any question, motion or amendment.

Rev. Mr. Empson's amendment was put and lost.

Mr. Brydges' motion was then put and carried.

APPENDIX A.

RURAL DEANERY OF HOCHELAGA.

ANNUAL REPORT, 1874-75.

My Lord,—The Deanery met in the Synod Hall on Monday, 14th June, at 4 o'clock.

Nineteen Incumbencies were represented by 19 Clergymen and ten Lay-

The following questions were submitted to the Deanery, and considered, yiz., "What is your opinion of the order of Synod that certain missions submit to a reduction in their grants of 10 per cent. from 1st July 1875?" The unanimous decision, after considerable discussion, was, that the measure is not expedient.

"What can be done to increase the income of the Mission Fund?"

It was replied, that, in the judgment of this Deanery the collection should be from house to house with more system and frequency.

"Have you received the full amount of the stipend for the past year?" The full amount, as a general thing, had been received.

"Is the property of the church in your incumbency insured?"

There is a too general neglect of this duty in the country; the following properties are not insured: the churches at Rawdon, Lacadie, Kildare, Terrebonne, and the parsonage at Rawdon.

Two deaths have occurred during the past year. The Reverend G. Slack, M.A., late incumbent of Bedford and Rural Dean of this Deanery, died on the 4th July last. The following resolution proves in what affectionate memory the Deanery holds his labors and worth.

"That in the death of the late Reverend George, Slack, M.A., first and for eleven years, Rural Dean of Bedford, this Ruri-decanal chapter desires to record its deep consciousness of the heavy loss both it and the Diocese at

large have sustained in the removal to his rest of one whose generous and sympathetic nature endeared him to his many friends, whose zeal and faithfulness during thirty-one years of indefatigable ministerial labor have made him second to none among the first missionaries of the Diocese, and whose piety and devotion to the cause of Christ and to the missionary work of his Church are eminently worthy of lasting remembrance.

"That the foregoing resolutions be recorded in the minutes, and that the secretary be instructed to communicate them to Mrs. Slack.

"That this Chapter desires to assure the bereaved widow and family of its heartfelt and prayerful sympathy under the great loss they have sustained."

The Reverend H. Caulfeild died on 10th December last, a few weeks after his induction as Rector of St. Johns. He gained in that time the esteem of his people, and gave the highest promise of usefulness to the Church.

The Deanery passed the following resolution.

"Resolved, That we desire to record our sense of the loss sustained by the Diocese in the sudden death of the late Reverend Hans Cauleild, and to express our sympathy with the members of his bereaved family in their affliction; and further that the Secretary be requested to forward to them a copy of this resolution."

By which it will appear that the total sum subscribed is \$8,605.60, and of this sum \$1,612.08 have been paid. In addition, the balance between the former sum, viz., \$8,605.60 and \$10,000, has been secured by the people of Dunham and others in the form of annual interest until the aforesaid \$10,000 required by the deanery resolution shall have been subscribed in full from other sources. The deed of land has been secured in the name of the Bishop, and a building, 45 x 90 with three stories above the basement, is now progressing towards completion. We commend this undertaking to the liberality of all who acknowledge the necessity of making some effort to compete with the convent system, and the duty of providing for the education of the daughters of the clergy who cannot afford to pay the sums demanded by private schools. To accomplish this, however, an endowment of \$25,000 will be required, and for this sum we now make an appeal which we hope will not be made in vain. This the more because as an endowed institution it will be the only one of its class within the limits of the colony. We acknowledge with gratitude the hearty approval of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, and the sanction given by the Clergy of the city of Montreal. We hope soon to have occasion to tender similar acknowledgments to the Laity generally throughout the city, and that all will take a practical interest in accomplishing a work whose primary objects are to secure positive instruction in the principles of our Reformed Church, and supply the educational wants of both clergy and laity at a more reasonable rate than is possible on a self-supporting basis.

REPORT OF THE DEANERY OF IBERVILLE.

ENDING JUNE 1st 1875.

My Lord,—I beg to report that there was a special meeting of the Deanery held on the 16th of December 1874, a report of which was by your Lordship's request submitted to the Executive Committee.

The regular Annual Meeting was held at Franklin on the 1st day of June inst., and there were present the Rev. Messrs. Davidson, Sutton, Allen and Hinde; and Messrs. Alfred Law, Robert Fulton, and George Rowe.

After Prayer, the various reports were canvassed, and it was found that Missic nary Meetings were held during the winter in all the parishes and missions with the exception of Lacolle.

The Missionary Meetings were decided upon as better to be held in the month of September.

No changes have taken place.

Sherrington with its church is still vacant.

Services have been kept up in all the Parishes and Missions, but three or four additional laborers are urgently required to strengthen what we have already done, and to extend our work, as we have now only six clergymen covering an extent of seventy miles.

This Deanery recommends that before reducing a grant to any Mission steps be taken to ascertain its ability to contribute, and that the reduc-

DEANERY OF ST. ANDREWS.

REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDING JUNE, 1875.

My Lord,—There are now 19 Missions in this Deanery, including the new Missions of Templeton and Papineauville and the German Mission.

The number of Clergymen is 17, Bristol being vacant, and Papineauville served by Mr. Cattermole, student and catechist, under the direction of

Portland is at present served by the Missionary of Templeton, the Rev. F. R. Smith, late of St. Augustine's College, Canterbury, under direction of the Rev. J. Rollit, of Buckingham. All the Missions are in receipt of foreign aid, and, from the circumstances of the people, the most of them will require it for some years to come, or be closed altogether. Shall the poverty of the people debar them from the ministrations of the Church?

The new Mission of Templeton is assisted by private contributions and at present not dependent on the Mission Fund.

Several new and promising fields yet remain to be occupied. If long neglected, they may be lost to the Church altogether.

Two ruri-decanal meetings were held during the past year.

The first meeting, held December 30th 1874, was called to take into consideration the recommendation of the Executive Committee as to proposed subscriptions to the Mission Fund, adopted at a meeting held November

The meeting, in the face of financial depression throughout the country, aggravated in the Ottawa valley by a light harvest in 1874, and stagnation in the lumber trade, cheerfully concurred in the recommendation of the Committee, excepting in the case of Hull, the amount proposed to be raised by that place being thought excessive. Missionary meetings were held throughout the Deanery, and strenuous efforts made to increase contributions to the Mission Fund. Some parishes succeeded in the attempt, though with great difficulty, others failed, because of the scarcity of money. Large contributions cannot reasonably be expected from people who were this

Mission reducspring without sufficient seed to put in the ground, without feed for their teams, without provisions for their families, and without money or the chance of earning it, as was the case in very many instances that might be named.

The second meeting was held on the 9th inst., and was attended by larger numbers of the Laity than usual.

The Resolution of the Executive Committee, passed at the meeting held May 12th, was taken into consideration. After careful discussion of its several clauses the following Resolutions were unanimously passed, viz:—

i. That this meeting considers that the action proposed by the Executive Committee would be most prejudicial to the true interests of the Diocese, and calculated to excite apprehension and distrust on the part of the Clergy upon whom alone the said Resolution would press; and would respectfully recommend that more systematic application to every member of the Church in the Diocese should be made, which would in all probability result in increasing the Mission Fund so as to meet all demands upon it, and that such Resolution should not be adopted by the Synod, but the matter left open for more mature consideration.

ii. That the mode for the payment of the Clergy in the Diocese of Quebec be adopted in this Diocese.

iii. That this meeting would respectfully call the attention of the Exceptive Committee, through the Bishop of the Diocese, to the advisability of remodelling the appointments to Missions so as to have several of the weaker Missions under the charge of a clergyman in Priest's Orders, assisted by a Deacon or Deacons, and thus reduce the expenditure on account of Missions.

iv. That this meeting having noticed with much surprise the large amount annually expended for printing is of opinion that a very considerable saving might hereafter be made in this particular, and the proceeds distributed for Missionary and other purposes much more useful to the Church in this Diocese.

In view of the possible confirmation of the Canon "respecting the Executive Committee" (Report of 15th Synod, page 510) before the election of the Executive Committee, the following persons were elected members of the Executive Committee by the Deanery, viz:—

The Ven. Archdeacon Lonsdell, the Rev. J. Rollit and Messrs. J. G. Bourinot and L. H. Davidson.

After disposing of such business as more immediately concerned the welfare of the Church in this Deanery, it was resolved unanimously:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE METROPOLITAN SUCCESSION,

APPOINTED TO CONFER WITH THE PROVINCIAL SYNOD.

Your Committee met twice to consider in what way they should meet the Provincial Synod; whether any terms of compromise could be offered, or if any new plan could be devised for the election of Metropolitan, which would still retain that office in connection with the Bishopric of Montreal.

The majority of your Committee felt that they had no authority to make any compromise, but that they should meet the Provincial Synod, and desire the continuance of the present arrangement, unless any plan could be suggested, which would change the mode of election without interfering with the position of Bishop of Montreal as Metropolitan.

The Provincial Synod appointed a most influential Committee with several of the Bishops upon it. Three meetings were held, without anything

The Provincial Synod Committee held that the power to make the change, was vested in them, whilst a majority of your Committee insisted that the office of Metropolitan was attached to the Bishopric of Montreal.

The conference therefore resulted in making no change in the determination of the Provincial Synod. That body confirmed the canon upon the succession to the Metropolitical See, of which notice had been given to this Diocese three years ago, and with reference to which your Committee

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

With the desire of ascerteining the state and prospect of Church Education in the Diocese, the Committee solicited information from the Clergy of every mission. They have only had answers from 23, and they most respectfully suggest to the Synod, that it should urge upon the Clergy the necessity of giving such information, which any committee appointed by the Synod may require.

The Committee finds (so far as they can ascertain) that there are several schools in connection with the Church, and possessing in the aggregate no inconsiderable amount of property.

The Colonial Church and School Society assists by grants of money 16 schools in the country, and the large school of St. George's Church, Montreal. Of these schools a full account will be found in the annual report of the Colonial Church and School Society. Your Committee fully endorse the sentiments of one of the Clergy regarding the operations of the Society: "That he feels a debt of gratitude for the valuable influence exercised by the Society in our country missions. The work of the society demands the warmest recognition on the part of the Diocese."

The Sub-Committee, of which the Rev. R.W. Norman was appointed Convener, requested Mr. L. H. Davidson, one of its members, to draw up a scheme for the establishment of a Ladies' School in Montreal or its neighbourhood in connection with the Church of England. This document, a very important one, is not yet completed.

DEANERY OF BEDFORD.

The schools in connexion with Sabrevois College have occupied an important place in Education, and have been much sought, both for their educational and religious advantages.

Sweetsburg, West Farnham and Knowlton have also schools and buildings belonging to the Church. Knowlton has in addition an endowment amounting to \$700.

In Granby, there is a legacy of the late J. Wetherby, Esq., of \$300 on behalf of a Church school to be established in that village. It is invested until opportunity offers to carry out the pious wishes of the donor.

The Deanery school for girls is in process of erection, a full report of which is given by the Deanery meeting to this Synod. It will mark an era in the Church Education of this Diocese, and your Committee trusts to supply the means of giving superior educations to girls, who, from reasons of expense and otherwise, have been induced to attend Convent schools.

DEANERY OF ST. ANDREWS.

Mille Isles, Aylwin, Alleyne, Thorne, so far as your Committee can gather, are all the Church schools in this Diocese.

They would recommend, with the view of this subject taking its proper place in the deliberations of Synod, that an Inspector of schools professing to be Church schools should be appointed, whose annual report to the Synod would prove what was really being done, and lead the benevolence of our Church members in a direction which it has already proved its willingness to follow. The properties in possession of the Church schools at St. George's, Montreal, Berthier, Sabrevois, West Farnham, Knowlton, Sweetsburg, the Deanery school at Bedford, as well as the endowment at Granby, have all been provided by the voluntary gifts of those interested in the work of education. This most promising field of Church work deserves the greatest care, and your Committee feel assured that if it can only obtain its proper recognition in the deliberation of the Synod, the means of receiving sound and Christian training will be brought within the reach of every member of the Church.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The Committee on Foreign Missions beg to report that they regard with thankfulness the quiet yet increasing growth of interest taken by the diocese in Foreign Missions.

Amid the difficulties by which we are surrounded in our Home Mission work, and partly by the reduction of the Propagation Society's grants, partly from the difficulty of maintaining Missions in places where the Protestant population is diminishing, and partly from the great demand for more Missions in all parts of the Diocese, it would at first sight appear unwise to talk about Foreign Missions in face of the fact of our inability to support our Home work.

Your Committee, whilst conscious of all these facts, is deeply convinced that the true success of Missions depends upon obedience to our Lord's words, "the field is the world." The distinction between Home and Foreign Missions, however convenient as shewing Diocesan Mission work as separate from Mission work outside the Diocese, yet it must be borne in mind that it is an artificial distinction. If too much insisted upon to the exclusion of the latter it tends to narrow the character of the Church. Christian people are endowed with various gifts. To some is given a peculiar interest in Foreign Missions, neglecting the development of which is a loss to the strength of the Church.

To awaken a greater interest in the work of Missions your Committee would recommend the holding of quarterly Missionary Meetings in each Parish for the purpose of giving information, when, by the aid of maps, the Mission work of our own Diocese, the Mission work of Algoma, and the great North West of this Dominion of Canada, and the Mission work of heathen lands could be made intelligible to our people.

Your Committee is deeply convinced that the more the members of our Church are interested in the great work in which the Church of England is engaged in all parts of the world, the zeal and devotedness of those engaged in it, the greater will be our interest in our Home work, the more will our Missions be disposed to help themselves.

Your Committee would recommend the concentration of the efforts which are now being made for Foreign Mission work, so as to enable the Diocese to send forth a Missionary into heathen lands whenever one shall arise amongst us whose heart prompts him to go forward into this great work.

In recommending this we leave it simply to the offerings of those who feel a special interest in this work.

By the circulation of Missionary intelligence the members of the Church will be prepared intelligently to realize the privilege of increased gifts for Mission work, and to extend the great work of mercy to the world which our Lord has committed to the love of His people to proclaim.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON LAY AGENCY IN MISSIONS.

The Committee on the Lay Agency in Missions desire to express their gratitude to His Lordship, the Bishop, for his Pastoral on this subject issued during the past year.

Your Committee regret to find in the small number of Lay Readers at present employed in this Diocese, an indication that this office is not yet generally held in the high estimation to which it is justly entitled, and they respectfully urge the Reverend Clergy to bring the subject frequently before their Congregations, with a view to the removal of existing prejudices and the more general adoption of a branch of Lay Agency, which has proved in many cases of signal value.

Your Committee have noticed with pleasure the establishment in some of our rural parishes of Young Men's Associations in connection with the Church. They are persuaded that these organizations may be made exceedingly useful, especially where they are so conducted as to enlist the active services of their members in works of mercy and piety.

Lastly, your Committee have to re uest that the sphere of their enquiries be extended so as to include the city parishes as well as the rural missions, and that some of the city clergy be added to the number.

They have also inserted a resolution on the subject of patronage of Rectories, passed at a General Meeting of the Church Society, held on the 5th Oct., 1852; a resolution which appears to be the Canon that has hitherto regulated the procedure of the Church on that point.

2. The following amendment remains to receive confirmation:

That all the words after "with" in the canon on "Representation to Provincial Synod" be struck out, and the following inserted in lieu thereof: "Seventeen others of each order to be elected by ballot at each Annual Meeting the Synod. The first eleven receiving the highest number of votes shall be the delegates; and the next six highest following in order shall be the substitutes—to attend the Provincial Synod whenever from sickness or other cause the delegates shall be unable to attend the Provin-

3. The Committee recommend, in regard to the Canon confirmed last Synod, on the subject of a Special Offertory for Widows and Orphans, that the words "that a Committee be appointed," &c., be struck out, and the following substituted: "that it shall be the duty of the Secretary to give notice of such Special Offertory to the churches or stations of the Diocese."

4. The Committee recommend that in section 5th, of the article "Widows and Orphans' Fund," the sentence beginning "one quarter's salary" be struck out, and the following substituted, "one quarter's salary shall be granted to the family of a deceased clergyman from any funds controlled by the Synod, but such grant to be confined to those clergymen whose salary has been paid from any funds of which the Synod had the control and was the almoner, and dating from the expiration of the quarter in which the decease occurs; and the stated pension to the widow of children shall begin from the expiration of such quarterly payment and shall continue as long as the widow shall remain unmarried.

5. In Section 5th of article Widows and Orphans' Fund the sum of/50 pounds currency requires to be changed for two hundred and forty dollars

6. The Committee recommend that the time of the payments ordered in Section 5 of the said article be quarterly instead of half-yearly.

7. The Committee recommend that in Section 5th of the said article, the words "regarding such Fund" be substituted for the words "respecting the funds of the Synod."

8. The Committee recommend that in section 9th of the said article, that the words "when required" shall be inserted between the words "shall" and "be attested."

9. The Committee recommend that section 10 of the said article be struck

10. The Committee recommend that in section 12 of the said article the word "and" after the word "simply" be struck out.

11. The Committee recommend that sections 1, 2, 3, 4, of the article Organization of Parishes be struck out, and that under the title-Organization of Parishes, the following sections be retained and in the following order and form.

ORGANIZATION OF PARISHES,

i. When any of the parishioners residing in any Parish or in any adjoining Parishes shall desire to have a new and distinct Parish erected, the said parishioners shall present a memorial to the Lord Bishop, stating fully the reasons moving them thereto, also the proposed boundaries of the contemplated new Parish, and whether the Incumbent or Incumbents of the Parish or Parishes aforesaid be a consenting party or parties.

ii. That the Bishop, on receipt of such memorial, shall refer the same to the Incumbent or Incumbents of the existing Parish or Parishes, and if he or they withhold his or their consent from such memorial, then he (r they

iii. When the Bishop of the Diocese shall be satisfied that the provisions of the XIXth section of the Church Temporalities Act have been complied with, and that the means for the worship of God have been provided, and when, further, he shall have referred the said memorial to the Clergy and Church-wardens of the Rural Deanery within which the proposed new Parish is situated, for their opinion respecting the same, his Lordship may declare the said portion of the Parish or Parishes to be a new Parish.

iv. That in any and every case where it is proposed to establish a new Mission, situate within any existing Rural Deanery, the proposal for the erection of such new Mission shall be submitted to the Clergy and Churchwardens of the said Rural Deanery for their counsel and advice.

v. That the boundaries of every Parish or Mission erected under authority of this Canon, as well as of every existing Parish or Mission, be entered in a book, to be kept by the Secretaries of the Synod for that purpose, and that a copy thereof be furnished to any person applying for it, on the payment of a fee of one sh.lling.

vi. That all repairs and dilapidations of Church property shall be defrayed by each Parish individually.

12. In regard to the motion on the subject of Dual Representation referred to this Committee, the following resolution was passed in it: That this Committee cannot recommend the adoption of the motion as "Dual Representation," but suggest that the objection as to more than one vote being cast by any one member of the Synod, can be met by enacting simply "that no lay delegate, although representing more than one cure shall vote more than once on any question, motion or amendment."

15. The Committee recommend that in the reports of the Synod and in"the Constitution and Rules and Regulations of the Synod," that instead
of "Secretary," the plural "Secretaries" be employed.

SHORT REPORTS FROM PARISHES AND MISSIONS.

AYLMER AND CHELSEA.

The village of Chelsea now forms part of the new mission of Chelsea, Templeton and Portland. This separation, while it will be a gain to Chelsea—giving it a resident missionary, more frequent services, &c.,—will, in a financial sense, be a loss to the parish of Aylmer, which looked to Chelsea for a good part of the stipend of the clergyman of the united parishes. How the deficiency will, in future, be made up, is at present hard to say.

While the parish of Aylmer is an old one, it is not one that has been increasing in a Church population. Twenty years ago there were nearly three times as many Church members as there are now, and still, owing to removals, the number is decreasing. When the present Incumbent first took charge of the parish, 8 years ago, the average Sunday congregation was 80, now, at the most, it is only 50. If the Mission grant is reduced, it will be impossible for the clergyman to remain. There are, at present, twenty subscribers to stipend list, who make up in all \$400 per annum. (Of these, three are not members of the Church of England, and only occasional attendants.) They are not rich, and in the present depressed state of business

are hardly likely to do more; indeed, it is to be feared, will not, next year, be able to raise as much. If Mr. Brydges' resolutions respecting the reduction of mission grants become law, it will be necessary either to close this parish or else join it to Hull or Eardley; for however anxious the Executive Committee may be to economize its funds, it will scarcely allow a violation of the Diocesan Canon, which requires that all priests above 10 years standing should have a salary of at least \$700 per annum, or if

In all other respects the parish, thank God, is, on the whole, in a good condition. Considering the smallness of the numbers of Church families this parish raises more for Church purposes than, perhaps, any other in the diocese. The people are kind and considerate to their clergyman, and the utmost harmony and good feeling have prevailed.

During last year the church has been repaired, and re-shingled, and the parsonage has been clap-boarded at the east end.

AYLWIN.

This Mission is passing through, in common with all lumber districts, hard times, judged from a monetary point of view. Nevertheless we thank God that He has led the people to do towards their church and minister as they have done before. The Missionary can say this in behalf of many, if not all, that they have subscribed this year to the various objects especially to the minister's stipend, by a self-denying effort. In some cases the subscribers were notable to pay anything at the tine, hoping, however, to do so before long. The people have made a good effort at raising money for the Mission Fund. The Missionary deputation, that held a meeting here during the coldest part of last winter, saw a very good gathering for the place and time—the time being night, and the weather much below zero. The meeting was enjoyed by the people, and gave an opportunity to organize a band of collectors, by whom, along with certain sums raised after sermons in church, we have been enabled to send a sum to the Executive Committee much in excess of the sum apportioned to us to raise. But in saying this, we hope the Committee will not increase the sum, on the supposition that we can always raise the like amount. In Alleyne, the "House of Prayer" has been lengthened by an addition which furnishes a vestry room, vestibule and wood room, all of which can be thrown open, one to the other, furnishing thereby a capacious room suitable to a class and business room. The bell presented by the Senior Churchwarden has been put in its place. The whole building is being painted within and without. Towards all this the members have contributed very liberally. To show how difficult it is to carry out the services of the Church in a country mission we may instance the following: Services in Alleyne were entirely suspended, on account of snow storms from Septuagesima until Palm Sunday. In Aylwin there were three Sundays, following each other at short intervals, whereon services were not held. On two of them, the people of the country were attending a funeral; on the other the roads

During the season of Lent an attempt was made towards its observance by week-night lectures and Holy Week services and meditations. The state of the roads and the coldness of the nights made us suspend the lectures, and during Holy Week, though there was every night of the earlier part a fair attendance, some having to travel four miles to the Church, the attendance was prevented on the part of some on account of the bush being infested by wolves whose yells were startlingly close to some of the young people returning home. Under these untoward circumstances, one had to consider the attendance of even five or six persons as satisfactory.

The day schools, fostered by the Continental Church and School Society, are now three in number with about fifty children, who are receiving an education which in all probability they would otherwise have to remain without.

BEDFORD.

In presenting my report for the year ending Easter 1875, I have to acknowledge with thankfulness to Almighty God that with unimpaired health I have been able to prosecute my public duties with scarcely any interruption.

I have held Divine Service regularly on the morning and evening of Sunday in the Parish Church, and in the afternoon at the Bockus School Room. Also the church has been open for service on holy days and on Friday evenings during the seasons of Advent and Lent.

I have been permitted to receive twenty-two in Holy Baptism, six of whom were adults.

Fifteen candidates were presented to the Bishop for the Sacred Rite of Confirmation; I earnestly trust that they in whom I feel such a true interest will ever remain faithful to their vows.

The Holy Communion has been celebrated on the first Sunday in every month and on the greater festivals, the number of Communicants being creditable. I have officiated at eleven funerals, and it is with feelings of deep regret that I have to place on record the deaths of Galloway Freligh, Esq., and Mrs. Coslett, whose influence and example I had hoped would for a longer time have conduced to the well-being of our Parish, but we may indeed rejoice that they died in the Lord and now rest from their labours.

I cannot speak too highly of the frequent and liberal entertainments which our Parish has this year given; the Induction dinner was as a cordial welcome to the Bishop and my Reverend Brethren who kindly came to wish me Godspeed in my new cure.

A Sunday School Pic-nic on Mr. Richard Alcombrack's grounds was thoroughly enjoyed by the children.

The Harvest Home Festival was a brilliant success, by which we were enabled to discharge the long pending debt of \$70 on the Organ to Richard Dickenson, Esquire.

BOLTON.

Rev. F. H. CLAYTON reports:

It is with much gratitude to Almighty God I submit the following report for the past year:

As a whole I feel the people have done according to their means, yet, as is everywhere the case, a few are to be found who plead poverty to avoid giving towards God's work, forgetting even the widow's mite, whilst others who are as poor or poorer, and involved in debt, forget not their duty towards God, and lay by the golden mite, scorning to sacrifice to God of that which costs them nothing.

But from a worldly standpoint, however, much cannot be expected from this parish for some time to come, many are heavily involved in debt, and have much to contend with. Yet, as may be seen, the parish has done well, our ladies have worked hard in response to the treasurer's appeal for the Mission Fund, and the people in general for the clergyman.

An extra one hundred collars was raised in the past year to prevent my leaving, as the mission failed by about three hundred dollars to pay me my stipend the first three years. But with the kind assistance of our Rural Dean, the Rev. D. Lindsay, and the good-will and feeling manifested by the people, the amount mentioned was spiritedly subscribed and paid. We also received much kindness and gifts at Christmas and other times.

Our church in course of erection at Bolton Centre is a considerable strain upon that portion of the parish, as nearly all have done their share promptly and spiritedly. Yet we are in great need of means to complete it, even after the plainest and cheapest manner, and make an earnest appeal for help to the friends of mission work, who have the means, and are themselves blessed with the luxury of a sacred place wherein to wor ship.

Our parsonage is in sad need of repair before the fall rains and winter snows set in, but means are wanting.

There is, I am happy to say, a marked improvement, as regards the dignity and tope displayed in the worship of Almighty God, and its main tenance in the Mission. Much, however, depends upon our church-wardens and save in one or two instances, I have much to be thankful for in this respect, as much energy, liberality and zeal have been manifested by these officers, which strengthens much the hands and heart of the incumbent, making his position a happy one, and his labours pleasant and profitable.

BOSCOBEL.

My seven months Incumbency of this Mission has been sufficient to convince me that an important and interesting portion of the Diocese has been assigned me.

The Church members of the Mission, as a body, have but little means, and consequently cannot contribute largely towards my stipend or to Church funds generally; yet I cannot refrain from stating that they have given evidence in their increased subscription towards my stipend and especially to the Mission fund, of a disposition not to lean upon external add for a larger sum than is needful. Although I have been able to carry on the Church services in Boscobel uninterruptedly, I regret to say I have been prevented doing so as regards North Ely and North Stukely during the winter, owing to the badness of the roads; but Mr. Wm. L. Davidson (Warden and Lay Reader) has willingly rendered services on such occasions at the former place. I am very glad to testify that the churchwardens of both churches faithfully and cheerfully perform the duties involved in their office.

Since my appointment to the Mission, Church improvements of the following nature have been made, viz.: at Boscobel matting has been placed up the aisle, the gift of W. Hackwell, Esq., and all Saints Church, North Ely, has been painted inside and a new chancel railing made, the united cost being \$77.92, which has been defrayed (except a balance of \$8.00) partly by a Pic-nic and partly by local subscription.

I acknowledge with gratitude the gift of \$37.00 from some unknown friend and well wisher of the Church, as an Easter Offering, accompanied with the request to devote half to Boscobel church, and the other half for myself.

It affords me much pleasure to state the hearty way in which the people are seconding my efforts to bring the glebe into profitable cultivation.

In the death of Mrs. Joseph Hackwell the Mission has lost a firm and devoted member of the Church. A short time prior to her decease she presented a Communion Service for use in St. John's Church, Boscobel.

There has been for several years a pressing need for an additional Missionary in this truly Missionary portion of the Diocese, a view which,

BRISTOL.

Rev. George Allan reports;

During the time covered by this Report the following number of Sunday services have been held, viz., at St. Luke's, 18; Bristol Corner, 19; Clarendon Front, 17; 54 in all. In addition we had a service in St. Luke's when the Bishop visited the Mission; and I also had service on Thanksgiving Day at St. Luke's, and at St. Luke's and Bristol Corner on Christmas Day;

During the summer His Lordship consecrated St. Luke's Church, and X confirmed five persons. One person from the Mission was confirmed in St.

Owing to the difficulty of getting a suitable man to put up the frame, we were not able to carry out our wish in regard to the church at Bristol Corner. But as the contract has now been given out, and the work is being rapidly pushed forward, we hope soon to have it in a condition to use.

I deeply regret that my hopes as to the making up the full amount of the stipend required from the Mission, \$100.00, have not been realized. The Mission, partly owing to the great failure of the harvest, is again very much in arrears. This year not more than half the required amount will, I am afraid, be made up; if so much. Not having in as yet all my lists I cannot, of course, speak positively on this point. Judging, however, from what I have already received, I have every reason to believe that the very utmost will only be half the required amount. Of the amount subscribed for last year, \$44.90, \$10.00 have never been paid in. The contributions to other Church purposes, owing to the great scarcity of money this year in this section of the country, have fallen off.

Finding it impossible to live and keep a horse on what I was receiving, I laid the deficiency of the Mission before the Bishop. His Lordship thought it would be better to withdraw me from the Mission, and so I am only able X to report up to March 31st.

CLARENCEVILLE,

INCLUDING THE PARISHES OF ST. GEORGE AND ST. THOMAS.

Although my health has been rather feeble during the greater portion of the past year, yet I am thankful to say that I have been able to carry on the regular Sunday services, with but two or three exceptions, when my place was kindly supplied by Reverend Messrs. Lewis and E. Roy.

At the Easter Vestry meeting of St. George's church the proprietors of

pews all consented, with one exception, to relinquish their rights. A resolution was also passed to the effect, that hereafter the stipend of the Clergyman should be raised by proceeds of pew rents instead of by subscription as heretofore. A similar resolution was passed at St. Thomas Church.

The amount raised this year for the Mission Fund falls a little short of the assessment levied by the Executive Committee, which is not surprising when it is considered that the assessment was first made when the Parish was receiving a large amount of extraneous aid, but has since become self-sustaining. The sums contributed for local church improvements amount to \$700.

The Ladies Church Aid Association both here and St. Thomas have done a good work.

CLARENDON.

A correct record of this Parish during the past year must be a mixed one—light and shade blended together. The walls of a stone Church were put up last summer, but owing to the light harvest of 1874, and general financial depression, people cannot pay instalments due on their subscriptions and the work is at a stand still. There is also a falling off in contributions to general Church purposes, from the same cause.

The Bishop visited the Parish in August last, accompanied by the Dean of Montreal and the Ven. Archdeacon Lonsdell. Twenty-eight persons were confirmed, twenty-seven of whom joined in Holy Communion the same day.

We gratefully acknowledge the gift of \$50 from J. J. Gibb, of Montreal, towards our new Church, also \$61 collected in Ottawa by Mr. J. Shaw towards the same object.

The thanks of the Clergyman are due to the congregation for hiberal donations of oats and fuel, and for other substantial tokens of kindly feelings.

GRANBY.

The Missionary at Granby reports that owing to the valuable exertions of the Wardens at both Churches during the past year, cheerfully responded to by their respective congregations, we have been enabled to remit to the Treasurer of the Synod for the general missionary work of the Diocese:

become valuable, though I did not expect it to become so remunerative for many years to come. I therefore advised that a new site should be purchased for the location of the present church, after the old one had been burned. Thus has been secured to this parish a permanent endowment. Had the present church been erected on the old site we should never have derived any income from it. The seventy-two dollars which I receive from the sale of the Glebe on the Aylmer and Hull Road is really but the interest on the twelve hundred dollars that I contributed towards that Glebe when I sold it to the late Bishop for £280. I did this on the assurance that I should derive the entire proceeds of that lot so long as I remained either in Hull or Aylmer. The value of the lot was £600, and as soon as it was decided that we would not build on it I sold it for the Bishop to Judge Lafontaine

I find that it is just as hard to live upon the income I get here from the church as it would be were I living in Montreal, and that I can just make ends meet, and it is indeed a merciful provision of Divine Providence that I was enabled to secure these endowments for the Church here.

The number of Church people living in Hull is as yetsmall. Two-thirds of the congregation live outside the limits of the parish, but I trust that those around us who have always been hostile to the Church are gradually being drawn towards her.

Oh that the God of Love would bring all His worshippers together in the true unity of the Spirit, that they might indeed be one in Him under one living Head, the Blessed Redeemer who died for all!

LILDARE AND DE RAMSEY.

A long-felt want was been met, in the fitting up of the School House at De Ramsey as a Mission Church and School; it is now provided with pews, vestry and a substantial porch. The Cemetery adjoining has been neatly fenced and planted. This work has been effected chiefly through the untiring efforts of Mr. Leonard Read, who is ever ready to promote the interests of the Church, Sunday and Day schools, and to whom we owe our

A further movement is being made to provide a melodeon, to take the place of the one which hitherto has been kindly lent by Mrs. Read for the Church Service. This, together with the painting of the church, now much required, we hope to effect this year, with the Divine blessing.

Further progress in our Temperance Association work was made during the past winter; at the Annual Meeting held at Kildare and De Ramsey, an accession was made to our numbers, the members now being about 100. Rev. Mr. McManus, Principal of the Grammar School, Berthier, kindly and

The Missionary acknowledges with much thankfulness, the gift of a valuable fur coat and gauntlets, which the people of Kildare, De Ramsey and Joliette kindly presented to him.

LACOLLE.

The Rev. A. D. LOCKHART reports:-

I am thankful to be able to say that through the Divine blessing our services here have been regularly kept up during the past year. During Lent I held a Friday evening service in the Church more especially for the young, which was well attended, there being an average congregation of 43. I have to acknowledge a very kind and serviceable present from the members of my congregation during the past winter of a very valuable pair of buffalo robes handsomely lined and trimmed.

I am also happy to be able to state that the people have paid yearly the sum which they agreed to raise for the Clergyman's stipend, with the exception of a small amount for the present year, which the Church-wardens expect to receive in a few days.

MILLE ISLES.

Services have been maintained in the churches at Mille Isles and Morin, and also in a school room at Cherry Valley. These have been pretty well attended, especially at Mille Isles and Cherry Valley. Sunday schools were maintained during the summer in both churches. It is found impracticable to keep them up in winter on account of the scattered nature of the settlements and the badness of the roads.

The congregation at Millian Isles have during the year erected a substantial board fence around the church yard; they have also given out a contract for the erection of a shed for the accommodation of horses at the church. The greater part of the amount required for this purpose has been subscribed in the Mission. We felt the need of such a building during the severe weather of last winter very much.

MONTREAL.

St. Thomas Church, left vacant by the retirement of the Rev. J. A McLeod, after occupying the Incumbency for the period of nine years, is now temporarily supplied by the Rev. George Sydenham. The Incumbent has much pleasure in reporting, at Mansonville, a decided increase in the number attending the services and the Holy Com-

At the out-stations, the services have been unfortunately very much interrupted during the winter, owing to the severe snew storms. The feeling of antipathy to the Church seems, however, to be weakening, and a growing interest springing up in her services. We cannot look for very

much from the older members—their habits are too strongly formed to be changed. Our strength lies in the younger generation, and our efforts must be, as speedily as possible, to get them interested.

Thus far, no pecuniary aid has been derived from the out-stations. This should be taken into consideration in estimating what has been done in the Mission.

The effort to build a barn and an addition to the parsonage and fence in the garden has at length been brought to a successful termination. This has been a heavy tax upon the people, and in consequence the subscriptions to other objects have been somewhat diminished. It is hoped, however, that, through the blessing of God, the present year may witness a decided improvement in the amount subscribed to the Mission Fund.

The Incumbent desires to take this opportunity of publicly thanking kind friends in Montreal and in the country for the cordial and liberal manner in which they responded to his appeal for help to enable the building to be carried on.

That having been enfeebled during the past year by frequent attacks of illness, he has gratefully to acknowledge the brotherly help, from time to time, promptly given to him by the Very Reverend The Dean, and the Reverend Messrs. Seaborn, McManus, W. C. Merrick, Empson, A. A. Allen, and A. L. Fortin. And having been finally ordered, by medical advice, to absent himself from his Parish, the Reverend A. L. Fortin was engaged by him, with the Bishop's consent, to undertake its charge, and has since, with God's good hand upon him, diligently discharged his Pastoral duties, and with such acceptance, that the people presented him this spring with a purse of upwards of \$130. Mr. Fortin has also, with the Bishop's approval, and with the Rector's consent, frequently conducted the services of the Church in French, and speaking the truth in love, his preaching has been willingly, and it is hoped profitably, received by those of our brethren of French origin who have heard him.

infectious disease, but, as the accompanying Parochial Returns will shew, with no diminution of interest in the various fields of Christian love and labour, whether at home or abroad.

The contributions of the Parish to the Mission Fund of the Diocese have gone, as they did last year, beyond the required amount, whilst Missions to the Jew, to the Heathen, to Sabrevois, and to the distant parts of our own Dominion, as well as to some of the great City Institutions of general benevolence, have all received their share of help. Local requirements have at the same time, by some generous donors, been liberally aided, notably as often before, by large-hearted and liberal-handed Christian women. In addition to one who has long been the constant benefactress of the little church at Sorel, God has put it into the heart of yet another Christian woman, a stranger and unsolicited, to contribute of her abundance towards the service of the Lord. Mrs. Phelps, wife of a well known and worthy missionary, late of this Diocese, presented the Parish last summer with the liberal donation of \$300, towards the re-covering, with galvanized iron, of the church roof, both as a willing tribute of love to Him who had given her wealth, and also as a token of affectionate regard for the birthplace and for the former church of a deceased and much venerated parent. The amount thus far collected for this special purpose has been deposited by the Church-warden in the Bank, until the full sum required is realized, as it has been determined not to incur any debt in its accomplishment. If some of the parishioners who have kindly promised subscriptions would only pay up the amount they have promised, and others, who have not yet subscribed, would according to their ability emulate the example of their brethren, the work would speedily be finished, a work it may be observed the more to be desired, as many internal improvements, which are badly needed, are necessarily suspended until outward protec-

Votes of thanks were unanimously accorded, at the adjourned Annual Easter meeting of the Congregation, to H. Brewer, Esq., manager of the Molsons Bank at Sorel, for his very effective services, in gratuitously presiding at the organ and directing the choir during the past year, and also to J. C. Griffin, Esq., N. P., of Montreal, for notarial services kindly rendered to the church, without charge; and further, to Strachan Bethune, Esq., Q.C., and Chancellor of the Diocese, for valuable professional services, unsparingly given, as often before, during many years continuance, and as usual free of all charge. Mr. Bethune indeed has placed the Parish, and it is believed the Diocese, under obligations of this character, which it would be difficult, if not impossible, in money value to repay.

Giving to God the glory for all the tokens of His favour in the past, we go on hopefully to the future, "thanking God and taking courage."

SOUTH STUKELY.

Rev. J. W. GARLAND reports:

I was appointed to the charge of this Mission on the 1st of October last. I have been keeping up services in four different places, viz., St. Matthew's

Church, South Stukely; The Mines in Bolton, Bolton Forest and Parker schoolhouse. At the latter place I succeeded in gathering about twenty children together, and starting a Sunday school. Mr. Handyside has rendered me much help in taking charge of it.

On my first visiting some families who are not connected with any Christian denomination, I found them very badly informed about our Church. I commenced a regular course of visiting among them, distributing tracts, and talking to each member of the family personally, on the subject of his soul's salvation. At first my hearers seemed to listen with inattention and indifference, but as we became better acquainted, they became more interested, and there is now every prospect of a good work being done among them, some already having given themselves to the Lord in Baptism.

Within the past year a bell, purchased during the incumbency of Mr. Holmes, was mounted on the tower of St. Matthew's Church with some fixing to protect it; a shed was erected, but not finished, and the Ladies Sewing circle expended about \$21.50 on the comforts of the Parsonage.

A Christmas tree was got up for the children of St. Matthew's Church Sunday School, when myself and wife received some nice presents. This Sunday School was commenced under many discouragements, but through the efforts of Mr. Day and Miss Marinda E. Knowlton the number of scholars has greatly increased. Mr. R. F. Elliott has also rendered good help. My Church-wardens, Wm. K. Knowlton and R. A. Savage, have shown more than Christian zeal in the work of the Church.

On the 22nd of May the ladies of the Parish presented Mrs. Garland with an excellent baby carriage, Mrs. Lawrence and Mrs. C. A. Goddard taking the lead in the presentation, and shortly before that, Mr. J. A. Savage presented her with a nice chair.

STANBRIDGE EAST.

Rev. J. Constantine reports:

I have nothing special to report this year in the way of material work or expenditure. In other matters we have had a quiet, but not unprogressive, year, with good Sunday, and occasional week-day, congregations. Next year we hope to chronicle some further progress. For some time I have felt it desirable to increase the number of our Communions, and the beginning of 1875 gave me the opportunity. We have now bi-monthly Communion, besides the special Communion on Xmas Day, Easter Day, and Whitsunday. Ordinary services thrice on Sundays; morning service on the greater festivals, and daily evening prayer during summer. Our Sunday School continues to do well.

ST. VINCENT DE PAUL.

Rev. JOHN ALLAN reports:

risoners astances have compelled the relinquishment of the Sunday School which was commenced more than a year ago, nor will it be advisable to re-open the same unless there be a larger number of Protestant officials than have yet been engaged here.

In addition to the usual services in the Penitentiary Chapel, I for some months conducted an evening service in private houses. They were numerously attended, and well and thankfully appreciated, but these, I regret to say, have also had to be relinquished.

TERREBONNE.

The services on Sunday mornings have been held regularly, with two or three exceptions caused by storms or unfit roads. They have been exceedingly well attended, better than ever before, and the attendance at Holy Communion is very satisfactory.

I have much pleasure in mentioning that the Day School is presided over by a gentleman who for many years conducted the School at New Glasgow with the highest success. There is only one drawback to this, which is, the excellent and efficient teacher is worthy of many times the remuneration which can be raised for him here. Such men as he ought to be held in honour, and a suitable maintenance be provided for their declining years.

The Sunday School is in a very satisfactory condition, and conducted by zealous and painstaking teachers. I have, however, strongly recommended the attendance of the children at Church, so that the Sunday School may not be substituted for the worship of God in His holy temple.

CONSTITUTION, RULES AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF MONTREAL.

DECLARATION.

We, the Bishop, the Clergy and the Laity of the United Church of England and Ireland, within the Diocese of Montreal assembled in Synod, and intending, under God's blessing and guidance, to consider and determine upon such matters as shall appear necessary for the welfare of the Church in this Diocese, desire, in the first place, for the avoiding of all misunderstanding, to make declaration of the principles upon which we propose to proceed.

We desire that the Church in this Diocese shall continue as it has been, an integral portion of the United Church of England and Ireland; and we declare our firm and unanimous resolution, in dependence on Divine aid, to preserve those doctrines, and that form of Church government, which are at present recognized by the Church of England and Ireland.

It is our earnest wish and determination to confine our deliberations and actions to matters of discipline, to the temporalities of the Church, and to such regulations of order as may tend to her efficiency and extension; and we desire no control or authority over any but those who are or shall be members of our own Church.

CONSTITUTION.

1. The Synod shall consist of the Bishop of the Diocese, of the Clergy of the same, licensed to the cure of souls therein, or holding office in any church, college or school under the jurisdiction of the Bishop (such Clergy not being under ecclesiastical censure), and of Lay representatives, to be elected as hereinafter provided.

2. The Lay representatives shall be male communicants of at least one year's standing, of the full age of twenty-one years, and shall be elected annually at the Easter meetings, or at any Vestry meeting (specially called for such purpose by Incumbents, after due notice on two Sundays), held by each Minister having a separate cure of souls; and all Laymen within the cure, of twenty-one years or upwards, entitled within such cure to vote at Vestry meetings, or who hold pews or sittings in the Church, though not entitled so to vote, who shall have declared themselves in writing to

be "Members of the United Church of England and Ireland, and to belong to no other religious denomination," shall have the rights of voting at the election.

3. The Minister himself, if present, shall preside at the election; and in his absence, the Curate or assistant Minister, or the Senior Church-warden, or a Chairman elected by the majority of those present, taking precedence

in the order in which they are here named.

4. Every separate cure served by a licersed Minister shall be entitled to elect two Lay representatives; but when there shall be two or more congregations, having a corresponding number of church edifices, within one cure, then each of such congregations shall be entitled to elect two representatives.

5. The following certificate, signed by the Chairman of the meeting shall be transmitted to the Lay Secretary within 15 days after such election, whose certified list of Delegates prepared from such certificates, shall be considered sufficient proof of such election, and such Lay delegate shall

continue in office until his successor is appointed:

6. In case of the election of any one as lay delegate, who does not reside within the cure, or of whose status or qualification the chairman be personally ignorant, or in doubt, the minister, curate or chairman of the eeting, shall not grant the foregoing certificate until proof of the qualification (as required by Art. 2 of the Constitution) of the said delegate so elected shall have been produced, which proof shall consist of an extract from the Register of Communicants required to be kept in every Parish or Charge, said extract certified by the Incumbent or Curate in charge. This proof shall be furnished by the delegate elect within twenty days after election, notice of which shall be at once forwarded to such delegate elect, and if not so furnished a new election shall be had forthwith.

7. If a vacancy should occur in the number of representatives, by death, resignation, or any other cause, the Minister shall proceed to hold a new election with as little delay as possible, after due notice.

10. When the Bishop is not present, his Commissary shall preside in his place; and when the See is vacant, the senior Dignitary of the Church, next in rank to the Bishop, in the Diocese, shall, within a fortnight of the cccurrence of such vacancy, summon a Synod to be held in not less than thirty days, to elect a successor to the See, at which he shall preside and at such meeting no business except such election shall be proceeded with.

11. A quorum of the Synod shall consist of no less than twenty-five Lay and fifteen Clerical Delegates.

12. There shall be two Secretaries, one from the Clergy, the other from the Laity, who shall keep regular minutes of all proceedings of the Synod, shall record them in a book provided for that purpose, shall preserve all proceedings, and other documents, shall certify the public acts of the Synod, and shall deliver all records and documents, to their successors; and give notice to each Minister and Vestry of the time and place appointed for any stated or special meetings of the Synod; this notice to be given at least three weeks before such meeting. The rate of salary to be paid to the Secretary shall be settled and determined by the Executive Committee.

The Secretary shall also perform the duties and receive the fees connected with the office of Registrar of the Diocese, viz., keep a record of all Church properties and moneys in different parishes, and of all the changes that from time to time take place, and a certified copy of every deed and deeds of consecration, and boundaries of parishes, and every acquisition of property shall be sent to him by the Rural Deans. He shall be entitled to receive a fee of \$1 for the registration of each document, and 50 cents for every copy of the same. The boundaries of every parish or mission erected, under authority of the Canon, as well as of every existing parish or mission shall be entered in a book, to be kept by the Secretaries of Synod for that purpose, and a copy thereof shall be furnished to any person applying for it on the payment of a fee of one shilling.

13. There shall be a Treasurer of the Synod, who shall receive and disburse all moneys collected and paid under its authority, and keep account thereof; and two Auditors who shall annually inspect and report on the condition of the accounts.

14. The vote of each order shall be taken separately, when so required by any three members, each vote being determined by the majority of the members present in each order.

15. No rule shall be binding on the members of the Church in this Diocese at large, which has not received the concurrent assent of the Bishop, the Clergy, and the Laity, and which has not been passed in the Synod.

16. Any proposition for an alteration of the Constitution, Regulations, Rules of Order, or Canons, shall be introduced in writing, and considered at the meeting at which it is introduced; and if approved by a majority of each order, shall lie over till the next meeting of the Synod, but shall not be finally adopted unless approved by majorities consisting of two-thirds of both Clergy and Laity then present.

ORDER OF PROCEEDINGS.

1. The first meeting of the Synod in each Session shall be preceded by public morning prayer, with a sermon and the Holy Communion; and the collection at the offertory shall be devoted to missionary or such other purposes as the Synod may direct.

2. The business of every day shall be preceded by special prayer for the Divine guidance and blessing, according to a form authorized by the Bishop.

- 3. After this prayer the Clerical Secretary shall call over the roll of the Clergy, to be furnished by the Bishop, and mark the names of those in attendance; and the Lay Secretary shall call over the names of the several parishes, missions or cures, and the names of the delegates representing each of the same.
- 4. The election of new Secretaries shall then be made by the Clergy and Laity respectively, and a Treasurer and two Auditors shall be appointed, all of which officers shall be elected by ballot if demanded, and shall hold their respective offices until their successors shall be chosen.

5. After this, on the first day, and on all other days, after prayers, the order of business shall be as follows:-

I. Reading, correcting, and approving the minutes of the previous meeting.

II. Appointing Committees.

III. Presenting, reading and referring memorials and petitions.

- IV. Presenting reports of Committees, and of the Treasurer and the Auditors.

An address from the Bishop shall be in order at any time.

FOR THE PRESERVATION OF ORDER.

1. The Synod shall meet the first day at two o'clock in the afternoon, and afterwards at ten o'clock each forenoon during its session, unless otherwise ordered by the Synod. And when it adjourns, the members shall keep their seats until the Chairman leaves the chair.

shall call the Synod to order; and should there not be a quorum at the appointed hour the Chairman is authorized to adjourn the meeting during pleasure.

3. Immediately after the Chairman shall have taken the chair, the meeting shall be opened by prayer according to a form authorized by the Bishop; and the minutes of the preceding meeting shall then be read, to the end that any mistake therein may be corrected by the Synod.

4. The Chairman shall preserve order and decorum, and shall decide questions of order, subject to the Synod, to be decided without debate. When called upon to explain a point of order, he shall state the rule applicable to the case, without argument or comment.

5. Members of the Synod shall sit uncovered, the clerical members to be habited in bands and gowns, and every member before speaking shall rise from his seat and address himself to the chair. When two or more members rise at the same time, the Chairman shall name the member who is first to speak.

6. When the Chairman is putting a question, no member shall walk out of, or across the house; nor, when a member is speaking, shall any member hold discourse to interrupt him, except to order, nor pass between him and the chair; and every member present when a question is put shall be required to vote on the same. In voting, those who vote in the affirmative shall first rise, and then those who vote in the negative.

7. No member, save the mover of a motion, who is entitled to reply, shall speak more than once on the same question without leave of the Synod, except in explanation of a material part of his speech, which may have been misunderstood, and then he is not to introduce new matter.

8. A member may, of right, require the motion in discussion to be read for his information, at any time during the debate, but not so as to interrupt a member speaking.

9. A member called to order shall sit down, unless permitted to explain; and the Synod, if appealed to, shall decide the case, but without debate; if there be an appeal, the decision of the chair shall be submitted to.

10. No member shall speak disrespectfully of the Queen or any of the Royal Family, nor use improper language against the proceedings of the Synod, or against particular members thereof, nor speak beside the question in debate.

11. The Chairman may at any time desire the Synod to be cleared of strangers, and may suspend the debate then in progress until the Synod be so cleared.

12. No motion shall be put or debated unless the same be in writing and seconded; nor shall any motion prefaced by a written preamble be received by the chair.

13. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order; but such motions, as well as motions to lay on the table, shall be decided without debate.

14. All questions shall be put to the Synod in the order in which they are moved.

15. After a motion has been read from the chair it shall be deemed to be in possession of the Synod, but it may be withdrawn at any time before decision or amendment with the permission of the Synod.

16. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received by the chair unless to amend it, or postpone it to a certain day, or to lay it upon the table, or for adjournment; and no more than one amend-

ment to the proposed amendment of a motion shall be in order.

17. On a division the names of those who vote for, and those who vote against, the question, shall be recorded in the minutes, if required by three members. And a question once determined shall not be brought up again the same session without the unanimous consent of the Synod.

18. On the passing or rejection of any resolution or business, any manifestation of approval or dissent shall be considered a breach of order.

. 19. Petitions, memorials, and other papers addressed to the Synod, shall be presented by a member in his place, who shall be answerable to the Synod that they do not contain improper or impertinent mat-

20. In order to expedite the business of the Synod, it is required for the future that the clerks of the several Vestries in this Diocese, or where there is no Vestry Clerk, the Chairman of the meeting, shall send to the Clerical Secretary of the Synod within six days after their election, the names of the Lay delegates elected at any meeting held for that purpose; and the Secretary of this Synod shall attend at the place where the Synod is to meet at 9 o'clock of the first day of meeting to record the names of said Lay delegates.

21. All special committees shall be named by the chair, unless otherwise ordered, and in such cases the election shall be by ballot. They shall appoint their own Chairman, and a majority of the number named

or elected shall be a quorum competent to proceed to business.

22. The reports of Committees shall be in writing, signed by the Chairman, who, or some member deputed by him, shall explain to the Synod the bearing of any portion of the report, if requested by any member of

23. Reports of Committees shall be received in course, unless ordered to be reconsidered, but further action thereon shall be by motion as in

other business.

24. All notices of motion intended to be brought before the next Synod shall be sent in to the Clerical Secretary at least six weeks before the day of meeting; and it shall be the duty of the Clerical Secretary to keep a record of such notices, and to issue a circular statement of the business for the ensuing Synod, with reports of Committees, and the order in which the same shall be brought up. The circular to be forwarded to each Clergyman and parish, one month before the meeting of the Synod.

26. The Journal of Synod shall be printed under the direction of the Secretaries, immediately after the annual Meeting. It shall contain all the acts and proceedings of the Synod, all reports of Committees, unless otherwise ordered, the list of Clergy and Lay delegates entitled to sit in the Synod; the Committees appointed to sit during the recess, with the names of the respective members; the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese, with the Rules of Order; the Reports of the Rural Deans, and such other matter as may be specially ordered by the Synod. A copy of each Journal shall be transmitted by the Secretaries to the several Bishops of the Dominion; to the Secretaries of the Provincial Synod, and of the other Diocesan Synods; to the Diocesan Library, and to the Library of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, and to every Clergyman and Lay delegate within the Diocese.

RULES AND BY-LAWS, RESPECTING THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE PROPERTY, MISSIONS AND TRUSTS OF THE SYNOD

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

1. That the property of the Synod be managed and administered by a Committee to be called "The Executive Committee," and to be composed of the Lord Bishop or His Commissary, the Secretaries, the Registrar, the Treasurer, and of 15 Clerical members, and 15 Day members, to be elected annually, at the annual stated meeting of the Synod; and such Committee shall have the general and full control over the collection, investment, and expenditure of all moneys belonging to, or in any way vested in or under the control of the Synod, and the leasing, purchase, sale and general management and administration of all property, real and personal, belonging to, or in any way vested in, or under the control of the Synod, except when otherwise specially provided or ordered by the Synod.

2. That no Layman may be a member of the Executive Committee who has not paid in as a subscription to Diocesan Missions for the year preceding at least five Gollars.

3. The said Committee shall meet quarterly in the City of Montreal on the second Wednesday in the months of February, May, August, and November, and shall be presided over by the Lord Bishop, or in his absence by his Commissary, or, in case of the absence of both, by a member elected from among themselves.

4. Special meetings of "The Executive Committee" may be called from time to time by the Bishop, or, in his absence, by his Commissary, or, when the See is vacant, by the Senior Dignitary of the Church next in rank to the Bishop, for the transaction of such business as may be stated in the notices calling such meetings, to be transmitted by mail to each member of the Committee at least one week before the day of meeting.

5. A quorum of said Committee shall consist of seven members, of whom

three shall be Laymen; and the said Committee shall furnish to the Synod, at each stated annual meeting of the Synod, a report of its operations, and a clear statement of the receipts and expenditure of the Committee during the preceding year, and of the state and condition of the funds and property belonging to, or vested in or under the control of the Synod; and shall receive and consider all applications for aid towards opening any new missions, filling up vacancies, or providing for any alteration in the circumstances of any existing ones.

6. The Committee shall have power to purchase and circulate in the Diocese the Holy Scriptures, and such publications as have the sanction of the Church, viz.: the Prayer Books, Homilies, Catechisms, Collects, with the addition of Books and Tracts circulated by the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, in London, and such other publications as may be approved of by the Bishop.

BOARD OF MISSIONS.

1. That a Board of Missions shall be appointed annually in each Deanery, to be composed of four Clerical and four Lay members, who shall annually report upon each Mission in the Deanery, and their recommendation with regard to it, to the Executive Committee; the Bishop to appoint the members of the Board in each Deanery.

2. That, excepting in any special case which may be directly recommended by the Bishop, each fresh application for a Mission grant shall emanate from the Ruri-decanal Meeting who shall forward it for consideration to the Mission Board.

SERMONS.

Such Sermons as the Lord Bishop of the Diocese shall direct, shall be preached in each year, in each parish, chapelry and missionary station, in the Diocese, on such days as the Bishop shall appoint, in favour of some one or more of the objects of the Synod, and a collection made in aid thereof, which shall forthwith be transmitted to the Treasurer of the Synod, and no grant or benefit from the Synod shall be obtained for any object, within any parish, chapelry or missionary station, within which such sermon or sermons shall not have been preached, and such collection shall not have been made.

WIDOWS AND ORPHANS FUND.

2. That the Synod shall and will put to the credit of the Widows and Orphans' Fund yearly, and every year, a sum of money equal to One Pound Five Shillings, for each duly recognized Clergyman in the Diocese, from the Fund of General Purposes, provided that Fund shall bear such a charge upon it; and that, after the current and customary expenses of the Synod are paid, the charges for the Widows and Orphans' Fund shall be the first paid from the General Purposes Fund, and that such sum shall be put to the credit of the Widows and Orphans' Fund, on the first day of April, in each year, on the Lord Bishop forwarding to the Treasurer a list of the

Clergy duly recognized, signed by his hand.

3. That each Clergyman, either Incumbent or Travelling Missionary, having cure of souls in this diocese, in order to entitle his widow or widow and children to claim the annuity hereafter provided, from the passing of this By-law, or from the time of his appointment in the Diocese, shall remit to the Treasurer of the W. and O. Fund the sum of five dollars per annum; shall observe the directions from time to time given by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, in respect of the collections to be made on behalf of the Widows and Orphans' Fund, unless such Clergyman shall have been excused by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese in writing, under his hand, from making such collection or collections, in any church, chapel or station, served by him; but it is essential to the stability and prosperity of this Fund, so as to meet the demands that may be hereafter made upon it, that every Clergyman in the Diocese should contribute towards its maintenance; and it is therefore hereby declared, that any Clergyman refusing to become a subscriber, or neglecting to make the annual collections in his parish or mission, (except as above stated) shall not be entitled to any benefits of the Fund for his widow or orphans. Should, however, any Clergyman fail to become a member, and afterwards desire to join it, he shall make application to the Executive Committee, through the Widows and Orphans' Fund Committee," and if the Executive Committee should favourably receive his application, it can only be on payment of all back subscriptions.

4. The Treasurer shall lay before the Executive Committee at its meeting in May in each year, a statement of all moneys invested, or in his hands, belonging to the Widows and Orphans' Fund, and of all moneys received and paid on account of the said Fund since the last annual

statement.

5. That from and after the passing of this By-law, the Synod shall pay an annuity to the widow of every Clergyman who, at the time of his decease, shall have been duly licensed to the cure of souls in this Diocese, and recognized by the Bishop, or have been placed on any retired list with the consent of his Lordship; and from the passing of this By-law, or from the time of his appointment in the Diocese, shall have been a subscriber,

as set forth in rule 3, and who shall have complied with the requirement of this By-law, such annuity to be of two hundred and forty dollars, payable in four equal quarterly payments. One quarter's salary shall be granted to the family of a deceased Clergyman from any funds controlled by the Synod, but such grant to be confined to those clergymen whose salary has been paid from any funds of which the Synod had the control and was the almoner and dating from the expiration of the quarter in which the decease occurs; and the stated pension to the widow or children shall begin from the expiration of such quarterly payment, and shall continue as long as the widow shall remain unmarried. In the event of marrying again, the question of continuation of annuity to be re-considered. And in case such widow shall have pne or more children at the time of her husband's decease—the lawful issue of her marriage with him—she shall for each and every such child, not exceeding four in number, be entitled to receive twenty dollars per annum, payable at such times and in such manner as has been before provided for the payment of the annuities of widows without children.

All annuities paid for children shall cease on the day at which they attain the age of eighteen years: provided always that in the case of the death of such widow, before the children have attained the above age of eighteen years, the annuity of such children shall be increased to forty dollars per annum for each and every such child until they attain the above mentioned age. And in case of a Clergyman deceased, leaving no widow, but leaving children, then such children to enjoy the annuity as above provided. But as circumstances may occur to cause this Fund to fluctuate in its amount, the Executive Committee may, on receiving a special report from the Widows and Orphans' Fund Committee, regarding such fund, increase or diminish the annuity of widows and orphans, should it appear advisable or necessary so to do.

6. As it is just and equitable that when any such Clergyman shall in future marry a lady many years younger than himself, and thereby in the common course of events leave a widow for many years drawing her pension, and so become a heavy burden on the Fund, the following scales of fines shall be established as a Rule of the Synod for all under such circumstances.

As soon as possible after the death of any Clergyman in the Diocese, a special offertory in every Church or Station shall be devoted to the immediate benefit of the widow and orphans (if any) of the deceased, and it shall be the duty of the Secretary to give notice of such Special Offertory to the churches or stations of the Diocese.

CANONS.

ELECTION OF BISHOP.

1. The House of Bishops shall present two or more persons to the Synod of Montreal, one of whom may be elected as the Bishop of Montreal; and in case no election shall take place from the names so nominated, the House of Bishops shall again exercise the same right of nomination until a choice shall be made by the Synod; and no other persons shall be put in nomination for the office of Bishop except such as shall be nominated

by the House of Bishops; provided a Resolution respecting the election of Bishops of the Diocese, passed at the meeting of the Synod on Wednesday, June 17th, 1863, be adopted by the Provincial Synod, respecting the election of future Bishops of Montreal, such Bishops continuing to fill permanently the office of Metropolitan.

2. In such election by said Synod of Montreal, the Clergy and Laity shall vote separately by ballot—the Clergy by individuals and Laity by Parishes or Cures. A majority of votes in each order shall determine the choice provided that two thirds of the Clergy entitled to vote are present, and two-thirds of all the Parishes or Cures entitled to be represented; otherwise two-thirds of the votes of each order shall be necessary to determine the choice.

ARCHDEACON.

1. The Archdeacon, upon receiving the reports of the Rural Deans, shall inquire into the cause of the non-payment of such sums as may be due to the Clergy from their respective Parishes of Cures.

2. The Archdeacon shall also see that all Church property in the Diocese is kept in good repair.

RURAL DEAN.

1. The Rural Deans are officers of the Bishop, receiving their commissions from him, and are to report the proceedings of their Deaneries to the Bishop, through the Archdeacon.

2. The Rural Deans shall hold a Ruri-decanal meeting, in their several Deaneries, once every year. Special meetings may be called by them at the desire of the Bishop. They shall summon to all Ruri-decanal meetings, both Church-wardens and Delegates to Synod in all parishes within 212 Syn.? 140 their Deaneries, and none others.

3. Each Rural Dean, at the annual meeting of his Deanery, shall submit a report of such statistics connected with the different Missions or Parishes, as he shall have been able to collect from the Clergymen and Church-wardens in their several Cures; such reports shall be presented at the Ruri-decanal meeting, previous to their being forwarded to the Archdea-

4. The Rural Deans shall collect such statistics as the Bishop may direct; and all matters relating to the boundaries of Parishes or the erection of new ones shall be referred to a Ruri-decanal meeting.

5. The Rural Deans shall have no power of interference on their own mere motion, in matters of discipline, in any Parish or Mission. All such matters shall be referred to the Bishop, to be dealt with as he shall think proper.

STATUS OF PARISHES, &c.

3. A Rectory is an ecclesiastical division raising within its limits the whole of the stipend of the Incumbent. Provided always, that it be understood that nothing herein shall be regarded as affecting Parishes erected by Letters Patent from the Crown.

4. In accordance with the terms of an Act passed, 14 & 15 Vict., c. 173, respecting the patronage of certain Rectories, established by letters patent in Canada, on a vacancy in any Rectory so established in the Diocese of Montreal, the Churchwardens of the Parish Church, having received notice of such vacancy from the Lord Bishop, shall proceed to summon a meeting of the Vestry, as constituted under the Church Temporalities Act, (notice of such intended meeting having been affixed to the door of the Church on two previous Sundays,) for the purpose of choosing two or more Clergymen, in Priests' Orders, whose names shall be forthwith returned to the Bishop, in order that his Lordship may, if they shall be found otherwise canonically qualified, select one of them for institution to the said Rectory; and no informality in the manner of choosing such Clergymen by the Vestry shall invalidate the institution, unless notice in writing shall have been sent to the Bishop or his Commissary, within twenty-one days from the date of the nomination. But if no such nomination shall be made by the Vestry, and returned to the Bishop, or his Commissary, within three calendar months from the date of notice of the vacancy sent to the Church-wardens, then the right of presenting an Incumbent or Minister to the said vacant Rectory shall rest absolutely with the Bishop.

5. Whenever in any Parish or Mission, an Endowment Fund, to the amount of \$4,000, shall have been raised and invested to the satisfaction of the Bishop, and the balance of the salary pledged by the Vestry, such Parish or Mission shall, in case of a vacancy in the Ministry thereof, enjoy the same privilege in the choice of a Clergyman as if it were a Patent Rectory.

6. The salaries to Clergymen employed as missionaries shall not be less than the following, viz:

For Priests under 10 years standing 600 "

For Priests above 10 years standing 700 "

ORGANIZATION OF PARISHES.

1. That, in order to distinguish between Parishes and Missions, it be enacted by the Synod that no Ecclesiastical Division be considered a Parish, unless it include within its limits a Church and Parsonage, and provide within itself at least one-half of the stipend of the Clergyman who is its Incumbent; and, further, that no such Parish be considered a Rectory until the whole of the stipend of the Incumbent is raised within its limits. Pro-

vided always that it be understood that this resolution is not to be regarded as affecting Parishes erected by Letters Patent from the Crown.

2. That in order to secure the better organization of Parishes and Missions now existing in the Diocese, it is desirable that the Diocese should be divided into Rural Deaneries; and that, for this object, the Lord Bishop be respectfully requested to take steps for the formation of such Deaneries.

3. That it be directed by the Synod that the Clergymen and Churchwardens resident within each Rural Deanery do, within six months of adjournment of the Diocesan Synod, or as soon after as practicable, hold a conference or conferences for the purpose of arranging and defining by mutual agreement the boundaries of their respective Parishes or Cures, and report the same to the Lord Bishop for his consideration; and should his Lordship approve of the same, then the boundaries se arranged, approved and declared shall be the boundaries of the Parishes and Cures aforesaid. And that the Bishop cause a report of the same to be laid before the Synod at the next ensuing meeting.

4. That in cases where the boundaries cannot be arranged by such mutual agreement, then the Bishop be requested to see a commission to two Clergymen and two Laymen, none of whom shall be locally connected with such Parishes or Cures, directing and authorising them to investigate the merits of the case and decide thereon, and to report their decision to the Lord Bishop for his consideration; and, should his Lordship approve of the same, then the boundaries so arranged approved and declared shall be the boundaries of the Parishes or Cures aforesaid. The expenses of such commission to be borne by the Parishes to be arranged. Provided that no such Clergyman, Church-warden or Commissioner shall consider any question of the metes and bounds of any existing Parishes or Missions, till one month's notice shall have been given to the several congregations interested in the question, and until it shall have been brought before the Vestry of the said Parish or Mission.

5. When any of the parishioners residing in any Parish or in any adjoining Parish shall desire to have a new and distinct Parish erected, the said parishioners shall present a memorial to the Lord Bishop, stating fully the reasons moving them thereto, also the proposed boundaries of the contemplated new Parish, and whether the Incumbent or Incumbents of the Parish or Parishes aforesaid be a consenting party or parties; and when the Bishop of the Diocese shall be satisfied that the provisions of the xixth section of the Church Temporalities Act have been complied with, and that the means for the worship of God have been provided, and when, further, he shall have referred the said memorial to the Clergy and Church wardens of the Rural Deanery within which the proposed new Parish is situated, for their opinion respecting the same, his Lordship shall declare the said portion of the Parish or Parishes to be a new Parish.

7. That in any and every case where it is proposed to establish a new Mission, situate within any existing Rural Deanery, the proposal for the erection of such new Mission shall be submitted to the Clergy and Church-wardens of the said Rural Deanery for their council and advice.

8. That the boundaries of every Parish or Mission erected under authority of this Canon, as well as of every existing Parish or Mission, be entered in a book, to be kept by the Secretaries of the Synod for that purpose, and that a copy thereof be furnished to any person applying for it, on the payment of a fee of one shilling.

9. That all repairs and dilapidations of Church property shall be defrayed by each Parish individually.

DIVISION OF PARISHES, (Under Royal Letters Patent.)

1. Any Parish now constituted under Royal Letters Patent may with the consent of the Rectori n office at the time of the Act Cap. xix, 1871, of the Province of Quebec came into force, or may after his demise, be divided into two or more Parishes by the Bishop of this Diocese by decree signed by him and registered by the Secretary of the Synod in a register to be kept for that purpose; and in such decree the limits of each Parish so newly constituted shall be designated.

2. The Incumbent of any new Parish thus constituted shall not be vested with the power conveyed in said Letters Patent, but shall be subjected to the provisions of the Church Temporalities Act.

3. The decree to be made by the Bishep of the Diocese of Montreal in the subdivision of any Parish constituted under Letters Patent, shall take effect only from the time of its sanction by the Synod by any rule, regulation or Canon to be adopted for that purpose.

OCCUPANCY OF PARSONAGES AFTER DECEASE OF INCUMBENTS.

1. At least three months from the time of decease shall be allowed to the widow, or children, or other relatives of the late Incumbent, provided that they have been resident with him and forming part of his family up to the time of his decease, before they, or she, or any of them be called upon to leave the Parsonage.

2. If the Glebe or any other land be under cultivation, the crop thereof belongs, of course, to the lawful representatives of the deceased, unless his successors consent to refund the expense incurred in such cultivation, when the crop belongs to the in-coming Incumbent.

3. In the case of meadow land the grass belongs to the successor; but if

made into hay the same is the property of the representatives of the deceased.

4. The above rules apply to Clergymen on their being placed on the superannuated list.

CHURCH-WARDENS.

The Incumbent and Church-wardens of every church and chapel being a body corporate and politic, the administration of the temporalities of every church or chapel is by law vested in them; but for the more perfect and efficient administration, and with a view to leaving the Incumbent more complete leisure for the discharge of his sacred office, it is expedient that certain duties should be under the more immediate superintendence of the Church-wardens.

Wherefore it shall be the special duties of the Church-wardens of every church or chapel, within fourteen days after appointment or re-election in each year, to make a faithful inventory, in duplicate, of all the movable property of the Corporation, and to insure the same, and all the buildings thereof, at their full estimated value, with some English or Provincial Fire Insurance Company, duly incorporated. And at each appointment or re-election of Church-wardens, the out-going Church-warden or Church-wardens shall present a true and faithful balance sheet of the accounts of the Corporation to be filed with the above-mentioned inventories in the vestry of the Corporation, and also shall hand over to his or their successors any balance of moneys remaining on hand.

To provide for the due care and preservation of the said movable property, together with the administration of the said real estate thereof, during their tenure of office.

Carefully to superintend and to enforce the execution of all contracts for the furnishing, repair and preservation of the Church, Parsonage, Burial Ground and Glebe, and to take the necessary steps to exact penalties in case of their non-fulfilment.

To secure the warmth, cleanliness, and ventilation of the Church and the supply of vestments, linen, books, and bread and wine for the celebration of the Holy Communion.

To provide such books and documents as the Synod may from time to time require to be kept.

To afford the Incumbent every assistance in their power, in the supervision of the sexton, the organist, the clerk and the choir, and the inferior officers of the Corporation.

To provide strangers with seats during the celebration of Divine Worship, in so far as the capacity of the building will allow.

To maintain good order and quiet in and about the church or chapel and in the adjoining roads and public places during Divine Worship, and prosecute all offences against that good order and quiet. Vide Consolidated Statutes of L. C., c. xxxx.

To notify the Incumbent of any grievous sickness or destitution among the members of the congregation, and generally, and as far as in them lies, to promote the comfort and welfare of the Clergyman and congregation.

A copy of those instructions shall be sent to the Incumbent and Church-wardens of every church and chapel, and shall be read aloud by the Chairman of the Vestry, at each annual election of the Church-wardens.

COMMUNICANTS.

The Vestry of every charge and parish represented in this Synod shall hereafter be required to furnish a suitable book or books in which shall be enregistered the names of all persons who are members of the Church in full communion, with the date of their first communion, as nearly as can be ascertained; and this register shall be in all cases kept by the Clergyman holding such charge or Parish, and shall be the property of the Parish; and copies or extracts thereof, certified by the Incumbent, or in his absence, by the Church-wardens, shall be full evidence of the status of any person in such congregation at the date of such enregistration.

NOTICE OF ORDINATION.

The names of the candidates for Holy Orders on the Bishop's list shall be transmitted, by the Bishop, to each officiating clergyman to be published by him during service at each place where he officiates, at least one month before the day of Ordination.

SUSTENTATION OR ENDOWMENT FUND.

1. An annual sermon shall be preached in each Parish or Mission throughout the Diocese, on behalf of this fund, and the whole of the proceeds of the same shall be paid into the hands of the Treasurer of the Synod.

2. An Annual Meeting for this object, in connection with the missionary purposes of the Synod, shall b_θ held in every Parish or Mission throughout the Diocese, and the amount of collections made at the same shall be paid to the Treasurer of the Synod.

3. Arrangements shall be made for bringing this plan, and the necessity for vigorously working the same, before the people in every Parish or Mission in the Diocese,—and with this object, a scheme for holding the requisite meetings, or preaching the requisite sermons, shall be drawn up, and the Bishop shall be requested to name a deputation or deputations for attending the same,—and, in addition, each Parish and Mission is earnestly recommended to create a local endowment fund.

SUPERANNUATION FUND.

1. A sermon shall be preached annually in every congregation throughout the Diocese, and collections made for a Superannuation Fund.

2. The clerical subscription shall be five dollars.

3. The management of the fund shall be placed in the hands of the

4. Each case for participation in the benefits of the said Fund shall be Synod. determined upon its particular merits by the Executive Committee.

5. On the death, or final removal from the Diocese, of any of the recipients of special grants from the Clergy Trust Fund, the portion of the fund so ceased to be drawn upon shall forthwith be applied to the support of Superannuated Clergymen.

REPRESENTATION TO PROVINCIAL SYNOD.

The number of Cherical and Lay delegates to represent each Diocese in the Provincial Synod having been fixed by the Provincial Synod at twelve of each order, the Clerical and Lay Secretary at the preceding Diocesan Synod shall always be ex-officio amongst the number of delegates to represent this Diocese at any meeting of the Provincial Synod, with seventeen others of each order to be elected by ballot at each annual meeting of the Synod. The first eleven receiving the highest number of votes shall be the delegates; and the next six highest following in order shall be the substitutes-to attend the Provincial Synod whenever from sickness, or other cause, the delegates shall be unable to attend the Provincial Synod.

LAY READERS.

1. One or more Lay Readers may be appointed in any Mission or Parish in the Diocese, at the request and on the nomination of the Incumbent of the said Mission or Parish.

2. The duties of such a Lay Reader shall be (a), to read the appointed lessons in the church at the Incumbent's request; (b), to conduct services in the out-stations of the Mission; (c), to aid in the formation and superintendence of Sunday-Schools, and (d) further to discharge such duties within the Mission under the direction of the Incumbent as by a layman may lawfully be done.

SCHOOLS.

1. There shall be attached to every Mission and Parish, when practicable, a Day School and Sunday School; and also in every Rural Deanery there shall be established a superior Church Day School.

- 4. The schools shall be maintained by school fees and public grants, and by subscriptions and endowments. And all the fees shall be collected by the schoolmaster, who shall account to the Church-wardens for the same.
- 5. CANON OF DISCIPLINE.

ARTICLE I.

Every Priest and Deacon, duly licensed by the Bishop, is amenable for offences committed by him, in the manner and under the provisions set forth in the Canon of Discipline hereinafter enacted.

§ 1.

- 1. For any crime, or immorality, for drunkenness, profane swearing, diserderly conduct, frequenting places most liable to be abused to licentiousness; for a violation of the Constitution or the Canons of this Synod or of the Provincial Synod; for discontinuing the exercise of the ministerial office, without lawful cause; for exercising any lay profession, or occupation inconsistent with his sacred calling; for the habitual disuse, after notice from the Bishop, of public worship, or of the Holy Eucharist, according to the offices of the Church; for the habitual infringement, after notice from the Bishop, of the rubric; for schism, or the separating himself from the communion of the Church.
- 2. And also for heresy, or teaching, or maintaining heretical doctrines; or for teaching or inculcating doctrines contrary to those of the Church; such teaching or maintaining being by way of writing, or printing, or preaching, or public teaching, or circulating books containing unsound doctrines.

1. If any Clergyman has committed, or, on reasonable grounds is believed to have been guilty of any of the foregoing ecclesiastical offences, committed within this Diocese, the Bishop, on the written application of any party complaining thereof, or of his own mere motion, may summon the party to appear before him, in private, and, upon confession of the offence alleged, may pronounce such sentence as may be proper.

facie evidence to justify further proceedings.

In such case, the accusation shall be reduced to form in writing, and a deposit placed in the hands of the Bishop, to his satisfaction, for the costs of the proceedings, if the accusers be laymen; such deposit to be applied in payment of the expenses of the party accused if acquitted, and the balance if any, to be repaid to the depositor; and notice of the time when, and place where, every such meeting of the commission shall be holden, shall be given in writing to the party accused, by means of personal service, at least twenty days before the first meeting; and it shall be lawful for the party accused, or his agent, to attend the proceedings of the commission, and to examine or cross-examine any witnesses; and such preliminary proceedings shall be in private, unless the party accused shall desire

5. Should the party accused neglect or refuse to appear before the said otherwise. commission, his default, after good and sufficient service, shall be placed on record, and the commissioners shall proceed with their inquiry ex-parte.

6. Upon the receipt of the report of the commissioners, the Bishop shall take such further proceedings therein, as the case may, in his judgment, require.

ARTICLE 2.

- "Rev. A. B., a minister of this Church, of the order of _______, and ______, of the church or parish of _______, has been guilty of certain ecclesiastical offences, for which he is subject to trial and censure; viz., of ______
- "To establish which allegations and charge, we refer to the accompanying affidavits, certificates, documents, and to the witnesses whose names
 and places of residence are hereunto annexed.

"Which charge (or charges) we know to be true in substance, (or) which charges on information satisfactory to us, we believe to be true."

5. Whenever a charge or charges against any Priest or Deacon shall have been reduced to writing and delivered to the Bishop, it shall then be the duty of the Bishop to cause to be served personally on the accused a certified copy thereof, together with notices of the time and place of trial, both of which the Bishop shall prescribe or fix.

6. The charges and notice shall be so served at least thirty days before the time appointed for the trial. In case of the innocence or acquittal of the accused, every reasonable effort shall be made to clear the character aspersed, in public estimation, at the expense of the accusers.

7. In the event of a public rumour prevailing against a Clergyman as having committed any of the Ecclesiastical offences above enumerated, the Clergyman may, upon application in writing to the Bishop or his Commissary, complaining of such rumour, and asserting its falsity, obtain an inquiry by commission as hereinbefore provided into the particulars of such rumour, and an opportunity be afforded to such Clergyman of exculpating himself.

ARTICLE III.

1. There shall be a Court to be called "The Diocesan Court of Montreal," to try such charges as may be preferred against any Priest or Deacon of the said Diocese.

2. It shall be composed of fifteen Priests, who shall be annually elected by ballot, by a majority of the Diocesan Synod, at its annual meeting, and who shall continue in office until others shall have been chosen in their places.

3. The Bishop shall have power to fill all vacancies which may occur by removal from the Diocese, by death or by election to the episcopate, or in case any one of them be the party accused, until the next meeting of Synod.

4. The Court shall name from among their body a Clerk, whose duty it shall be to keep a record of all the proceedings had before the Court.

5. The Church Advocate (as hereinafter appointed) shall give notice in writing at least fifteen days before the day fixed for the trial, to the party accused, to attend before the Clerical Secretary of the Synod, time and place being mentioned in the notice, when and where the party accused shall strike from the list of the members of the Court, elected as aforesaid,

one of the names, and the Church Advocate shall strike off another, and so alternately until the number shall be reduced to five, which five, or a majority of them, shall form the Court for the trial.

6. If the accused shall neglect to attend in person, or by an agent, the Clerical Secretary of the Synod shall strike the list with the Church Advo-

cate, in place of the accused so absent.

7. The accused and Church Advocate may, by a written consent, fyled with the Clerical Secretary of the Synod, agree upon any five of the members of the Court, so elected as aforesaid, which five, or a majority of them, shall form the Court.

8. The Bishop shall issue a precept, addressed to the members of the Court, so struck or agreed upon, requiring them to proceed to the trial of the accused at the appointed time and place; which precept, together with a certified copy of the charges, shall be transmitted by the Bishop to the President of the Court (to be named by him), whose duty it shall be, on receipt thereof, to cause all the members of the Court, so struck or agreed upon, and the accused, to be summoned to meet at the prescribed time and place.

9. The Bishop shall, at the annual meeting of Synod, nominate a Church Advocate to conduct all prosecutions; he shall be a Priest belonging to the diocese, or a layman who is a practising advocate of the Province of Quebec, and has been a communicant of some church within the Diocese, at least two years before such nomination, and is such at the time of his appointment, and shall continue to be such during the time of his holding

said office.

10. If on the day fixed for the trial, the accused shall appear, he shall, before proceeding to trial, be called upon by the Court to say whether he is guilty or not of the offence or offences charged against him; and on his neglect or refusal, the plea of not guilty shall be entered for him, and his trial shall proceed.

11. Exceptions to the form or substance, or any part thereof, or legal sufficiency of the charge or presentment, or any part thereof, or of the allegations or specifications therein, or to the jurisdiction of the Court or any member thereof may be taken by the accused, and shall be determined by the Court. But the Court may, with reference to exceptions as to form not affecting the substantial merits of the proceedings, order their Clerk to make such amendments as may be deemed necessary.

12. Such exceptions shall be made in writing, at the time of plead-

13. If no such exceptions are taken, or, having been taken, are overruled, the accused shall be called upon to plead guilty or not guilty as aforesaid, and the trial shall proceed.

14. If the accused neglect or refuse to appear, according to his summons, due notice having been served upon him as aforesaid, except for some sufficient or reasonable cause, the Court shall certify such default to the Bishop, whereupon the Bishop shall pronounce him to be in contuma-

cy: and sentence of suspension from the ministry shall be forthwith pronounced against him for such contumacy, by the Bishop; but this sentence may be revoked if within three calendar months, he shall tender himself ready, and accordingly appear and take his trial on the presentment.

15. No proceeding shall be instituted against any Priest or Deacon, unless the same be commenced within two years after the commission of the offence in question. And any such proceeding shall be prosecuted to final judgment within six months from the date of its institution.

16. When proceedings are brought in respect of an offence for which a conviction has been obtained in a civil or criminal tribunal, the suit in the Diocesan Court may be commenced against the clergyman so convicted, within two years from the date of such conviction.

17. The accused party may have the privilege of appearing by counsel if he shall see fit.

18. All evidence shall be taken in writing, and each witness shall be sworn in open Court.

19. All notices, services, and citations, shall be made on the accused personally within the delays before mentioned.

'20. If on or during any trial the accused shall confess the truth of the charges contained in the presentment, the Court may dispense with hearing further evidence, and proceed at once to report the same to the Bishop, whose duty it shall then be to proceed to pass sentence.

21. The proceedings upon a trial shall be private, unless the accused party shall request the same to be public, in which latter case the Court may direct it to be private, should public decency be likely to be outraged by such publicity.

22. No charge shall be considered as substantiated or proven by the testimony of less than two witnesses.

23. If any member of the Church shall be summoned to attend as a witness before the Court or Commissioners, constituted under any provision of this Canon, or being present before either of the same, shall refuse to testify, or to be sworn or affirm, such persons may be declared guilty of contumacy, and punished accordingly.

24 A certificate or record of such contumacy shall be signed by the President of the Court, or Commissioners, as the case may be, and transmitted to the Bishop or his Commissary.

25. Whereupon the Bishop shall cause reasonable notice to be given to the party of the proceedings intended against him, and after due citation, and the hearing of the party in defence or extenuation, or in default of his appearing to answer, the Bishop may proceed, if the party be a layman, to admonish or suspend him from communion with the Church, and if a Priest or Deacon, to admonish or suspend him from his office until such contumacy be purged.

26. The Court may, in its discretion, adjourn from time to time.

27. The Court having deliberately considered the evidence, shall declare in writing signed by the members thereof, or a majority of them,

their decision on the charges contained in the presentment, whether in their opinion the accused is guilty or not guilty on each particular charge. And, in the event of the Court being equally divided, the charge or charges shall be considered not proved.

28. If the accused, after trial, shall be found guilty, the finding of the Court together with all their proceedings, including the evidence taken in the case, shall be transmitted to the Bishop before it is transmitted to the accused or in any way made public, and he may proceed to pass such sentence, as in his judgment may be proper, not repugnant to the provisions of the Statutes under which the Synod is constituted.

29. A copy of the sentence shall be sent to the accused, and after the expiration of one month, provided no notice of appeal be given, another to the vestry, or vestries of the parish, or parishes, or congregation, or congregations, with which the accused may be canonically connected; and such other publicity may be given to it as the Bishop shall think expedient.

30. When the penalty of suspension shall be inflicted, such sentence shall specify the terms thereof and the period of its duration.

31. During his suspension the suspended minister, shall not exercise the functions of the ministry either in his own congregation or elsewhere within this Diocese.

32. Upon sentence being pronounced, the connection between the minister and his parish, or congregation, shall be *ipso facto* severed, and all other offices, rents, issues, profits, and emoluments, which he may have held by virtue of such office or ministry, from which he has been removed, shall whelly cease and determine.

ARTICLE IV.

1. The Rubric, perfixed to the other of the Holy Communion in the book of Common Prayer, prescribes the manner of proceeding by the minister of any parish toward any layman guilty of any of the offences therein mentioned, and provides for the reporting the same to the Bishop.

2. If the party thus repelled shall think proper to make a complaint (in writing) to the Bishop, against the conduct of his minister, in such case it shall be the duty of the Bishop, (unless he think proper to restore him, from the insufficiency of the cause assigned by the minister) to institute an inquiry into the merits of the case.

3. If the Bishop should not think proper of his own authority to restore the layman complaining, as above, he or his Commissary shall appoint two disinterested clergymen, and two disinterested laymen, who are communicants, to inquire into and try the case.

4. If they report to the Bishop that the repelled person ought to be restored, the Bishop shall so direct, and no minister of the Diocese shall ceny him the Holy Communion.

5. If they report otherwise, or make no report within three months from their appointment, the repulsion shall continue in force. If this Board of Inquiry be equally divided, they may elect an umpire, clerical or lay,

CANON

FOR THE DIVISION OF THE PARISH OF MONTREAL.

Whereas, it is advisable to divide the Parish of Montreal in the manner hereinafter mentioned, be it therefore enacted, under the authority vested in the Synod by the Provincial Statute 35th Vic, ch. 19, that the said Parish shall be and the same is hereby divided into ten Parishes, as follows:—

1. The Parish of Montreal shall consist of all such parts and portions of the Parish of Montreal, as presently existing, as are not included in the boundaries of the several other Parishes hereinafter mentioned.

2. The Parish of Trinity shall consist of all that portion of the present Parish of Montreal which is within the following limits, to wit:—On the South East the River St. Lawrence, on the North West the present City limits, on the North East Woodyard street, Campeau street, St. André street and Maple street, and on the South West St. Lawrence Main street, St. Lambert street and St. Jean Baptiste street; the whole as colored pink on the map or plan hereunto annexed.

3. The Parish of St. George shall consist of all that portion of the present Parish of Montreal which is within the following limits, to wit:—On the South East William street, on the North West St. Bonaventure street and Dorchester street, on the North East McGill street, Victoria square, Radegonde street and Beaver Hall, and on the South West Seigneurs street and Mountain street; the whole as colored purple on the said map or plan.

4. The Parish of St. Stephen shall consist of all that portion of the present Parish of Montreal which is within the following limits, to wit:—On the South East and South the Lachine Canal, on the North West William street and Commissioners street, on the North East the continuation of St. Peter street, and on the South West the present City limits; the whole as colored yellow on the said map or plan. *

5. The Parish of St. Luke shall consist of all that portion of the present Parish of Montreal which is within the following limits, to wit:—On the South East St. Mary street, on the North West the present City limits, on the North East Papineau square and Papineau road, and on the South West Campeau street, St. André street and Maple street; the whole as colored blue on the said map or plan.

6. The Parish of St Thomas shall consist of all that portion of the pre

8. The Parish of St. John the Evangelist shall consist of all that part of the present Parish of Montreal which is within the following limits, to wit:—On the South East the River St. Lawrence, on the North West Sherbrooke street, on the North East St. Jean Baptiste street, St. Lambert street and St. Lawrence Main street, and on the South West Bleury street, St. Peter street and its continuation; the whole as colored green on said map or plan.

9. The Parish of Grace Church shall consist of all that portion of the present Parish of Montreal which is within the following limits, to wit:—On the South, South East and North East the River St. Lawrence, on the North West the Lachine Canal and on the South West the Napoleon road; The whole as colored gray on said map or plan.

10. The Parish of St. Jude shall consist of all that portion of the present Parish of Montreal which is within the following limits, to wit:—On the South East the Aqueduct of the Montreal Water Works and the Lachine Canal, on the North West the continuation of St. Bonaventure street and the Main street of the village of the Tanneries des Rollands, on the North East the Aqueduct road, the present City limits and Seigneurs street, and on the South West the Côte St. Paul road; the whole as colored light brown on the said map or plan.
