### 9-Year-Old Wanders 17 Days In Woods and Comes Out Unharmed

Saskatoon, Sask., Oct. 6—After 17 days of wandering alone in the wilderness around The Pas, Man., George MacLeod, a 9-year-old Indian boy, was found yesterday unharmed. Except for a quantity of matches, he had no supplies with him in the 100 or more miles of his travels, but according to his story, which cross-examination failed to shake, he made himself a bow and arrows and lived off the country.

Seventeen days previous the child ran away from McKay Boarding School at the Big Eddy, six miles from The Pas. He was found at Sturgeon Landing. To reach there he would have to make his way through bush and around deep bays, and cover a distance of at least 100 miles.

He said that he had made himself a bow and arrows with which he had killed rabbits, chickens and other small game. He had found no difficulty in catching all the fish he wanted, and once got away unseen with

Told Premiers More

London, Oct. 6.—The next turn in the drama of Anglo-French relations lies with the Dominion Premiers. The official summary of Lord Curzon's remarks at yesterday's sitting of the Imperial Conference ran between 5,000 and 6,000 words. The publication of the summary was a break from established precedent but it left unsaid much that Lord Curzon told the Dominion delegates.

The comment that one hears today and is reflected among certain of the overseas delegates is that the Foreign Secretary's statement failed to reval any settled policy on the part of Great Britain for dealing with the European problem.

Premier Bruce of Australia after adventurous encounters with storms on the English Channel has finally arrived in London. He strongly advocates a common foreign policy for the Empire.

To this end Premier Bruce stresses the necessity of greater Imperial unity, a view which it is understood Premier Massey of New Zealand has already emphasized during conference deliberations.







AMBASSADOR TAKEN IN SPEEDING CHARGE

Charleston, W. Va., Oct. 5—West Virginia has been asked to return \$5.60, taken by a town policeman as bond on a speeding charge, to Otto L. Weidfelt, German Ambassador to the United States, it became known when correspondence on the incident was made public this week.

The Ambassador, motoring with Dr. Diekhoff, counsel to the embassy; Dr. Johannes Jantzen, Frau Jantzen and Vice-Consul Baer was stopped by a policeman in the town of Bolivar, Jefferson county. The officer charged the

In a letter of apology, directed to Secretary Hughes, Governor Morgan added that "I would most respectfully suggest that the innocent action of an untutored policeman is less deserving of admonishment than the wilful defiance of a lawful speed limit by such an important personage as an Ambassador."
