A belated despatch reaching London from Copenhagen asserts that Emperor William has recently been at Breslau where he decided on a fourfold ofive movement against Konovo, Warsaw, Lodz and Galicia. From the southeastern tip of Galicia, that is to say, Boukwovina, filters news of the advanced Russian forces unheard from for days.

Paris, Oct. 3-After having tried in vain recently, in the north of France, to break through the strong line of the allies, the Germans have renewed their fierce attacks between Roys and the region of Arras. Their latest efforts in which they have been hurling their forces against the French and English in trying to gain a decisive victory, have had no better results.

The French, in an official statement, frankly admit a slight falling back at the left of one of their detachments. On the other hand the allies have not only successfully opposed the terrific onslaughts of the enemy at other points, but

The Allies continue to pour in their troops at points where they are needed to replace those worn out by the hard fighting or in filling gaps in the ranks. It is assumed that Great Britain's native troops, whose arrival at Marseilles last week, has only just been announced, are either at the front, or in its vicinity. They have greatly strengthened the French line which, it is roughly estimated.

"It is on our left." says Lieutenant Colonel Rousset, the mulitary critic of the Petit Parisian, that the battle takes on the most imposing proportions. When one considers that after hardly a month of fighting the enemy was nearly at the gates of Paris, it can be seen how much territory we have gained on the Ger-

"The enemy has brought to its right large forces, hoping to break our offensive, and at the same time, it returns to attempt the passage of the Meuse. It is making thus a visible effort on two wings, and at the same time guarding the rest of the front in an expectant attitude. This is the old tactic of flanking, which reappears unfortunately, for it has no more the merit of secrecy than that of surprise. We know it too well now, to have it still imposed on us

The troops in the trenches are suffering severely in the chilly nights and consequently a number of British supply officers have visited Paris and have purchased all of the available supplies of warm clothing, furs, comforters and sweaters. Each man in the field has been supplied with a blanket, a waterproof sheet and an overcoat, but the districts where the lighting is proceeding, are subjected to thick mists, making a sojourn in the open air unendurable.

### DENY METHODIST WOMEN EQUAL RIGHT IN CHURCH AFFAIRS

Committee's Strong Recommendation Voted Down in General Conference - Lost by Narrow

Ottawa, Sept. 29.—Though a special

conference this afternoon in favor of giving to women the equal rights with laymen in the administrative affairs of the church, it was voted down today.

By the terms of the constitution governing the conference any matter effecting a radical change in the constitution requires a three-fourths vote of the total vote cast. A standing vote was taken first and resulted 200 for and 102 against. Some of the delegates called for the yeas and nays with the result that a slight change in the vote was noted; this time 194 yeas and 99 nays being recorded. The latter vote of course was the decisive one. Thus to have carried the report 220 votes were required.

quired.

This is the third time the general conference has turned down the question of extending the same privileges to women as are enjoyed by the laymen of the church. Each time it has been lost by a narrow margin. The committee reported that it had voted solidly against the proposal to admit women

by a narrow margin. The committee reported that it had voted solidly against the proposal to admit women into the ministry.

Cyrus A. Birge, of Hamilton, urged that if women were to be given equal rights in the church it should not be with the laymen only, but with ministers too. He moved an amendment embracing what he desired, but this was lost by a big majority. The following is the report in part of the committee which the conference turned down:

"Nine memorials on the admission of women to the courts of the church were considered together, and the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

"Whereas these memorials come from widely scattered conferences with their approval, namely, British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Hamilton, Toronto, Montreal and Nova Scotia:

"Whereas the work of the church on all our circuits, missions and stations is greatly aided by the self sacrificing services of the women of our churches;
"Whereas they are equally affected with laymen by any church legislation which may be enacted;
"Whereas Methodism has ever been in the vanguard in recognizing women's eights to exercise her gifts and graces

in the vanguard in recognizing women's rights to exercise her gifts and graces in the service of her Lord and the advancement of His kingdom;

Manufacturers In Great Britain Form an Association to Replace German Goods

(Montreal Journal of Commerce.) London, Sept. 30-The war on Gertry on such a permanent basis that German competition in years to come will be found to have died a natural death. At a meeting held on September 18 un-der the presidency of David Waterlow, the following resolution was unanimous-

the following resolution was unanimously passed:—

"In view of the enormous trade so far done almost exclusively by Germany in the manufacture of toys for British and Colonial markets, this meeting considers the time appropriate for a determined attempt to be made to organize the toy industry in Great Britain. It considers this step to be in the interests of the rural workers, the cripples, the weakly, the infirm, and the unemployed, or those not fully employed; and the meeting hereby resolves to form the British Toy Association, in order to focus public opinion and to unite the activities of individuals, committees and associations opinion and to unite the activities of individuals, committees and associations interested in the making of British toys, in order that the work may be developed upon sound and national lines."

The fear has been expressed in several quarters that cheap toys are impossible without the employment of child labor and sweating. This question was fully entered into, and a resolution was passed providing that all the necessary steps should be taken by the British Toy Association to safeguard the interests of its workers in this particular. It was decided to make the preliminary organization a matter for voluntary effort and afterwards to develop the operations of the association on a commercial basis.
