Berlin, July 25—Germany wants to
divert the mouth of the Rhine from Holland to her own territory. She wants to make a second mouth to the Rhine which will lie in German territory and thereby to cut out the Dutch and the Dutch port of Rotterdam, which at present have a monopolist control of Rhine traffic and can stop all Rhine commerce n time of war.

in time of war.

The diversion of the Rhine is an enterprise fit to rank with Panama, for the new river will be 215 kilometres long, which is more than twice as long as the Panama Canal and half as long again as the Suez. Also the cost will be on a Panama scale, for the minimum estimate is \$200,000,000. This sum frightens thrifty Germans, but they are comforted by the fact that their extra outlay on armaments alone this year is \$200,000,000.

At present Rotterdam gets the lion's share of the Rhine traffic. This traffic is big. Of the trade between Holland and Germany 6,000,000 tons go by railroad( whereas 30,000,000 go by river. Through Rotterdam go 18,000,000 tons. As a result Rotterdam is increasing at a quicker rate than any German port; its tonnage increase in the last three years was double that of Hamburg, and considerably more than that of Antwerp. The commerce is German, but the profit is Dutch. Thus only a fifth of the Rotterdam shipping is German. German firms have to keep offices and agents in Rotterdam. Naturally they reason that if German Emden could be turned into the chief Rhine seaport, all the profits reaped by the Dutch would be kept in Germany's purse.

# LIFE OF ITALY'S KING

An anonymous writer, who evidently is a member of the royal household, contributes an interesting article about the private life of the King of Italy in the veview Not e il Mondo of Rome.

When Victor Emmanuel III succeeded his father, King Humbert I, who was assassinated at Monza by the Anarchist, Bresci, July 28, 1900, the Indian sooth-sayer, Mammath Bhatahacary foretold that "The King of Italy, having been born under the best auspices because all the planets were in a favorable position at the time of his birth, Nov. II, 1869, would be a true statesman, wise, energetic and prudent, and during his reign Italy would acquire, new splendor and her political influence and territory would be increased?

This prediction has come true as a result of the recent Tripoli war, the success of which the king never doubted. Some time ago a member of parliament was telling the king that everybody in Italy was surprised at the great success of this war, adding that the fighting qualities displayed by the Italian army were quite unexpected. The king calmly replied that it was no surprise to him as he never doubted the valor of the army.

Victor Emmanuel plays the role of a constitutional monarch to perfection and he takes a great personal interest in affairs of state, so much so, in fact, that when his father was assassinated and the prime minister suggested that a proclamation should be addressed to the people and gave a copy to the king, Victor Emmanuel told the minister that he had already written the proclamation himself.

When Colonel Roosevelt was here the king one morning told him that he would call at his hotel and take him for a motor drive. The colonel was not ready when the king called for him. Victor Emmanuel resented this breach of etiquette and was on the point of driving off when Col. Roosevelt rushed out in the nick of time and profusely apologized for the delay. The king interrupted the colonel saying, "It was my fault not yours, as I ought to have come latter," thus implying that his guest should have been made to wait for him.

Victor Emmanuel leads a retired and active jife. He is up at six every morning. He spends several hours reading. He reads all the newspapers and many books, especially treatises on numismatics, which is his hobby. The king's collection of coins is one of the best in the world, and he is considered a great authority on numismatics. The king described the origin of his wonderful collection as follows:

"When I was a boy I happened to pick up a penny coined under Pope Pius IX which I put by. Later on I collected ten similar pennies, which I added to the first one. My father then gave me seventy bronze coins and I decided to begin a collection, I was eleven years old when I began collecting coins, and three years later I already had over 8000. I soon realized that it was impossible to have a complete collection unless I limited the kinds of coins, and, accordingly, I decided to exclude classical coins and specialize only in medieval and modern Italian coins. I thus succeeded in having my collection almost complete."
