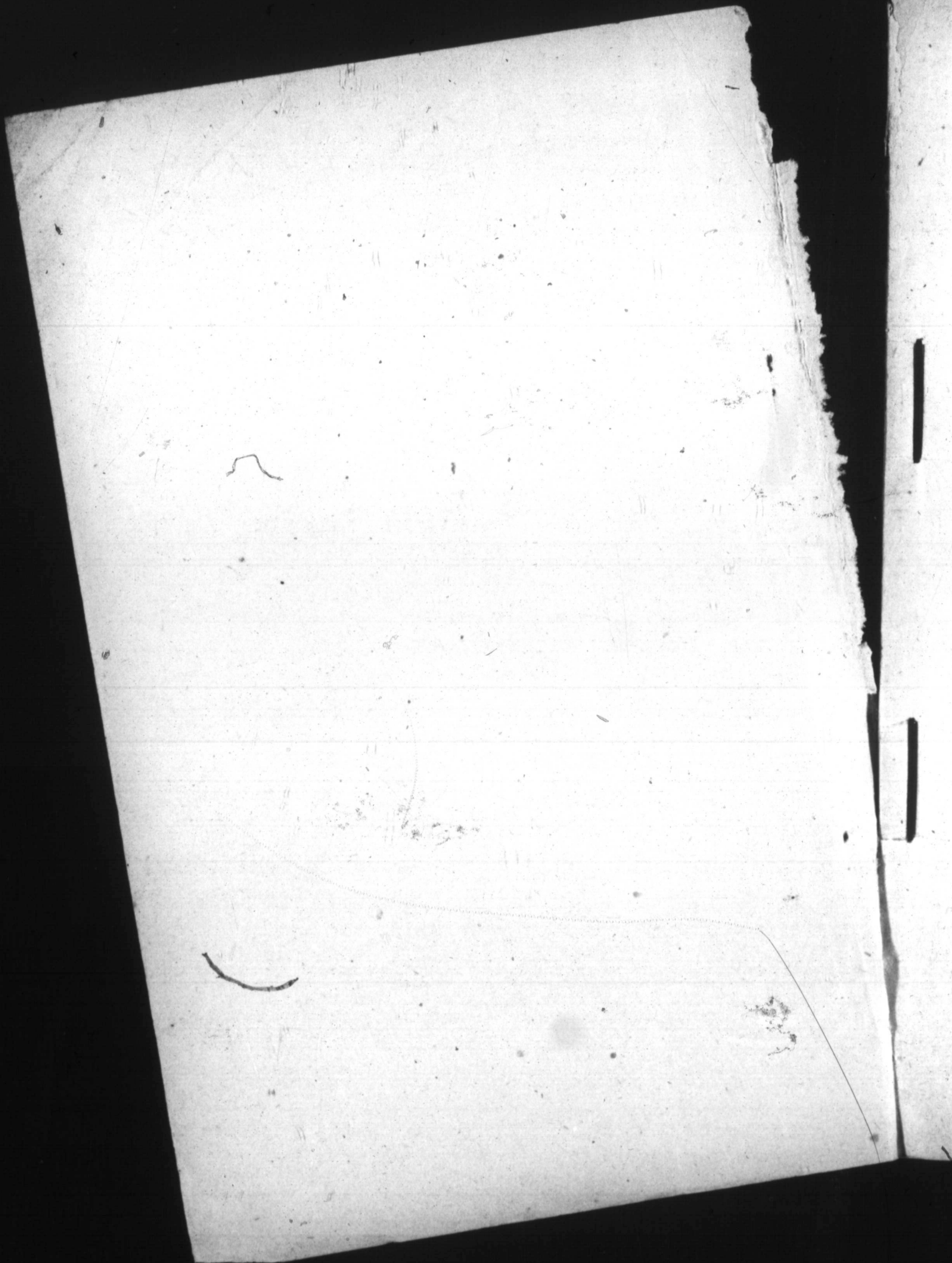

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LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

British and Foreign Bible Society.

I. The designation of the Society shall be **THE BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY**, of which the main object shall be to encourage a wider circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment; the only copies in the language of the United Kingdom to be circulated by the Society, shall be the Authorized Version.

II. This Society shall add its endeavours to those employed by other Societies; for circulating the Scriptures through the British Dominion; and shall also, according to its ability, extend its influence to other countries, whether Christian, Mohammedan or Pagan.

III. Every subscriber of One Guinea annually shall be a member.

IV. Every subscriber of Ten Guineas at one time shall be a member for life.

V. Each subscriber of Fifty Pounds at one time, or who shall by one additional payment, increase his original subscription to Fifty Pounds, shall be a Governor for life.

VII. Governors shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.

VIII. An Executor, paying a bequest of Fifty Pounds, shall be a Member for life; or, of One Hundred Pounds, a Governor for life.

IX. A Committee shall be appointed to conduct the business of the Society, consisting of thirty-six laymen, six of whom shall be foreigners, resident in London or its vicinity; half the remainder shall be members of the Church

of England, and the other half members of other denominations of Christians. Twenty seven of the above number, who shall have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

The Committee shall appoint all officers except the Treasurer, and call Special General Meetings, and shall be charged with procuring for the Society suitable patronage, both British and Foreign,

X. Each member of the Society shall be entitled, under the directions of the Committee, to purchase Bibles and Testaments at the Society's prices, which shall be as low as possible.

XI. The annual meeting of the Society shall be held on the first Wednesday in May, when the Treasurer and Committee shall be chosen, the accounts presented, and the proceedings of the foregoing year presented.

XII. The President, Vice-President, and Treasurer shall be considered *ex officio* members of the Committee.

XIII. Every clergyman or dissenting minister who is a member of the Society, shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.

XIV. The Secretaries for the time being shall be considered as members of the Committee; but no other person deriving any emolument from the Society shall have that privilege.

XV. At the general meeting, and at meetings of the Committee, the President, or in his absence, the Vice-President, first upon the list then present; and in the absence of the Vice-President the Treasurer, and in his absence such member, as shall be voted for the purpose, shall preside at the meeting.

XVI. The Committee shall meet on the first Wednesday in every month, or oftener if necessary.

XVII. The Committee shall have the power of nominating such persons as have rendered essential services to the Society, either Members for life, or Governors for life.

XVIII. The Committee shall also have the power of nominating Honorary Members from among foreigners who have promoted the object of the Society.

XIX. The whole of the minutes of every general meeting shall be signed by the Chairman.

LAW AND EQUITY

REGULATIONS

Adopted at the Annual General Meeting of the Society in 1826 and 1827.

I. That the fundamental law of the Society, which limits its operations to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, be fully and distinctly recognized as excluding the circulation of the Apocrypha.

II. That in conformity to the foregoing resolution, no pecuniary aid can be granted to any Society circulating the Apocrypha; nor, except for the purpose of being applied in conformity to the said resolution, to any individual whatever.

III. That in all cases in which grants, whether gratuitous or otherwise, of the Holy Scriptures, either in whole or in part, be made by the Society, the books issued be bound, and on the express condition that they shall be distributed without alteration or addition.

IV. That all grants of Scriptures to the Society which circulate the Apocrypha, be made under the express condition that they be sold or distributed without alteration or addition; and that the proceeds of the sale of any such copies of Scripture be held at the disposal of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

V. The whole of the subscriptions and the amount of the annual expenses shall be rendered annually in aid of the Society in the English and Foreign Bible Society.

VI. Every member of the Society shall be entitled to purchase under the approval of the Committee, at the rate of the reduced prices in the prospectus, which may be ascertained from the Secretary.

VII. The Committee shall be empowered to make such regulations as may be necessary and expedient for the better management of the Society, and to alter or amend the same from time to time.

LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

Nova Scotia Bible Society.

I. This Society shall be called THE BIBLE SOCIETY OF NOVA SCOTIA AND ITS DEPENDENCIES: the object of which shall be the same as that of the British and Foreign Bible Society, viz., to encourage the circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment, and to furnish copies of Scripture gratis to the indigent, and at reduced prices to those requiring them.

II. The business of the Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and a Committee.

III. In order to give effect to the designs of this institution, benefactions and subscriptions shall be solicited, and books opened for receiving the names of benefactors and subscribers.

IV. Every person contributing annually ten shillings at one time, or a donation of ten pounds, shall be considered a member of the Society.

V. A general meeting of the members of this Society shall be held every year, before which will be laid the accounts and proceedings of the preceding year.

VI. The whole of the subscriptions and donations, after deducting the incidental expenses, shall be remitted annually in aid of the funds of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

VII. Every member of the Society shall be entitled to purchase, under the direction of the Committee, Bibles and Testaments at the reduced prices of the Society, which are as low as possible.

VIII. The Committee shall be authorized to meet for the purpose of conducting the business of this Society as often as may be necessary, and shall have power to add to their number as occasion may require.

SUGGESTIONS

FOR THE COMPLETE

ORGANIZATION AND WORKING

OF A

BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

ANY BRANCH which, in the past, has not attained eminence as a tributary to the AUXILIARY—whose annual grant has not compared favorably with others in districts of less note as to population, wealth or religious privileges, is earnestly requested to consider the following suggestions of means whereby its latent resources may be made more available in the blessed cause of Bible dissemination.

1. The Bible Society being undenominational, care should be taken to preserve its character, as such, in its Branch organization and operation, and to this end the *committee* and *collectors* should, as far as possible, represent every Christian denomination in its district. The *sheet* in the *Auxiliary's Report* containing the *list of Branches* is divided into four columns: one for the name of the Branch and three for the *chief members* of Committee, viz.: *President, Treasurer* and *Secretary*. Where there are more than three denominations in any district, they can be represented by *Vice-Presidents*. When a branch embraces an extensive district, its outlying sections should also be represented by *Vice-Presidents*, who could superintend the work of collecting in their respective localities.

2. At every ANNUAL MEETING (which it is desirable should be held during the *Agent's visit*) the COMMITTEE, if necessary, should be re-cast and *collectors appointed, competent to present the Society's claims and earnestly interested in the work*: for to zealous collectors, rather than to Committee or contributors, belong the honor of placing the silver and the gold at the service of the Redeemer.

3. Should a Committee be impaired by the death or removal of any of its *chief members*, notice of such should be furnished the Agent at the earliest opportunity.

4. Each Branch should decide upon always carrying on the work of collecting during that month most favorable for such in its district, (of which, also, the Agent should be informed) and, previous to the collector's canvass, the annual reports of the Auxiliary should be distributed among the *best* subscribers, and placed in the hands of other persons likely to become valuable supporters. And during the canvass *all* ministers of the gospel should be notified of the same, and asked to encourage their congregations in a liberal response to the collector's call.

5. When a Committee receives notice from the Agent of his intended visit, no delay should be made in appointing the place of meeting and making such known from the pulpit and press; for the delay of a day may possibly result in the preclusion of the meeting by another of merely local interest, whose object might as well be attained at any other time, whereas the *loss of one day means the loss of a whole year*, in so far as a due visitation of the Branch by the Agent is concerned. All ministers in the district should receive special invitations to be present on the platform, and should also be requested to call the attention of their congregations to the meeting, and urge upon them their attendance. The editors of local newspapers should also be asked to insert a brief notice of the meeting.

6. As the annual accounts of the Auxiliary are *closed on the last working day* of December, it is desirable that remittances, with lists of subscribers, should be forwarded to the Secretary or Treasurer in Halifax, not later than Christmas.

7. Any Branch can, if necessary, have its DEPOSITORY, but such should be under its own care. During the Agent's visit, a statement of all Bibles in stock should be duly rendered and payment made to him or the Committee. The Depository may be paid a commission of 10% on his sales. *All orders for the supply of Bibles for the Depositor should be sent by the Secretary of the Branch to the Secretary of the Auxiliary in Halifax.*

8. In view of the transcendent aim and ever growing work of the British and Foreign Bible Society, it is hoped that in every locality a *few persons* may feel moved to espouse its cause as their *special Christian work*, and use their influence in making their Branch an institution deeply established in the popular heart.

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SEVENTY-EIGHTH ANNIVERSARY

OF THE

Nova Scotia Auxiliary Bible Society,

HELD IN THE

BRUNSWICK ST. METHODIST CHURCH,

Thursday, 7th January, 1892.

THE Seventy-Eighth Anniversary of the Nova Scotia Auxiliary Bible Society was held in the Brunswick Street Methodist Church on Thursday evening, the 7th January, 1892, and was attended by an attentive audience, which well filled the building.

W. C. SILVER, Esq., the Vice-President, occupied the Chair.

The REV. DR. T. W. SMITH read Scriptures and engaged in prayer with praise in which the congregation joined.

The CHAIRMAN addressed the meeting, tracing the history of the parent society from its small beginnings in 1803 to its present position in the world, with its ramifications to all parts of the earth's surface, and to the branch, whose annual meeting we are now holding, which traced date from 1813, and concluded by calling on the Secretary to read his report.

(The Secretary's Report, read by JAMES FARQUHAR, see page 13.)

The first resolution was moved by **MR. FOWLER** of St. Matthew's Church :—

"That the report, part of which now read, be received adopted, printed and circulated with the usual appendages, under the direction of the Committee."

Seconded by **REV. L. E. SKEY**, of St. Pauls.

The **REV. H. F. ADAMS**, of First Baptist Church, moved the second resolution, which was :—

"That this meeting, humbly thanking God for the extended circulation of His Word and for the blessings accompanying it, asks Him for the means and the men to enable the parent society to make the most of the present opportunity for furnishing the Holy Scriptures to larger numbers and in more languages to meet the world's great need."

Seconded by **REV. J. C. BOND** of Brunswick Street Church.

The **REV. FOSTER ALMON** of Trinity Church, moved, seconded by **REV. MR. HUESTIS**, Wesleyan Book Room, the third resolution, to the effect :—

"That the officers be re-elected with such alterations and additions as may appear necessary from non-attendance or removals."

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REPORT.

WITH the advent of another year the Committee of the Nova Scotia Auxiliary Bible Society desire to make their annual appearance before the members and friends and through the press to the general public.

Few things new or deeply interesting have occurred in as far as the local affairs of the Auxiliary are concerned. Death as usual has been in our midst and claimed from the ranks of the Committee its quota of those who finished their work, and we trust have received the gracious welcome from the Master "Well done." Of these we would gratefully remember the Vice-President, T. B. Akins, D. C. L., whose connection with the Auxiliary dates as far back as 1858, and continued a liberal contributor till the year of his death, and by his will left a bequest to the funds of the parent Society, which, when realized, will be duly transmitted. The late Dr. Akins' name first appears as a subscriber 1857, as member of committee 1871, as Vice-President from 1880. Death has caused other vacancies in the ranks of the Committee which it will be difficult to fill. The late James S. Hutton had been for a few years an active member of this body, his practical appeals at the Annual Meetings and his earnest efforts in committee for the success of the Auxiliary will not soon be forgotten. Death has also deprived us of the prayers, the labours and the contributions of other subscribers. The Hon. Samuel

Creelman has passed away. His connection with the Society dates as far back as 1854, on which occasion, as ever since, he has been an enthusiastic supporter of the cause, ever anxiously looking for the Parent Society's Annual Reports, and showing an intelligent acquaintance with their contents.

Other changes in the management have become necessary. The state of health has compelled the President, Hon. S. L. Shannon, to submit his resignation to the Society, among whom he has held a place so long, first as member of Committee, then as Assistant Secretary, and then as Secretary, and finally as President. Thus his connection with the Society extends over a period of forty years.

Changes in the official list of the Committee are ever occurring, and the names of new members will be presented for your approval to-night, or at a future day.

Respecting the finances the Parent Society's Report, 87, for 1891, pages 364-5. Income for year is \$4,669.54, which includes both free contributions and purchase account. The contributions are thus analyzed, so far as Nova Scotia is concerned :

Which would make the contributions from Nova Scotia creditable; but for Halifax not so much can be said, its subscription is \$147.

On previous years your Committee called attention to similar items. Old subscribers removed by the hand of death, and perhaps each year a bequest of two hundred dollars, as was the case the preceding year, Thos. A. Brown, and the last year S. S. B. Smith, and among the income for the year now closed, Silas Bishop of Somerset, Cornwallis, five hundred dollars, and John Naylor's estate, two hundred and fifty dollars.

During the past year a communication was received from the parent Society's Committee stating that a delegate from London, who was at New York attending the anniversary of the American Bible Society, "would convey their hearty greetings to the important Auxiliaries in the Dominion, and desiring that the Rev. Auston Binns should be favoured with an opportunity of meeting them." A programme of meetings was agreed upon. A letter was received from New York cancelling the appointed delegation; and then on Monday, the third of June, a telegram was received from Quebec intimating that he would spend Saturday afternoon and Sabbath, and have a meeting on Monday forenoon in Halifax. The Rev. Dyson Hague kindly entertained him, and on Sabbath morning he preached in St. Paul's, and in the evening addressed a meeting in St. John's Church, and on Monday forenoon a meeting of Committee and a few friends was held in the Y. M. C. A. building. All the addresses were greatly appreciated and only regret felt that the esteemed

delegate was able to spend so little time among us, while gratefully acknowledging obligations to the parent Society's Committee for the valuable services of the delegate. Your Committee would remember two former delegations to Nova Scotia, one in 1842 when Rev. Mr. Thomson spent the greater part of a summer in visiting and organizing branches in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick; and in 1862, when the Rev. Dr. Gill visited every branch in the Province of Nova Scotia in company with the late Mr. Russell, the then Agent, and these meetings were productive of great good to the cause in awakening interest where so little existed hitherto, and which interest has continued in many cases, till the present day. On the late occasion the Committee had made arrangements for the agent to accompany the Rev. Auston Binns, but when the letter cancelling the appointment was received that cancelled the Agent's appointment also, and hence he was in New Brunswick when the delegate was here.

For details of the work of the parent Society this Report cannot enter, except to simply name three items as stated in Report already referred to, or the abstract thereof, page 4 :

1. Circulation. Nearly four millions of copies have been put in circulation in the year 1890-1.
2. Translations. The translations of the Bible have been brought by the Society to the number of 300.
3. Finance. The total for financial year was £217,148 17/ 3d sterling.

Your Committee would again repeat in substance what has been so often done on similar occasions, that your Agent still retains the cordial approbation of

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your Committee and that of the sister Society of New Brunswick, and all the Branches.

The Collectors in the several Branches and Ladies Associations throughout the Province deserve all praise, some of whom have attended to this not very pleasant duty for twenty and some for twenty-five years.

In reference to the parent Society's operations, we quote from its report of May, 1891, as follows :—

THE story of the Society's latest year is, like that of so many previous periods, one of advance. Gradual in some directions, rapid in others, the progress is general, and, it is believed, equally safe and sure. In the months of earlier spring there are alternations of shade with sun, and even periods which seem to show that the motion is less in the direction of summer than towards last winter's frost. But in that sphere of visible things no one doubts the issue ; nor do wiser and calmer minds in the affairs of the Kingdom of God. Yet even there, and so far as the outward signs and the calculations of its growth are concerned, few chapters of the Christian year are more remarkable than that which includes the account of the last twelve months of the Bible Society.

The ISSUES have continued to widen their volume, and during the year 1890-91 almost FOUR MILLIONS of copies of the Scriptures in part or whole, have been put into circulation. This is an increase on the issues of last year of more than a hundred and thirty thousand copies. In purely Bible distribution no returns equal to this have ever been made except in the records of the Society itself, and then owing to a special and temporary cause.¹

showing a total of 3,926,535, and, compared with the issues of 1889-90, an increase of 134,273 copies. The issues of 1881 were 2,846,029. It will be remembered that many of the London issues are for use abroad.

The INCOME for the year have also increased, but slightly. So slightly, indeed, that neither have the deficits of the last two years been removed nor has a new one been prevented. The items of Legacies and of Donations is always very variable: a more important source of income is that of Free Contributions, and it is also most significant of the amount of interest generally felt in the Society's work. It is one of the most pleasant facts of the financial year that in this section—that of Free Contributions—there is an increase of some £2,000. This is a continuation of the advance reported for two years past, and the beginning, it is hoped, of still more signal progress in the future. But it is most evident—and this is the moral of the financial report—that there must be a very large addition made to the Society's reliable income if its beneficent work is to be developed; and that the devoted helpers and friends, who are everywhere showing so much self-denying zeal, must fully continue and even increase their efforts.¹

The survey of the work of the year begins with France, and writes its first chapter under the shadow of the vineyards and among the romantic villages of Brittany. It then passes—following the broad pathways of its work—from country to country of Europe, till it finds itself led—across the Eastern frontier of Russia—into the immense prairies of Siberia and the steppes of Central Asia. From these it turns westward, through the Turkish Empire and Greece into Africa: from Africa eastwards again, by Palestine and Arabia, to Persia, to India, to the island-world of Malaysia, to China, to Australia; thence, across the Pacific, to South America and Canada, until, taking leave of the Dominion at Newfoundland, it comes to an end among the cities and villages of England. In all this review of the countries and the peoples of the globe there is nothing more impressive than the evidences of the gradual establishment of a kingdom which is destined to include them all. When the century which is now

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closing began its course the area of Christian knowledge was a very limited one, and but few of the many languages had become familiar with the Story of the Cross. But it is different now. Four new versions, begun during the year, and making the Gospel vernacular in as many tongues, have brought up the total of the Society's translations to almost three hundred. This number includes all the greater languages of the globe, and the large majority of those which are of secondary compass and importance. As the eye passes from land to land it sees everywhere the scholar at work upon the Word of God, moulding with patient care some new version into shape, or giving an earlier one more perfect form. Nor is it in productive work alone that so liberal energy is being expended, for the accounts of the year report that some 330 Bible-women are busy in the Zenanas of the East; that over 600 colporteurs are, in almost every country, familiarizing the people with the Bible; and that more than 230 Depôts, like centres of light, are diffusing among many races the knowledge which not only refines and elevates, but saves. The workers in this great enterprise are of every nationality—of every grade of natural character and education. What is it that unites them in a brotherhood so cordial, and supports them in the face of the dangers and depression which so many of them have to endure? There is only one competent answer, and it has boundless meaning. It is the love of Christ that constrains them, and His Spirit that animates their own.

In the annual letter from FRANCE, the sentences which will be generally most welcome are those in which M. Monod expresses his belief that a spiritual change for the better has begun to show itself in the land of his heart. It is not merely that the lower classes seem to have laid aside some of their hostility to Christianity, but that those who, as literary men, express and mould the mind of the nation, are beginning to speak in a tone as hopeful as it is unusual. 'It seems,' writes Jules Lemaitre, 'as if a spiritual sensibility—*un attendrissement de lame humaine*—is about to lay hold of us in this close of the century, and as if we were to be witnesses of—who knows?—an awakening of the spirit of the

Gospel. Our heart is empty, our soul without ideal or hope. Oh that at last a Messiah would come down and restore to us hope and love !' M. Monod is careful not to lay too great importance on the suggestive sentences of which this is one, but his trained eye and ear seem to detect here and elsewhere signs of approaching improvement. Nor is it in the literary world alone. The Abbé Garnier, one of the clergy of Normandy, has, with the approval of the Bishop of Bayeux, issued the Gospels and Acts in the expressive version of de Carrières, and embellished, if not illustrated, by a profusion of early engravings. But the most significant part of the edition is the preface. 'France,' writes the Abbé, 'must return to the Gospel. It is a deplorable fact that the Gospel is no more read in France. . . . Let the book be circulated *a profusion*. The Gospel has made the civilized world : it shall make it over again. Recollect that the book must ever be read with deep reverence : it is the word of God, the source of life—the Christian's strength' On words like these a very impressive commentary is furnished by the journals of the colporteurs : a series of frank and graphic communications which express, as perhaps nothing else can, the actual mind and temper of the people. Too plainly it is on the whole anything but a contented temper : sometimes conservative and intolerant, but more generally sceptical or atheistic, it is everywhere full of unrest. 'Do you really believe nothing ?' said one of the colporteurs sorrowfully to a group of women who, standing round a well one summer day, had suggested to him the woman of Samaria, and to whom he had read her touching story. 'Yes, something,' was the half brusque, half pathetic reply, 'but what that is we cannot tell !' He pleaded with them, apparently in vain, and they turned away : but when they had gone one stole back and asked for the book of which the divine words had touched her heart. It is in an incident like this one seems to see expressed the spirit of the whole nation. Meantime it is pleasant to learn that the purely colportage circulation for the year has exceeded that of 1889 by nine thousand copies ; and that the spirit of the band of fifty-three colporteurs, tested by M. Monod on a special tour of investigation, and evidenced in their copious journals, is exceptionally animated and excellent.

In this review Italy, Spain, and Belgium may be associated with France: community of religious faith, and, to a large extent, of race, unite these prevailingly Latin and Catholic countries with each other, and sufficiently separate them from their Teutonic neighbours. There is, unhappily, another common characteristic, and the morose materialism so prevalent in France reappears with startling similiarity of feature, and with equal prevalence in the others. Of ITALY, Sig. Meille sends an account which, as regards social and economic affairs, will be to her many friends painfully depressing: with an ever-increasing expenditure and taxation, and an ever-lesseing trade, the spirit of the people seems embittered, and the latest statistics of crime are alarmingly high. But there is even a sadder side to the story of the year, and unless the veteran statesman, Sig. Bonghi, is mistaken, the life of Italy is pervaded by a more general ungodliness than can, even in a sceptical age, be easily paralleled elsewhere. Nor is it among the governing classes only—though there the evil is doubly mischievous—it is in schools, from the lowest to the highest, where the race of the future is receiving the impress which it may keep to the end. But the heart is everywhere the same; and a recently republished sentence of Prof. Villari, the biographer of Savonarola, and the new Minister of Public Instruction, recalls the confession of the French peasant-woman which the colporteur heard beside the well. 'We are thirsting,' writes Sig. Villari, 'to believe, but what to believe we know not'—*siamo avidi di credere, ma non sappiamo che cosa credere*. Let it be hoped that the half-despairing cry may soon be answered, and that in a second and nobler Renaissance Italy may recover again a system of truth diviner than Platonism, and a literature as much more inspiring as it is holier than the classics of Greece. It is surely prophetic of good that the circulation of the Scriptures have never been so high in Italy as during the past year, and that over 153,000 copies of the Gospel have passed into the people's hands. If there be no country, as Sig. Meille believes, which needs the Gospel so much, let it be remembered that in none has it more free entrance or more hopeful course; and that it is but a few decades since superstition lay secure in the fortress

from which it had ruled for centuries, and since the Bible was a book proscribed and practically unknown.

From SPAIN and from BELGIUM the accounts of the year are almost as grave as from Italy. Yet in each there are also signs of progress which cannot be overlooked. In the northern country, where life to the masses of its miners and artizans is so largely 'labour and sorrow,' the only hope which seems to lighten the murky prospect of so many is the dream of a socialistic new heaven and a new earth, wherein dwells no God; but in which, with an eight hours' day and equal property and universal suffrage, the evils which vex this weary age shall have passed away. Yet here also the prevalent liberalism allows free passage to the colporteur in his rounds, and during the past twelve months over sixteen thousand copies of the Scriptures have been circulated—a total which exceeds that of 1889 by a thousand copies, and the purely colportage issues by twelve hundred. In Spain life is less driven than in the great workshops of the north, and, as he rests in the shaded balcony, or leans in the sun against the vine-covered wall, the peasant of Leon or Andalusia may trouble himself little with new socialistic theories: but if the Gospel is unopposed by one difficulty it is resisted by another, and the hostility of the average mind to everything that looks like clericalism is perhaps as bitter here as elsewhere. From all that he can see it is Mr. Jameson's impression that whatever influences came with the Revolution of 1868 against the popular religion, there is no movement of mind or of heart in Spain wide enough to be called national. But, in spite of all, there is progress: the colporteur work has been thoroughly done within its own limits; new sub-inspectors have been appointed, and Depots are being opened in the principal towns. That in Seville lifts up its appealing placards, and looks down on the central square of the city; it is the square in which, in darker days, the stakes used to be planted, and the fires of the Inquisition set ablaze, but from which are now despatched the messengers of the liberty wherewith Christ makes the nations free, and of the love which renders persecution an impossibility.

TO GERMANY—and the group across the Rhine of Protestant and Teutonic peoples of which Germany is the centre—the transition from Spain may seem complete, but modern society is cosmopolitan, and the same general aspects meet us as those noticed beyond the Pyrenees. Less impulsive than his Italian or Spanish, or even than his Belgian brothers, the German artisan is as deeply stirred by social problems and materialistic teachings as they are, and he expresses himself with almost equal intensity. It thus comes to pass that, in Mr. Watt's words, 'The world's drama of the working out of social problems is seen in miniature in Germany; it is a struggle between organized government and anarchy, Christianity and atheism, morality and libertinism.' But if one seems to see in all this a reproduction of the atheistic mood of France or Italy, a great difference must also be observed, and facts noticed for which one looks to these countries in vain. In the Fatherland, if the enemy come in like a flood, there is a power resolute and ready to lift up a standard against him; and Mr. Watt can add that, if the working classes are passing through the period of 'strain and stress'—of *Sturm and Drang*—which their associates feel elsewhere, 'the State is endeavoring by benevolent and protective legislation to ameliorate their condition; and the Church—aroused as it never was before to the urgent need of a practical application of Christian truth in elevating the sunken masses—is year by year displaying an ever-increasing amount of zeal and energy.' There is something perhaps even more important than this: it is that every year is also seeing a larger circulation of the Scriptures in Germany, and this by the strong and rapid development of German Bible Societies themselves. In 1889 the united issues of all the Societies were 603,000, the largest ever known till then; but last year they rose to 644,000, of which 32,000 were distributed in the Army and Navy. In the spring of 1890 a Conference of Bible Societies—itsself an event of great significance—was held at Halle, and when among other questions that of an abridged or 'School Bible' was suggested, it was with almost complete unanimity rejected, the Reformation instinct and principle of 'the whole Bible, and nothing but the Bible,' asserting and emphasizing itself again. At the same

Conference the revision of Luther's version—the great national Bible—was announced as complete; and with its issue, possibly in the present year, a new era may with some confidence be expected. All this with the advance which has been made in organization, in popular circulation, in deepening and elevating the spirit of the work everywhere, shows that the report is justified in describing the year as one of solid progress. It adds to the impression made by these accounts that in HOLLAND, that old home of Reformation learning and piety, the issues of the Netherlands Society are higher by ten thousand copies than in 1889; that in DENMARK the circulation of the Danish Society has advanced from 4,000 copies in 1887 to 22,000 in 1890; that in SWITZERLAND, if the year's issues are somewhat reduced, the average circulation is yet exceptionally high; that in NORWAY the Bible is everywhere welcomed and the colporteur treated as a friend; and that—to close the enumeration with the old land of Gustavus Adolphus—the fact that this Society has for years ceased all direct work in SWEDEN, indicates only that its task there, as elsewhere, is practically complete, and that the diffusion of the Scriptures is safely left in the people's own hands.

From the Vienna agency—the dual empire of AUSTRIA-HUNGARY—the accounts are of a quiet year; sunshine and shadow, as in some day of opening summer, have followed each other across its plains; but the good work has gone forward, and Mr. Millard's pages are everywhere illuminated with a glow of thanksgiving. The general circulation is, by a slight proportion, lower than that of last year, but here and there occur instances of remarkable advance. Among these none, in telling its story, stirs Mr. Millard's pulses more than Bohemia. And just as some old garden, though long thrown open to ruder cultivation and overgrown with common plants, still here and there renews its bloom and recalls its fragrant past, so the ancient home of Jerome and Huss, and of the Bohemian Brethren, reminds a colder age of its evangelical fervour. Never has the circulation been so high as last year, nor have the colporteurs anywhere been so impressed by the desire of the people to become acquainted with the Word of God. And the same accounts, if in a

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somewhat less degree, apply to other districts of the empire. But the central event of the year—the story which will linger longest and most pleasantly in the recollection, and the fact of deepest promise and significance—is the celebration of the tercentenary of Gáspár Károli—the Tyndale of Hungary—and the erection of a statue to his memory. It was in September of last year that the town of Cöncz was thronged by a brilliant company, such as the quiet little place had never seen before, and the celebration duly inaugurated. On the day previous to the central ceremony the company of Revisers, under the presidency of the venerable poet-Bishop Szász, assembled at Sáros-Pátak, and at this, as at the later festival, the Society was represented by Dr. Theodore Duka and Mr. Millard himself. No welcome could be warmer than that which Dr. Duka received from his enthusiastic countrymen: nor could any memories be more cherished than those which were left behind. In the face of the hostility of the Church of Rome to a popular bible—a hostility which seems everywhere in Austria to become more bitter; and of the fatal influence of socialistic atheism—an influence which seems ever to grow more deep—it is delightful to witness in this tercentenary of Károli the recognition, by the devout Protestantism in Hungary, of the great translator's services, and the revival and continuance of his work.

Across the eastern frontier of the Austro-Hungarian monarchy we enter at once the RUSSIAN AGENCY and Empire, a section in the Bible Society's field which, thus limited towards the west, stretches over Europe and Asia till, along its eastern boundary, it meets the frontier of China, and the waters of the Yellow Sea. Along the southern stretches of this immense realm Mr. Morrison, with his centre at Odessa, surveys and organizes the Society's work, while Mr. Nicolson from St. Petersburg directs its operations in the north. During the year a readjustment of the dividing lines has better proportioned the compass of the two Agencies; and the development of work at the new sub-agency for Siberia is indicating how soon and how usefully a third centre must be formed. But even more impressive than the geographical spaciousness of the Empire are the resources and the potential

development of this home at once of the races of the past and of the new peoples of the future. There is another fact, as ample and significant in its own way as either of the others—it is the proved goodwill of the Russian people generally to the Bible; and the ready courtesy of the authorities to the Agents and messengers of the Society, whose aim is, apart from every political or theological complication, to make the Word of God as familiar among the villages of Russia as it is among those of England.

In this great field the circulation amounted last year to nearly a million copies. This includes an increase in the Northern Agency of nearly seventeen thousand; and in other regards Mr. Nicholson can report encouraging progress. 'A sense of thankfulness to God is the ruling feeling on the mind as the accounts of the year are surveyed. From the frontier of Germany to the coasts of Kamtschatka, from Archangel to the Caspian, the colporteur is at work, and though he faces many a snowstorm and braves many an icy blast as he passes from village to village, yet taken altogether, his success has been very real.' The details of this outlined picture are supplied by the journals of men. They are seen conversing with artizans and peasants—now in Finland, where, if the weather is wintry, the spiritual atmosphere is correspondingly warm then in the central provinces around Moscow; then in Livonia and Courland; then in Samara and Saratov towards the South, and on the crowded decks of the steamers on the Volga. But the interest of the year centres in Siberia. During the summer the sub-agent Mr. Davidson, undertook a journey as far as Irkutsk and, as he skirted the endless unexplored forests, or passed through miles of wild forget-me-nots and buttercups, he found that the home of his work was as wide and attractive as vast; and that the only obstacles he had to overcome were the barriers of space and time. In the western section of Siberia twenty-five thousand copies of the scripture have been circulated instead of the eleven thousand of last year, and no limit can be placed on the future. During part of his journey Mr. Davidson was accompanied by Dr. Baedeker who, like a messenger of hope, passed from prison to prison, distributing among Rus-

of the races of the future. There is not in its own way as much of the good will of the world as is possible; and the ready agents and messengers from every political quarter of the Word of God as it is among those of the exiles the words of divine forgiveness and redemption. The central and eastern sections of the sub-agency are scarcely less interesting than the western, and this huge territory—as large, Mr. Davidson reminds us, as the whole of Australia and the half of Africa together—must attract, as it will reward, increased attention with every year that is added to its expanding history.

From the Southern Agency the accounts of the year are no less favourable. The issues, in thirty-five languages have been over 166,000, and several new districts unvisited before have been opened up. From the Odessa centre the free grants of the year have been unusually high, and the scriptures distributed among these convicts and emigrants who received them will 'find their way to remote and inaccessible regions of the Amur and the Assuri, to the island of Saghalien, to the bleak settlements around the Gulf of Okhotsk, to Kamtschatka, and to quarters where for the present our colporteurs cannot hope to penetrate.' Even in less inaccessible regions it is only in the exercise of no common resolution that the men make their way. When, in the Kalmuck steppes, the travellers meet round the camp fires their usual conversation is on the deadly perils of the road; and the colporteur, when he joins the company, listens evening by evening to the story of the latest robbery or murder. But for all the dangers, no one has fallen in the field or turned aside from his appointed task. Along the swamps and dank forests of Mingrelia;—across the heights of Ararat, where the Kurdish tribes are 'unruly people given to disorder and violence';—in the Crimea where 'inhospitable weather is bad, but an inhospitable population worse';—in Turkestan, where for seven months of the year 'the sun is a fire, water is scant and bad, and the people semi-barbarous'—in these and many equally trying regions the colporteurs have nevertheless struggled bravely forward and been successful all along the line. Mr. Morrison's survey, picturesque on every page, closes in Transcaucasia, where, among cities like Samarkand, and Bokhara, 'the Noble,' and Merv and Penjdeh the men ply their work, and the last sentence will be the most memorable—'The General in charge of the Russian garrison at Kerki near the Afghan frontier

encourages our good colporteur to work among his soldiers, and expresses his thankfulness, and the thankfulness of his officers, to the British and Foreign Bible Society.' 'This,' adds Mr. Morrison, 'is good news—as good as the rectification of disputed boundary, and an omen of goodwill and peace.'

At this point the course of review turns again to Europe, and leads us into the center of the dominions of Islam. From Constantinople in the north, and Alexandria in the south, two Agents of the Society direct its work in one of the most testing yet most hopeful fields. Nowhere indeed does a more obstinately lingering shadow lie than across the old realms of Constantine, and the country of the Seven Churches, and the sacred scenes of Palestine; yet it is just here that Christian faith is assured it will not lie forever. And there are few chapters of the year more sure to interest than that which records the bible work done since 1889 in these and the adjacent countries. ❧

It is, on the whole, a story of decided progress; and if somewhat imperceptible, perhaps for that reason all the more sure. Turning first to the **TURKISH AGENCY**, Dr. Thomson reports that in spite of the obstinate hostility of the Government to the Christian advance—not to reckon the poverty and suffering of a severe season—the issues of the year have been fully sustained, and the operation of his colporteur force extended. During the twelve months close upon thirty-six thousand copies have been diffused. Of these Constantinople itself has had five thousand four hundred; Bulgaria three thousand; Albania, with part of Macedonia, three thousand three hundred; Bithynia nine hundred; Iona and the Islands three thousand eight hundred; Cypress and Crete three thousand three hundred; and **GREECE**, which is included in the agency, seven thousand. These have been in thirty-nine languages. Nor has all this been the result of routine operation. 'All the centres of circulation have,' writes Dr. Thomson, 'been visited during the year; careful and persevering efforts have been made to penetrate districts hitherto untouched, and with some success. An island of the **Ægean** has been visited for the first time with the Word of God, as well as

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another of which the scanty population and difficult access led to its being often passed by ; more especially the western shores of Asia Minor have been traversed by our men as never before, for they have not only visited the towns at which the coasting steamers touch, but, going to land, have entered many villages and localities where a colporteur has never till now gone ; and where in several instances they found a thirst for the Holy Scriptures. A similar account may be given of several districts in Central and Southern Albania, and even Bulgaria and Greece.' Nor is Mr. Weakley's summary less hopeful than this. The circulation in the EGYPTIAN AGENCY, which includes Egypt, Syria and Arabia, has been over twenty thousand ; and an examination of this total shows that while free grants have been for good reasons reduced, the sales have been about four thousand in excess of 1891. Of the whole Egypt has had seven thousand copies, and it is pleasant to read accounts of steadily growing prosperity of the people in every direction ; the vessels which pass through the Suez Canal five thousand five hundred ; and the pilgrims bound for Mecca have received a hundred copies. This last item may seem an insignificant one, but a sentence of Mr. Weakley's redeems it from commonplace : 'It has long been our prayer that God would make the way open for the Gospel to enter the fortress of Islam, Mecca, and it is to us a fact of deep and touching interest that ninety-five Arabic and five Turkish Scriptures were sold on the pilgrim-ships to Muslims going thither. Many on these ships were to see their native land no more. Cholera broke out among the crowds, and the mortality was great. Who can tell on what an errand of mercy these few volumes have been sent.'

These accounts have already led us into AFRICA, and they are happily but the first sections of a chapter occupied with the great continent, which, if less full than some, cannot be less interesting or regarded as less important than any other. Passing along the northern coast we enter Tripoli, then Tunis and Algeria ; and find that, according to the statistics of Mr. Lowitz, over eight thousand copies have been distributed to the mixed races of these regions—a substantial advance of five

hundred in actual sales. In the MOROCCO AGENCY—'poor dark Morocco,' as Mr. Macintosh sorrowfully calls it—the issues have doubled those of last year and risen to seven thousand copies. Not a few of these have gone to the Canary Islands. Southward from Morocco stretches the Sahara, but beyond its wastes of sandhills and its scattered oases lie Senegambia and the vast seaboard of Guinea, to the mouths of the Niger, and—still further south, beyond the Congo—Angola and Damaraland. Already many of the names along this western coast, unknown or unfamiliar half a century since, have a pleasant home-sound to Christian ears. More than twenty versions of the Scriptures are perpetually being supplied to the new churches by the Society; and a special mission of inquiry despatched during the past year has been charged to inquire how the number may be increased. Passing still further south we begin to catch again the sound of the English tongue, and find in Cape Colony a Bible organization as expansive and vigorous as any at home, with its hundred Branches, its Colportage Mission, its Ladies' Association, and, lying before them all, the limitless fields and ever emerging races of the great continent in which they live and work. Still following the coast line, the Evangelical succession of Bible agencies is continued in the Transvaal, at Port Elizabeth, at King William's Town, at East London, in Natal, in Basutoland, till the eye, noting the Universities Mission at work at Zanzibar and Lake Nyassa, and looking across the Galla country, sees the frontier of the Egyptian Agency at which the circuit of the continent began. From all these, and many other places, messages month by month arrive, and to them are despatched continuous supplies, and in the fifty versions which now, each in its own vernacular, are so many rays of light across the darkness of Africa.

To pass immediately from one great continent to another—from Africa to INDIA—is to overlook many an attractive subject on the way. But there is a certain impressiveness in turning the eye from every object of lesser interest in order to catch the emphasis of the contrast and comparison. It will be a day of fatal omen when the Christianity of England can ever turn to India

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but with heightened hope, and with a solemnized feeling of responsibility. Happily if the sense of the vast volume of population—the signs of the rapid awakening of the subtle intellect to the problems of the civilization of the west;—the signals in earth and sky of the approach of one of those spiritual revolutions which change the aspect of history;—if these and other warning indications deepen the conscientiousness of Christian duty, there are other truths which must move the most unimaginative, if only a believing mind, with the highest anticipation. To many who still live it seems but yesterday since Carey sheltered himself in the Sunderbunds, and Marshman and Ward prepared in silence, and amid the unbroken gloom of heathenism around them, the version which they hoped one day the people might read. The reports from the six Indian Auxiliaries of the Bible Society lay beside the story of these beginnings of Christianity in Bengal, and in startling contrast with it, the statistics of last year. From the Calcutta centre the issues have been one hundred and seven thousand copies; this is the highest yet known, and six thousand beyond that of the year before. In the Madras district never were the opportunities of Bible work so prosperous or so promising; the issues, unequalled by any previous year, have been one hundred and thirty thousand. Bangalore, with its Kanarese version, has also passed all earlier returns in a circulation of fourteen thousand; Bombay has risen from thirty-six thousand in 1889 to fifty-seven thousand in 1890; Allahabad, the centre of the Hindi supplies, from twenty-three thousand to fifty-eight thousand; and, finally, in a list in which there is no exception to the records of a progress which passes beyond any point gained in the past, Lahore, which in 1871 circulated one thousand two hundred copies, distributed last year forty-seven thousand. On these significant statistics a commentary of equal significance and exhaustive interest is furnished by the reports and journals which accompany them. Not that these reports are all favourable; for there are everywhere signs, perhaps in this very diffusion of Scriptural truth, that a shattering struggle is near. But there is also everywhere that which to hearts of true courage is itself prelude of victory—the eagerness for the battle because the end is already assured. ‘As

regards India,' the Calcutta report writes, 'it seems certain that there will be a time of fierce, stern conflict; yet alike the veteran of fifty years and the recruit of yesterday are confident of triumph.' This spirit reveals itself with more or less expression in all the returns. It is under its influence that the agents strengthen their organization, and chronicle the records of every success. Even the native mind is beginning to be alarmed, and the native societies for the diffusion of anti-Christian literature is but another form of the confession, reported from some educated Hindus at Madras, that 'the Scriptures are destroying more temples than even the Moguls did.' How large a share in this progress belongs to direct Bible circulation no one who reads the journals can doubt. 'I have noticed,' writes one of the missionaries, 'that during the twenty-one years of my career in N. India most of my inquirers and converts have been men and women who have been brought to Christ, by the quiet and steady perusal at home of the Word of God.' It is one of the most delightful facts in the history of the year that such opportunities of home study are more and more possible, for since the Biblewomen, now so welcome in many Zenenas, began their work, the Indian home has been indeed opened to the Gospel, and its deep fountain of sympathies and many influences touched as it never has been before.

Opposite Madras, across the Bay of Bengal, lies BURMAH, and from its capital the year has brought the first report, brief but satisfactory, of the society's new Agency there. And, crossing the limits of Burmah to the south-east, we enter that 'island world of the Pacific,' the central home of the Malaysian race, where six European and nineteen native colporteurs are at work, and where during the year they assisted in the distribution of forty-eight thousand copies of the Scriptures. Hard by are AUSTRALIA and NEW ZEALAND, where fifty auxiliaries are lending their strength to the work of the parent society, and caring for the wants of their own expanding populations. Beyond these new homes of our race, and beyond the ocean which, to the east, washes their shores, stretch the coasts of South America; there also—in CHILI and PERU, in the ARGENTINE REPUBLIC,

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n BRAZIL, in BRITISH GUINEA, as well as in the WEST
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 Society's organization is established, and its work is being
 done. To Canada alone many pages might be given,
 and the account of its sixteen auxiliaries—that of Upper
 Canada with four hundred and sixty-one branches, and
 that of Montreal with two hundred and eighty-one—
 the summaries of their labours, the journals of their
 colporteurs, would render every page as attractive as it
 would be full of suggestion to others. But to all these
 fields no fuller reference can be made now.

To this closing page—itsself a position of advantage,
 for it is often the latest words, the most recent facts,
 which linger longest in the memory—there has been
 reserved the references which must be made to CHINA
 and JAPAN. In the year's history of Japan the leading
 fact is the reorganization of Bible work by the formation
 of a united Committee representing the Societies at work
 there; and the first Report, while it announces the
 absorption of the mind of the people in political affairs,
 and an unwelcome recrudescence of antipathy to every-
 thing foreign, is yet decisive in its tone, and encouraging
 in its outlook. The CHINA reports are, like those of
 last year, shadowed by the accounts of inundations, with
 their haunting famines and plagues which so often drive
 a morose fatalism into the people's soul, and hinder the
 freer spread of the Word of divine comfort and peace.
 At the same time the pages are brightened by many an
 illustration of the way in which light is rising on the
 great Mongolian races; and the total issues for the year
 over two hundred and eleven thousand, is itself a result
 about which we cannot be too glad.

But in the Christian history of China the interest of
 the year 1890 centres at Shanghai, and in the Missionary
 Conference which was held there in May. At this great
 convention more than four hundred delegates represented
 over forty separate organizations; and the presence
 among them of this Society's Editorial Superintendent
 indicated how deeply was felt the Biblical importance of
 the event. The history of the Conference has already
 been written in many forms, but from none of them is
 absent that expression of thankfulness which is never so

genuine as when it comes after fear. But whatever natural fears may have preceded the Assembly few have survived it ; and the magnanimous unanimity with which the delegates, subduing every contending interest, agreed to undertake the production of a standard version of the Bible which; in various editions, may suit alike the scholar and the peasant, and, superseding imperfect renderings, become for a third of the human race what the Authorised Version is for England and Luther's for Germany,—this is not only the inauguration of a monumental work, but the expression of a Christian spirit which is itself greater than any task it may accomplish. Is it not also a symbol full of beauty and an earnest full of hope of the issue of that higher enterprise which, not limited to one nation, but including them all, cannot be crowned with the accomplishment of its desire until the Word of God is familiar to all His children, and the Bible has been given to the WORLD !



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AGENT'S REPORT.

To the President and Committee of the Nova Scotia Bible Society.

GENTLEMEN :

Owing to the unprofitable returns of agriculture in 1890, I began my campaign in 1891 with mingled feelings of fear and hope ; for if only a partial failure in that year's business seriously affected the income of the Bible Society, a succeeding year of failure of the crops would mean utter depression in commerce and an almost empty Bible Society treasury. But marching orders having been issued it is ours to obey ; and the activities of duty dispel recurring fears, while courage courses through the heart at the remembrance of the Master's words, " it is not for you to know the times and seasons which the Father hath set within his own authority." And the cheering promise " Lo I am with you always " is as pregnant with victory to the faithful armour bearer as to the bravest soldier on the tented field. It is ours to provide the Word of God, which is the Sword of the Spirit, the weapon by which the kingdom of this world shall be won for the Lord and His Christ. Whether, therefore, farm crops be abundant or meagre, commerce profitable or otherwise, there will always be some returns for Bible Society gleaners ; for poor indeed must be the man whose soul is nourished with his own English Bible, who cannot once a year contribute a portion of his income to send the same saving Word to his fellow-men in spiritual destitution. As the season advanced, hope was

strengthened by promising crops, and the people's expressions of unabated interest in the Society's work. The harvest was abundant, and I am glad to notice that my own gatherings for the Society show an increase on former years. Still I cannot restrain the expression that there is a great room for increased liberality in such a beneficent and glorious cause, room for deeper zeal and enlarged gifts of the Society's old friends and a hundred fold increase in the lists of annual contributions. Notwithstanding an Agent's annual visit and profuse circulation of Bible Society literature, it is surprising that comparatively few church going people really understand the nature of the Society or its claims upon them for annual support. Some think it is sectional or denominational, and as such it cannot concern them; others imagine that the Society is rich and can exist without their help; others who know it to be a charitable institution, yet remain ignorant of its full claims and its missionary genius, and consequently are content with the bestowal of an occasional pittance; whereas did they conscientiously avail themselves of the information which we are anxious to give, they might enjoy the greater blessing of life membership and liberal supporters of the grandest philanthropic institution of this missionary age. If you look over our financial columns you will be surprised at the meagre support from rich and populous districts—districts dotted with churches, yet indicated in our Report by figures of unbecoming insignificance; while other places of less note in the world's estimation shew well in the Society's ranks.

In planning my route of Branch Visitation I had in view the expected visit of the Rev. T. Aston Birns, and was glad at the prospect of accompanying the parent Society's Honorary Home Secretary for a few days in the province, but on learning that he would have no time to carry out his first intention, I changed

my course and made appointments in New Brunswick, learning only of his visit when it was too late, owing to distance, to meet him. Should our Dominion be again honoured by a deputation from London, it would be well if two weeks could be devoted to the Maritime Provinces, and that the Auxiliary Committee be permitted to plan the route of visitation.

I began my visitation work, as in previous years, at the lower end of the Stewiacke Valley, holding my first meeting in the Presbyterian Church, LOWER STEWIACKE on March 19. I am glad to notice an increase in the annual contributions of that young branch, and judging from my knowledge of some of the residents of that growing place, they will keep the fire on our altar burning with increased zeal.

The following day I had a fair meeting at MIDDLE STEWIACKE and received from the Revd. President of that branch \$19.60, being also quite an increase on its previous year's contribution.

On Sabbath 22nd I addressed South Branch Congregation in the morning, and was kindly driven by Mr. E. Tupper to UPPER STEWIACKE VILLAGE in the evening, where I also had a good audience, but owing to imperfect notices no collections at either place were taken up. At the latter meeting five dollars were handed me by Mr. Dickie, being part of the previous year's contribution. At the present writing I have not heard of any returns from this Branch for 1891.

At SPRINGSIDE meeting I received from the Treasurer \$3.40, being some late gifts of the previous year, and since then you have received \$24.11. These two sums keep up SPRINGSIDE'S good record.

Crossing the mountain to DEAN SETTLEMENT I addressed a fair audience on the following night at UPPER MUSQUODOBOIT. It gives me pleasure to notice

that this Branch has turned a new leaf in the Society's favour. May it increase in that sympathy towards the Bible Society, for which some of the residents of the place were distinguished in days of yore.

Our meetings at ELMSDALE and MIDDLE MUSQUODOBOIT were fairly well attended, and of quite a pleasant character, but if the returns are all in they show quite a falling off from those of former years.

It being "Division" night at SHUBENACADIE our meeting there was a failure. On the following day I collected \$10.62, and a kind lady subsequently remitted to Halifax \$1.00, but \$11.62 is not a contribution worthy of that place, nor can such be obtained unless a corp of collectors be appointed to canvass the village and adjoining country.

The meeting at MAITLAND was well attended, but not having "the benefit of the clergy," (they being out of town,) it was not quite up to Bible Society regulation. My canvass, however, of that generous town was very successful; but by the death of Mr. George Frieze, which occurred a few days after I received his last gift, the Society has lost a life long and liberal supporter.

At SELMA, LOWER SELMA, and NOEL the meetings were well attended, but no plate collections were taken up, as was also the case in MUSQUODOBOIT VALLEY. I notice a slight falling off in NOEL's contribution, but it is still good and had there been plate collections at its three meetings the contributions would probably have exceeded that of any previous year. NOEL Branch has some generous supporters and the cause there has always been well sustained.

The meeting at WALTON was well attended, and that new Branch shews in this report its first canvass in our cause, for which the estimable young lady

President has my deep thanks. May the results of her initial effort in this good work cheer her on to still greater achievements in the future, and may she find helpers willing to extend the canvass in every direction.

Election day spoiled our meeting at CHEVAREE, but I duly received its annual contribution, and my thanks are due to the amiable lady who undertook the canvass of that village. May she also henceforth obtain willing helpers in gleaning for our gracious garner.

BURLINGTON meeting was better than usual as was also the contribution. Our supporters there are few in number, but some of them are liberal towards the cause.

At the NEWPORT meeting, which was well attended, I was, as on the previous year, ably assisted by the Rev. Mr. Ashbury; and you will be pleased to know that the venerable Mr. Cochrane still leads on that old and loyal Branch with wonted zeal. Although the Committee have evidently secured a general canvass of the district. I am sorry to notice the result falls considerably below last year's.

I had a good meeting at ELMSDALE and NINE MILE RIVER on April 12th, at which the plate collections amounted to \$8.64.

I failed to obtain meetings at MILFORD and GAY'S RIVER, and returned to NEW BRUNSWICK. This trip, which occupied four weeks differed little from those of former years, as to bad roads, rough weather and casual disappointments through imperfect notices of meetings. But the inclemency of weather was, as heretofore, offset by generous hospitality and genial companionship of loyal adherents of the Bible Society.

From August 11th to December 11th I was, with the exception of a few days, again engaged in Nova Scotia, beginning at ANTIGONISH, where I had a good

meeting and received the plate collection of \$6.03, and also some contributions and the promise of a supplemented canvass.

I had no meeting at GENELG but was assured that the collectors would in due time canvass the district there and at EAST RIVER, ST. MARY'S.

The meeting at SHERBROOKE was smaller than usual, as was also the collection which has since been sent to HALIFAX.

At LOCHABER and UNION CENTRE I had good meetings on Sabbath the 16th and received the plate collection amounting to \$12.83 and the promise of an additional contribution later on.

The first meeting in CAPE BRETON was in PORT HAWKESBURY on the 17th. I subsequently canvassed the town, receiving \$17.03, and cash for Bibles sold by the Depository, \$12.65.

At Cow BAY a Stereoptican show in the Village somewhat interfered with our meeting, but I gathered \$18.00 from a few very liberal friends of our cause during the few hours I spent there.

The meeting at BRIDGEPORT was small and none was arranged for at GLACE BAY, but in these places I collected \$18.20. At GLACE BAY our friends are few but very generous.

On Sabbath the 23rd I preached in St. Andrew's Church, SYDNEY in the morning and at the close of the evening service I addressed a united meeting in the same church, on the Bible Society's work. During my stay of two days in that beautiful town I collected \$60.76 and received from the Depository for Bibles sold \$6.58. This amount was quite an advance of any previous record, and cheered me on in my subsequent canvass across the harbour.

At SYDNEY MINES I collected \$15.00, precisely the same amount as that of the previous year, and our friends at the Mines have since remitted to you \$10.00, which makes a praiseworthy contribution from that Branch.

At NORTH SYDNEY the meeting was poorly-attended, but during my short stay there I collected \$56.33, an good advance also on the previous year's amount.

During my stay in SYDNEY, NORTH SYDNEY and vicinity the weather was exceptionally warm and would have been almost insufferably so but for the warmth of Sydney hearts and glowing generosity of contributors. And it was with great pleasure that the Bible Society responded to an appeal from the W. C. T. U. for a free grant of Scriptures for distribution among the English and Foreign sailors who visit that busy and most lovely harbour, regretting only its inability at the time to furnish a fuller supply of suitable Scriptures.

At BADDECK meeting the collection was \$2.00 and I obtained \$3.00 more from two annual subscribers; to which has since been added the welcome sum of \$24.75 from the Presbyterian Church of that charming village and vicinity. In all \$29.79.

From a few kind friends in the picturesque village of WHYCOCOMAGH I collected \$13.00, a slight advance on the previous years amount. And on Sabbath the 30th, at WEST BAY and the POINTS that Presbyterian congregation gave me the plate collections of \$23.00, which together with generous hospitalities and journeying assistance will be ever gratefully remembered.

There was a goodly gathering and a very appreciative audience in the pretty little church at St. PETER'S on the 31st, at which the plate collection of \$4.93 swelled my canvass in that village to \$13.68, a noble gift from that small Presbyterian congregation, to

which was added the cordial hospitality of Morrison's elegant and commodious hotel.

September 1st and 2nd were very wet days, yet I gathered in PORT HASTINGS \$9.50.

This closed the most successful trip through CAPE BRETON which I have yet made, and here it is meet to acknowledge the countless kindnesses of the Islanders, and as of yore their hearty hospitalities to your agent and sincere sympathy with our cause.

On Sept. 3rd I was privileged to address a meeting for the first time at PORT MURRAVE. A few friends contributed \$4.75, which I trust is only an earnest of greater things in the future.

I addressed a meeting in the Methodist Church, GUYSBORO, on Sabbath the 6th and received the collection \$4.53, which added to my canvass of \$6.25, and that of the ladies \$17.20, shows \$27.98 from that fine old branch.

I made a second visit to Antigonish with the view of canvassing the town, but the greatest storm of the season seriously hindered my work.

When in NEW GLASGOW and PICTOU I called upon the Presidents and Secretaries of the Auxiliaries with the view of rendering them assistance by a visitation of their outside branches in future, if necessary, and on the 9th I had the pleasure of organizing a branch at MILLVILLE in connection with Pictou Auxiliary.

I also addressed a meeting at TATAMAGOUCHE but failed in organizing, although the Rev. Thos. Sedgewick encouraged the cause by speech and purse.

I hope, however, yet to succeed in organizing a branch there and another at RIVER JOHN, at which place I spent part of a day preparing the way.

I addressed three meetings at WALLACE Branch, viz., at the STAKE on Friday, and at WALLACE and FOX

HARBOUR on Sabbath. I am glad to notice the continued liberality of Wallace Branch, and I trust that the executive ability of that committee will continue to be rewarded with becoming success. Our deepest thanks are due to our friends in Wallace; for there the Society's cause has had to sustain bitter opposition for many years.

At ACADJA MINES I addressed two meetings, and one each at PORTAUIQUE, ECONOMY, FIVE ISLANDS, PARRSBORO, SPRINGHILL and RIVER HEBERT, but when at BASS RIVER I was forestalled by the veteran Christian soldier, Father Chiniquy. I held also fair meetings at GREAT VILLAGE, FOLLEIGH, DEBERT and BELMONT. I have not yet heard of any returns from ECONOMY, FIVE ISLANDS, GREAT VILLAGE or SPRINGHILL. I am sorry to see a falling off in the grand old Branch of BASS RIVER and hope it is only temporary for there your agent has always been cheered by the deep interest in the Society's work manifested by many in that thrifty and intelligent community. But it may be as it was last year when I wrote my report, that the returns are not yet all in. By the death of the Rev. A. L. Wyllie our Society has lost one of its most liberal supporters, and your agent a warm friend. At the last meeting in GREAT VILLAGE he was elected Vice-President, and it was his intention to work up a deeper interest in the cause in that part of the province.

Our meeting at WINDSOR on the 14th October was fairly well attended, and I was ably assisted by the Revds. Messrs. Coffin and Rogers. The audience was deeply moved by Mr. Coffin's pathetic recital of his dear son's dying testimony to the power of a single sentence of God's word in sustaining the soul about to enter the valley of the shadow of death. Every heart in that assembly was melted at the assurance that the

promise made over three thousand years ago still holds good "The Eternal God" is the "Refuge" of His Saints, "and underneath are the everlasting arms." Oh, who that knows the value of such a book but must rejoice at the Bible Society's success in its wide diffusion. I am glad to think that WINDSOR shews its appreciation of the blessed book by the splendid contribution just remitted for the Society's world-wide work.

OUR meeting at AVONDALE was as usual small, but the contribution from that ever liberal branch shows an increase.

For the first time in my agency I obtained a meeting at HANTSPORT, although typhoid fever was very prevalent in the village. A Branch was organized but at date of writing I have heard of no returns.

On Saturday I held a small meeting at LOWER HORTON, and on Sabbath the 17th I preached in the same village and at WOLFVILLE; and in the evening our Bible Society was held in the Baptist Church, WOLFVILLE. Although it rained heavily on the following Monday I collected fairly well, carrying away \$18.25.

It rained again on Tuesday, and although the night was dark we had a fair meeting at CHURCH STREET, and I was agreeably surprised when four bright young lads handed me \$18.00. Mrs. Edwin Chase had a few days before asked her Sabbath School Class for volunteer collectors for our cause and these boys cheerfully responded to the appeal with the above mentioned result. I do not know whether such lads are members of the Christian Endeavor Society, but whether or not, such is a commendable way of practicing a Christian principle.

You will be gratified to learn that the KENTVILLE Branch has been re-organized and again graces our

financial lists as of yore ; and that some new and very liberal friends are making up what the Society has lost by departed supporters.

The returns from CANARD are also very cheering. May the new and fruitful zeal in the diffusion of the leaves of the tree which are for the healing of the nations be rewarded by heaven's blessings on orchard and meadow of that luxuriant valley, and the heart of every husbandman be encouraged to increased liberality.

The night was dark and stormy when I visited CANNING, and the fever prevalent. No meeting, no collections and no friends, save those who were sick or absent from home.

On Sabbath the 25th I held meetings at WATERVILLE, BERWICK and SOMERSET. You will notice in the list of contributors that SOMERSET still leads all Nova Scotia's rural Branches in liberality, and in proportion to population far ahead of some towns ostentatious of wealth and abounding in religious institutions. It is this Branch that the late Silas Bishop, Esq., so long lead as President and whose bequest of \$500.00 will furnish the good seed of the Word to thousands of famishing souls in distant lands.

When at AYLESFORD the night was so dark and stormy that no meeting was held, and on the following night at MIDDLETON the weather and bad roads also made a meeting impossible, and also prevented me from visiting a few kind friends of the Society at MELVERN SQUARE. These, however, to the manner born, never fail to remit their annual contributions. During my stay at LAWRENCETOWN the weather was so cold and blustering that I had to remain indoors and avail the occasion for correspondence ; but at night, notwithstanding the inclement weather, we had a fair and very pleasant meeting. Our support in LAWRENCETOWN this

year, as has been often in the past, is confined to two Methodist families, and of that class who are the salt of the earth.

The meeting at BRIDGETOWN was fairly attended and hopeful of growth in Bible Society zeal. At time of meeting the canvass was not finished and the expected contributions were to be devoted to purchase of Bibles for a local Depository which is much needed in that town.

We had a small but very pleasant meeting at ROUND HILL, and the contribution, which is considerably above last year's, shows a growing interest and praiseworthy zeal in Bible work by the thrifty residents of that lovely and fruitful hillside. The adjoining towns will have to stir up to a fuller canvass of their streets or the intervening country will carry off the laurels.

The night was dark and extremely cold on Sabbath the 1st November when our meeting was held in the Methodist Church, ANNAPOLIS. Our thanks are again due to the Rev. R. McArthur for his ever timely help, and to Mrs. Campbell who superintends the collecting work.

The meeting at DIGBY was small, the weather being still very cold, but not too cold to keep away a venerable couple of friends of the Book and devoted followers of its divine author. DIGBY's contribution shews an increase, and I am sure none would rejoice more deeply than the President of that Branch were its annual contributions doubled in value.

Our meeting at WEYMOUTH was fair, although the weather was still cold and the night very dark. It was very cheering to listen to the scholarly octogenarian Rector of that village church, as he spoke of the power of the Bible in moulding our national life, and

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 dented empire. It was also a scene most touching and
 one worthy of the brush of art, as that venerable and
 staunch churchman wended his way with staff and
 lantern along bluff and beach to attend our annual
 Bible Society meeting in the distant Baptist Church.
 Beautiful indeed must be the soul and lion hearted the
 frame of that Christian patriot, who, while the young
 and stalwart shrank from leaving their firesides on that
 night, he joyously ventured out to aid by his voice a
 Society that deals out the bread of life to a hungry
 world. Would that Dr. Filuel's zeal prevailed every
 diocese and WEYMOUTH be everywhere imitated in
 liberality, and in its steady growth in annual contri-
 butions.

The YARMOUTH meeting was held in the Presby-
 terian Church on the 5th. The smallness of the
 audiencè, and particularly the lack of ministerial
 representation, was a subject of sad comment, only two
 ministers were present. The substantial sympathy
 of YARMOUTH for our cause is however abundantly
 manifested in our financial columns, and shews that
 YARMOUTH leads every town in support of the Bible
 Society. Until the very last hour of my canvass I
 was fearful of failure in maintaining the annual
 standard, but after all I was able to gather an increase
 of the preceding year's handsome gift and this was
 supplemented by Mr. Farish collecting from subscribers
 who were out of town during my visit. This swelled
 my canvass to \$74.75 among the gentlemen, and the
 Ladies Association rolled up \$156.24, making Yar-
 mouth's contributiou \$230.99. I very much regret to
 learn that the ladies collections were not fully copied
 by the printer last year. The report, however, will
 show that the Treasurer duly received the grand total
 of cash; and the kind donors may rest assured that

their names are written on a higher and more enduring record than that of our perishable paper.

I had planned to devote a day to ARGYLE but was induced by a competent adviser and friend of the Society to postpone my visit to a future occasion.

In the Methodist Church, Kirk and F. C. B. Temple at BARRINGTON I held meetings on Sabbath the 8th and received there and from the President \$16.00.

The meeting at SHELBURNE was small, as was also the collection ; but collectors were appointed to canvass the town.

Only twenty-five persons attended our meeting at LIVERPOOL. I received from Mrs. Anderson \$20.50 with list of contributors. Our thanks are due to that lady for her kindness and activity in our cause.

No meeting was arranged for in MILTON, not, however, through any neglect of your agent or the kind President of that Branch. The collector there had hard work gathering \$4.75, but the very liberal contribution of a veteran supporter swelled MILTON's gift to \$14.75.

We had no meeting at MILL VILLAGE, my notice not having reached our friends there, although written two weeks previously. The Rev. Mr. Ackman kindly drove me on Saturday towards PETITE RIVIERE, where on Sabbath morning I addressed a large congregation in the Methodist Church and re-organized the Branch there which for many years was barren of fruit. On the same day, after a long drive, I preached in the Methodist Church at MIDDLE LAHAVE and returned in the evening to address a meeting at DUBLIN SHORE.

On Monday we had a good meeting at LOWER LAHAVE Cross Roads, where I was ably assisted by the Revds. Messrs. Batty and Leck. The contributions from that fine Branch swells our treasury ; and

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the active committee and collectors merit our warm
anks, for evidently every family on the east bank of
at most charming river has been solicited for
ntributions.

Our meeting at BRIDGEWATER was held in the Y.
C. A. Hall, a cheerful and spacious room. But the
ight was stormy and the audience was smaller than
ual. I was ably assisted by the Rev. Mr. Huestis
nd the Hon. Judge Desbrisay, and we spent a very
rofitable evening's talk on Bible Society work. The
dies of Bridgewater Branch have continued to advance
collecting skill and are worthy of the highest
mmendation in rolling up the munificent contribu-
on of \$72.50. Long may the personel of that
mmittee remain intact, and their Christian activity
abundantly blessed.

At the meeting in the Lutheran Church, MAHONE
Y, I had the assistance of the Rev. Messrs. Maurer,
Williams and Crawford, and received from the
mmittee \$16.85.

At LUNENBURG our meeting was held in the
Lutheran Sunday School Room, a place admirably
uitable for a public meeting. The room was not quite
led with people, but my heart was over-flowing with
atitude when Judge Chesley and E. H. Solomon,
sq., handed me the collections amounting to \$81.22,
advance of \$12.00 over last year's, and by far the
rgest contribution ever received from that flourishing
wn by the sea. If LUNENBURG has lost some of our
d friends, the gap has been ably filled by new
rivals, and the loss overbalanced by the increased
berality of living friends.

Our meeting at DARTMOUTH was held in the Church
England Sunday School Building, and was enjoyed
all present. The meeting was ably addressed by

the ministers of the various churches. The Rev. Mr Mellor placed upon the desk for inspection an old English Bible which was found underneath a stone near my native village. The Book had been preserved from destruction by the cruel and misguided soldier of Claverhouse, although its covenanting owner had perished in the field. DARTMOUTH'S contribution although not quite up to that of the previous year, is very good, and our deep thanks are due to Mrs. Robson and her companions in committee for their constant care of our cause.

On Sabbath the 29th I addressed a Bible Society meeting at ONSLOW and preached at BELMONT, receiving the collections of \$15.23, which with BELMONT'S previous collection make a total of \$21.14 from that congregation.

Our meeting at OXFORD was fairly well attended and owing to the departure from the town of some of the old committee a new set of officers was elected.

December the 9th and 10th I spent in AMHERST collecting. I was privileged to address the Methodist prayer meeting on the cause, but no regular Bible Society meeting was held in that town. During my stay the weather was rough and the streets in very bad condition. I collected \$32.25 and obtained the assistance of the Misses Moffatt to canvass where I failed to find the friends of our cause, and I am highly gratified at the result of their kind work; for notwithstanding the deranged state of business at that time, Amherst contributions amount to \$64.85 and we have yet to hear from a gentleman who promised me to canvass among his Methodist friends in January.

This finished my visitation of the branches of the Nova Scotia Auxiliary in 1891, which I respectfully submit to your committee; grateful that I am still

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privileged to work in such a good cause, but often sad
 at the thought that the returns to the Society are far
 from being commensurate with the labor of gathering
 them, for after all they are only the crumbs that fall
 from the tables of the rich in a highly favored pro-
 vince. Sad, yet often glad, as I think of the countless
 kindnesses bestowed on me for the work's sake; and
 of the many contributors who cheerfully give part of
 their hard earnings to send abroad the saving word.
 Glad to see increased liberality in many places, and
 that others are being drawn into line with our
 missionary band. And glad in the assurance that
 God's word will not return to Him void, but will con-
 tinue to spread as the handful of corn on the top of
 the mountains, until the whole earth will be filled with
 the knowledge of the Lord.

As this report will be read by the Society's support-
 ers generally throughout the province permit me to
 close it with an appeal to the officers of branches to
 read carefully the two pages of this book entitled
 "*Suggestions for the complete organization and working
 of a Branch Bible Society.*" Unless such plans are
 adopted failure may be expected even in very liberal
 communities. I beg also to call the attention of every
 reader of this report to give a conscientious and careful
 consideration of article No. 8, the last though not the
 least in that list of suggestions; for wherever a branch
 embraces one or two persons, as therein indicated, it is
 ever prosperous. And just here I appeal to the mem-
 bers of that recently organized institution, so vigorous
 and full of promise in swelling the ranks of the Sacra-
 mental Host,—the Christian Endeavour Society—to
 give their thoughtful attention to the same subject.
 Our cause is one that comes easily within the range of
 that Society's Christian activities; and surely there
 are some members in every branch of its consecrated
 army who will readily espouse our sacred cause of Bible

diffusion,—some whose souls are so illumined by the Holy oracles of God, and whose hearts are so full of holy fire as to say: "O Christ, whose I am and whom I serve, I will endeavour to raise funds for the Bible Society and make the diffusion of Thy saving word my especial mission while I live." And what a grand triumph would also be achieved, if all the Christian Endeavor Societies would take our cause to heart and make an annual contribution in aid of the Bible Society. Which of these societies will have the honor of making the first grant towards this work for enlightening the world? Some one has truly said, "It is the light that shines farthest through the darkness that shines clearest at home" and glorifies our Father in Heaven.

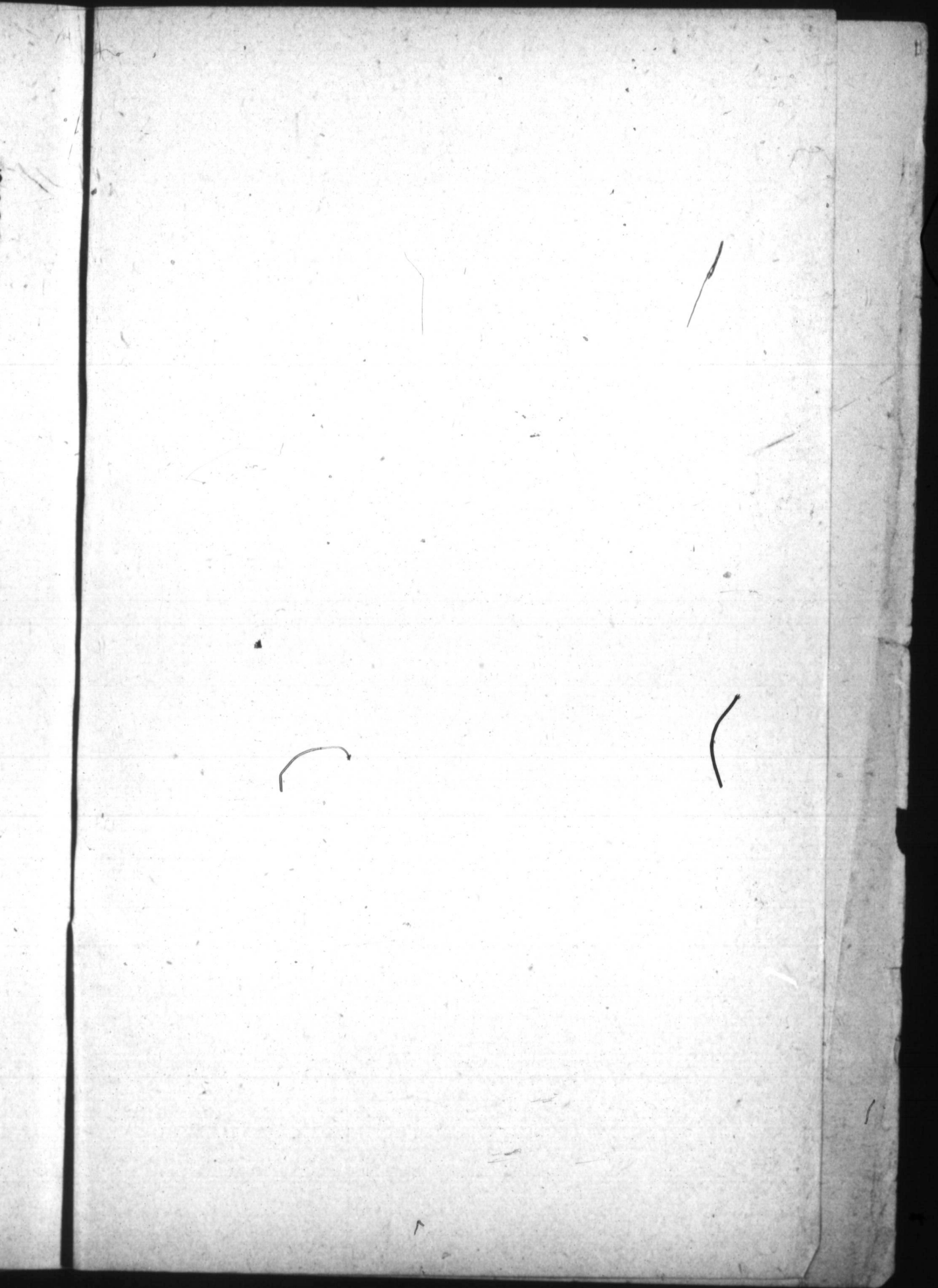

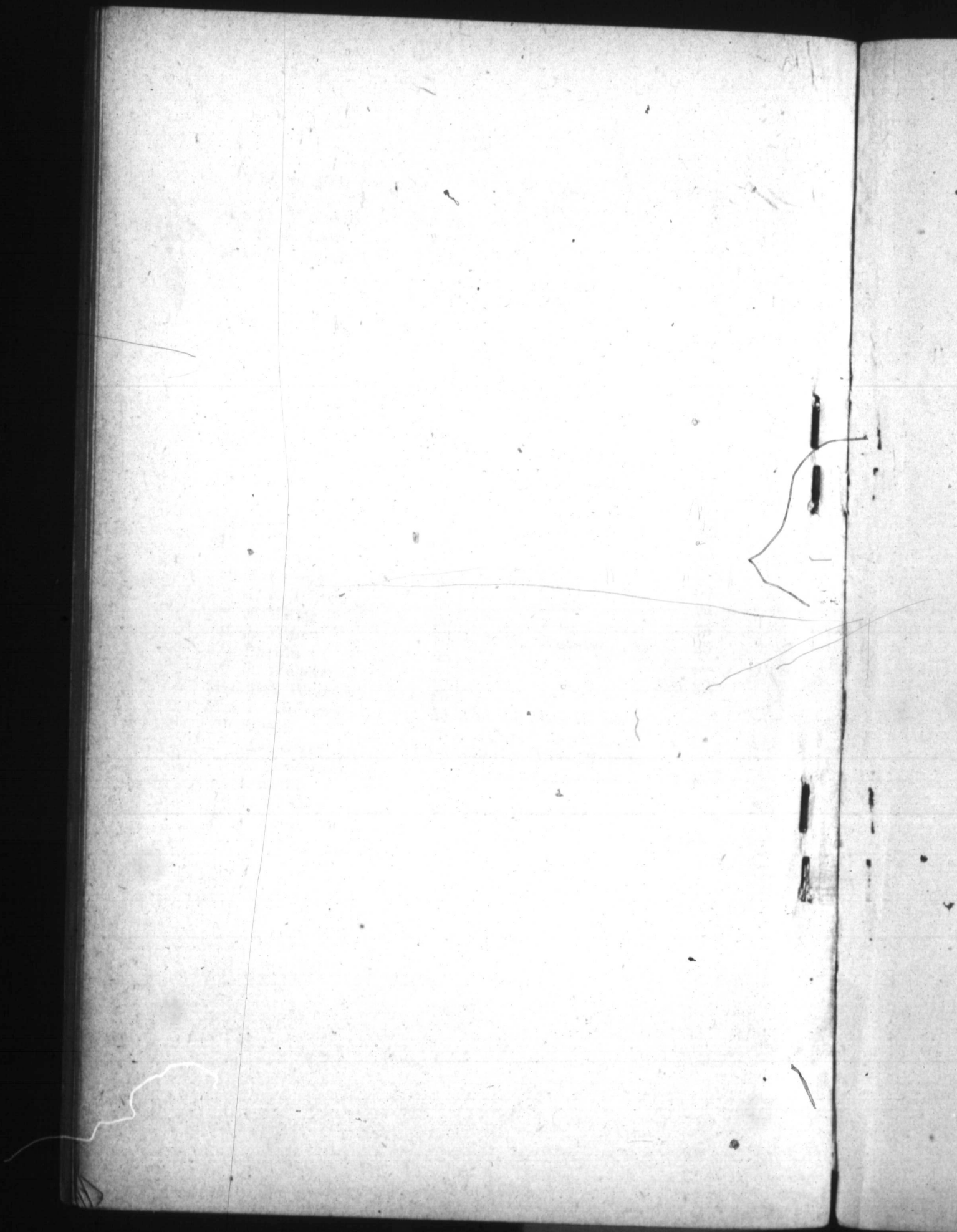

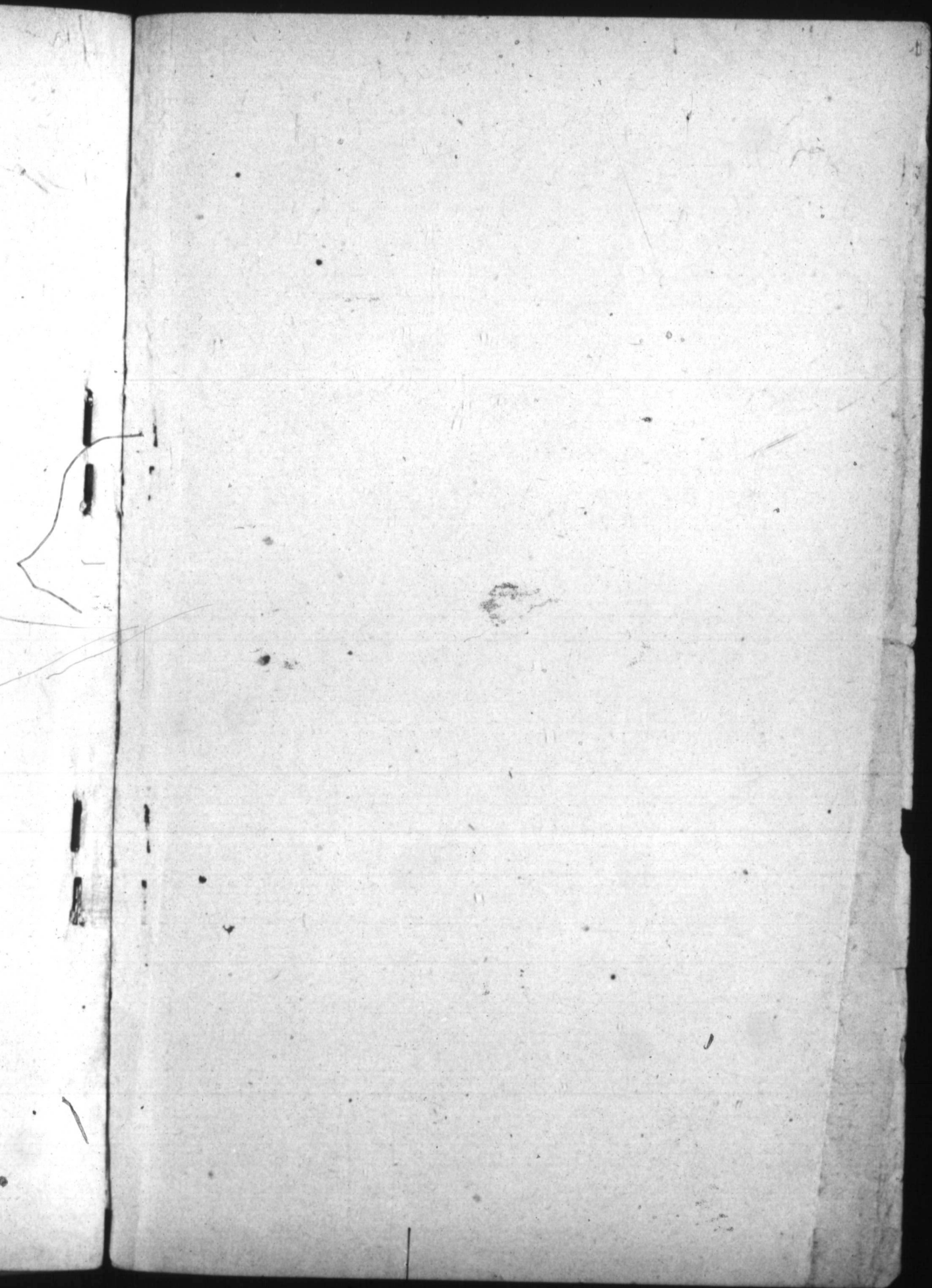
