CHATHAM, MARCH 30, 1882. The Budget Debate in the House of Assembly.

Mr. Parburie opened his speech with a reference to that of Hon. Mr. Crawford, and continuing, said, "I cannot call his speech high-toned, nor yet low-toned; but it was a desponding tone in view of the down-fall of the Government. He dwelt on some of the Acts passed by the Government, but if all the acts are like their acts they are poor acts. Why, all the Acts they passed, such as the Attachment and Garnishee Acts, are dead letters today; but it is said they are going to be revived. I cannot call this system of things wise legislation. The last speaker has been in the Government for many years, and the Attorney-General, it seems to me, has been there since Confederation, up-stairs and all around. It was not only on the school question that the Surveyor-General and Chief Commissioner differed from the Government. We remember how the Chief Commissioner assailed the President of the Council who now sits in the Government. He may smile, and a captivating and fascinating smile. He wined these gentlemen who opposed him on, one by one, until he could say, "Now I have you; you must keep your mouth shut."

The member for Charlotte, the other day, in an able speech, showed the importance of conserving the hemlock lands. We find, however, that a large quantity of this land was sold in Kent to Messrs. Miller at a nominal price, and I am informed that the bark on every acre of this land is worth eight dollars. If the Government had sold the bark and trees only a larger revenue would have accrued to the Province. The Surveyor-General has failed to show that he has managed the Crown Lands as he should have.

THE EXPOSÉ. This patched up Government, as I may call them, have devised no means of settling our lands or encouraging immigration, and our people are going away to the great Northwest. Between the Upland and Grand Falls there is a tract of 80 miles of land, with which no land in New Brunswick can compare, and it is a shame to see it lying there unused. It should be opened up by a road, on which people would settle and clear the land. There would be a market on the very spot, for one of the largest lumbering districts in New Brunswick is there, and such settlement would help the lumbermen as well. We should send out pamphlets showing the advantages of our own province and thus prevent the whole tide of emigration from going west.

I wish to say a word about the inland fisheries. They belong to the province, and the Government has been lax in their duty in letting the Dominion have control of them. I want the Provincial Government to depart from the Dominion every day that has been obtained from leasing these fisheries. We want more than a conversation, we want something in black and white, and an answer to that. Why don't our Government take a stand? First look at the Restigouche where the poor men, though aggrieved, cannot afford to go to law. The fishery officers are given tyrannical powers; they can take a man's net and incorporate him without a trial, and this will all admit ought not to be tolerated. All the people are opposed to the hatchery, and the fish are decreasing in consequence of the bad management of the Dominion Government. By the Dominion Government own a stone in that river? They do not. We know that the right of the soil is in the Province. I hope the Attorney General will promptly deal with this matter. If I moved for some correspondence regarding it the other day and have not yet obtained it. The Government, from what I have told them, must see the necessity of having this matter brought to a final issue.

TO BE SETTLED. I hope they will have time to do so before the elections, for probably the Attorney General will go buzzing around, and they say that the Provincial Secretary will be made a Judge and the Chief Commissioner will not get with us again, and the member for St. John may go some where else with his statistical part with him of course, and the member for Northumberland is also going to be elevated. I will now refer to the Grand Southern.

THE GRAND SOUTHERN. The leader of the Opposition, Mr. Ritchie and I contended that the Government had no right in point of law to pay the salaries to the Grand Southern, and the judgment of the court shows that we were correct. The Provincial Secretary last year asked the House to suspend their judgment until the matter was decided by the highest court in the land. The Government ventured to pay the money on a judgment of Judge Palmer's, though I contend they should wait until the court decided they had a right to pay the money. If the Government had a right to do this, they might as well come and inform the House that they have found out a law by which they can do anything they want to.

WE ARE OUR OWN COUNTRY. When we are our own duties to perform, and honorable members should perform these duties independently of party; and no honorable gentleman should place himself in such a position that his tongue is tied. Oh, Mr. Speaker, there is too much of this done. It is a serious matter and I would not on any account stand in such a position. I regret that the member for Westmorland and the Chief Commissioner were so easily caught by the craft of the wily leader of the Council. Why, when I was elected, I thought we would all be together. I thought we would be together in the light of the country. I might support them but I am afraid they went in from a desire to write "honorable" before their names, and \$2,000 a year extra. If they think they wish in from pure motives, must sympathize with them, but I feel satisfied that these gentlemen would prefer leaving their records better. I can almost see by the Chief Commissioner's face that he feels guilty. True, he says he went back to his constituents, and they went away to his political sins and gave him absolution. The Surveyor-General and Chief Commissioner got gazzeted and went back and told their constituents that they had taken office to serve them; that they had got everything they wanted, and that is the way they got returned without opposition.

THE GOVERNMENT'S LEGAL ACTS. I did not intend to speak this afternoon, and on that as well prepared as I would like to be, but as I have had a good case it has not been a great effort for me to put it before the House. The Government seem to be on their trial, and they all have made strong speeches to show how well they have managed their departments. They have come to the stock farm. I admire good stock, and if the Provincial

Mr. Fredericton Letter.

Work has been somewhat pushed along during the past week in the House of Assembly. Night sessions were begun on Monday last and continued for three nights, and a good deal of talking and some work were done at the House on Tuesday morning...

Mr. Hutchison's speech.

Mr. Hutchison's speech in the House of Commons on Tuesday night, in support of his resolution in regard to the coal interest, is only for the purpose of awakening Nova Scotia prejudices against the Liberal Party in view of possible elections next summer.

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The Province, seeing the importance of having it for a central prison, purchased it, one of the conditions being that the short term prisoners of St. John could be incarcerated there as a penal charge. I am not going to go over all the grounds in connection with this matter, but in 1871 the matter came before the Session, and the Dominion Government then offered to hand over the penitentiary to the Province when the central prison was built. I took the ground then, as a member of the Session, that accepting it would be like taking a white elephant for \$2,000,000 a year. The same year the Local Government presented a strong case to the Dominion asking that a reasonable indemnity might be made; but it had no effect. In 1875, Sheriff Harding and I met the Government at Ottawa, and we made a report to the Session saying the Minister of Justice informed us that he would recommend that the institution be placed in such a position as would conserve to us our local rights. The whole thing, my friends, is a vast shell. At Confederation no valuation of the penitentiaries was taken, as a letter received by me from Sir John Macdonald clearly stated. I am not going to go into the Dominion Government introduced an act allowing short-term prisoners for a certain period to be sent to the penitentiary, and when the question came before the Supreme Court, the act was held to be unconstitutional. It was decided by the Dominion Government that it had the right to legislate concerning penitentiaries, a theory any lawyer could have deduced equally well. The proper question was not whether the Court was, and I hold that the Dominion Government is liable to the Province, and the Province to the St. John. It is not the question of Judge King, and it is also the opinion of the present Attorney General, that prisoners convicted by statute of the Dominion Parliament should be a charge on the Dominion. This is not a matter of civil concern, but a vindictive one, and the Government were pressing the claim as earnestly as they possibly could. The people of St. John, in the interest of morality, are looking to a reformatory, but deem it possible to take it up with this question pending, yet I hope the day is not far distant when the reformatory matter will be considered by the House of Assembly. As I do not wish to occupy too much of your time I will now bring my remarks to a close, and in doing so I may fairly assert that the condition of the Province is one in which we may fairly congratulate ourselves, for New Brunswick, today, occupies as good a field, taking all the circumstances into consideration, as any of the other Provinces of Canada. Before I sit down, Mr. Speaker, allow me to thank you and the members of the Session for the attention that has been given me and for the courteous manner in which my remarks have been received.
